### Red Probers Plan Future Campaigns

THE Congressional hunt for I Communists involves three committees:

1. The Government Operations Committee, headed by Wisconsin's Republican Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, which has power to investigate anywhere in the government, including the Executive

2. The Senate Internal Security Committee, headed by Sen. William E. Jenner (R-Ind.), a close friend of McCarthy's.

3. The House Un-American Activi ties Committee, headed by Rep. Harold H. Velde (R-Ill.).

In probing for Communist influence in the U.S., the three committees are bound to overlap. The Jenner and Velde groups, for example, scheduled almost parallel inquiries into communism in the school system. The McCarthy Committee, meanwhile, concentrated on the Voice of America, State Department files and alleged employment of sex deviates in important posts in the Department.

The McCarthy Committee was interested in the question of whether State Department Foreign Service personnel files had been looted of derogatory information.

Several State Department emoloyes testified that some confidential documents had mysteriously disappeared from the files.

McCarthy said some people are "doing a fairly good job of sabotag-ing Dulles' and Eisenhower's foreign policy program" in the Voice of

"There are some very questionable people in the Voice program,"
McCarthy said, but added that it included "a vast number of good

In his State of the Union message, President Eisenhower seemed to make it clear he wanted the loyalty field left to the Executive.

... I know the primary responsi bility for keeping out the disloyal and dangerous rests squarely upon the Executive Branch," said Eisen-hower. "I am determined to meet this responsibility . . . I believe the powers of the Executive Branch under existing laws are sufficient. It they should prove inadequate, the necessary laws will be requested."

as a Navy oil reserve.

Some legislators said they were frankly puzzled by Brownell's opinion and wondered what effect it might have on the state vs. federal controversy over the offshore de-

The Navy stood by, explaining it was taking no action under the Tru-man order that might prejudice a final decision on ownership. In this situation, the oil lands technically belonged neither to the U. S., the states, the Navy or the Department

of the Interior.

In his opinion, Brownell wrote:
... "The (Truman) order did not intend and did not create a Naval petroleum reserve to be administered under the provisions of the Naval Petroleum Reserve Act."

Brownell said it was clear that former Attorney General James Mc-

Granery approved Truman's order as finally drafted and issued "on the understanding that it did not inte to, nor did it in fact or in law, create a Naval petroleum reserve within the meaning of the law."

### KOREA: U.S. Seeks Relief Plan for Troops

A DMINISTRATION plans for Korea center around withdrawing U. S. troops from the

Since his personal tour of the battle zone shortly after election, President Eisenhower has worked with his top advisers on some plan to bring this about.

The new U. S. policy in Korea, of course, will primarily be designed to end the war. The machinery the Administration has worked out to this end is secret. Some of the plan's broad outlines reportedly were discussed Thursday at a White House meeting between Congressional leaders of both parties, the President and his top aides.

The question of a naval blockade of the China coast or an embargo against Red China still is open. The President said he personally is not considering either but he supposes such steps are being looked into by several government departments.

The President also declared Unitd Nations forces can't be pulled out of Korea completely so long as a dangerous situation exists there. The Administration plan for withdrawing U. S. troops from the front apparently will be based on the President's oft-repeated insistence that South Koreans should replace other U.N. troops in the fighting to the greatest possible extent.

As for the statement of the recently-retired U.N. Commander in Korea, Gen. James A. Van Fleet, that a U.N. offensive could succeed now, Eisenhower said mildly that the responsibility in such matters does not rest in a field commander.



Closed Courtroom

New York State's Judiciary Law permits a closed trial in cases of seduction, abortion, rape, bastardy,

The law was exercised by New York City's General Sessions Judge Francis J. Valente in the case of Minot T. Jelke, heir to an oleomargarine fortune, who was being tried on a nine-count indictment charging he induced three women to "live s life of prostitution" and that he lived off their earnings.

Judge Valente contended the trial would be "steeped in filth," that it was not a function of the court to satisfy the public appetite for "lurid salacious details."

Representatives of eight news media petitioned the State Supreme Court to lift the ban. The Court

Justice Benjamin F. Schreiber held the State Supreme Court "has no right or power" to decide whether the judge "should or should not have ordered the exclusion of the public and press" from the trial.

Despite the closed trial, enterpris-ing reporters managed to dig up enough details from principals in the case at interviews outside the chamber to keep the trial in headlines.

From some of this sleuthing it developed that 19-year-old Pat Ward had testified in great detail about the rigors of life as a \$100-a-night professional prostitude. Other principals included former television bit player Barbara Harmon 21 to have coached Miss Ward in her role as a night call girl.

The defense, meanwhile, was reported to have produced photographs which were introduced as evidence to destroy Miss Ward's

legislative business. In the House, the emphasis is on taxes and government spending. In the Senate, President Eisenhower's resolution denouncing

provisions of the Yalta and Potsdam agreements is under study. The first money bill of the 83rd Congress slashed 61 per cent of departmental requests. Most of the requests were made in the budget

estimates of the late Administration, Total reductions in the appropriations bill came to around 11/2 billion

The biggest slice was made in funds requested by the Defense Department. The Department asked for \$1,200,000,000 in supplemental funds to meet higher costs and pay increases voted by Congress. The request was to tide the Department over until June 30. The Appropriations Committee turned it down in

Capitol observers thought the full effect of the appropriations slashes would not be felt for awhile but that they would lead to eventual reductions in expenditures.

The bill to cut personal income taxes cleared its first Congressional hurdle with ease, but faced a rocky path after that.

The proposal, championed by New York's Republican Rep. Daniel Reed, would advance by six months -to June 30-a 10 per cent cut in individual income tax rates. Present law provides for the same reduction

For the Federal Government, the Reed bill would mean a loss of 11/2 billion dollars in revenue. The Ad-ministration clearly favors waiting to cut taxes until some headway can be made toward a balanced budget. President Eisenhower has pledged to do everything possible to match Federal spending with income.

#### YALTA-POTSDAM HASSLE

A split developed between the White House and Republican mem-bers of the Senate over the Yalta and Potsdam agreements.

The Administration was not prepared to go as far in denouncing one-time secret parts of these pacts as some GOP Senators demanded. The Administration resolution, which the President hoped to see Congress pass, did not call for outright re-pudiation of any of the territorial concessions made to Russia at Yalta and Potsdam but stated in general terms that the U. S. would never acquiesce in the enslavement of any people or peoples that resulted from wartime secret agreements.

Thus, the resolution followed si-most exactly the President's declara-tion on the subject in his State of the Union message.

#### FARM PRICE DEBATE

Secretary of Agriculture Benson's farm aid policies raised a hot debate in the Senate, too.

The furor has built up since the Secretary's speech in St. Paul in which he declared his opposition to farm price supports which encourage "uneconomic" production. Benson also promised no price supports for the sagging beef cattle market. for the sagging beef cattle marks



### Spy Couple Gauges Life by the Month

ON April 5, 1951, Julius and Ethel Rosenberg were convicted of conspiring to transmit atomic information to Russia and sentenced to death. They have been in Sing Sing Prison's death

It was Mrs. Rosenberg's brother, David Greenglass, who sealed the case against the couple. He testified they persuaded him to turn over wartime atomic secrets to a Russian agent. Greenglass and Morton Sobell were sentenced to prison. The Rosenbergs denied the testimony and have maintained their innocence.

Since their convictions, the Rosenbergs have made six appeals to the courts, a petition for commutation of their sentence and an appeal for Presidential clemency. All were

turned down.

The condemned atom spies won a further stay of execution Tuesday when a three-member United States Appeals Court granted it on motion of Defense Attorney Emanuel Bloch to give the couple time to petition the Supreme Court again.

The stay will be in effect while the Supreme Court studies the case for the third time.

The President announced the Rosenbergs had received "full measure of justice" and pointed out their crime "could very well result in the

death of many, many thousands of innocent citizens."

A delegation of 700 New Yorkers took up posts outside the White House for round-the-clock picket-

Walking three and four abreast, the pickets carried signs reading: "Sentence is Excessive and Cruel," "Electric Chair Cannot Kill Doubts in Rosenberg Case," "Do Not Allow Hysterical Fear To Override Justice."

Communists campaigning in behalf of the Rosenbergs, meanwhile, made the point that the Rosenbergs are Jews, but did not mention that Judge Kaufman, the chief prosecutor and the chief prosecution witnesses also are Jews.

The Rosenbergs would be the first persons ever executed in the United States during peacetime for espionage.
