# Day Center Finds Paths To Children

(Editor's note: This article was written by Mrs. Jack Winget, who has been working with the Migrant Labor Camp Day Center program, which is sponsored by the Hereford United Council of Church Women,

since the program was started.) To many townsmen, the venture concerning the opening of the Hereford Day Nursery at the Labor Camp last summer was a tot-

It may be that this was due to our not collecting the money pledged by many of you. We want Hereford to know how much was accomplished with our Latin - American friends from June, 1953 to July, 1954.

We optimistically opened our nursery on June 15, 1953, expecting people to leave pre-school age children with us. No pre-visiting had been done in homes, and the Day Nursery personnel had almost no experience in working with migrant workers or their children.

As a result, we had no children. After all, most parents at the camp go to work before 6 o'clock in the morning, and we opened our doors at 9 o'clock. Also, this was a new thing, and they were not sure that they could trust us. (Continued on Page 2)



### **Voter Has Choice** In Marking Ballot

Voting instructions in Texas give just enough leeway to cause some confusion

Either of two ways are accept able for marking the ballot when there is more than one candidate for the same office, according to Ralph Smith, county

First, a voter may put an "X" in the square at the left of the name of the candidate he wishes to vote for; or, he may scratch out all the names of candidates for that office except the name he wishes to cast his vote for.

Where a candidate is unopposed, it is necessary to place an "X" in the square at the left of the candidate's name, or it will be "no vote" as far as that of-

# Cheddar Cheese Gives | HD Chatter Special Dash To Potatoes

Mrs. Eugene Naugle enjoys trying out new ideas to add variety to meals, and the housewife who usually thinks of Irish potatoes as either being creamed, baked, fried or boiled will like her recipe for dressing them up a bit for company, especially for serving with baked ham.

The recipe is original with Mrs. Naugle and is one that can be prepared well in advance of the meal and kept in the refrigerator until a few minutes before it is to be put into the oven, if time is a factor.

Potato Cheese Balls

Mrs. Naugle prepares the potatoes as for regular creamed potatoes. She prefers to cook them in the pressure cooker as it not only saves time but she thinks this method of cooking improves the

After the potatoes are creamed a stiffly beaten egg white is folded into them. Then dip hands into cold water and shape a part of the mixture into a mound, making a hole in the middle to hold a ball of shredded medium sharp cheddar cheese about the size of a walnut. The cheese may be prepared in advance.

Finish molding into round ball and put on greased baking sheet. Continue until potatoes are all used allowing one large sized mound for each serving. Cross two narrow strips of cheese across the top and set in a 400 degree oven to brown. Serve hot.

If the potatoes have been stored in refrigerator take out early enough to reach room temperature before putting into oven or the center will not be warm enough to melt the cheese inside.

Another recipe Mrs. Naugle has graciously passed on to others, who nearly always have a request to pass it on again, is a quick casserole using tuna fish. The recipe originally came from Mrs. Douglas Meador of Matador, and is well liked by people who ordinarily do not care for tuna.

# THE INVESTIGATION BUSINESS

Hawkshawing appears to be holding its own as a national pas-time. From the looks of the House calendar, it appears that Hawkshaws are going to start investi-gating each other. I have reference to House Resolution 439, that provides for the appointment of a Representatives to investigate the campaign expenditures of various candidates of the House of Representatives. The important thing about some campaign expenditures is not the expendi-ture itself, but where it came from. Anyway, it might turn out to be a pretty good show when the investigators get to investigating the investigators.

Early in the debate, it was brought out in very clear terms that the bill would not reduce the ost of health insurance to the average citizen, that it would not reduce the cost of medical services to the average citizen, and would not make available health insurance to those who could not now afford it. In short, it would not accomplish the stated purpose

In the main, it would have created and provided a direct and indirect subsidy to insurance companies. It is my opinion that if there is any business in the United States that does not need a subsidy, it is the insurance business. If you have a mortgage on your home, the chances are that some insurance company owns that mortgage, because many, many mortgages are purchased every day by these companies.

The bill would have provided at least a door to socialized medicine, to which I am unalterably oppos-
