Jones is an airborne control and warning radar specialist with the 82nd Tactical Control Flight.


He is a 1978 graduate of Littlefield High School.

Constitutional Amendments To Be Decided Tuesday

Bailey County voters will go to the polls Tuesday, November 8 to decide "yea" or "nay" to eleven Texas Constitutional Amendments proposed by the Texas Legislature. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday.

The following paragraphs contain a brief description of each of the eleven proposed amendments, which will be printed in both English and Spanish on the ballots.

Proposition One is an amendment which, if passed, would authorize fewer justice of the peace and

constable precincts in counties having a population of less than 30,000. It would also provide for continuous service by justice of the peace, constables and county commissioners when precinct boundaries are changed.

Proposition Two would replace the limitation on the value of an urban homestead with a limitation based on size.

A vote for Proposition Three would provide for the advancement of food and fiber production and marketing in the state of Texas through research, education and promotion, financed by the producers of agricultural products.

Proposition Four would authorize statutory provisions for succession of public office during disasters caused by enemy attack. It would also authorize the suspension of certain constitutional rules which relate to legislative procedures during those disasters or during immediate threat of enemy attack.

A vote for Proposition Five as listed on the ballot would authorize the use of the permanent school funds to guarantee bonds issued by school districts.

Perhaps one of the most controversial and talked about amendments is that of Proposition Six. A vote for Proposition Six would allow the Texas legislature to provide for additional remedies to enforce the payment of court-ordered child support payments. This amendment would allow garnishment of wages for the purpose of child support only.

Proposition Seven would provide for financial assistance to veterans and authorize the issuance of \$800 million in bonds of the state to finance the Veteran's Land Program and the Veteran's Housing Assistance Program.

The passage of Proposition Number Eight would authorize taxing units to exempt property of certain veterans' and fraternal organizations from taxation.

The purpose of the passage of Proposition Number Nine would provide for assignment of judges of statutory probate courts to other statutory county courts with probate jurisdiction and to county courts.

Number Ten Proposition would permit a city or town to expend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of

sanitation sewer laterals on private property.

Proposition Eleven would change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and give the board power to revoke paroles.

On Friday, County Clerk Barbara McCamish reported a total of seven absentee

No Paid Diversions, In '84 Cotton Program

A twenty-five percent acreage reduction program for the 1984 crop of upland cotton was announced this week by USDA Secretary John Block. Block stated that the 1984 upland cotton sign-up period will commence on January 16 to February 24 - the same sign-up dates for the wheat and feed grains programs. The announcement followed the closing of the markets on Friday.

An acreage reduction program for upland cotton is needed to prevent ending stocks from rising to excessive levels, Block said. "With the payment-in-kind program, we have made progress in bringing cotton supplies into line with demand," Block stated. "We urge farmers to cooperate once more in 1984 in an effort to avoid burdensome production and low prices."

The program for upland cotton includes a nonpaid acreage reduction requirement of 25 percent, with no paid diversion and no payment-in-kind provisions.

To be eligible for price support benefits, producers must agree to limit upland cotton planted acreage to not more than 75 percent of their cotton acreage base. The 1984 acreage base is considered to be the average of the acres planted and considered to have been planted to upland cotton in 1982 and 1983. An acreage of cropland equal to 33.33 percent of the cotton planted acreage must be devoted to

approved conservation uses.

Upland cotton price support provisions include a base loan rate for Strict Low Middling 1-1/6 inch cotton, micronaire 3.5 to 4.9, of 55 cents per pound and the minimum target price allowed by law. The current statutory minimum price for the 1984 crop is 81 cents per pound.

Land designated for conservation use must have been devoted to row crops or small grains in two of the last three years, except for a summer fallow farm. In the case of summer fallow, conservation use acreage must be land that would have been planted to small grains or row crops in 1984 in the absence of the 1984 upland cotton program.

The land must be protected from the wind and water erosion throughout the entire year.

No offsetting and cross compliance will apply to the 1984 program, and there will be no advance deficiency payments.

Perryton will be the home team.

An ever tough Mule defense held Tulia to a mere 11 yards gain in the first half of the ballgame, while the Mule offense pulled tricks out of their helmets at will. Not much starting was necessary, however, and early on, the Mules settled into serious, steady, ground gaining offensive play.

After a couple of possessions each, the Mules fired the first shot and their first touchdown came after an 8 play drive of about 50 yards. That TD was tucked away as a Hamilton pass was taken by Mark Moton 14 yards into the end zone. Ray Vinson's PAT try was

good and the Mules led by seven points at the end of the first quarter of play.

Although the Hornets made several attempts to put the Mules in a bad situation, they could just not pull it off. Friday was a big night for several Mule receivers and the Mule defense was extra tough. Penalties were a big factor in the game and hurt both teams.

Muleshoe's big Trent Hysinger opened up and paved the way breaking tackles for the first TD and Garcia and Moton picked up some good yardage on Hamilton's passes.

The Hornets had trouble hanging on to the ball and on the next down after the Mule TD, a big hit by Jeff McCarty knocked the ball loose from Tulia's Tony Powell, giving the Mules possession again.

Tulia took the ball on the first possession in the second quarter, but was unable to do anything with it and punted it away to the Mules where Moton called for fair catch on the 43 yard line. The Mules began their second TD drive from their own 43, see-sawing with Hysinger and Moton, while the Mule line was busy opening up holes for them. Hysinger had a big 15 yard gainer and Moton picked up an 18 yard play in the drive. Hysinger's play brought the Mules to the 6 yard line and Hamilton handed off to Moton on the next play. Moton scrambled across the goal line following the blocking of "Big Bad" John Isaac for the second Mule TD. Vinson's point after attempt was good and the Mules put a comfortable lead on with 14-0 over the Hornets.

Vinson also put a tackle on the kickoff receiver in the next play, most likely saving a touchdown play for the Mules. Tulia took possession finally on the 30 yard line and after four downs, was still there, with Rodriguez being unable to complete any passes. With 7:11 left in the second quarter, the Mules began a long drive which carried them through most of the 3rd quarter and ended with another Mule touchdown compliments of Trent Hysinger. Hysinger, Moton, Jeff McCarty and a tough Mule line gathered in the yardage for the Mules, and Hamilton took a big hit from 252 pound tackle, Rusty Ferguson. On a 3/23 situation on the Hornet 29 yard line, Hamilton handed off to Hysinger on a draw play and Hysinger broke through tackles carrying the ball and two men with him into the end zone for the third Mule TD. A letter of appreciation was received from Mrs. Marjorie Errington, District Two Chairman of Home Development Committee, for the contribution the group made from their



Municipal Court trials for the City of Muleshoe will be held in Council Chambers of the City Hall before a jury on November 9, beginning at 9 a.m. with Judge Linda Huckaby presiding. A list of jurors was unavailable at this time.

The Judge will be in her office on Monday and Tues-

day prior to the trial date from 9 a.m. until noon for consultation of pending cases. Cases will be called in the order listed and anyone not present will be considered guilty and will forfeit their bonds.

Cases filed in Municipal Court with Judge Linda Huckaby over the past week a total of 23, with 37 disposals of prior cases being made.

Among the cases filed were seven for bad checks, three for public intoxication, three for running stop signs, two for violation of city ordinance and two for speeding. One case each was filed on each of the following: defective lights, drivers license restrictions, no MVI sticker, no drivers license and no liability insurance.

The Bailey County Commissioner's Court met in a special session in the Courthouse on Wednesday, November 2, beginning at 10 a.m.

Commissioners approved a motion to accept a bid by Wiedebush and Company on a proposal for the purchase of unleaded gasoline for county vehicles for the coming year. Commissioner's said that the Wiedebush bid was the best and lowest bid submitted.

Also up for consideration was the amendment of the Bailey County Fiscal Year Budget for 1984 for non-departmental purposes. The

amendments included increasing miscellaneous expenses by \$5,000. Also under non-departmental, the budget was increased in the County Health Services department for major repairs in the amount of \$2,000. Other non-departmental budget amendments included one for an increase of \$1,999.60 for coliseum capital expenditures for paving purposes.

County Commissioners also made a motion authorizing County Judge Gordon H. Green to make a settlement of insurance claims on the courthouse roof in the

amount of \$11,877.30.

Commissioners established the number of miles of county maintained roads in Bailey County to be over 900. Since the State funding only covers up to 500 miles,

no action was taken on the matter.

Previous minutes were approved and routine county bills were paid; along with the handling of a few miscellaneous items.

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


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

which failed. Tulia took over the ball on their 33 yard line, but was unable to move it. A bad officiating call put a 39 yard penalty on the Mules for "pass interference," but failed to give the Hornets any edge, since a Rodriguez pass was intercepted on the next play by Mark Moton who took it to the 30 yard line, ending the half.

Tulia received the second half opening kickoff and gathered up three first downs on their first possession. (As many as they had altogether in the first half.) However, the situation came down to a punt fake after the Hornets could not move the ball. John Isaac read the fake and put a big tackle on the Hornet Rusty Hooper on the 43 yard line.

for the Mule's next score. Hysinger, Moton and Norman picked up some good rushing yardage, as the Mule forward wall did their job well. Norman had a 23 yard gainer in this series, and "Scrap Iron" Gleason burst through Tulia's ranks three times to put the Mules within firing range. Vinson put a foot into a 22 yard field goal attempt for the Mules and the Mules pulled further ahead 23 to zip.

Tulia had the ball for the next four plays, but the Hornets came up against an immovable object in the Mule forward wall. The ball was punted away by Tulia after a couple of bad fumbles for illegal touch of the ball and unprofessional conduct on Hornet Randy Ferguson.

The Mules took over with

2:39 left in the quarter and on the first down play from their own 42 yard line, Hamilton connected with Milton Norman who then blasted through with a 58 yard touch down run. The PAT by Vinson was good and the Mules extended their lead 30-0. A clipping call on the Hornets was added behind the play and on to their next possession.

That possession did not last long, for after a kick off by Vinson that went out of the end zone, Tulia started from their own 20 yard line, with Hamilton and Flores stopping the play. On the second down, Michael Del Toro (the Bull) put a sack on the Hornet quarterback and forced a turnover on the Hornet 24 yard line. The Hornets came back in the second half using Swinburn as quarterback, but the Mules didn't let it affect them.

On their next possession, the Mules put on a short drive with Hysinger and Norman picking up some yardage. The Hornets managed to get a sack on Hamilton and then on a 4/6 situation a field goal attempt was faked by the Mules and Hysinger tried for the goal line. He was forced out of bounds at the line of scrimmage and the Mules turned the ball over to Tulia at the end of the third quarter on their own 17 yard line.

With Rodriguez back in the quarterbacking spot, the Hornets tried the passing route again, but gained little yardage, and what could have been a good gainer was averted by Mule's Dar-

in Shaw. The Hornets faked on the next play and the flags really flew. Pass interference was called on the offense and the Hornets had to turn the ball over on their ten yard line.

The Mules picked up some yardage and lost some on the next couple of plays, and were left with a 4/17 situation after Hamilton drew another sack. A field goal attempt by Ray Vinson from the 17 yard line went wide to the left, (the first one he has missed this season) and was not good and Tulia took the ball back, but began drawing some heavy penalties in the processing via Randy Ferguson. Their possession lasted for four downs and the ball was turned over to the Mules after Hooper punted it to the Mule 28 yard line. In this series, Hector Garcia was hit by a perfect strike from Hamilton for a 23 yard pass play, however, the play was wiped out by a clipping call on the Mules. With 5:57 left in the game, the Mules started to move and Hamilton hit Todd Jones for a 23 yard pickup, while Hysinger, Moton, Ward and Norman tried for ground yardage. The Hornet defense rallied about this time, and the Mules were forced to punt on a 4/6 situation with Hamilton putting a bare foot into it for 31 yards.

Tulia took over on the 12 yard line and Rodriguez hit Chris Padilla and Jim Bob Gleason on a couple of passes that gathered some yardage and a first down. Officials at this point, after a third unprofessional conduct call on Tulia's Randy Ferguson, ejected him from the game following a late hit.

This call pretty well did the Tulia team in and Rodriguez was unable to connect on his passes. The Mules could have taken over possession of the ball at a couple of points, but with their usual sportsmanlike class, allowed Tulia to retain possession. Two big plays for a couple of Mules came at the end of the game: one when Del Toro sacked the Hornet quarterback and the

other when Paul Silguero, up from JV, intercepted a Rodriguez pass, which ended the game with the Mules on top with a shut-out of 30 to ZIP.

The Mules also ended a successful season of district play, and will now go into the playoffs as the second team under UIL rules. For those of you who are interested, Littlefield beat Fri-

Combest Pays Visit To Muleshoe

Larry Combest, Republican candidate for the 19th Congressional District, and the seat to be vacated by Congressman Kent Hance was in Muleshoe on Thursday November 3 on a promotional tour of the District.

Combest, who has several years experience in legislative work and served as administrative aide in Washington, has first-hand knowledge of problems facing agriculture at this time. He was raised on a farm and has worked in County ASCS offices, helping to administer farm programs.

"I know the farming angle, as well as the administrative and legislative problems in agriculture to-

day," Combest stated. He told the Journal that he was not pleased with the 1984 Farm Programs recently announced, and indicated that he feared a program with no diversion payments no incentives to set aside land, might put agriculture right back where it was before PIK. "We really need a strong farm program and one that will offer some encouragement to farmers to participate in it," he stated. Combest also had criticism of the USDA Secretary of Agriculture's handling of the corn in storage in area elevators, and stated that the corn should have been released a long time ago.

Recourse loans will be available for seed cotton in 1984, which means that the borrower must repay the full dollar amount of the loan plus accrued interest. The loan rate for seed cotton will be the same as that applicable to lint cotton adjusted to a lint basis.

Contracts signed by program participants will be considered as binding and will provide for liquidated

damages in cases of failure to comply with program requirements.

Area growers and cotton executives do not expect a strong participation in the 1984 program, with the dropping of paid diversions and PIK. "There's just not that much incentive to go into the program, and we may be left with the same situation as we had before the PIK programs," said one area grower.
