Shortest Way to California From All Points East

Hereford's east and west trunk autoline, The South West Trail, is boginning to assume tangible shape for the coming season. Secretary Frank A. Proposed Railway From Ft. Worth

The following letter has been received by the Hereford Chamber of Commerce from Secretary W. A. Warren of the Canyon Commercial League:

"At the meeting of the Randall County Commercial League Tuesday, the following resolutions were presented by the committee composed of Pres. J. A. Hill, L. G. Allen and C. W. Warwick, favoring the proposed railroad to this section;

"Whereas the people of Canyon and Randall County are vitally interested in the commercial, industrial an educational development of the Panhandle-Plains country.

"And whereas we realize the ad tages that would acrue from a railroad connection between the Santa Fe lines. and the Plains, with Central Texas

"And whereas a movement to establish such connections has been inaugurated by our neighbors to the south,

"Be It Resolved by the Randall County Commercial League, That we heartily endorse this proposal, and stand ready to lend every possible assistance to the construction of such a line.

"Be It Resolved Further, That we endorse the suggestion that all efforts be pooled toward the construction of such a line irrespective of its western connections and we are thoroughly convinced that our own interests will be subserved by the construction of any east and west railway lines from Fort Worth to the Plains, regardless of the point of contact with the present Santa Fe System.

"Be It Further Resolved, That Randall County Conmercial League shall send representatives to the next meet called for the consideration of the matter, and that copies of these resolutions be furnished to the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce, the various other commercial organizations are most vitally interested."




