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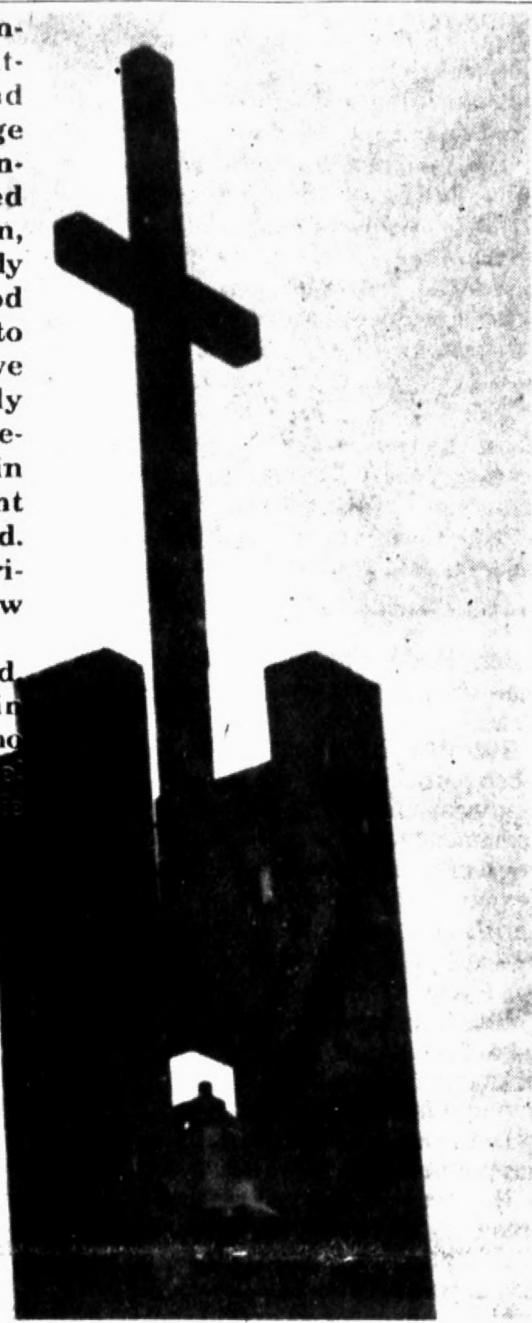

Parent-school partnership pushed

Rally will begin new program

Psst. Wanna hear how you can guarantee your child's success in school?

Get involved. That's the gospel originally preached by Hereford school counselors and teachers. They involved some parents who were already actively working with their kids. Together, they used a program developed by Dr. Hilery Motsinger of Dallas. He's the founder of Success-N-School, a dropout prevention and student enrichment program that helps build a better partnership between school, home and community.

Motsinger will help lead a parent rally Tuesday at 7 p.m. at the HHS auditorium.

Counselors and teachers feel it's vitally important that every parent who can attend the rally be there. It's not limited to parents; everyone in the community is invited, and a special invitation has been sent to ministers.

"If we are going to have any success whatsoever in education, the parents will have to fan the flames," said Maria Garcia, a counselor at West Central Intermediate School.

Intermediate school counselors Elva Devers, Maria Garcia and Berta Loera make plans for Tuesday's parent rally at 7 p.m. at the Hereford High School auditorium. Methods to help parents and children will be discussed at the rally.

The big flame-fanner is building each child's self-esteem. It's not enough, counselors say, for teachers to build self-esteem if there's no support at home.

"Every student has one special attribute or talent," Garcia said. "We can help each child see themselves as a unique individual, and the parents can help with their success."

Revere legend maybe more fact than fiction

SAN MARCOS, Texas (AP) - Listen my children and you shall hear how a lunar phase helped Paul Revere.

It was 217 years ago today that he rowed across Boston Harbor to begin the famous ride warning that the British were coming.

Two scientists say the moon was unusually low that night, allowing

him to slip by the British warship Somerset in the harbor.

"The question has always been, since a British man-of-war was posted there specifically to stop people like Revere, why didn't they stop him?" said Patrick Leehey, coordinator of research at the Paul Revere House in Boston.

Perot backtracks on statements

DALLAS (AP) - As billionaire Ross Perot gets nearer to running for president as an independent, he's reportedly trying to get farther away from statements attributed to him.

During the past week, Perot has denied endorsing a state income tax, house-to-house sweeps for drugs and weapons in South Dallas or increased use of wiretapping in drug cases.

Perot says he never made some of those statements, or they were misreported.

Reporters involved have stood behind stories linking Perot to these positions and have said they never heard complaints from the computing tycoon.

Perot says the rehashing results from politics-as-usual and shortsighted reporters.

doesn't it?" Ed Martin, executive director of the Texas Democratic Party, told The Dallas Morning News.

Jim Oberwetter, the Texas chairman of President Bush's re-election, said, "I for one am surprised to see him backing and

filling on what I thought had been reports on where he stood on the issues."

An April 1991 story in The Beaumont Enterprise - cited frequently by Republican strategists - reported that Perot endorsed a state income tax.

The newspaper quoted Perot as saying, "We've lived on oil and gas forever. We're running out of oil and gas. It's the real world. We've got to pay our bills."

Perot said he never mentioned a state income tax in his conversation with the Beaumont reporter. "I said we're going to have to pay our bills and I walked away," he said.

David Bauerlein, the reporter, said Perot's comments came in response

Paperwork really piles up around courthouse

Public officials in Texas are charged with management of records in their safekeeping.

Controlling the every-day blizzard while maintaining the mounds from the past is no small feat.

Deaf Smith County Clerk David Ruland is typical of his peers throughout the courthouse and the state. They have to decide what to throw away and what to keep, while trying to comply with a state law.

In itself, the statute is a thick volume of (what else?) paper.

The newest Local Government Records Act was passed in 1989. Since then public officials, especially at the county level, have wrestled with the provisions of that law and its ramifications.

In Deaf Smith County, each public official is responsible for retention or destruction of records within that office. Sorting out the materials that should be saved and those that can be destroyed requires some heavy reading.

For instance, in the storage room beneath the second floor county clerk's office are box stacked on box stacked on box of records of criminal

cases that have gone through county court. For any of the case papers to be destroyed, an office employee probably will have to examine each file individually, said Ruland.

Fourteen types of records may be weeded out after five years ... unless they meet the test in one of four different categories. Then, the record must be retained for three years, or 20 years, depending on what category.

As if that isn't enough, officials also must be part historian. The law states:

"Criminal case papers dated 1920, or earlier, may have historical value. This manual recommends, but does not require, that consideration be given to retaining all or a representative sampling of the papers PERMANENTLY."

The manual on the law also addresses the method of preserving the "sampling."

Certain records are considered historical, by their very nature. Some must be held in perpetuity, especially deeds.

County in 1989, two of whom were convicted.

Clark uncovered several glaring errors in Hood's testimony, including discrepancies in his military record and expenses Hood charged to taxpayers from a bar that had been shut down.

Hood made a habit of telling his bosses that he was a proud Army veteran. But Army records show Hood was "dropped from the rolls of the U.S. Army as a deserter after being AWOL" from Fort Campbell in Kentucky in February 1972.

"He lied to me about his record in the military, and that didn't cut water with me," said Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin, who dismissed 15 cases made by Hood from March through August of 1989.

When Hood was asked in court about his military records, he testified, "I really don't care about it. There's nothing I can do about the past."

In a Yoakum County drug trial in the spring of 1989, Hood testified he spent over \$100 at Glen's Bar in Hobbs in July 1988 as part of his undercover work.

But the bar's owner, Leota Brow, testified the bar had been closed the entire month of July because she could not pay her sales tax.

When Clark cross-examined Hood about the contradiction, he testified, "If my records show I was at the bar, I was at the bar."

"No, he was not," Ms. Brow testified.

Some of the most damning testimony against Hood came from an Odessa woman named Melissa Auron, who acknowledges a beleaguered past filled with serious drug abuse.

As a defense witness in a drug trial in March 1989, Ms. Auron told Yoakum

County jurors that Hood hired her boyfriend to make methamphetamine for him in May 1988.

Ms. Auron also testified that Hood used methamphetamine, which caused him to become violent.

"My reason for testifying is I'm very afraid of Lonnie Hood," Ms. Auron said, according to court records. "I'd like to have the man off the streets myself. I'm definitely afraid of Lonnie Hood."

Hood testified that he had never seen Ms. Auron before and said he had never used drugs.

In spite of the revelations brought out in Yoakum County, Hood moved on to Hansford and Ochiltree counties, located in the northern tip of the Panhandle. But his terms there were shortlived.

Ochiltree County Sheriff Joe Hataway, who paid Hood \$3,600 plus expenses for a two-month investigation that netted five indictments, said he terminated Hood's services after catching the investigator at home with a stack of hard-core pornographic magazines.

"Hood told me the porno stuff was part of his act, and I told him it didn't matter, it was time to go on his way," Hataway said. "And this guy claimed to be a minister."

"We let him go because I didn't think his cases were legitimate," says McFarlin, sheriff in Hansford County who paid Hood \$7,200 for a six-month investigation.

McFarlin said he became suspicious after Hood repeatedly turned in methamphetamine cases.

"We had never had a problem with meth before," McFarlin said. "And we haven't had a problem with meth since Hood left. We dismissed all 15 cases because we want to commit someone who is guilty. We don't want to take a chance with someone who may be innocent."

lack of extensive background checks and the devout recommendations of a few authorities kept his entrepreneurial drug work alive in Texas another four years.

It wasn't until the end of Hood's seven-month undercover operation in Nolan County in March 1991 that the contents of his drug samples were called into scrutiny.

Sweetwater defense attorney Kenny Maxwell, who represented three clients claiming to be wrongly accused by Hood, had some of the investigator's methamphetamine samples tested.

A Department of Public Safety examination found those three cases and nearly all of the 68 other cases made by Hood in Nolan County involved drugs containing aspirin, an uncommon cutting agent.

Believing it nearly impossible that every dope dealer in the county was using aspirin to cut drugs, Nolan County District Attorney Frank Conard dismissed the cases, claiming Hood may have tampered with evidence.

"His credibility is destroyed," Conard said.

Conard and Eidson then announced last August they were throwing out 71 Nolan County drug indictments and 25 Taylor County indictments based on Hood investigations.

Later that month, Hood was indicted on two counts of tampering with government records and one count of aggravated perjury.

His trial was scheduled to begin last week, but has been postponed until later this summer. He faces up to 10 years in prison if convicted, and is currently free on \$7,500 bond.

"I think the guy made a lot of legitimate cases," Eidson said. "He was giving us names of people that he could only get from inside the drug rings in Abilene. But he made three impossible cases that raised the red flag. We had documentation to show that he identified a guy in jail, a guy in prison and a guy who was dead."

"As soon as any of the cases are tainted, you have to dismiss them all."

Hood is working somewhere in

Arkansas, according to Maner, who adds his client "is not in hiding."

Hood did not return phone messages left with family still living in Denver City.

"Under my instructions, he would not talk to you," Maner said. "We can't try a defense of this case in the newspaper."

Maner said he was unaware of any complaints about Hood's work outside Nolan County.

"Everybody I have talked to said he did excellent work with the highest of recommendations," Maner said. "I think he is absolutely innocent."

Yoakum County District Attorney Linda Shoemaker Lowrey stands by

Hood's work, boasting of a 74 percent conviction rate for 31 adult offenders arrested from March through September 1988.

When some counties began getting cold feet about Hood, Mrs. Lowrey was often the person they would call for reassurance. She testified as a character witness for Hood in a drug trial in Sutton County in the fall of 1989.

"There have been no sweeping dismissals here, nor will there be," Mrs. Lowrey said, adding that about five people remain imprisoned on Hood's testimony, including three who pleaded guilty. "I don't know what happened in the other counties, or how they handled their cases. But we are satisfied with the work done in Yoakum County."

Mrs. Lowrey concedes her county is now using only certified peace

officers to conduct drug investigations.

Others also have vowed never to use a non-commissioned officer in undercover work again.

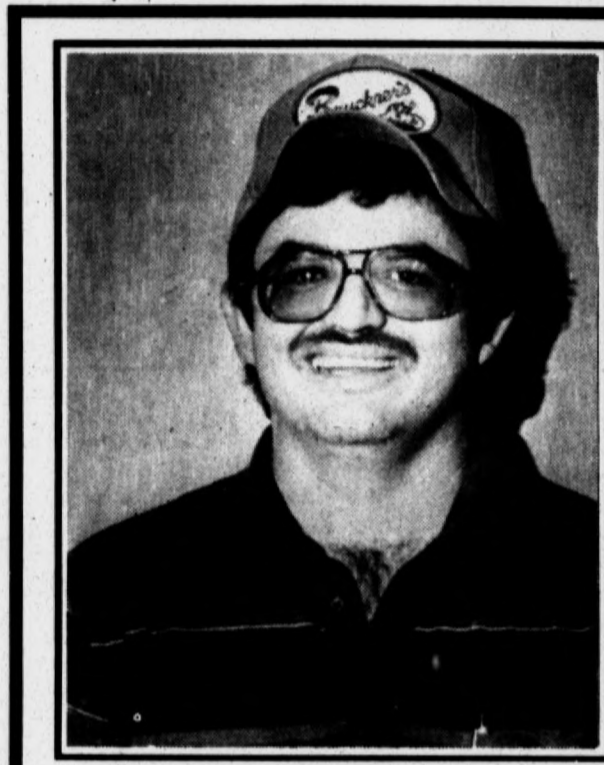
"There won't be another noncertified investigator doing drug work in this county as long as I'm here," says Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin. "And that decision is based entirely on the work of Lonnie Hood."

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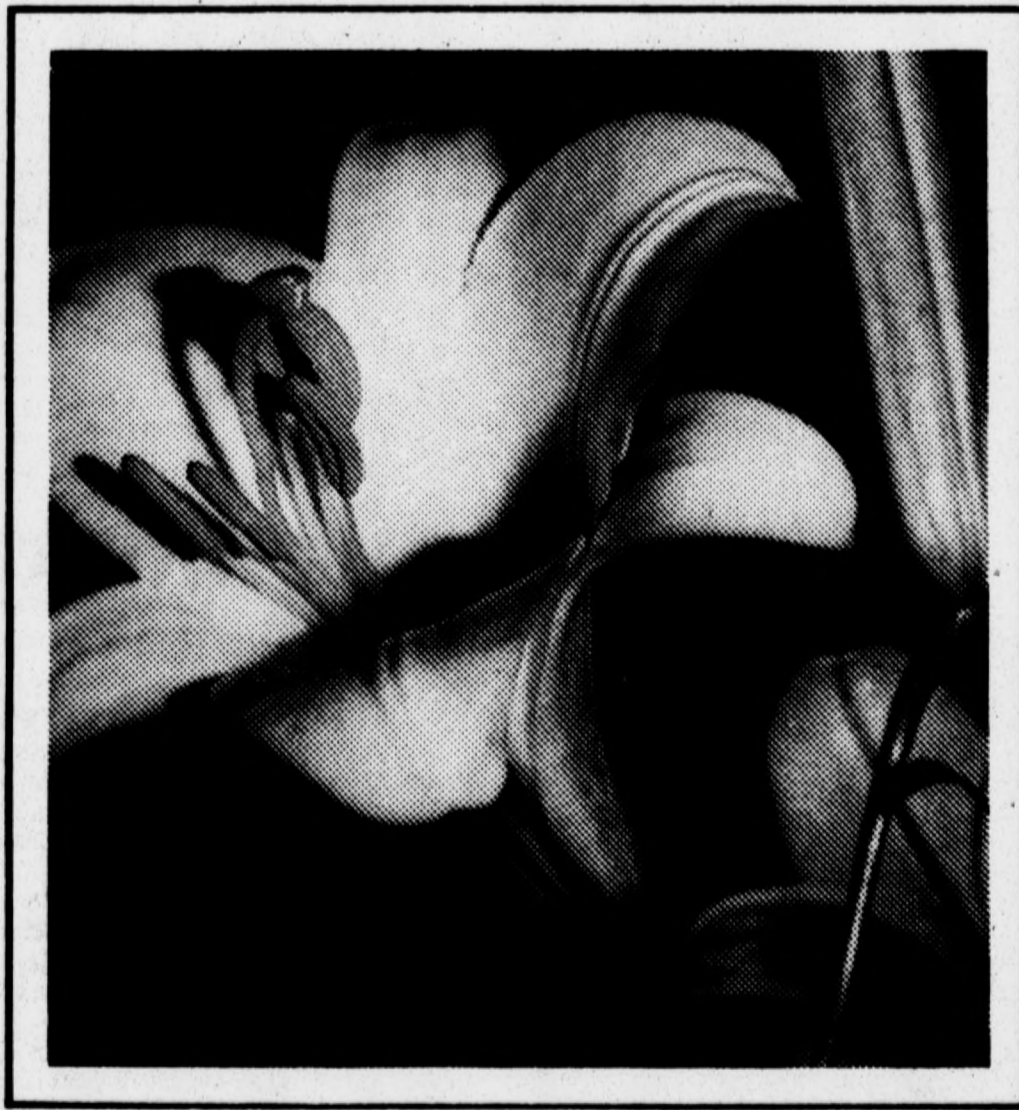
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Science Fair winners from St. Anthony's School

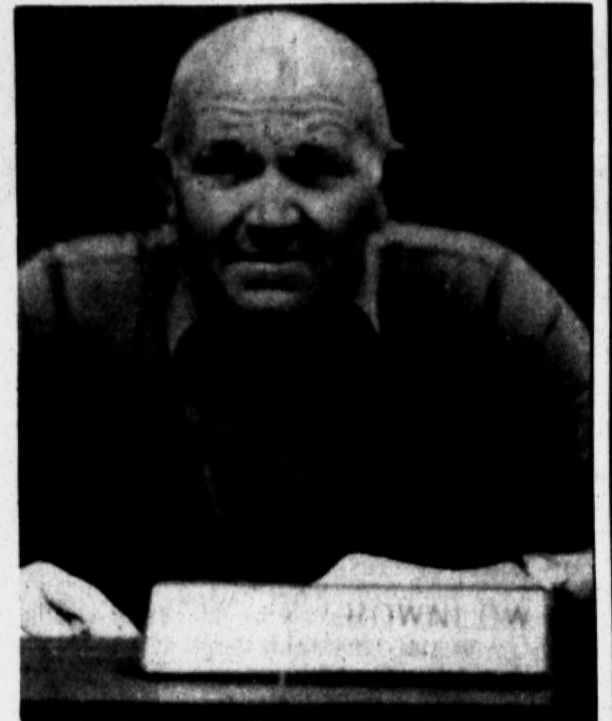

Bad luck follows boys' track team

If it weren't for bad luck, the Hereford boys' track team would have no luck at all.

Cody High, the third leg of Hereford's 400-meter relay team, pulled a muscle in his leg during the race at the District 1-4A track meet Friday at Randall.

"We were in definite contention for second," head track coach Ron Young said. "We probably would have gotten second, but he pulled up and we ended up fourth."

This came a day after Leo Brown, the team's top performer, broke a bone in his leg during the finals of the long jump competition.

"We've had enough bad luck to last the whole year," said Young, who obviously had two very long days.

The result of this luck was a fourth-place finish for the Hereford team. Brown was lost for the triple jump and the 110-meter high hurdles, events he might have won. High was lost for the 400-meter run, in which he probably would have placed.

Brown was replaced in the 400-meter relay by Michael Brown. High and Leo Brown both had to be replaced in the 1,600 relay, which finished fourth with Michael Brown and Mark Kuper as emergency replacements.

Borger won the meet with 155 points. Dumas, with 129, was second and Randall, with 111, was third. Hereford had 74 points, and was followed by Caprock with 54 and Pampa with 20. Borger and Dumas will represent the district at the Region 1-4A track meet May 1-2 in San Angelo.

The bad luck may have cost the team second place and a trip to regionals. Hereford lost as much as 40 points between the two injuries, and if Hereford would have placed higher in the relays and received the expected points in the individual events, then Dumas would have placed lower and received less points. Hereford almost certainly would have passed Randall for third.

Hereford will send three boys to the regional meet. Pety Colvin finished second in the 100-meter dash with a time of 10.91 seconds, and he

finished second in the 200 with a time of 22.09. Borger's Ronald Knighton won both races. His times were 10.67 and 21.31.

Stephen Blea and Shawn Fogo earned regional berths on Thursday. Blea took second in the shot with a put of 51 feet, 1 1/4 inches. Randall's Chris Cook put the shot 52-11 3/4 for the win.

Fogo will go as the alternate in the long jump, replacing Leo Brown, who earned second. Fogo tied Brown's best jump of 21-1 1/2, but Brown was given second because his next best jump was better than Fogo's next best. Randall's Billy Vivens won with a leap of 21-5 1/4.

Fogo will be the alternate in the 200 dash after finishing third with a time of 22.42.

A few other Whitefaces placed. Michael Brown was fifth in the triple jump with an effort of 39-9. (Michael Brown of Borger won the event with a 43-9.) Michael Ramirez was sixth with a 38-8. Ramirez was also sixth in the 800 run with a time of 2:06.67.

On Thursday, T.J. Samples put the shot 46-2 1/2. That tied him for third, but he lost out on the next-best-throw tiebreaker to Jeremy Kreig of Randall. Hereford's Craig Hilt-brunner took fifth place with a put of 44-5.

The 400 relay team's fourth place finish and time of 44.05 on Friday was not bad considering High's injury. Fogo, Colvin and Michael Brown joined High on that team.

The 1,600 relay team's time was 3:36.86. That team was Fogo, Ramirez, Michael Brown and Mark Kuper.

Hereford's junior varsity team came in second with 125 points to the Dumas JV's 169. Hereford was second despite the fact that many of the boys who ran on JV most of the year ran on varsity at the district meet, Young said.

"We're looking forward to next year. We've got all these guys coming back," Young said, referring to the JV team and the varsity team, which has only five seniors. "We're going to be real strong next year. Real strong."

Mavs keep Rockets from clinching

DALLAS (AP) - Rudy Tomjanovich called it his worst nightmare. Richie Adubato said it was a minor miracle.

The Houston Rockets blew a

chance to clinch a Western Conference playoff berth Friday night by taking one of the NBA's worst teams for granted. The Rockets paid for their overconfidence with a 109-106 upset loss to the Dallas Mavericks.

"We let the Mavericks go crazy

in the fourth quarter," said Tomjanovich, the Rockets' interim coach. "This is a nightmare. We didn't close the door on the playoffs and we had a big opportunity to do it."

Herb Williams scored 24 points and Mike Iuzzolino added 19 as the Mavericks beat Houston for the fourth time in six games this season.

"I thought we would really be in for it tonight, playing our rookies," Dallas coach Adubato said. "I thought they would be mad because we beat them in Houston. I expected Hakeem Olajuwon to go wild. He did he got 33 points. But we still won. You figure it. We may have ruined their playoff chances."

Then again, maybe not. Though their lead over the Los Angeles Lakers dwindled to a half-game, the Lakers must win Saturday in Portland and Sunday at home against the LA

Clippers, then hope Phoenix wins in Houston on Sunday to overtake the Rockets for the last spot.

"We've put big pressure on us now," Olajuwon said. "It's a must-win situation now. This loss was very disappointing, very discouraging."

Of the six matches, four were finals of the District 1-4A tennis tournament. There was a Hereford player involved on each court. At the same time, entire teams from a few other schools were already on their buses and headed out of town.

Hereford will send two singles players and two doubles teams to the Region 1-4A tennis tournament April 27-28 in San Angelo. Advancing were Teresa Baker and Greg Coplen in singles, the boys' singles team of Jamie Kapka and Torey Sellers, and the girls' doubles team of Robyn Sublett and Bri Reinauer.

Although all lost their finals and finished second, they put up fights which made for some pretty good matches, Sims said. The best was the boys' singles match between Coplen and the defending district champion, Barry Thrutchley of Borger.

"It gave you chills to watch," Sims said. "(Coplen) played him awesome. They were diving for balls...hurdling the net. You would have paid money to see that match." (Coplen actually did hurdle the net while going for a ball, she said.)

The match went three sets. Thrutchley took the first, 6-3, then Coplen won the second, 2-6. In the third set, Thrutchley "came back like fire," Sims said, and won 6-3.

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TPWD to discuss monitoring tournaments

AUSTIN (AP) - Few anglers ever fish in a prize-money tournament, but for the serious and semi-serious, there's a growing number of events that offer the challenge of competition and the lure of big bucks.

The impact of the tournament industry is an unknown, but the number of tournaments continues to grow in Texas and nationally.

Texas Parks and Wildlife will hold a public hearing May 8 in Athens to discuss a proposal for a permit system to monitor tournament activity and gather information about how many there are and how many fish are caught.

The current numbers include such highlights as:

Forty-one reservoirs in Texas will play host to nearly 300 money tournaments in 1992.

A staggering 3,000 to 5,000 local bass club tournaments are held annually on the 200 major Texas lakes.

Nationally, there are more than 3,000 tournaments that have financial paybacks of some kind, and another immense but unknown number of local club tournaments held on rivers and lakes in every state with a bass population.

According to the Tournament Angler Directory, a twice-yearly publication based in Marble Falls that lists nearly 3,000 money tournaments, 57 lakes nationwide will host a minimum of 10 bass tournaments during 1992. Those same 57 lakes, 11 of which are in Texas, will host a minimum total of 997 tournaments.

Those tournaments are having an unknown impact on the public water fisheries of Texas and other states. Virtually all major tournaments are catch-and-release affairs and are universally given credit for popularizing the release ethic. Anglers are even penalized for weighing in a dead fish.

Still others, including some large circuit events, carry out "paper tournaments" where fish are measured in the boat and released on the spot. Anglers are given credit for weights based on a predetermined formula.

However, many local club tournament anglers are given an option on releasing their fish.

Texas Parks and Wildlife hopes to find out what's happening by instituting a permit system similar to ones already in place in states such as Missouri and California. Phil Durocher, chief of inland fisheries for TPWD, said tournament operators and participants have access to ready knowledge about individual lakes that would aid the agency in tracking the health of fish populations.

Catch rates and individual catch information would be used to establish a data base for tournament lakes that would help indicate any changes in the health of the fish populations.

"We know that there are so many of these tournaments going on," Durocher said. "Those people are collecting a tremendous amount of information, but they're keeping it. We want to get it."

TPWD can't match numbers with tournaments and tournament anglers, Durocher said.

"We have 200 large lakes in the state, and because of our manpower limitations, we sample just 17 of them every year," he said. "The rest of them we do on a two- to three-year rotation basis. Those people are out there every week."

They are out there in numbers almost too big to count, according to Alan Allen of Sportsmen Conservationists of Texas, which lobbies on behalf of sportsmen's organizations. Besides the tournaments that attract anglers eager for a cut of a financial pie, there are the local bass clubs.

"There are easily 300 and as many as 500 bass clubs in Texas," Allen said. "Each one of them holds about 10 monthly tournaments every year." Quick math shows that to be about 5,000 club tournaments, which have a varying impact on the lakes fished.

"The problem isn't bass clubs or tournaments," Allen said. "The problem is that we have too many people in this country. There are too many people fishing. We are putting more pressure on the lakes than we need to."

Allen said he could envision a day when states might have to begin putting daily limits on the number of boats that can be fishing on a lake. Similar systems already are in place on certain smaller, heavily fished lakes such as Purkis Creek State Park Lake in East Texas.

The numbers of tournaments are huge. They are sponsored by such diverse organizations and companies as McDonald's, Bass Anglers Sportsmen's Society, radio stations and Red Man tobacco products, and kept alive by the manufacturers of fishing tackle and equipment, marine manufacturers and others.

Prizes range from a few hundred dollars to as much as \$100,000. Equipment, boats and motors also are routinely awarded to winning anglers and teams. A number of anglers nationwide make their sole living from tournament winnings and endorsements from major manufacturers, in what has become a multimillion-dollar industry.

The business is so large that the 11 Texas lakes with at least 10 tournaments this year will host 174 payback tournaments that have been listed in the Tournament Angler Directory.

Toledo Bend leads the list with 27 tournaments, closely followed by Sam Rayburn with 26. Lake Fork will have 20 and Richland Chambers another 18. Such lakes as Possum Kingdom with 15 and Palestine with 11 also made the list.

Nationally, some lakes will be home to an unbelievable number of tournaments. The Ohio River, for instance, has 53 listed in the directory. Eufala in the Southeast has 42 and Kentucky Lake 33, Missouri's Mark Twain lists 33, and there are 39 on Smithville in Missouri.

Those tournaments, though, indicate only a small amount of the fishing that's actually going on. Tournament anglers are only a fraction of the people out there fishing, according to TPWD's own opinion surveys.

"Only 7 percent of all bass fishermen belong to any organized fishing group," Durocher said. "And only 9 percent have fished in any kind of event."

Durocher said those surveys show that 50 percent of the anglers in Texas fish for largemouth bass.

"We sell about 2 million licenses, but that doesn't account for all the fishermen in the state," he said.

Those under 17 and over 65 are exempted, along with those who fish only in private waters.

"I think 3 million might be a better number for the total number of fishermen," Durocher said, "so there could be 1.5 million people fishing for bass in Texas."

Tournament anglers, then, account for a very small number of the total. They are, however, zealous in their pursuit of prizes and cash awards in the 3,000 or so tournaments listed in the Tournament Angler Directory, the largest such publication in the country.

"They have to be a payback tournament before we list them," said Britt Thompson.

Collecting the information requires a combination of investigative efforts, phone calls, bulletin board snooping and networking to pull off.

"It's a hard job," he said. The list is pretty extensive for every section of the country except the West Coast, Thompson said.

"We have more tournaments listed in Texas because that's where we are," he said. "In the Western states I'm sure they have plenty of tournaments, but we don't get that many of those."

Durocher said the permit system he's proposing would help identify the tournament activity in Texas and put it to use helping biologists track fish populations. There has been some negative response, he said, in the form of rumors that the plan is the beginning of regulations to put tournaments out of business altogether.

"There's been no discussion whatsoever on any move to regulate tournaments," he said. "That's not our intention. The permits would just help us know what's going on."

Durocher said he wasn't concerned with any financial charge for the permit, although a minimum amount probably would be used to cover costs of implementing the program. Minimum numbers probably would be established for number of participants and for prizes, too.

"That way small clubs that just do

trophies or points for monthly tournaments could get a one-time, annual permit to cover them. Anybody holding a bigger tournament would buy on a tournament by tournament basis," Durocher said.

"The large majority of people believe tournament fishing is detrimental to the resource," Durocher said. "We don't have any data to back that up. The permit is a chance for the clubs and fishermen to give us the data to show they don't hurt the fishing."

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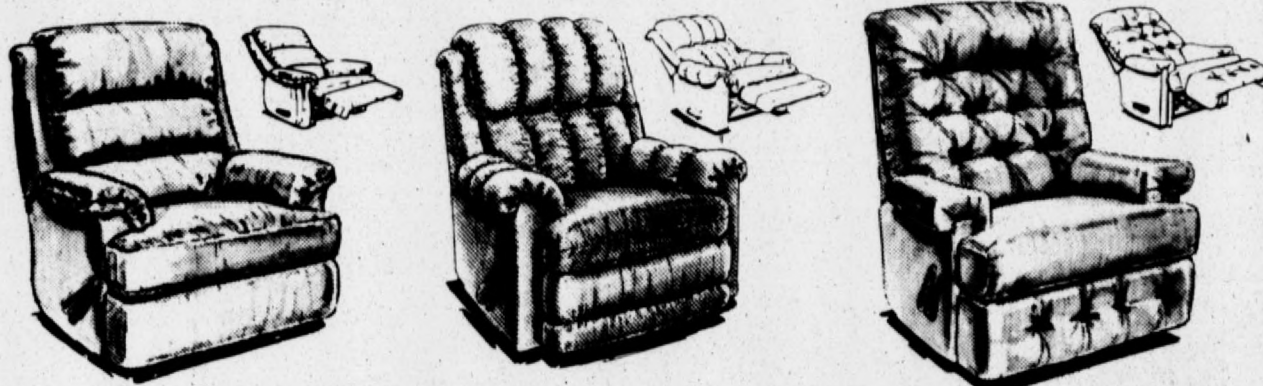
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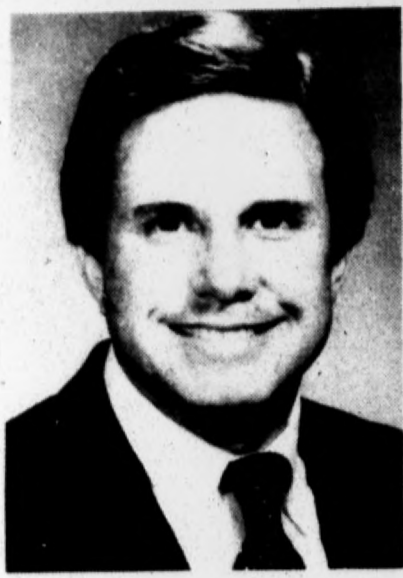

Combest wants more for disaster

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- "I am not any more satisfied than our farmers are over the half-a-loaf portion of disaster relief now in the mail," said U.S. Representative Larry Combest (R-Texas). While working in the 19th Congressional District this week, Congressman Combest said he will continue to urge the President to release an additional \$755 million in emergency funds. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced that disaster payments will be reduced to 50-point-04 percent of their eligible losses.

"While the 50 percent payment calculation is more than the predictions of just pennies on the dollar, it is not enough," said Combest. "Patchwork disaster assistance usually fails to provide satisfactory compensation to farmers for disaster loss. By failing to work with us on a viable crop insurance program, the Administration has a responsibility now to meet the disaster needs of producers by releasing the remaining funds. Instead of dealing with the unreliability of these disaster payments, farmers need a crop insurance program more suitable to their requirements."

"Immediate action to release the additional \$755 million in disaster relief could give farmers additional assistance for crop losses suffered in the year they have not yet claimed for disaster aid," said Combest. Currently, producers can qualify for disaster payments in only one year out of 1989, 1990 or 1991.

"The added effect of three straight years of crop disasters compounds producers' financial problems and magnifies the need for a positive, sound approach to the survival of farmers hard-hit and haggard by the weather," said Combest.

Soil moisture in good shape

Soil moisture conditions are better than they have been in many years for Deaf Smith County producers within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

No pre-plant irrigation is needed to bring the five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity for the 1992 growing season.

"The top three feet of the five-foot soil profile are near field capacity, with small soil moisture deficits occurring at the four and five foot levels. This is the opposite of recent years where the deficits were in the top three feet of the soil," said Wilfred E. "Willie" Crenwelge, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist.

Two to four inches of water will be needed to wet the top five feet of soil to field capacity over most of the portion of Deaf Smith County within Water District boundaries, according to data collected during the annual joint pre-plant soil moisture survey

conducted by the High Plains Water District and the United States Department of Agriculture—Soil Conservation Service (USDA-SCS).

An area requiring two to four inches of water to fill the soil profile is located south of the Garcia and Bootleg Communities and west of FM 1412. Two to four inches of water is also needed in a wide band stretching from the northeast corner of the county and continuing southwest through the Milo Center community, the City of Hereford, and the Westway Community.

Two smaller bands requiring four to six inches of soil moisture were also noted. One begins at the Water District boundary near the La Plata historic site and continues southwest to the Deaf Smith/Parmer County line. The other begins near the intersection of Palo Duro Creek and FM 2587 and continues in a southwesterly direction

to the Deaf Smith/Castro County line. The Dawn Community is included in this area.

Crenwelge suggests that producers let normal rainfall replenish the deeper soil moisture, since the probability is good that enough precipitation will fall between now and the growing season to fill the deficits.

Soil moisture conditions were surveyed from November 13, 1991, through January 23, 1992, at 270 soil moisture monitoring sites within the 15-county District service area.

However, some sites received additional precipitation after the measurements had been made. In order to provide the most accurate soil moisture information possible to District residents, personnel re-read rain gauges from those soil moisture sites measured from November 14, 1991, through December 16, 1991. They found that additional rainfall had

been received at these sites. A second set of soil moisture readings were made at selected sites, and the data was adjusted to reflect these findings.

Soil moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed aluminum access tube. Soil density data and rain gauge readings are also recorded during the survey.

Selection of soil moisture monitoring sites is based upon the soil type and crop(s) grown in the area. Each site is representative of typical field conditions in the area.

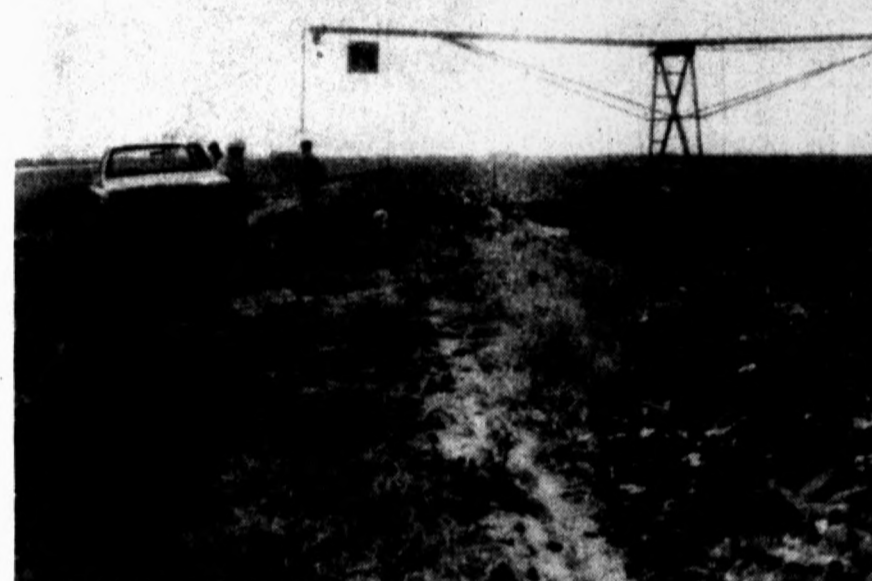

Beef checkoff: mixed results

Total dollars collected by the Texas Beef Industry Council (TBIC) in 1990-91 for the \$1 per head beef checkoff program are lower than in any fiscal year since the checkoff program began.

Yet more Texas beef producers reported checkoff dollars paid to TBIC in the same period.

That's one interesting bit of information contained in TBIC's recently released annual report for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1991. The annual report also lists total checkoff dollars paid by Texas beef producers to fund national programs of research, education and promotion of beef. It summarizes national expenditures. It reports on national programs that TBIC extended into Texas in the last fiscal year.

But outside the facts and figures, the TBIC annual report offers important information about the state of the Texas beef industry. An example is the disparity between record high compliance and record low collections of checkoff dollars in the 1990-91 fiscal year.

"Reporting of checkoff dollars by individual beef producers increased 11 percent this year," said TBIC Executive Director Anne I. Anderson.

"Required reporting by collection sites (packers, dealer/order buyers, auction markets and feedyards) also increased by 15 percent."

TBIC further verifies compliance through TBIC's random audits of collection sites. These audits are required by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Beef Board, the national organization that administers the beef checkoff program.

The 1990-91 audits were conducted on three dealer/order buyers, two

feedyards, two packers, two auction market and one sale manager. Each company was randomly selected through a computer program.

The results of the audit showed overall high compliance with the checkoff program. Only one audited site proved to have a significant amount of delinquent checkoff dollars. Texas BIC collections and compliance staff members are working with the management of this site to collect the checkoff dollars owed.

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USDA agrees with Combest, will change designation for peas

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Seeds of legislation planted by U.S. Representative Larry Combest (R-Texas) have produced action that will now allow cotton farmers to effectively donate black-eyed peas to food banks. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has just released new rules that will allow the mechanical harvesting of black-eyed peas on cotton conserving-use and set aside acreage, if the peas are donated to charitable food programs.

Combest had responded to South Plains Food Bank Executive Director Carolyn Lanier's plea for removal of a USDA technical ban that hindered her harvest and donation efforts on behalf of more than 16,000 needy people. Combest's black-eyed pea provisions for the first time allow combines into the fields on set aside

acreage for more timely and effective harvesting of black-eyed peas for charitable donation, while satisfying USDA rules governing the use of land in these specified cotton programs.

"Even with all the hardship suffered these past few years, farmers still are eager to spend their own time and money to freely donate a crop that can feed needy people," said Combest. "I am proud of our farmers and I salute the work of Carolyn Lanier and the South Plains Food Bank."

Cotton farmers wishing to donate their black-eyed pea cover crops under new provisions of the conserving-use and set aside acreage programs can find details from their local Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service office and from the South Plains Food Bank in Lubbock at (806)763-3003.

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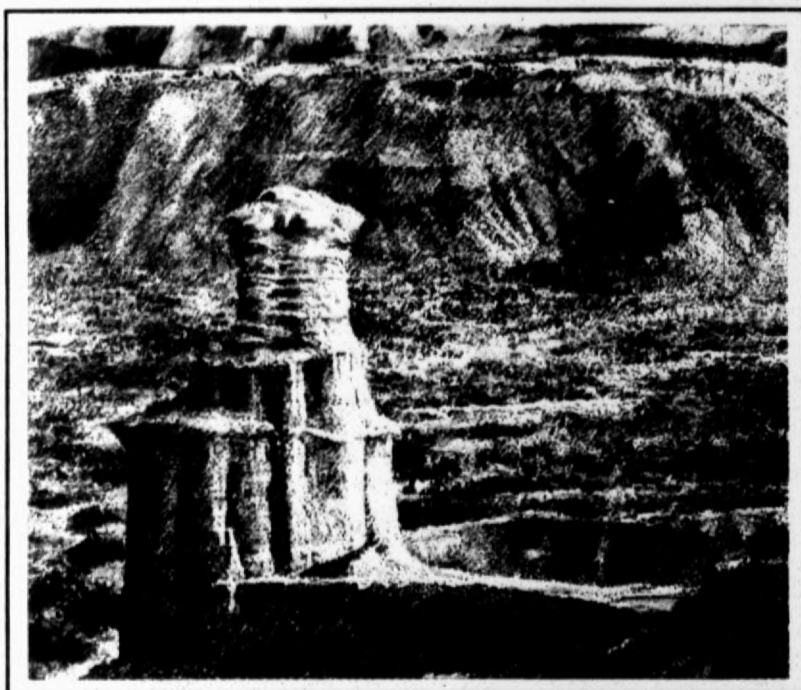

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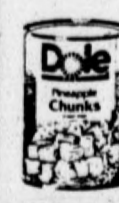
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Between the Covers

So what's different from the truth? Look at this week's non-fiction:

Murder...Who Killed Martin Luther King? James Earl Ray, accused and convicted of the crime, alleges that the FBI was behind the assassination of the civil rights leader.

Mayhem...Edna Buchanan, police reporter in Miami, relates some of her breathtaking, bizarre, and totally unforgettable experiences in *Never Let Them See You Cry*.

Moody maidens...Marilyn and Me, Susan Strasberg's account of how the Strasberg family coached and encouraged Marilyn Monroe, and the relationship between the two girls.

Also The Vanderbilt Women by Clarice Stasz. The dynasty of wealth, glamour, and tragedy.

If, however, you insist on miscellaneous mindless misery, preferring a make-believe world to the real one. I guess we can manage that, too. Not new, but newly re-released is *A Girl of The Limberlost* by Gene Stratton Porter. Originally published in the early 1900's, this tale is strikingly relevant to today's environmental emphasis. Elnora Comstock falls in love - first with Indiana's Limberlost Swamp (I didn't even know Indiana had a swamp!), then with a handsome young man from the city. Tough choice, Elnora! (For what it's worth, a couple of self-styled literary critics peeking over my shoulder verify that this is a good book!)

Jean Plaidy offers *The Pleasures Of Love* to anyone who want sit. (That didn't come out right. My apologies, Jean.) Actually this is Plaidy's fictionalized account of Catherine of Braganza. Catherine is the daughter of King John IV of Portugal and is betrothed to Charles II of England.

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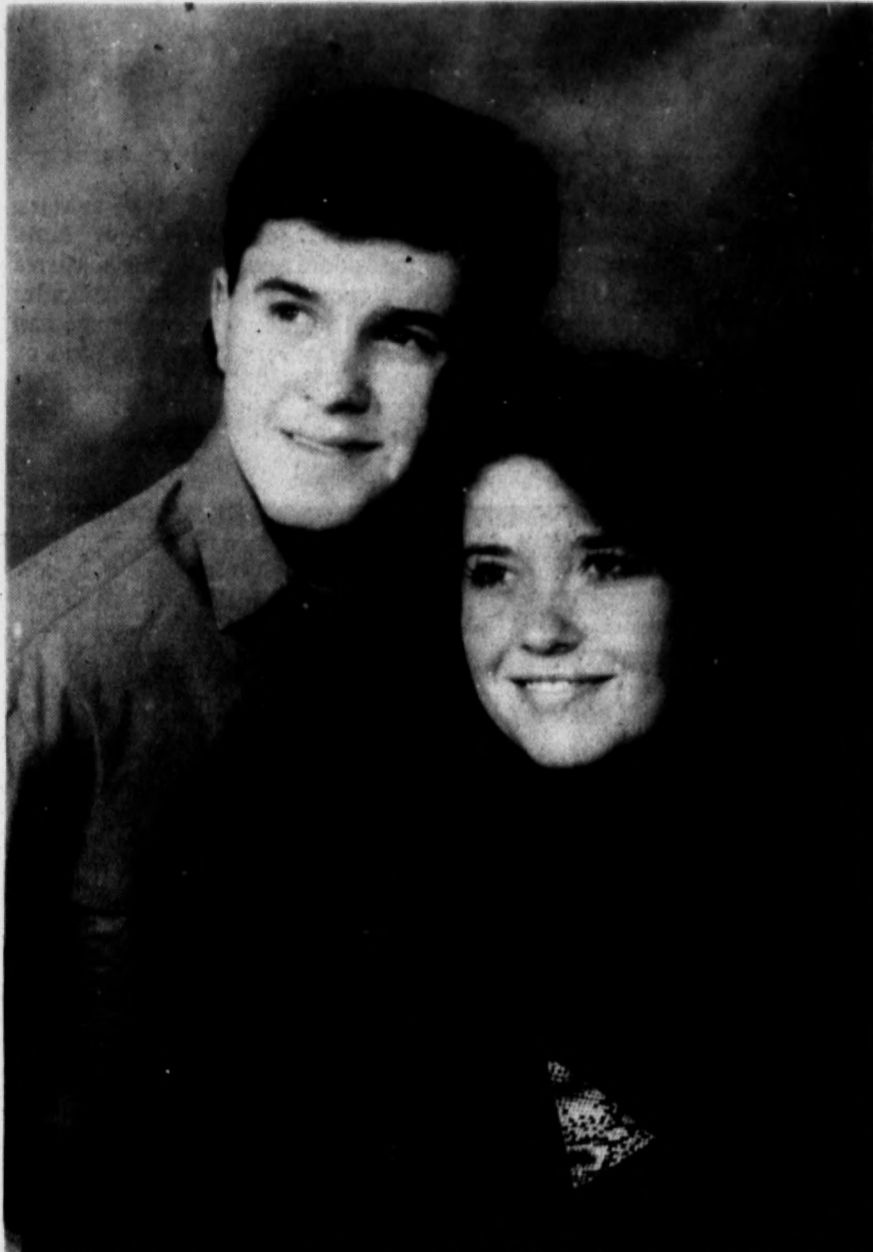

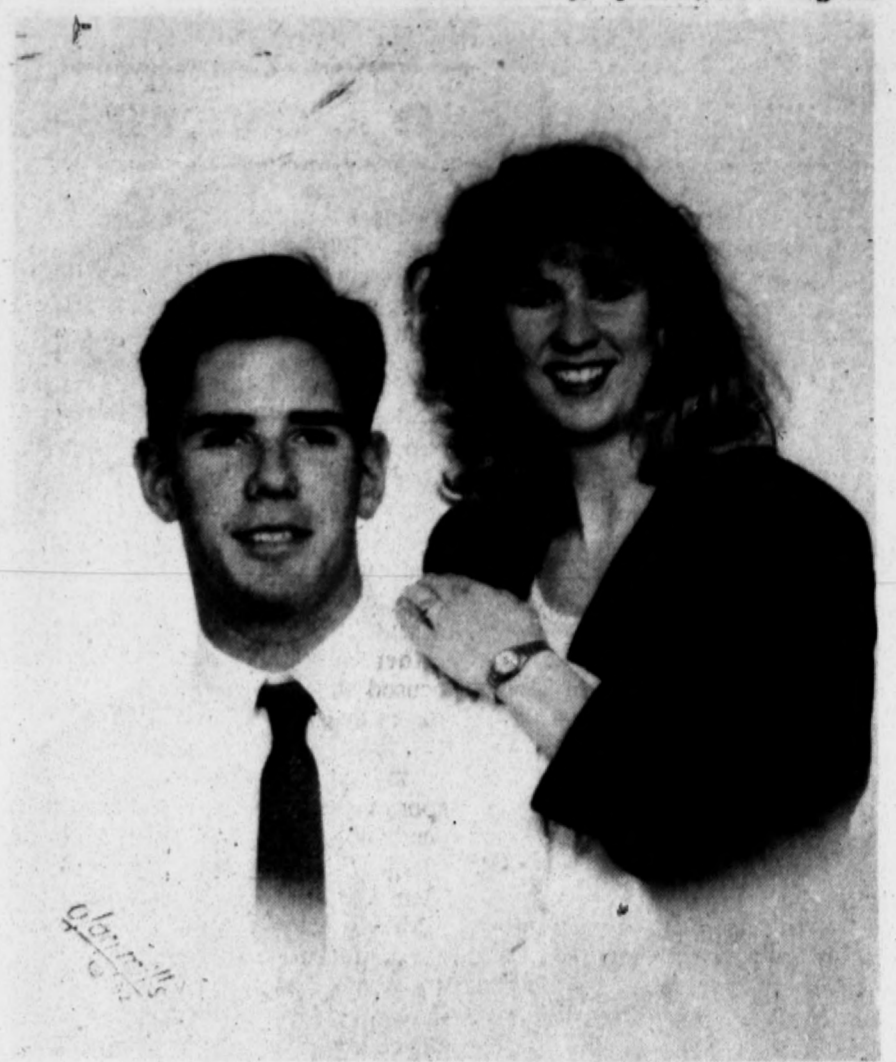

Many coffee drinkers take the last sip of their coffee and throw the cup into the trash can, a routine repeated many times a day by office workers worldwide.

The average office worker in North America goes through around 500 disposable cups a year. All those empty cups and related utensils are easy to toss, but they don't just disappear. In fact, most plastic coffee cups are made from polystyrene foam. In a landfill, they don't break down. Even paper cups don't break down easily. In fact, in a landfill, almost nothing breaks down. It just sits there.

There are solutions:
-Issue each employee a ceramic mug, perhaps with your company logo or an environmental message printed on the side.
-Keep sturdy mugs, not polystyrene or paper cups, near the office

coffee pot.

-Don't buy plastic stirrers; just keep some spoons on hand.

-Arrange for your cafeteria or coffee shop to give discounts to employees who bring their own mugs for coffee.

-If there is space to wash dishes, make durable plastic dishes available for employee use.

-Arrange with owners or nearby carry-outs to give discounts to employees who bring their own mugs. Ask if employees can bring their own dishes or plastic containers for the salad bar.

It's air conditioner time

And spring is the best time to prepare for that summer weather by selecting the new air conditioner needed for the family room. The major purchase requires some planning and shopping time.

The most important purchase factor is to size the unit to the area to be cooled. An air conditioner not only cools the air, it dehumidifies it.

Home economists suggest taking this list of information and questions with you to the appliance store:

- Size of area to be cooled.
- Is room sunny, shaded, insulated?
- Window size and available electric outlets (120 volt or 240 volt?).

-EER (energy efficiency rating) available in size needed. High efficiency models may have a higher purchase price, but savings in operating costs can often return that difference quickly.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: After my car was stolen and recovered, I attended the court arraignment and sentencing of the thief. It was an eye-opener to say the least.

There were at least 50 juveniles in the courtroom--male and female, black, white and Asian, ranging in age from 12 to 16. The charges included everything from attempted murder and selling drugs to mugging, breaking and entering, shoplifting, arson and possession of firearms (Uzis, AK-47s, you name it). Only two of these kids were first-time offenders.

The judge appeared to be extremely lenient. He treated them like naughty children, telling them to behave themselves and mind their parents.

When these young hoodlums reach 18, their records will be closed, and they will be given a clean slate. Invariably they show up in adult court.

It's time to lower the accountability age to 13. Also, their names, their ages and descriptions of their crimes should be published in the paper. We need to go back to old-fashioned reform schools, where young lawbreakers were taught basic living skills and work ethics, developed good eating habits and learned how to live with others.--Against Coddling Hoodlums

DEAR AGAINST: Most reform schools make kids meaner and teach them how to be better criminals. What we REALLY need are rehabilitation centers where "young hoodlums" are taught a trade and equipped to go out into the world and earn an honest living. This is not easy when they can make 10 times more running drugs.

These children need heroes and role models. How I wish some of our great American success stories would go to these reform schools and talk to the kids. It would be a real service and just might make a difference in somebody's life. I have addressed the inmates at Cook County Jail twice. They behaved like gentlemen, hung on every word and gave me a standing ovation.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: This letter was prompted by the one from "F.C." who is in prison and concerned about re-entering society when he is released.

In 1990, I signed on as the medical director of a South Carolina prison. My contract was for one year. I resigned after 90 days because I didn't approve of what went on there and soon realized I could not change anything.

The correctional authorities made it clear that their function is to incarcerate. Period. They make no attempt to rehabilitate their prisoners and prepare them to re-enter society. The inmates are not required to take any training nor are they required to do any work. If a man wants to sit on his rear end and watch color TV all day, he is allowed to do it.

About 30 percent of the inmates I saw appeared to be mentally retarded. The majority of the others were what I would describe as social neanderthals.

It is a darned shame that taxpayers are shelling out so much money to lock these people up only to have them returned to society in the same shape or worse than before the prison experience. I'm signing my name and you have my permission to use it.--Dr. I.F. Wood-Jr., Myrtle Beach, S.C.

DEAR DR. WOOD: You have written a splendid letter and I admire

your courage in allowing me to use your name.

More than 30 years ago, Dr. Karl Menninger, a giant of a man who set the highest standards for psychiatry, wrote a book called, "The Crime of Punishment." He addressed the very problem you described.

How long is it going to take for us to get smart?

DEAR ANN LANDERS: After 10 years, I am ready to call it quits. I married a woman with two children. One died tragically. The other child and I never got along. He left home recently and now a chasm exists between my wife and me because of it.

"Meg" has a successful business and leads a fiercely independent life. She always has made more money than I, but it was never a problem. We eat in front of the TV every night, do each other's laundry and rarely go out. Our sex life has all but disappeared. Her desire for me is nil, and I am sick of the rejection. I had a vasectomy, thinking it might help, but it didn't. She wants sex eight or nine times a year in the dark with her clothes on. I long for passion, which I now realize is an empty dream.

I brought home some books on sex from the library, hoping to share them with Meg. She was offended and said I was "perverted." The thought of spending another decade with this woman is depressing.

I suspect your wife's loss of her child has a stronger impact than you realize. She may be deeply depressed and unable to express her grief. Suggest counseling.

Do not, repeat NOT, have an affair. You have enough problems to deal with without adding infidelity to the mix. Good luck. I hope things work out for you both. I have a feeling Meg needs you more than you know.

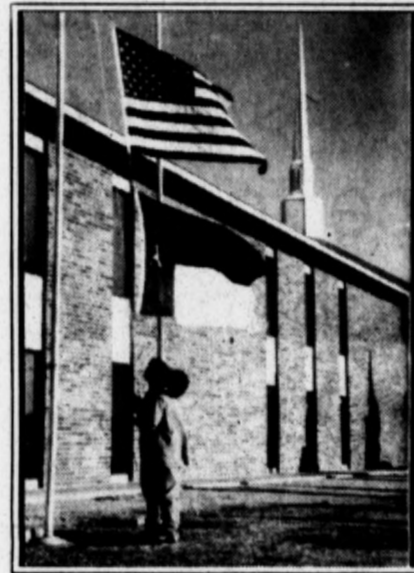

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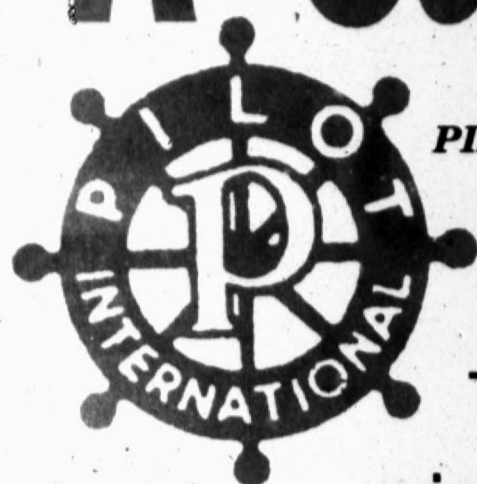

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MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

Safety First

March 15, 1990. The Soviet Parliament elected Mikhail Gorbachev to its presidency. The Allies and two Germans opened formal talks on reunification and the FSW Feedyard went all day without an accident. Today, Gorbachev is out, the two Germans are one and the feedyard is still accident free.

More than 5 million cattle are fed every year in feedlots in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. Cattle feeding can be dangerous. The very nature of the business creates many opportunities for accidents.

The hazards include heavy machinery, trucks, tractors, cantankerous cows, surly steers and some hardheaded horses. Mix in a few cowboys and a little snow and ice, and accidents will happen. Workers compensation insurance carriers view feedlots as high-risk employers. However, one Texas company may be changing that perception.

Cactus Feeders, Inc., of Amarillo, is the world's largest privately owned cattle feeding operation. Deteriorating safety conditions were creat-

ing a number of problems. Loss-time accidents were increasing, incidents that required medical treatment were on the rise and the cost of workers compensation insurance had gone through the ceiling.

Above all, company president, Paul Engler was concerned with the safety of the 325 company employees. "The No. 1 objective was to prevent personal injury to employees," said Engler. "We didn't want to see anybody get hurt." The company has always been a leader in the industry, so they took the proverbial steer by the horns.

Engler and his executive committee mandated a new safety program in early 1989. They hire eddy Smith to implement the program in June of that year. The results have been spectacular.

Cactus Feeders has reduced 1991 loss-time accidents by 55 percent compared to 1990. More than \$600,000 has been cut from annual workers compensation premiums, and they've created a healthier, happier work place.

The program took commitment from management and every member of the staff. Smith, who is the full-time safety director, is reluctant to take any credit. "We all work hard on safety," he said. "Everybody is a believer. We're having fun now, and creating a safer working environment. We're all working together."

A High Steaks Challenge

The fun began when Engler personally challenged each of the feedyards to eliminate loss-time accidents for 200 consecutive days. He promised to grill steaks for the entire staff of any feedyard that could meet the challenge.

Although it seemed impossible initially, every Cactus feedyard has achieved that goal. Engler returned to grill steaks a second time when some yards extended their accident-free streak to 400 days.

Two Year Streak

The most remarkable streak now spans more than 740 days. This continuing record is being complied by the FSW feedyard in Wildorado, Texas. It began on March 15, 1990, after a disappointing setback.

The FSW feedyard employs 30 people and feeds about 62,000 head annually. On day 197 of the very first challenge, a loss-time injury occurred. The streak stopped just 3 days short of the goal.

Larry Harvey, general manager of the yard recalled the disappointment. "It really hurt," he said. "We were just 3 days away and we could almost taste that steak."

However, Harvey's team didn't quit. From that day, more than 2 years ago, this determined group has conscientiously avoided a loss-time accident. "Every feedyard in this company is a competitor," said Harvey. "This program is working because of the challenge. Everyone in this yard is thinking safety. We want to set a standard that the feedyard industry will have to work hard to beat."

Cactus Feeders' successful safety program required commitment from management, a full-time safety director and cooperation from every employee. Without question, it is a successful formula for improving working conditions and lowering insurance costs. We tip our hat to Cactus Feeders and the crew at the FSW lot and wish them continued accident-free days.

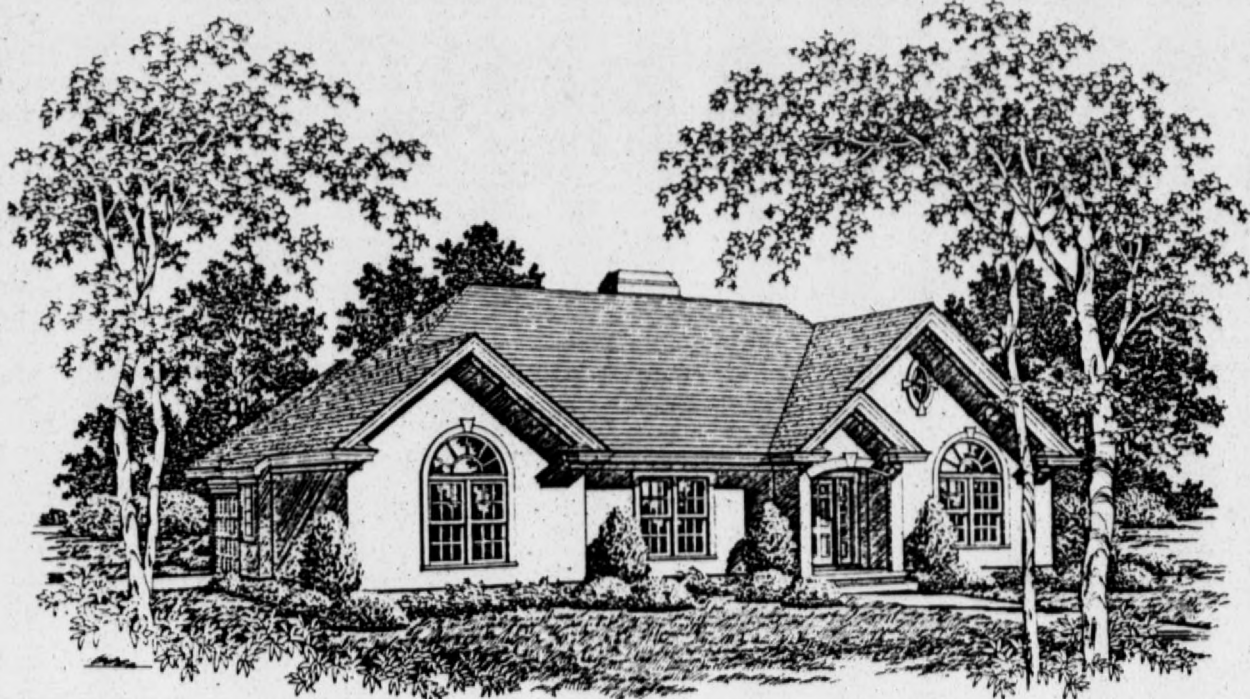

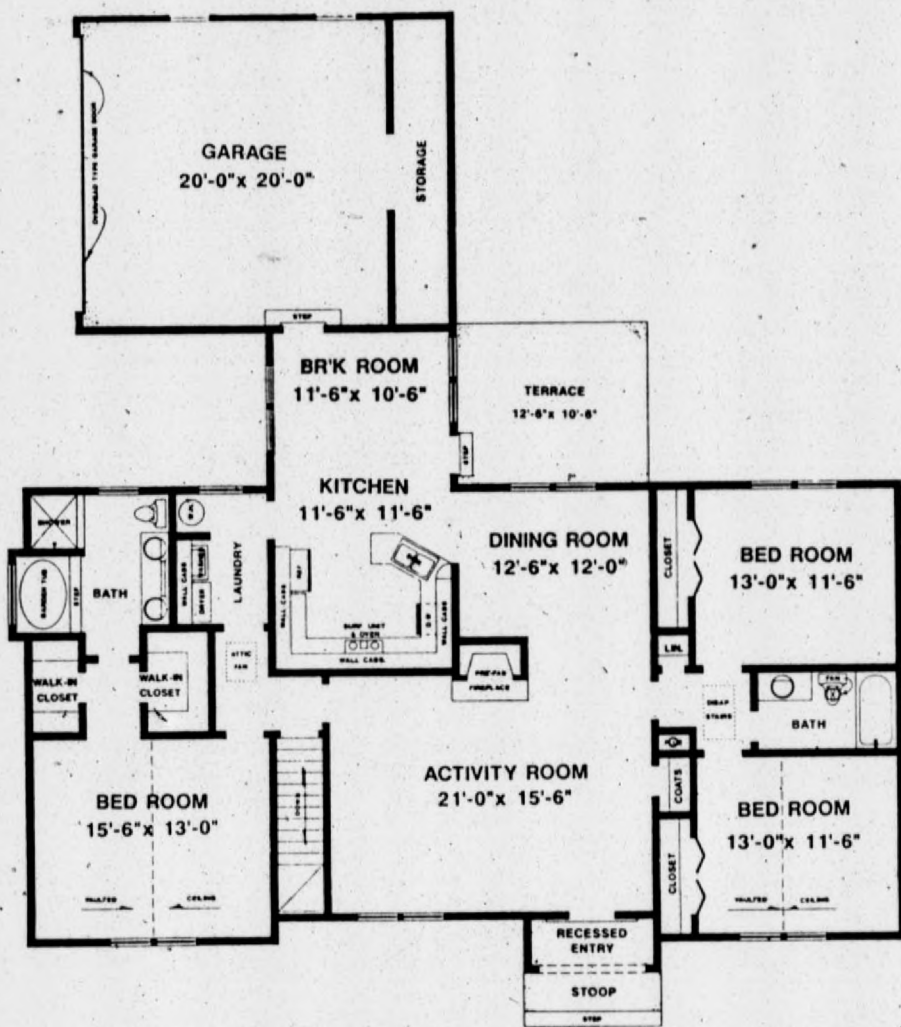

Q: Two years ago, I bought an 18-year-old house with board and batten siding (vertical 1-inch by 3-inch boards with 1-by-3 covering the joints). I think the wood is cedar. It is now very dry and has cracked and warped in many places. I plan to replace the 1-by-3 strips, and hope this will hold the warped boards tight. What kind of finish should I use to protect both the old and the new wood?

A: Based on your description, it sounds as if any attempt to correct the problem would be fruitless. If they are warped as badly as you say, pulling the warped boards down using the new 1-by-3 batten strips may tighten them temporarily, but the wider boards will soon crack. Warping was probably caused by inadequate nailing when the house was built. With vertical siding like yours, backer blocks are normally installed between the studs to provide a good flat nailing base. With a poor or inadequate nailing base, when one vertical board gets wetter than the one next to it, it expands, pulls the nails loose and warps.

Your siding is probably not cedar. The warping and cracking that you describe is not typical of cedar. It is more commonly found with spruce or hemlock. In any event, the badly warped boards and batten as well as the cracked ones should be replaced. If you don't make a good nailing base, the new material may crack and warp within a few years just as the original did. If more than about one-third of the siding needs work, you probably would be better off by replacing all of the siding. One problem with replacing sections is getting the new material to match the weathered appearance of the original siding. You can minimize matching problems by coating all exterior surfaces with a semitransparent penetrating oil-base stain.

There's another reason for seriously considering replacing all siding on your 18-year-old house. It was built before the oil crisis raised fuel prices to the levels where sidewall insulation became really worthwhile. If you replace the siding and build up a solid nailing base with backer blocks between the studs, you could add insulating board at relatively little extra expense beyond the cost of materials. Done this way, fixing the siding would pay off not only in improved appearance, it would also lower energy costs.

Q: I had my clapboard siding painted about three months ago and the paint is now starting to blister.

The boards were scraped, sanded and primed before painting, and a good quality paint was used on the job. What could be causing this problem?

A: Paint blisters are caused by two factors - painting when it's very hot or in direct sunlight, or by moisture. In the former case, the blisters form very quickly - in no more than a couple of days. Your problem is more likely caused by moisture in the form of water vapor that is trapped inside the walls. The moisture, which originates from cooking, baths, showers, etc., seeks to escape by

penetrating right through your siding and pushing off the exterior paint in the process. Allow the moisture to escape through a path of lesser resistance by opening windows after you shower, installing exhaust fans and installing vents in the siding.

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Poor windows can increase fuel bills

Fenestration, the design of windows and their placement on the walls and roof of a building, has been practiced by homeowners as well as architects for many years.

But it took the energy crises of the '70s for Americans to realize that poorly designed and placed windows were costing them a lot of money in inflated fuel bills. There weren't many good solutions to the problem until a new generation of energy-efficient windows was manufactured for residential use.

Here is an overview of the various types of windows available and placement alternatives.

Double-pane insulated windows have been in widespread use since the mid-'50s, but many homeowners have failed to take advantage of them. Double-pane (double-glazed) windows have two separate sheets of glass, separated by an air space, hermetically sealed into a tightly bonded, single pane.

The dead airspace between the glass insulates, preventing heat or air conditioning from escaping. This window's U-value (a measure of heat

flow through a material) is .52, compared to a 1.1-rating for a single-pane window. This means double-glazed windows lose about half as much heat as single-glazed, and double glazing greatly reduces condensation, or sweating, on the inside.

Triple-pane windows simply refine the same idea. They boost U-values ranging from .34 to .39, and offer a heat retention advantage of 25 to 35 percent over double glazing.

Low-E or Low Emissivity windows look like ordinary double-pane windows, but the inside surface of the outer pane has a microscopic metallic layer that reflects radiant heat, while allowing the visible portion of the solar spectrum through. Low E-glass has a U-value of .32, losing 42 percent less heat than a standard double-pane.

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Hollywood's invisible man steps in front of the camera



Have you seen this man? He's Dan Castellaneta, all dressed up and going places. Viewers know him best as the voice of Homer Simpson, but he's a live-action character actor, too. See him this week as a wisecracking gossip columnist in NBC's Monday movie, *Lady Against the Odds*, and in ABC's Wednesday-night comedy *Sibs*.

Viewers know the voice; how about the face?

"I think it's essential that I'm recognized by the people who do the hiring. Other than that, it's gravy." It's a good thing he feels that way, since Dan Castellaneta, who portrays perhaps the best loved family man in prime time, has never been seen in the role. "I don't particularly care if people recognize me doing Homer (Simpson of Fox's *The Simpsons*)," he says.

Castellaneta, like most actors, is primarily a live-action performer. He has been an ensemble player on Fox's *The Tracey Ullman Show* and ABC's *Sibs*, which returned to the air only last week. An alumnus of the Second City comedy troupe, he has appeared in four feature films. Yet he remains a man without a face, a kind of radio star of television and film. Network photo departments routinely forget to include him when publicity shots are mailed out.

Perhaps it is because Castellaneta himself works from the voice out. Lean, blue-eyed, intelligent and, yes, *couth*, he bears little resemblance to alter-ego Homer. But his voice is his greatest asset.

"When I'm doing a character, sometimes I'll fool around with a voice, because you may actually change yourself physically in order to get that voice. And that helps you find the character." Castellaneta once taught his wife to imitate a "punch-drunk Muhammad Ali" to do some verbal sparring with his Howard Cosell on their Chicago radio show, *Sundays With Deb and Dan*.

With one brief sidestep into *Macbeth*, comedy has been the tale of the tape for Castellaneta. "I don't think anything should be straight drama. Anything that's dramatic should have humor in it," he believes.

This week, Castellaneta provides the

leaven in *Lady Against the Odds*, an NBC movie airing Monday, April 20. Crystal Bernard and Annabeth Gish star as gal sleuths on the trail of a murderer in 1943 Los Angeles. Castellaneta plays gossip columnist Len Chisholm, a plague who visits himself on the scene of any good crime. While everyone around him frets and fumes, Castellaneta sails through his scenes with a drink, a swagger and a well-twirled fedora.

Two nights later, he plays Marsha Mason's nemesis in *Sibs*, an ABC comedy that's been missing and presumed canceled since fall. A full 22-episode order was completed, however, and Castellaneta naturally hopes the comedy will do well in the spring and summer.

Then, Thursday on Fox, Spinal Tap pays a visit to *The Simpsons*. Because the animation for each episode is done after the voice track is recorded, Castellaneta says he's constantly sur-

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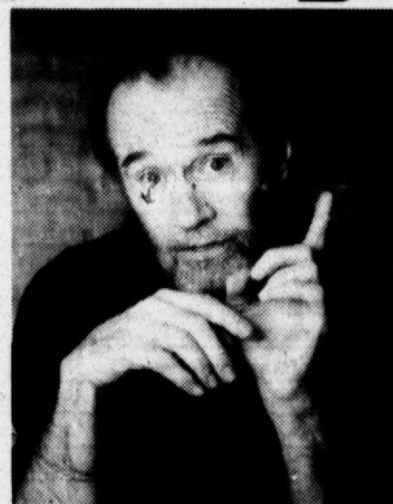
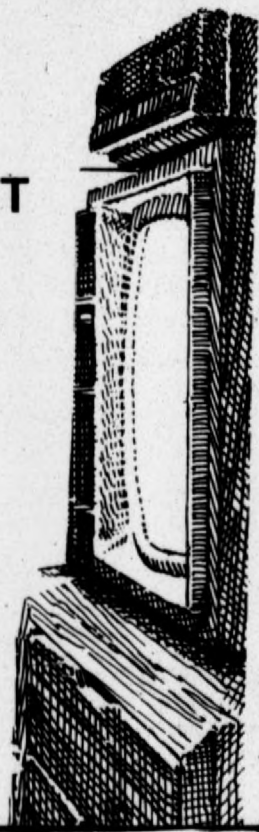

Carlin back on HBO for live performance

Counterculture comedian George Carlin, who in the 1960s created stand-up characters such as the "Hippy-Dippy Weatherman," says his material is "absolutely not" relaxing into mainstream humor. "If anything has happened," he says, "the mainstream has come to me."

George Carlin Live at the Paramount, which will air live from the Madison Square Garden theater on Saturday, April 25, is Carlin's eighth HBO special since 1977. He reports that among the topics touched on will be "man's psychosexual need to prove his potency by fighting wars, and golf courses for the homeless, which is an attack on the upper class."

The former radio disc jockey began his stand-up career in 1960, developing his style in folk clubs and coffeehouses. The late '60s brought much exposure on TV and the first of many successful comedy albums. His ultimate goal of acting was best realized with his role in *Bill & Ted's Excellent Adventure* and its sequel, and then a fine turn in *Prince of Tides*.

Carlin derives his humor largely from the redundancies and oversimplifications of language. The social commentator strikes out against censorship and is amused by politics.

"I look on politics as a blood sport and high theater, and I enjoy it the same way I enjoy watching auto racing," Carlin says. "I'm in it, for the accidents."

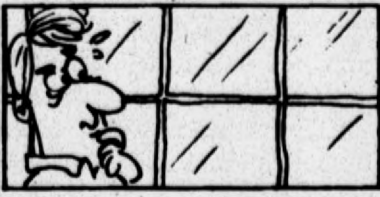

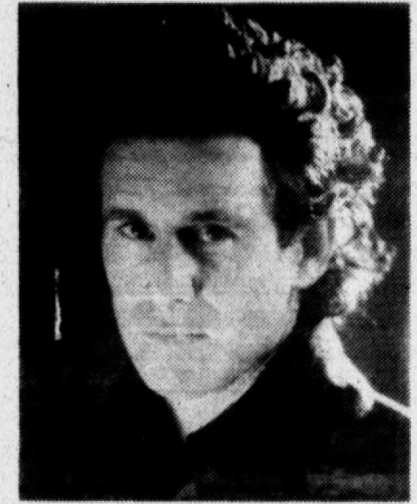

Over the last decade Michael Jordan has become one of the most publicized athletes ever. No one can say for sure that another Jordan will emerge from this year's game, which airs Saturday, April 25, on CBS' *Sports Sunday*. But with players like Jason Kidd, Rodrick Rhoades, Corjiss Williamson and Othella Harrington on the rosters, it's possible.

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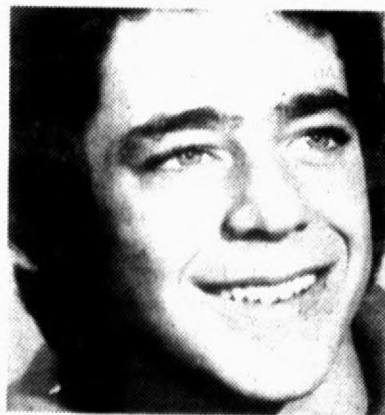
Was there romance among the "Brady Bunch"?

'Mirror' reflects Hispanic culture

It's been 500 years since Christopher Columbus came to the New World in 1492 and set the fire for the Great Melting Pot. 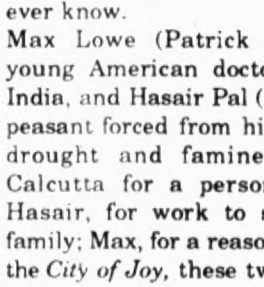

CITY OF JOY: Starring Patrick Swayze and Pauline Collins. This is the type of film that Hollywood should make. *City of Joy* is a compelling story about engaging people in another land, at a time and in a place that few people will ever know. Max Lowe (Patrick Swayze), a young American doctor adrift in India, and Hasair Pal (Om Puri), a peasant forced from his village by drought and famine, come to Calcutta for a personal search: Hasair, for work to support his family; Max, for a reason to live. In the *City of Joy*, these two disparate

lives forever. Joan, an Irish, middle-aged woman struggling to provide basic medical care for some of Calcutta's poor, runs the City of Joy Self-Help School and Dispensary. She's a bit of a hustler, because she never lets Max or Pal say no, she just keeps needling and pushing, and gradually a great friendship and mutual need grow among the three. Together they fight the local Mafia, disease, the weather, and prejudice. *City of Joy* is actually a story about the inordinate power that resides in the human spirit. While Patrick Swayze looks and sounds like the All-American boy, and the script has "get-out-the-hankie" dialogue with scene-stealing children and "heart-of-gold" oppressed, the acting, by an amazing roster of fine Indian artists and Pauline Collins is superb. The photography is excellent, and the locale shooting is fascinating. How often will you get a chance to see Calcutta, experience a ride in an authentic rickshaw, and have your spirits lifted with the hope that good
