## Right-Of-Way Complete For Wyche Road Paving

Right of way has been secured for eight miles of the Wyche road which will be the next farm-to-market paving project for Deaf Smith county according to M. T. Rutter, Commissioner, Precinct 1, today.

When the work is completed it is hoped that there will be 11 miles of paving extending to the county line, he said. The definite route for the road was not outlined by Rutter. Previous plans, however, showed that the road would not follow exactly what is known as the old Wyche road, but will continue farther east to the Nolie Eliston corner before turning south. The paving will run south for about two miles before turning back east to the county line.

It is hoped that work on the road will get underway during the early part of the summer, Rutter said.

## City Extensions Will Serve Four Additional Units

Sewerage and water improvements in four new sections of Hereford were a step nearer reality following the City Commission meeting Monday night. The commission approved 6,000 feet of sewer extensions and work has already started in the four blocks concerned. The extensions, when completed, will also result in lengthening of Star Street from the present dead-end on Grand Avenue, North to 15th Street, which marks the present north boundary of the city.

Improvements will chiefly be concentrated in the Brawley Addition, the Gamoy Addition, the Jack Francis Addition and a block owned by Carl McCaslin extending from K Street through to Star. The Francis platt is located between K and Star east and west and runs from Grand to 15th, north and south, this is the area which calls for extending Star Street. The McCaslin property already in the city limits, has previously offered no complete sewer and water facilities.

Total cost of the sewerage extensions was estimated at \$7,500. The ditching contract was let to Enix Construction company of Amarillo.

## Set Election Date

The commission also called a city election for April 8, according to the City charter. T. J. Anderson was named as presiding judge, Mrs. N. E. Gass and Mrs. Earl Phillips as assistants.

The ticket with Henry Sears, mayor, Wayne Edwards and D. C. Kinsey as councilmen, filed last week, was the only one filed to date, according to City Manager Grady Bowdry. Final filing date will be Saturday, March 7, or 30 days prior to the election date.

Lippold was arrested around 1 o'clock Tuesday morning after he overturned his 1952 Chrysler. Police said he was going east on Park, skidded through the intersection into Highway 60, then overturned. Damage on the car was estimated at \$1,200. City police carried Lippold to the hospital for emergency treatment, following which he was turned over to the State Highway patrol and confined in the county jail.

Samuel Edward Choate was also arrested by the city police Monday night at 11:35 following complaints. He was picked up at the Greenhedge Cafe and charged with DWI. Choate had entered no plea Wednesday morning.

## Closing Dates For 1953 Suggested; Shopping Survey Plans Are Outlined

Observation of holidays in Hereford, a bugaboo in 1952, presented once again a debatable question when the Chamber of Commerce Merchant's committee met Tuesday morning in Hotel Jim Hill to iron out means of better serving the community.

The committee decided, due to conflict regarding dates last year, that no cards would be distributed in 1953. They discussed the situation at length, however, and recommended five days for closing in the community:  
**Labor Day — Monday, Sept. 7.**  
**Armistice Day — Wednesday, Nov. 11.**  
**Thanksgiving Day — Thursday, Nov. 26.**  
**Christmas Day — Friday, Dec. 25.**  
**New Year's Day — Friday, Jan. 11, 1954.**  
The group also discussed two other holidays: Memorial Day, May 30, and Independence Day, July 4. Both days fall on Saturday however, and Memorial Day, in addition, has also been designated as "Pioneer Day" in Hereford. The committee decided that neither of these days should appear on the list recommended for closing the town in view of the above reasons.

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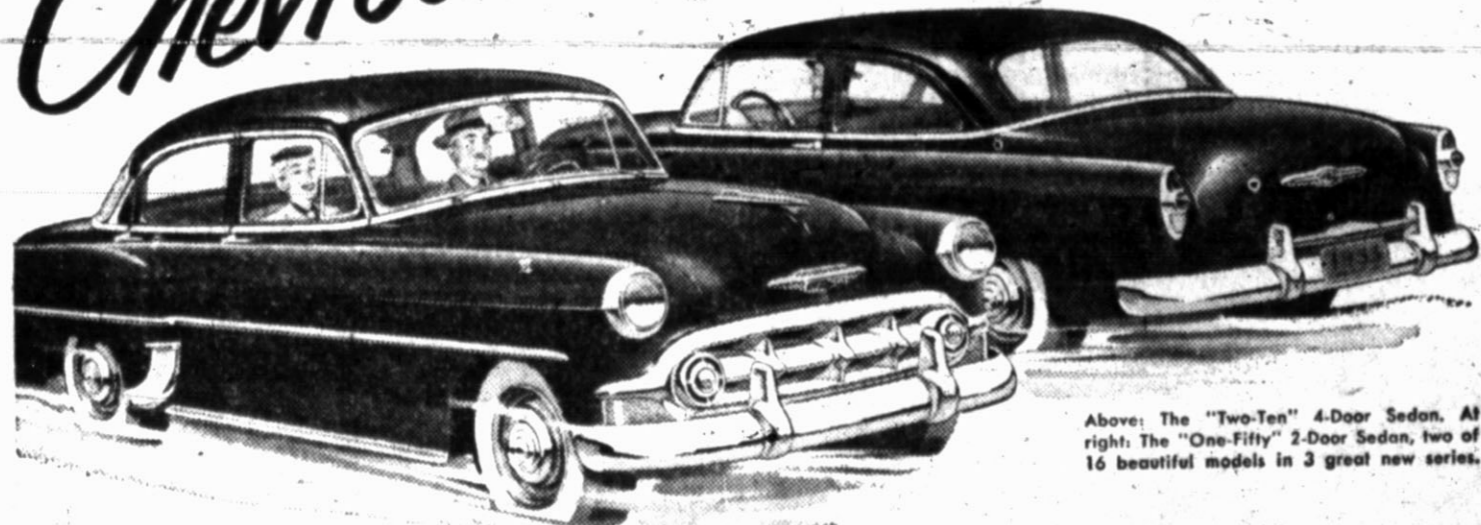

WALTER ROGERS REPORTS:

**Congressman Warns Hawaii To Nail Down Boundaries Before Joining The States**

Washington, D. C., February 27, 1953. HAWAIIAN STATEHOOD. Although there has been very little progress in the Congress as a whole toward completing final action on the legislative backlog, the committees have been in almost continuous session for the past several weeks. One of the subcommittees of which I am a member has been holding the hearings on the bill that would admit Hawaii as a sister state. These committee meetings have all been open to the public and many people from various walks of life have shown a great deal of interest in this legislation. There was one group at the meeting the other day that were not primarily interested in the Hawaiian statehood, but were more interested in the mechanics of the United States Congress. These men came from Germany. The delegation was from the legislative body of Western Germany. The delegation consisted of Mr. Hans Trossmann, Director of the Bundestag (Lower House), Mr. Albert A. Pfitzer, Director of the Bundestag (Upper House), and Mr. Friedrich K. O. Schramm, Assistant to the Speaker of the House. They found the proceedings most interesting and informative. At the time of their visit there was extended debate in the subcommittee concerning proposed amendments to the bill concerning the constitution that has already been adopted by Hawaii. One point that was discussed at length was the possibility of a tidelands controversy should Hawaii be admitted to statehood. Incidentally, I warned the representatives of Hawaii that there could be no question should they be admitted as a state. I called to their attention that Texas thought she had her boundaries fixed until some Federal bureaucrats decided they wanted the tidelands. During this discussion the former Attorney General of Hawaii, Mr. Tavares, pointed out that there is practically no possibility of oil and gas along the shores of the Hawaiian Islands because of the fact that the islands consist of volcanic ash and coral deposits. He pointed out that in the Islands television beams go through the mountains, which of course indicates the lack of mineral deposits therein. It was also pointed out in the hearings that should the water area between the islands be used as constituting a part of the islands, Texas might lose her place as the biggest state in the Union. The former Attorney General assured us that Hawaii would yield that position to the State of Texas.

**THE TIDELANDS:** You of course realize that nothing yet has been done on the tidelands bills. This legislation is presently before the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives and the Interior and Insular Affairs Committee in the Senate. Frankly, I think that these committee hearings are a waste of time because this is an issue that has been more thoroughly scrutinized than perhaps any other issue in the past two decades. Lengthy committee hearings have been had in both Houses of Congress and the reports are available for new Members. The present administration is committed to tidelands legislation, and I personally feel that no delay should be occasioned in returning the products of that attempted legalized theft to the respective states who rightfully own them. The new Secretary of Interior stated before my committee in the House that he was for returning these tidelands to the States. He has recently been quoted in the newspapers to the effect that these tidelands should be returned to the States, but that all properties outside thereof should be decreed to be in the Federal Government, indicating that the states bordering on the ocean should have no interest in the continental shelf. I believe that Secretary McKay was in some degree misquoted in this statement as it is my understanding that he favored the bill that passed the House of Representatives last year. This bill not only quitclaims the tidelands strips to the states, but goes into great detail to fix interests of those states in the continental shelf. This issue has caused quite a bit of comment here and has prompted some of the news columnists to say that Texas and some of the other states now want to extend their boundaries several miles farther to the seaward. This certainly is not the case. Texas has always asked for what was rightfully hers and is not trying to encroach upon anybody. She is trying to keep from being encroached upon. Incidentally, one of the leading newspapers in the East, the Washington Post, has carried several editorials underwriting Federal ownership. Further delay in considering the matter could serve no good purpose and the bills should be brought to the Floor for an immediate vote.

**THE VOICE OF AMERICA:** There are many people here in official Washington who have never been satisfied with the progress made by this arm of the State Department. In fact, many have constantly condemned it. The hearings in this Congress seem to be confirming a suspicion that I have long harbored, namely, that the voice is not that of America, but of some individual who makes a personal decision as to what Americanism is, or is not. This is certainly brought out in the discovery that certain passages from Edna Ferber's book, "The Giant," were used in this broadcast. The excerpts reported to have been used on the Voice were to the effect that male Texans drink Bourbon by the gallon and that the women are all nitwits. Any book containing such a statement is a disgrace to America, and the broadcasting of such a statement on the Voice of America is ample ground for abolishing the Voice altogether. My observation is that many people in this world could do themselves and their country a great service if they would follow the examples that have been set by Texans, especially those of our fine women.

**VISITORS:** When I stepped out of the committee room the other day, I thought that Amarillo had moved to Washington. Mayor Gene Klein, Frank Storm, Weldon Howell, William Q. Boyce, and Lee Bivins were all standing there to greet me. You have no idea how exhilarating it is to see good folks from the Panhandle here in Washington. Rumor has it that a delegation from Randall and Potter County, including Mrs. Clyde Warwick, Mrs. James A. Brannen,

Mrs. Tom Knighton, Mrs. James R. Barnhill, Miss Wilida Neeley, and Mrs. William O'Brien, will be up for the meeting of the Daughters of The American Revolution. We are certainly looking forward to seeing these fine ladies, and know that they will have a good time. I also hear that the seniors at Follett high school are tampering with the idea of a Washington trip upon graduation. I know of nothing that would be of greater service to the high school graduating classes of the country, and I certainly hope that the dream of these fine Follett youngsters materializes. I just had a nice visit with James Kirby of Pampa, who is attending a Methodist young people's conference here in Washington.

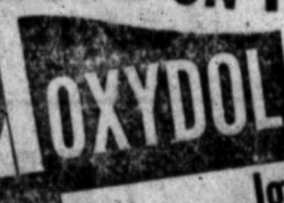

**Terry McRight**

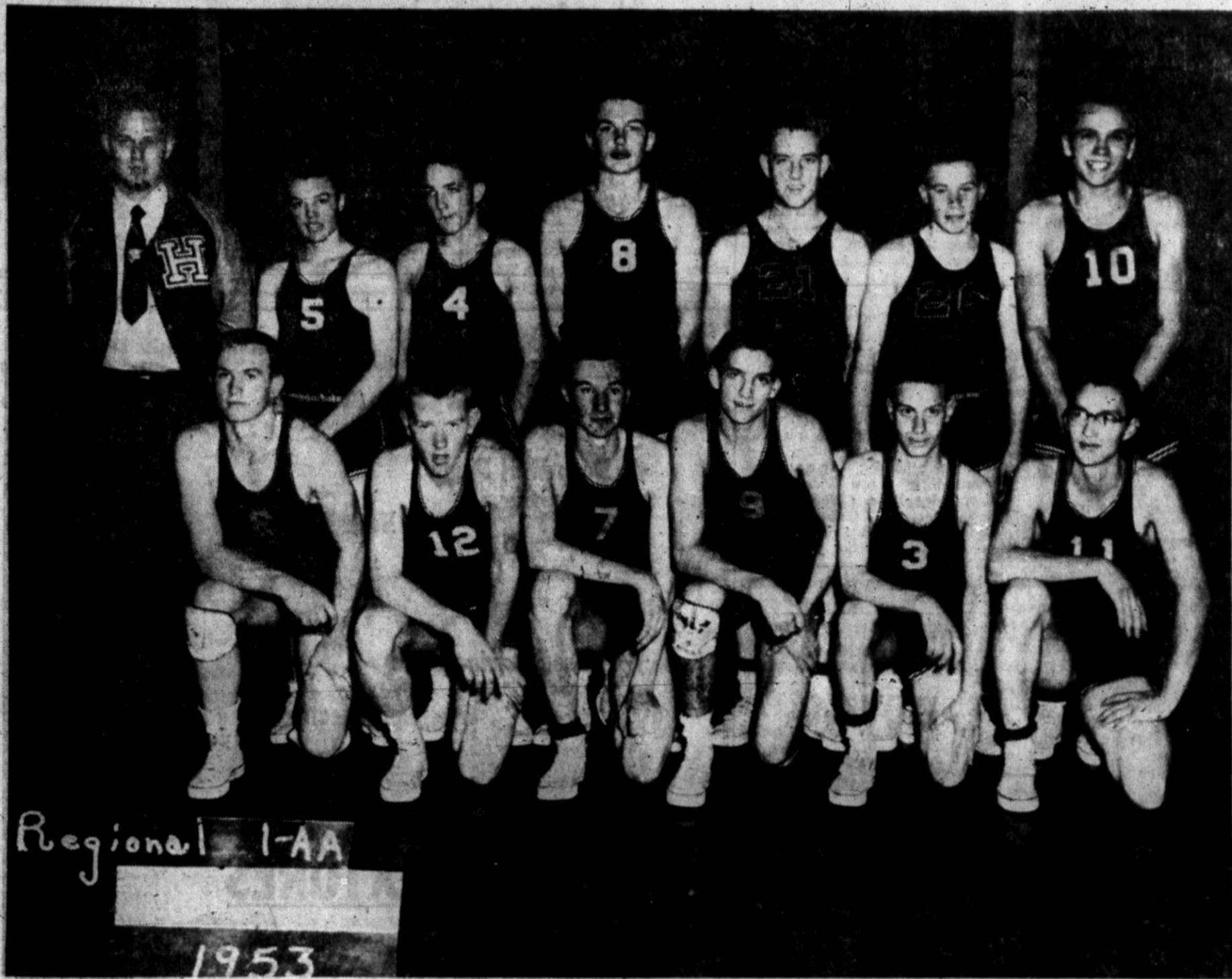

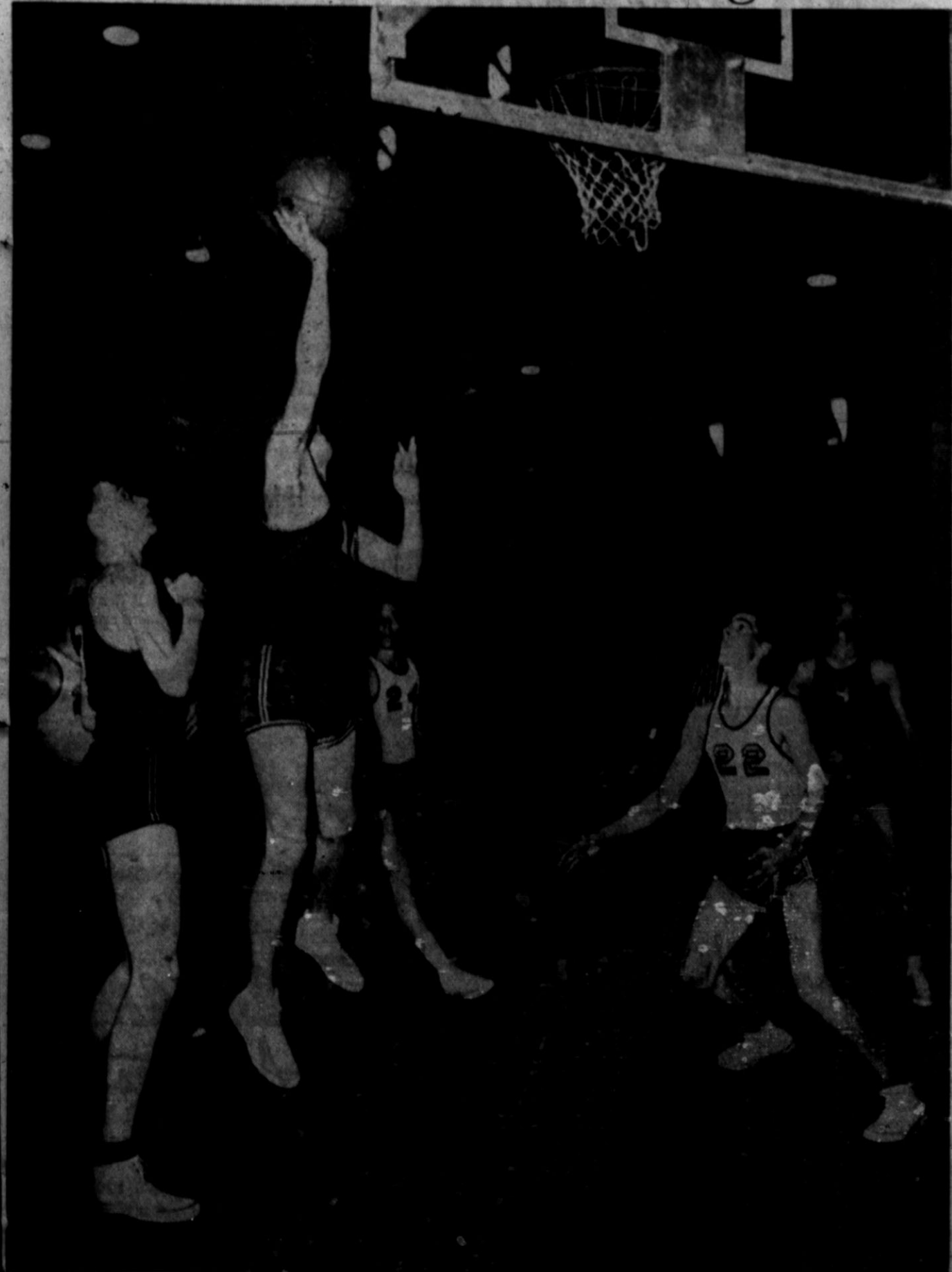

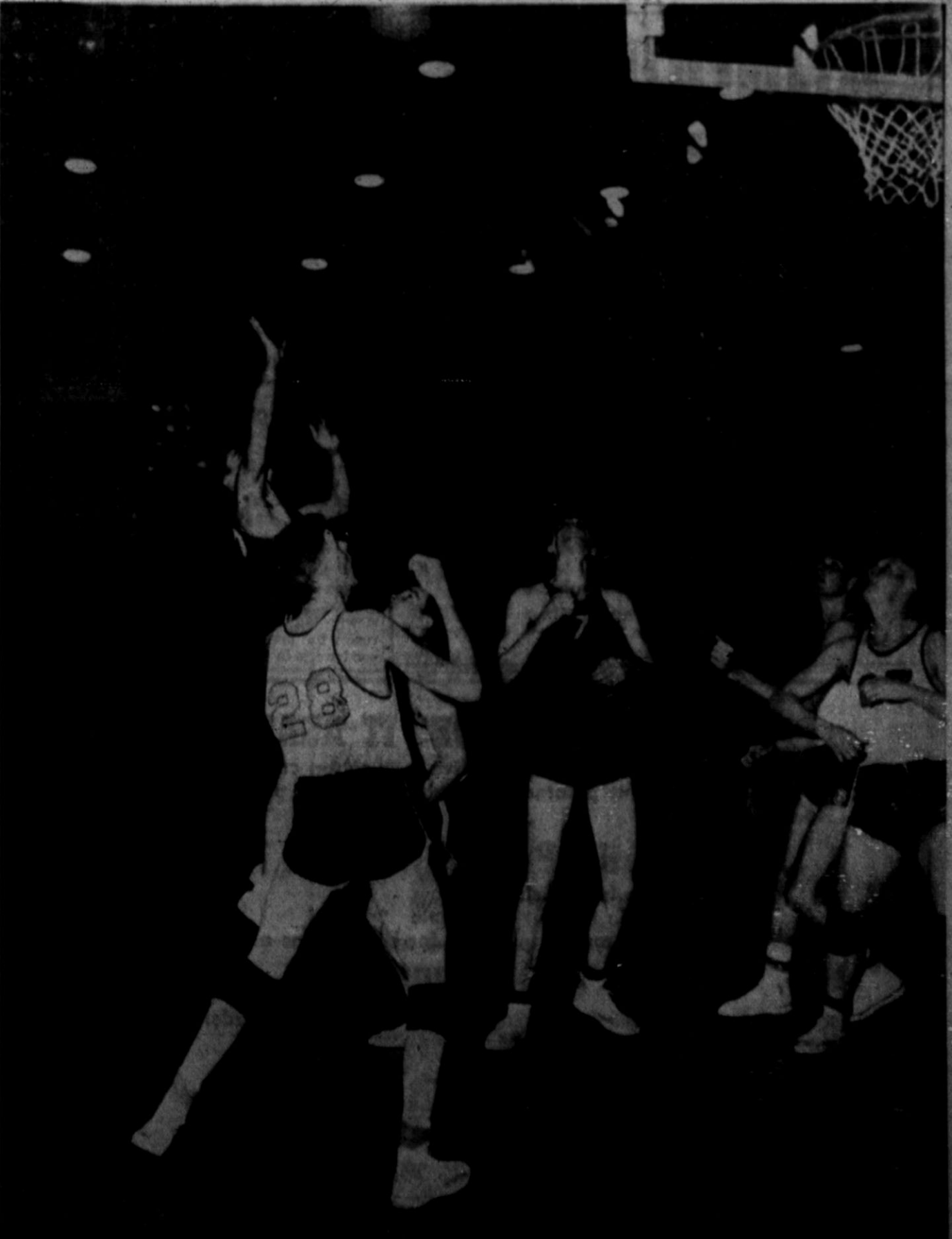
**Review of Season**

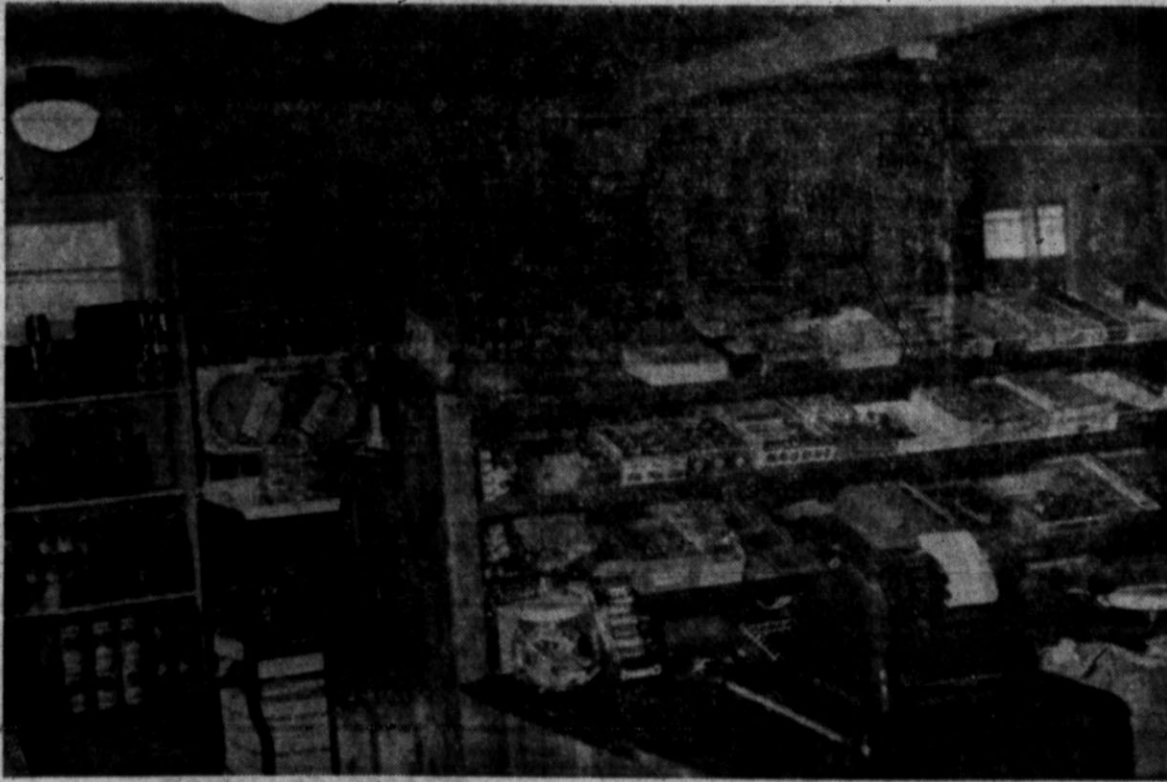

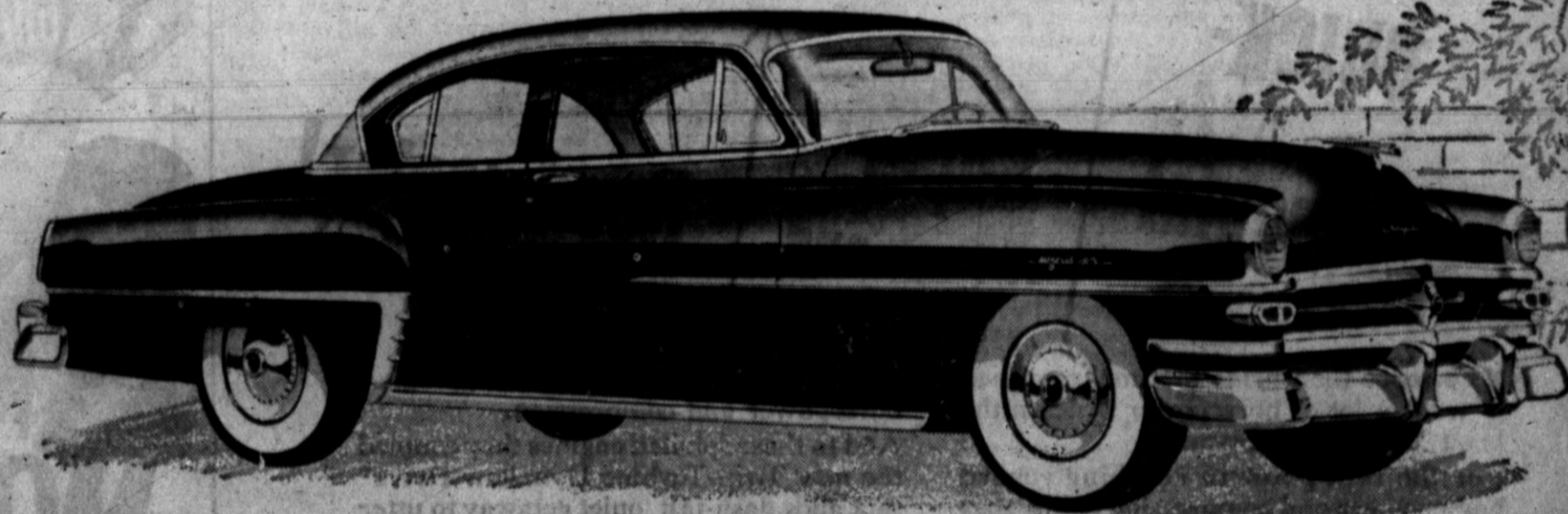
