Low bid on the Canadian River bridge, north of Vega, was \$335,206 Wednesday, according to a telephone call from Marshall Formby, highway commission member. He said that the bid was submitted by Bell, Braden, Barker and Gilvin of Amarillo. The bid was around two percent less than funds allocated by the state for construction of the project, Formby said.

Next step will involve presentation of all bids before the highway commission at their official meeting Monday, Feb. 23. The commission will either accept or reject the bids. The fact that the low figure came within the allotment, however, led boosters of the project to feel that it had a good chance to pass the commission. Construction of the bridge would connect this area with Dalhart over U. S. Highway 51.

Amarillo "Advisor" Jailed For Selling Driving Permits To Hereford Mexicans

If you are one of those fellows who figure the government would have a hard time competing with private enterprise, here's your proof.

Whereas, the State Highway department issues a driver's license good for 24 months for only \$1, Tomas Hernandez, resident of 1102 South Cleveland, Amarillo, has been selling three-month permits to Spanish American residents of the Hereford area for \$3 each. Business was good, too. In addition to the original permit, renewals occurred along from time to time. Here is how he worked it.

Hernandez would in some manner contact the Spanish-Americans, telling them to go by the office in Hereford and pick up an application blank. When the victim showed up with the blank, Hernandez would carefully fill it out in detail and have the victim sign the application. If the driver were stopped, the application was shown—and he was probably gone before the inquiry cleared the state board. When the unsuspect-

Water Extensions Are Planned Here

Plans to extend water and sewerage into several new areas, including the Brawley Addition and the Spanish-American sub-division, north of Hereford, were discussed at the regular Monday evening city commission meeting of the city commission Monday evening. The city authorized the purchase of 6,000 feet of six-inch No. 1 sewer pipe to handle these extensions. The extensions will go into several other proposed areas.

The new Spanish-American sub-division, approved Jan. 24, will depend largely upon the sale of sufficient lots to justify the extension of water and sewerage, and will be incorporated in the City of Hereford. It is known as the Gomez subdivision, block 37, Evans addition.

Location of the subdivision will actually be an extension of C and D streets north to fourteenth north their present termination on Thirteenth Street. The subdivision includes 40 lots 20 on each side of the street. Nineteen lots on each side of the street will be 50 feet wide, and the twentieth will be 33.55 feet, according to the City Plan.

The ordinance calls for construction of durable materials commonly used in buildings; also that all wood, except roofs, be painted. Tents, shacks and barns are banned under the restrictions.

Take Over Jaycee Park

An appeal on behalf of the Hereford Jaycees to return the park adjoining the Main Street bridge to the city was also considered. The commission moved to accept the park, but specified that they might occasionally call on the Jaycees for help. John Aiken, president, asked the city to take the park in view of the inability of the organization to properly maintain the premises, control weeds and mow the grass, due to lack of equipment and available help.

Mayor S. O. Wilson and Commissioner Wayne Edwards attended the meeting, along with City Manager Grady Bowdry. Don Zimmerman, the other commissioner, was absent due to illness.

Parking Meters Get New Heads

A total of 215 late model, extra change parking meter heads this week replaced meters installed here in 1949. Only 20 of the old meters were judged in good condition.

Replacement of the meter heads was voted by the city commission several weeks ago following announcement of a "crack-down" on parking meter enforcement. It soon developed that 85 of the meters would not work at all, and that many of the others were sluggish.

The commission contacted the meter company and decided to exchange the heads. The exchange cost totals \$26 each, \$13 for the head and \$13 for new mechanism; total \$5,590 on 215 meters, payable \$1 per meter per month until retired.

The replacement heads, in addition, are a later model, according to City Manager Grady Bowdry, who said that they should afford much longer life than the old models with reasonable care. Parking meter receipts from April 30, 1951, to April 30, 1952, ran \$16,490.50, whereas the meter take from April 30, 1952 to Dec. 30, 1952 ran only \$6,804.85 for the eight-month period, city records show.

FARM FIRE LOSS \$40,000

Five Calls Sunday Keep Firemen Busy

Sunday was a busy day for the Hereford Fire Department! The whistle blew three times—but the actual number of calls was five. Heaviest loss of the day was the estimated \$35,000 to \$40,000 fire at Sulphur Park-Ranch, six miles east of town.

Dimmitt Restaurant
Things started humming for the department early Sunday afternoon, when a call from Dimmitt got some of the boys up from the dinner table; it was at 12:50 p. m. to be exact. This alarm resulted when the Steak House, a restaurant, caught fire and the Dimmitt crew feared that high winds might wipe out the entire Dimmitt business district. The fire occurred when the french fryer in the kitchen ignited. The blaze was brought under control, however, and the loss was reported as slight.

Back To Sulphur Park
The boys had hardly hung up their hats when they got another call at 7:45 o'clock. The Sulphur Park fire had spread to the big barn and the feed. Still without adequate facilities, the few answering the call could do little more than watch.

A total of 150,000 bundles of feed, 200 bales of hay, some threshed grain and the large barn were a total loss. Damage was estimated between \$35,000 and \$40,000. The property belonged to Walter G. Russell, Amarillo, and W. F. Doole is tenant-resident on the place.

High velocity winds and blowing dust are two hazards any fireman in this county fears. Under these conditions, the firemen felt that one call was plenty Sunday—much less five.

Marshall Formby Sworn In Monday As State Highway Commissioner

A delegation of six Hereford men and one Bovina woman were among the 75 guests who were in Austin Monday to see Marshall Formby sworn in as new commissioner of the Texas Highway Department.

The oath was administered at 11:30 Monday morning, Feb. 16, by Judge Meade Griffith of Plainview and took place in the reception room of Gov. Alan Shivers' chambers. In addition to friends from over West Texas, numerous senators, highway officials and other department representatives made up the group.

Formby, in addition to being from Hereford, is the first man of the High Plains area to be appointed to the important post, which controls placing of approximately \$100 million in state and federal funds. The commission also handles location of roads within the state, along with allocation for improvements.

A dinner for the out-of-town visitors at the ceremony was given by Formby at noon in the Stephen F. Austin hotel. Mrs. Formby and his parents of Kermit were also honor guests.

 The police figured and figured, but all they could actually charge against Hernandez was "misdemeanor swindling". He was released on \$500 bond and will appear in the Amarillo courts on April 7.

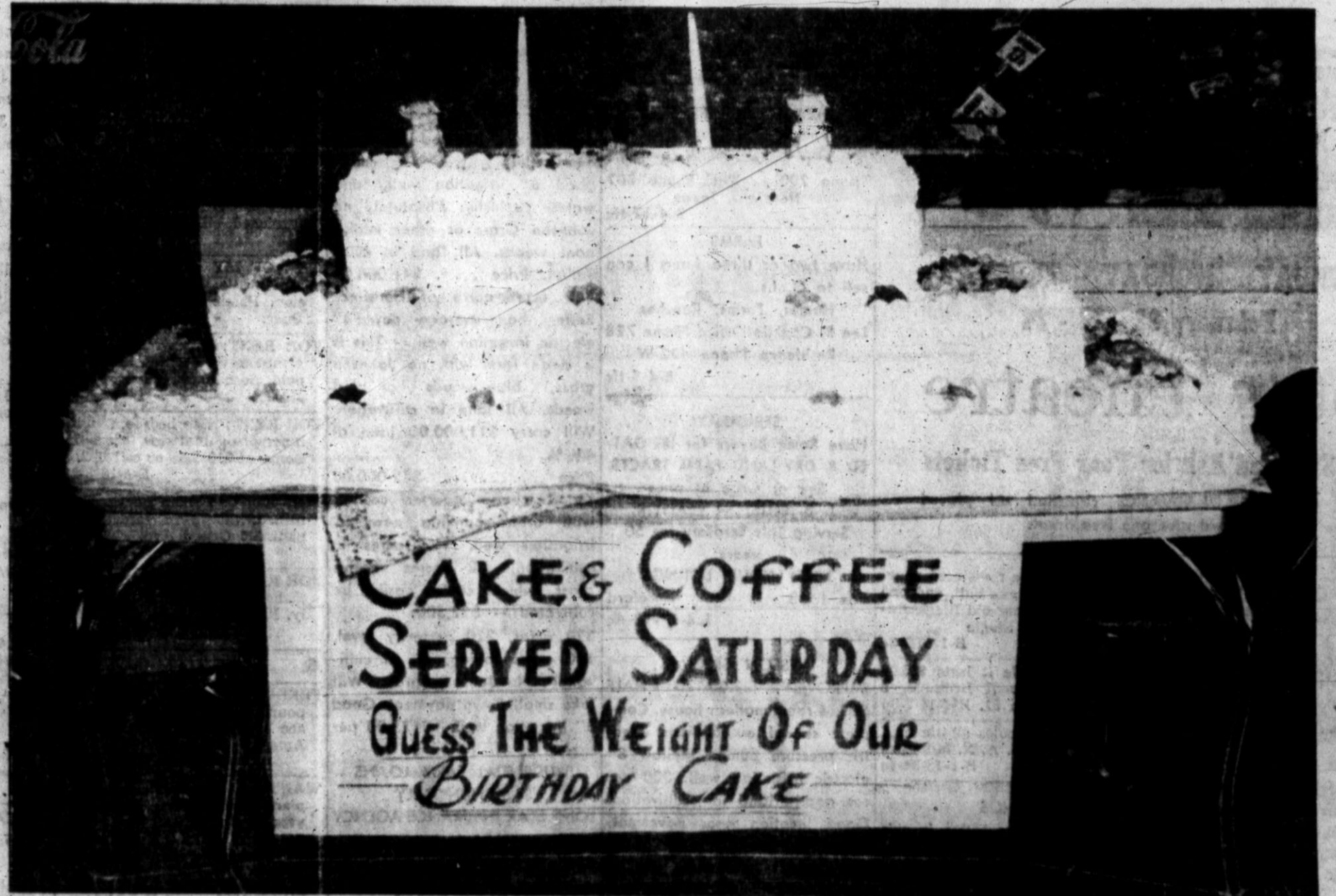

Beauty at Home

Q. I am a young girl of sixteen and am very much embarrassed by a growth of hair on my chin. What should I do about this?

A. One solution is the use of cosmetic wax. This is applied, then pulled off, bringing the unwanted hairs with it. But, of course, this is not permanent. Permanent removal can be effected by electrolysis and a qualified operator.

Q. How should rouge be applied to the long and slender face?

A. Since your rouge is your highlight, your face must be widened under the eyes by blending the rouge out towards the ears. Deepen your rouge just about even with your ear lobes.

Q. Please suggest a good treatment for hair that is very oily.

A. Oily hair should be washed often and thoroughly. Have a good permanent to make the hair less liable to become stringy. In an emergency, wet a bit of silk with cologne, and wipe off the hair, strand by strand to remove excess oil. Or, force a pad of cotton between the brush bristles and brush the hair hard.

Q. How can I eliminate blackheads and whiteheads on my back?

A. By scrubbing frequently and vigorously with a stiff brush and soap after the back has been soaked for a half-hour in cream or oil.

Q. How can I mend worn rugs?

A. By sewing a piece of burlap to the wrong side with wool thread, making stitches form loops on the right side, afterward clipping the loops the height of the nap of the rug.

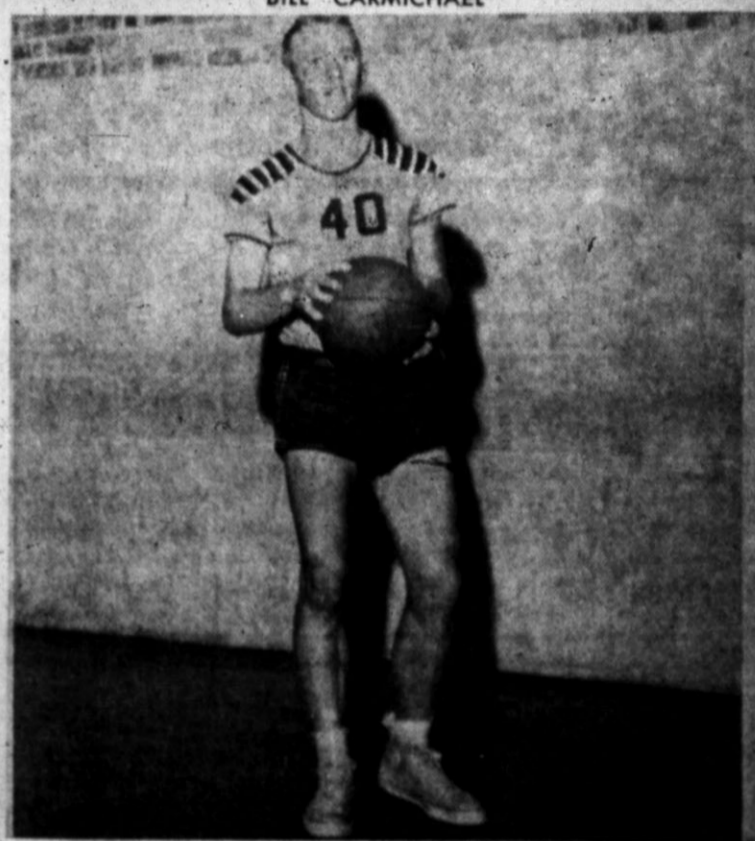
