

### Bank wins some relief

Hereford State Bank won at least some temporary relief last week from a grand jury subpoena for financial transactions of several people and firms involved in the investigation of the district attorney's office.

Pat Boone, 154th District judge, modified the subpoena during a hearing last Friday, ordering that the "execution of the subpoena be abated until such time that funds are made available to pay the reasonable costs incurred by the bank."

The judge also ordered the deletion of several words in the terminology of records to be produced. He said the words "but not limited to" should be stricken from the subpoena, thus making the description more specific.

"We are perfectly willing to produce specific copies of transactions ordered by the court," said Craig Smith, bank president. "But producing three years of transactions on several accounts from our original microfilm seems impractical and inappropriate."

Smith said the time and cost would be meaningful, not to mention the question of privacy of other accounts on the microfilm. Should the bank turn over the film, Smith said it would also be in the position of losing access to data which other customers night need, especially with tax time approaching.

It was reported Tuesday that the judge denied the motion to quash the subpoenas, but the modification ruling was not explained in the Brand article.

ing a civil war against the U.S-backed government for four years.

The embassy spokesman identified the border guard as Modesto Perdomo Osorio, and said the agent had accompanied the family since they crossed the border from Guatemala on Wednesday. Lagana said Ms. Cancel

### Shuttle delayed overnight on trip

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - Bad weather has se back the space shuttle Columbia's cross-country trip to California by almost two days, but the delay isn't crucia. since the orbiter's next mission remains eight months away, officials said.

The jumbo jet hauling the shuttle as a piggyback passenger spent an unscheduled night in San Antonio, but its crew hoped to leave this morning on the four-hour flight to Edwards Air Force Base.

The shuttle-bearing jet, which took off Thursday morning from Cape Canaveral in Florida, was expected to stor about 11/2 hours at Kelly Air Force Base for refueling.

#### Judge considering motion

HOUSTON (AP) - An instructive verdict acquitting a woman charged with killing her former professional football player husband is "very close," according to the Texas judge who was to rule today on a defense motion.

Attorney Jack Zimmermann submitted a 12-page brief to state District Judge Pete Moore late Thursday as the state rested its case against Patricia Latourette.

Mrs. Latourette, 35, is charged with murder in the Dec. 22, 1982 shooting death of her husband, Charles, a radiologist and former defensive back with the St. Louis Cardinals of the National Football League.

Moore, describing the state's evidence as "completely circumstantial," deferred a ruling on the defense motion until today to allow Harris County prosecutors the opportunity to contest it.

The trial is in its second week before a five-woman, seven-man jury. Moore said that while the jury members are factfinders in the case, it was up to him to decide if the evidence presented by the state was insufficient.

#### School absenteeism high

AUSTIN (AP) - A sudden, "overwhelming" flu has struck Texas, with some schools reduced to 80 percent attendance because of the virus, says a state health official.

"What is unique is the very suddenness with which it has occurred," said Jeff Taylor, an epidemiologist with the Texas Department of Health.

"Last week, Jan. 15, there was nothing, and then within seven to 10 days, it seems that everybody's sick. It was very sudden, very overwhelming," Taylor said Thursday. I haven't seen (school) absentee levels like this in over two years," he said.

In schools districts in Tarrant and surrounding counties, some schools have experienced absentee rates as high as 22 percent to 25 percent.



GEORGETOWN, Texas (AP) - Dr. Kathleen Holland says nurse Genene Jones ran out of explanations when the doctor found two holes in a vial of the drug allegedly by the nurse to kill a baby.

The Kerrville pediatrician told jurors Thursday that her nurse was "cooly defensive" when confronted with the holes in the bottle's stopper. Ms. Jones was out of explanations, but not out of ideas, she said.

The nurse wanted to throw the bottle away, the doctor testified. I indirectly authorized." By that time, 10 days after



#### Hunger issue split

WASHINGTON (AP) - Republicans are accusing Democrats of partisanship and grandstanding over the hunger issue, while Sen. Edward M. Kennedy says a presidential task force is perpetrating "a cruel joke" on the underfed.

Those claims and counter-claims flew across a congressional hearing room Thursday as senators and congressmen held an unusual joint hearing on the report of President Reagan's Task Force on Food Assistance.

'To put it plainly, the task force report is a cruel joke on millions of our fellow citizens who continue to endure an unacceptable and unfair burden of poverty, hunger and deprivation in this wealthy, well-fed and privileged land," declared Kennedy, D-Mass.

#### **Blizzard halts fighting**

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - A heavy snowstorm halted the factional fighting around Beirut today, and army troops left their battle stations to join in rescuing 111 travelers stranded overnight on a mountain highway.

Police said soldiers, civil defense workers and the Red Cross joined police in two rescue expeditions, saving travelers trapped in cars and buses by shoulder-high

One rescue mission was mounted from Zahle, a city in the Bekaa Valley, and the other from Jounieh, a port north of Beirut, police said.

Last February, 63 travelers died in a blizzard that buried another stretch of road in the central mountains. U.S. Marines helped in rescue operations then, but today they remained at their 'barricaded base at Beirut's air-

they remained at their barricaded base at Berrut's al-port, where they have been targets of frequent attacks. As the snowfall interrupted the fighting, diplomatic ef-forts continued to achieve a more permanent cease-fire. Prime Minister Shafik Wazzan said Thursday that the government was bowing to demands by Druse leader Walid Jumblatt that had stalled a plan to set up buffer zones betwen the warring factions.

#### Millions vote: others sit-in

MANILA, Philippines (AP) - Millions of Filipinos ted today on a proposal to create a vice presidency and three other measures, but many others stayed home, stag-ed sit-ins or jogged in groups to protest the election. The constitutional referendum was planned by Presi-

dent Ferdinand E. Marcos' political party as a concession to his long-powerless opposition. But many of those critics were unsatisfied and called for an election boycott to pro-

Ricardo Rosaldo, local customs administrator, said he had neither the trained staff nor the equipment to detect radioactivity in metal imported from the United States, Excelsior said.

Five truckloads of contaminated construction steel were stopped at El Paso and sent back to Mexico last week. Officials in New Mexico and Arizona were continuing a search for the contaminated steel and feared some may have been used in buildings.

MEXICO CITY (AP) - Zoo veterinarians have confirmed the sex of a panda born six months ago, zoo ad-ministrator Maria Elena de Hoyo said Tuesday. The panda baby is a boy, she said.

The panda's sexual identity was confirmed by wary veterinarians after an inspection Monday, Ms. de Hoyo told reporters:

He was born last June 22, the third offspring of Ying Ying and Pe-Pe, two nineyear-old pandas donated by the Chinese government to Mexico in 1976.

HOUSTON (AP) - Continental Airlines made striking pilots a "definitive" contract offer but walked away from the bargaining table for a second time in two months after the union demanded that pilots who were hired during the walkout be replaced by strikers, officials say.

A federal bankruptcy judge had ordered representatives of the Air Line Pilots Association and the carrier to try to end the strike by Jan. 30, the date set aside to hear arguments on Continental's motion to reject labor contracts.

The two groups met for two hours in Los Angeles on Thursday before negotiations broke down. Contract talks ended bruptly last month over the same issue.

"Although we cannot and will not agree to a contract that would displace working pilots, we had hoped that the innovative methods we suggested to bring back striking pilots would help break the impasse that caused this breakdown in negotations,"

**Continental Chairman Frank** Lorenzo said in the release. ALPA members were unavailable for comments

and failed to return telephone calls Thursday night. Meanwhile, negotiations between Continental and the striking Union of Flight Attendants continued in Houston.

Pilots and flight attendants walked off their jobs Oct. 1 after Continental filed for protection from creditors under federal bankruptcy laws, then slashed its route structure, laid off many employees and cut pay sharply for workers kept on the job. Strikers claimed the carrier, once the nation's eighth

that the company officials had no choice but to file for Chapter 11 protection in order

to keep its planes in the air. According to the release, Continental presented ALPA with a "definitive contract proposal," as ordered by Wheless, during a two-hour session and recommended "a number of innovative methods" to get striking pilots back to work without displacing any employees hired during the strike.


The proposal included work-sharing programs, part-time employement, liberal policy that would allow pilots who do not need to work to take extended leaves of absence and the creation of a fund for extra jobs by allocating money that otherwise would be spent on legal fees, the release said.

The company said the pilots' back-to-work demand for replacing current pilots would violate a U.S. Supreme Court decision, as well as refurlough many pilots who had returned to active duty and demote all pilots who had been promoted during the strike.

"Continental Airlines has a duty to try and balance our moral obligation to the active pilots who have helped steer this company on the road to recovery with our obligation to try to reach an agreement that would facilitate a return to work for those pilots who have been on strike for 120 days," Lorenzo said.
