





Shortly after intermission, Du-mas jumped out in front, and con-tinued their lead most of the third quarter. Raymond Dement sank a long shot seconds before the quart-er ended to give Hereford the lead

42-41, however. Marshall Wilson fouled out in the third quarter. He was followed by Joe Streun early in the fourth. This hurt Hereford's chances badly and Dumas began to pull away, winding up with the 57-51 total.
