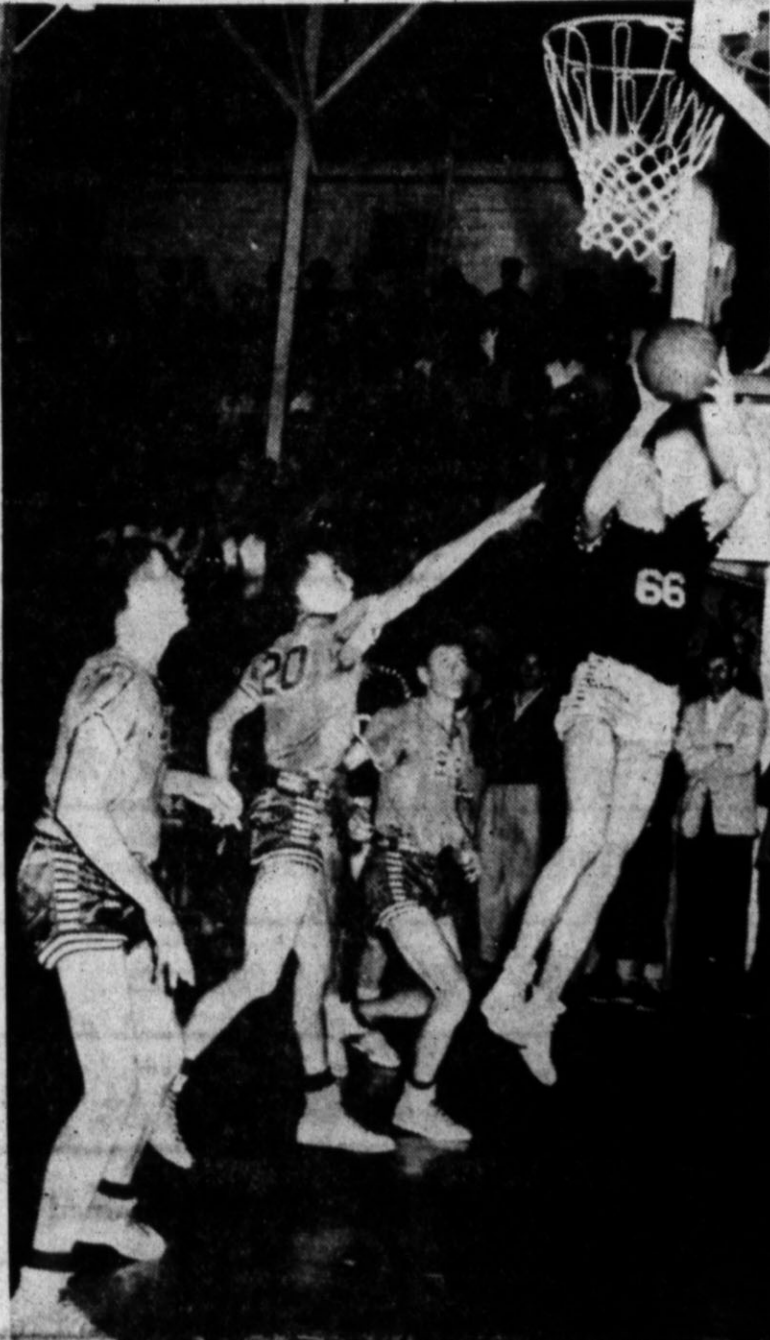

Water District Planning More Strict Enforcement

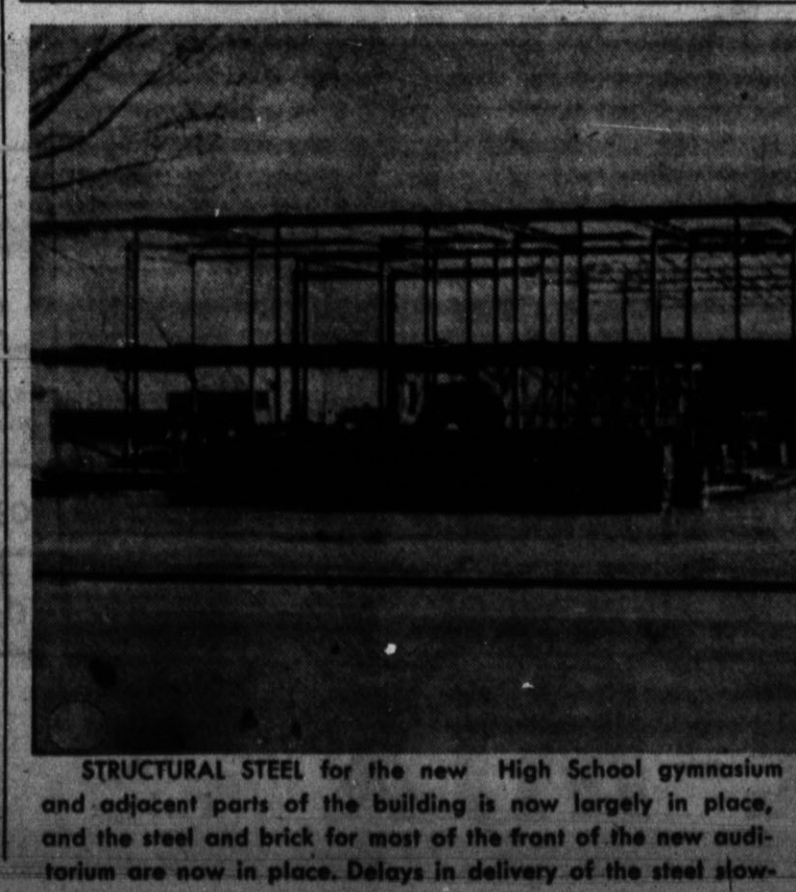
This year the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District is going to begin stricter enforcement of rules about wasting irrigation water. Tom McFarland, water district office manager, told the Rotary Club Monday.

There has been a definite decline in water tables and water pumping capacity over the entire High Plains, he added, and it would be quite possible for the water to reach a point of economic exhaustion, where it was too expensive to pump from the required depths, much sooner than most people expect.

Parent's Attitude Scored In P-TA Panel Discussion

One of the largest crowds to attend Parent-Teachers meetings this year heard a panel, made up of G. E. Mullins, George Heard, Miss Della Stagner, Earlene Plank, Tom Woodford and Kenneth Carmichael, give a discussion on the subject "Parents Till the Soil," Monday night in the High School auditorium.

Listing ways in which parents can help the school, Miss Stagner who is co-ordinator for the grades, named obedience as the greatest asset to the child, just starting to school. She outlined the aim of the school briefly as teaching a child to "read, write, think and accept responsibility."

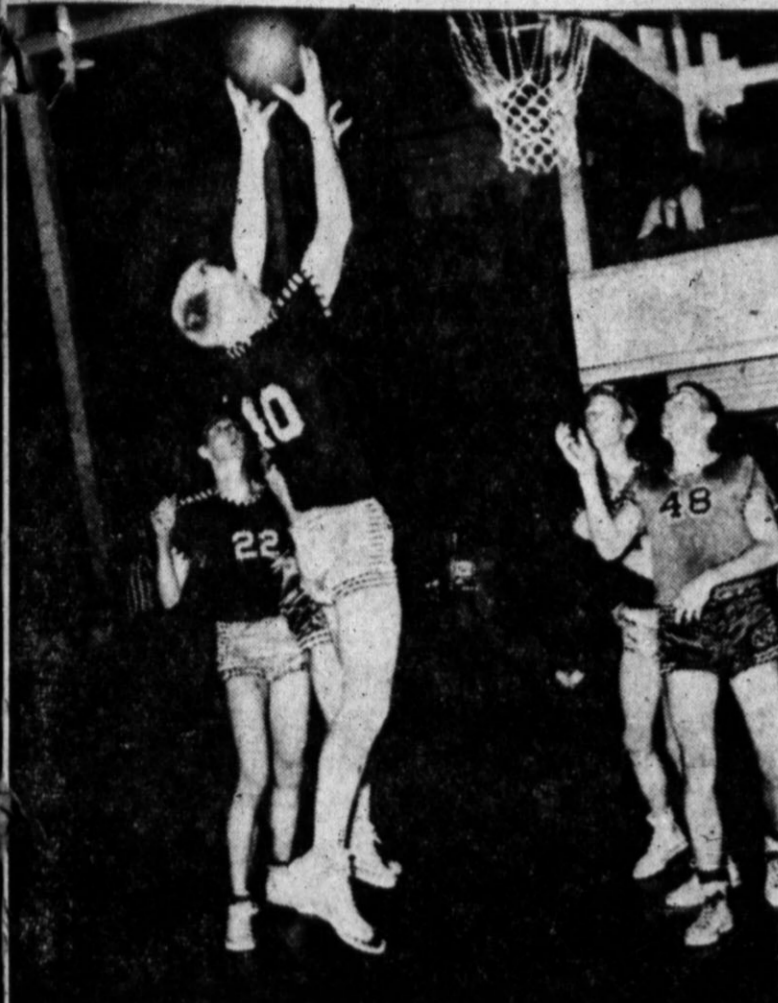

Morelli Returns Saturday Night

Tony Morelli is back! Some wrestling fans will be pleased; others will come to the Hereford Bull Barn in hopes of seeing him get stomped. Those who haven't seen him in action are in for a different kind of treat. Morelli, native of Naples, Italy, is one of the rowdiest rasters ever to appear in the Southwest States Junior heavyweight territory, and goodness knows some rough and rowdy ones have appeared here.

Morelli makes his new debut in a double main event, meeting young and handsome Ricki Starr of St. Louis in the top match. Whitey Whittier, veteran "iron man" from Roxana, Ill., takes on Al Getz, astute grappler from Pittsburgh, Pa., in the other part of the double feature.

Could Be Mayhem
Each match is scheduled for two out of three falls to a one-hour time limit. There could be two hours of legalized mayhem, and the fans who miss it are pretty apt to hear about it. Ricki Starr continues to grow in

the estimation of mat fans everywhere he works. The young, good-looking Irishman who holds "a degree from Purdue University and who toured with Ballet Russe and the American Opera Company as a ballet dancer, has proved to be capable of taking on any wrestler within 25 pounds of his weight. He is considered one of the real stars of the 200-pound division; and his aim is to win the junior heavyweight championship of the world. He has made rapid progress since turning from boxer to wrestler. He gives credit to ballet, fencing and boxing for his fine footwork

and his speed in the ring. Morelli, on the other hand, depends on brute strength and a lot of illegal holds and punches. He is tough and unhandsome, but one of the more consistent winners. Slice 1 1/2 pounds veal in quarter-inch strips. Cover with juice of 1 lemon.

Dean Barden, with the aid of Charles Hudson, county agent, is making plans to see that all the dogs and cats in and near Jumbo are vaccinated for rabies.

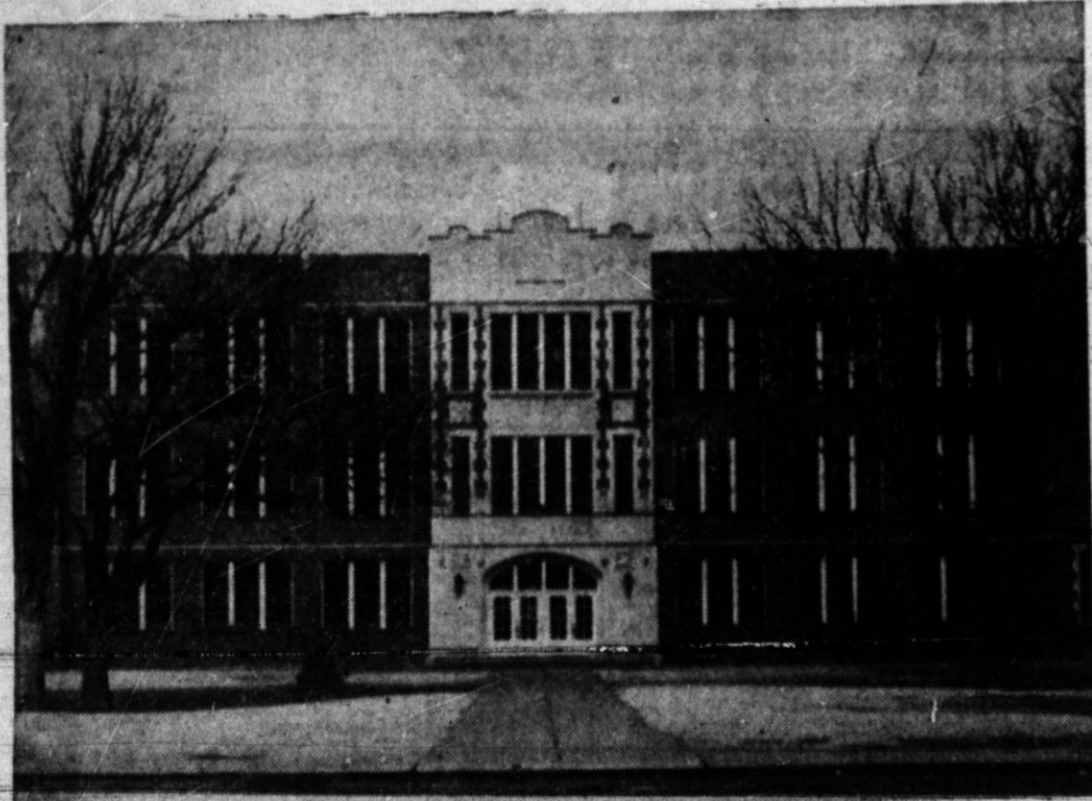

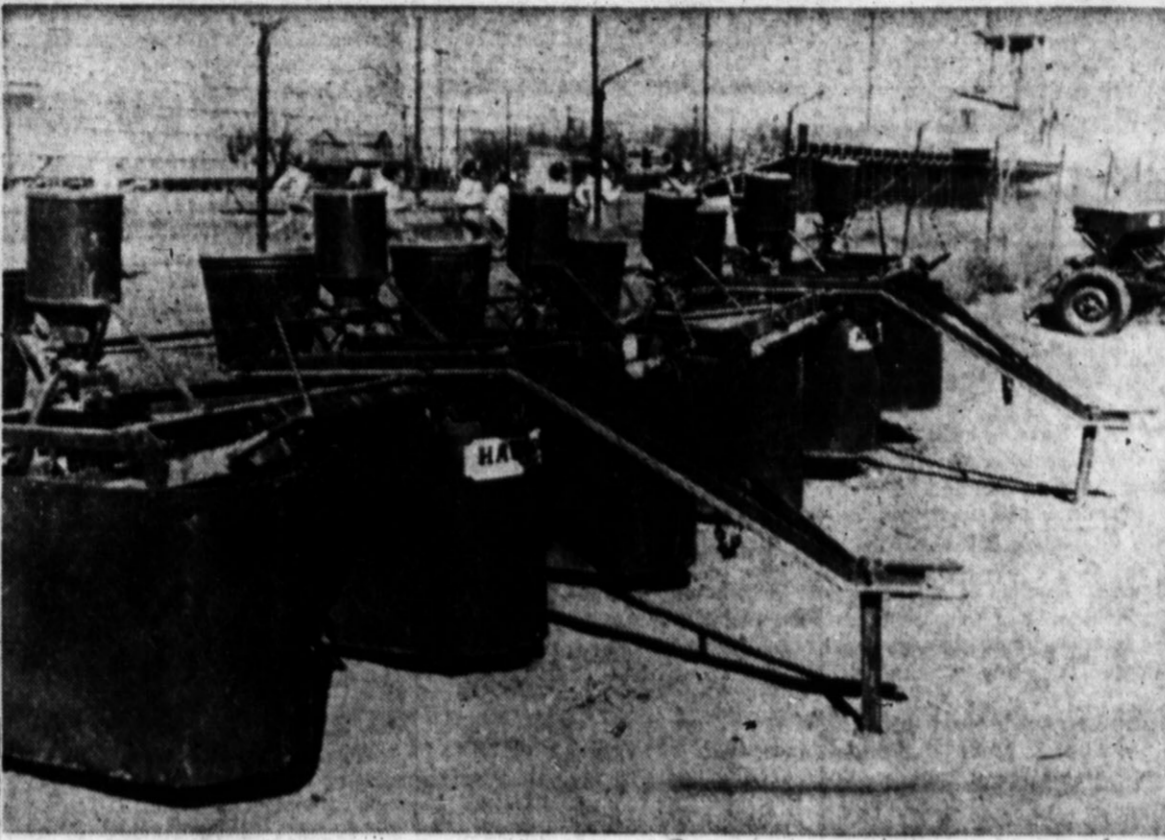

Conservation Equipment Is Available From SCD

If soil from Kansas and Colorado has been covering up fence rows or playing havoc with farming operations, or if the land-owner is simply interested in keeping that part of Texas at home which he already has title to then he will likely be interested in several pieces of soil-conserving equipment which is owned by the Soil Conservation or Wind Erosion District and is for hire through the Vocational Agriculture Department under the direction of W. J. (Bill) Stanford, or supervisors of the districts.

Fifty Cents An Hour
This machinery is available to anyone interested in soil conservation practices at a rate of 50 cents per hour or \$10 per day and is drawn by the farmer's tractor. Mr. Stanford also has for use in laying out terraces a Bostrom Farm Level.

Proceeds from the hire of this equipment is divided equally between the FFA boys fund and the Soil Conservation District. Supervisors for both the Soil Conservation and the Wind Erosion Districts who are Luther Lesly, chairman; Ira Scott, secretary; and C. F. Rickels, H. M. Benson and Carl Wimberley have, in addition to equipment listed above, a large tractor powered by a Caterpillar tractor and a maintainer that can be obtained for such practices as digging trenches, building dams, moving dirt off of fence rows and making fills in low places. These may be obtained by contacting Ronald Matthews. This ma-

chinery is operated by men employed by the district. Head of the SCS Work Unit is Jim Wiman; range conservationist is Richard Gilbreth; engineer is Henry Vicari; and conservation aide is John Burkett. All of these men work in agreement with the Wind Erosion District.

"So far, my marks are all to the velvet, and so I've been no killjoy in this letter."
Miss Kirk translated the 1923 letter into today's jive slang which would go like this:
"Dear Dad:
"That present you sent me was real cra-a-z-y, but I want to-pul you wise to the info that all the cats here, and they're a gone, but gone, gang, haven't the dope on the moneylender that yours truly has.
"Went to a real cool ball last night, and some uninvited squares nearly flipped a wig when they scanned the dolls we cats drag along. One of the Miss Fines wore a gassy vine and a wolf fell for it like a lead balloon, leaving his dish for this man to tow home."
But while some of the kids wallow in jive, reports are that other sections of the country scorn the slang craze. In the Granite State of New Hampshire, for instance, our correspondent tells us that young people are "devoid of follies, slanguages and rages at this time."

At the Indiana High School Press Assn. convention, some 17-year-old girls sported hand-painted skirts. The drawings including poison skull and bones, telephones, household pets and lingo made a great hit.

How Can I?

By Anne Ashley

Q. How can I successfully clean colored suede gloves?
A. Do not wash colored suede gloves. Put on the glove, then rub with a piece of stale bread crust with some of the crumb to it, changing the bread when it becomes soiled.
Q. How can I make a lotion for chapped hands?
A. Mix one ounce of glycerin, three ounces of bay rum, 1/2 dram oil of bergamot, and apply. Or rub well at night with olive oil and wear sleeping gloves.
Q. How can I remove old varnish from furniture?
A. To remove the old varnish before revarnishing, use three to five spoonfuls washing soda to one quart water; and apply with a rough cloth.
Q. How should salad dressing be served?
A. If possible, serve the dressing separately and let the guests help themselves. Not only does the lettuce wilt after the dressing has been on it for any length of time, but people have so many different ideas in regard to salad dressing.
Q. How can I remove oil stains from bed clothing?
A. Wet the spots with spirits of turpentine and wash out with cold water and a mild soap. (Hot water will set the stains).
Q. How can I retain the shapes of knitted garments?
A. Stretch out the knitted articles on a flat surface after laundering and they will retain their shapes.
Q. How can I remedy tough meat?
A. There are several ways: it can be made tender by sufficient pounding, by slow cooking, and also by laying it for a few minutes in vinegar water.
Q. How can I clean my hair-brush very thoroughly?
A. Rub half a cupful of salt and flour, in equal proportions, through the bristles of the hairbrush. Shake the mixture out well before using the brush.
Q. How can I make olive oil more palatable?
A. If olive oil must be taken, it will be much more palatable if a pinch of salt is added to the dose.
Q. What is a good headache remedy?
A. Throbbing headache is often relieved by drinking the juice of half a lemon in fresh water. Follow with the other half in about thirty minutes. Also rub sliced lemon over the temples and brow.

Q. How can I avoid pimples and other such blemishes on my face?
A. Just by observing these simple health rules: Eat lots of fruits and vegetables. Eat meat or fish rather sparingly. Drink 10 glasses of water daily, and lots of milk. Drink orange juice, with lemon added. Avoid candy, jellies, hot breads and cake, and avoid fried foods. Avoid alcohol and spicy-foods. Get lots of exercise and sunshine, lots of hot baths, followed by brisk towelings.
Q. What is a good, inexpensive lotion for combating skin dryness?
A. A bottle of lanolin or baby oil will give you excellent results.
Q. What rinse is especially good for ridding the hair of all soap after a shampoo?
A. A tablespoon of vinegar in the rinse water will do this.
Q. What is a good method of removing warts from the hands?
A. Kerosene, lemon juice, or castor oil, applied two or three times a day over a period of six or seven days, should help.

A. Make a habit of adding a few drops of olive oil to your liquid soap shampoo.

Congressman Walter Rogers Says **Non-Controversial Legislation Needlessly Delayed In House**

Congress as a whole does not have much to brag about in the way of accomplishments during the first two months of this session. By "accomplishments" I mean legislative action carried through to finality. This does not mean that the work-load has decreased. The committees and individual Members of Congress have seen no idle hours since this session began. Much of the proposed legislation should be ready for action by the full House membership. Many of the members are getting restless because of the lack of activity on the House Floor. Much of the debate so far has been on relatively non-controversial matters or on items of minor importance when compared with the legislation that we know will have to be considered at this session.

Much of President Eisenhower's program could have been debated and passed by the House, as a substantial part of it will be non-controversial. That is, it will be non-controversial unless some jokers are slipped into the laws that are not in keeping with the aims expressed by Mr. Eisenhower in his State of the Union message. A sizable part of his proposed program will be controversial. For that reason, the non-controversial matters should be disposed of at the earliest possible date so that plenty of time would be left for full debate on the controversial matters. Sometimes when a large backlog of legislation is created and the time grows short before adjournment, legislation is adopted by a parliamentary body without proper consideration and debate. This is a very dangerous procedure and should never be employed. A large backlog of legislative matters also creates an opportunity for controversy to be raised over matters that otherwise would be non-controversial. This practice can force long delay of controversial matters that should be thoroughly explored and scrutinized. Most of the House Members are very anxious to get the show on the road, so to speak, and not be faced with a shortage of time when we have to consider the big appropriations bills. Proper trimming of these bills requires time for study and debate after the bills are prepared by the committee and submitted to the full House membership.

Household Scrapbook

- Remodeling Straw**
If it is desired to change the shape of a straw hat, pour boiling water over it, and while it is hot and pliable reshape it with the hands. Take a bowl or vessel that will fit the crown and place the hat on this while working, also leaving it on the bowl to dry, in the sun.
- Whipped Cream**
If three or four drops of lemon juice are added to the cream, it hastens the operation of whipping it and the cream will soon thicken.
- The Scissors**
A method for sharpening the scissors that is quick and easy is merely to cut sandpaper with them until a sharp edge is secured.
- The Complexion**
The complexion will be improved if you eat plenty of fruit, drink milk, and also drink water freely between meals. Massage with almond oil, or a good face cream. Keep regular habits.
- Damp Rooms**
If blocks of camphor are placed in all corners and on the shelves, replacing them as they evaporate, it will soon take away all dampness.
- Sponges**
Clean the sponges thoroughly by soaking them in milk for several hours. Then wring them dry and rinse thoroughly in hot water.
- Medicine Stains**
Medicine stains on white goods can be removed by painting the stains with tincture of iodine. Then soak in a strong solution of ammonia for 30 minutes, and wash well.

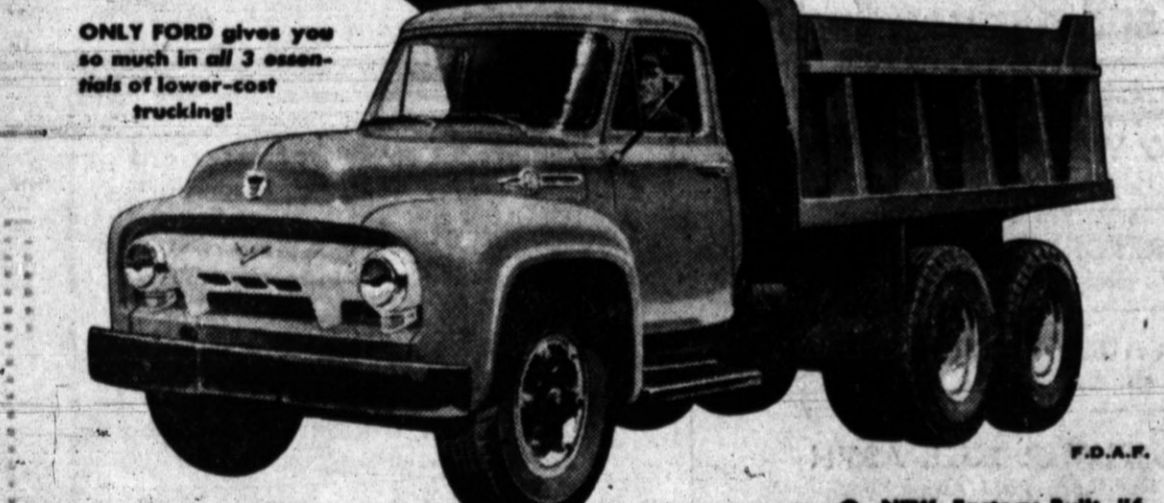
