The victory practically cinches the district title for the Herd, who have won 23 and lost only 2. A win over Canyon Friday night would send Hereford into a bi-district clash against the 2AA

The lead changed hands continually throughout the first quarter until the Herd steadily pulled away in the second quarter. The Whitefaces were never headed from this point.

Hereford enjoyed a 17-15 margin at the end of the first quarter, The lead changed hands not less than five times during the first

Turning Point

The turning point of the game came in the second quarter when Hereford built up a lead of 16 points. The 21 points scored by the Whitefaces compared to the 7 points scored by the Blackhawks meant the difference. The halftime score was 38-22.

Big Joe Streun led Hereford at half-time with a total of 14 points. Phillips was led by Jack Germany, who had 9 points.

Although the Herd enjoyed a 16 point lead at half-time, their shooting was off compared to their normal percentage. The same may be said for the Hawks.

The third quarter was a completely new ball game. The Blackhawks came out strong, using a man-to-man press. Phillips scored 22 points, compared to 19 scored by Hereford, to bring the third quarter score up to 57-44.

The Hawks maintained their strength in the fourth quarter as they began sinking shots from way out. They capitalized on Whiteface fouls and bad passes to close the gap to within 7 points of the Whitefaces midway through the fourth quarter. Phillips out-scored the Herd 19-12 in the final period. Wayne Stark, the boys played inspired ball throughout the game. George Graham and Don T. Martin did the coaching job.

Joe Streun came through with 22 points to lead the Whiteface scorers. Woodford was next with 18 points. Leading Hawk scorer was Don Smith. He had 14 points. Hereford's next game will be

Keep cords free from kinks knots or sharp bends which break fine wires or insulated covering, Mrs. Claytor concludes. Cords may be coiled loosely on a shelf or in a drawer.



put out more laterals and horizontal roots, and for that reason, shallow plowing, maybe as many as 20 times the first season and up until July the next year to destroy top growth, seems to be the best method of control.

Several different kinds of chemicals have proved to be effective, including sodium chlorate, 2-4D, 2-4-5-T and salt, but all leave the soil sterile for several years afterward and some cannot be used where cotton and other broad leaf crops are grown.

Frequent plowing also destroys the plants that come from the seed which will lie dormant a long time, but under favorable conditions will sprout all during the season.

Same For Johnson Grass

C. N. McClure recommended much the same method of intensive plowing as the only effective means of killing Johnson grass, and suggested that the irrigation farmer start at the well first.

To emphasize the fact that it will grow from either end, Mc-Clure told the story of a soap salesman who proved the merits of his product by cutting a dog's tail off. The salesman rubbed the stub with some of his soap and grew a new tail. Then he rubbed the tail, and grew a new dog.

McClure does not sanction deep plowing as a means of control on the theory that when you work it works, but County Agent Hudson of Castro County said some farm ers had been successful in plowing deep in the winter and shallow in the summer. This method turns many of the roots up to freeze during cold weather, they

Ways of Spreading Hudson pointed out that Johnson grass, as well as bindweed and blue weed, may be spread by imported seed, combines, commercial feeds, animal manure and even the wheels of machines carrying it from one field to another. It is soil fertility rather than water that limits production, and it is up to the individual to control bindweed, blue weed and Johnson grass if our farms are to




