Two Churches Aid With Classrooms

With a total of 2,040 students enrolled Wednesday morning, Hereford School facilities were literally bursting at the seams. Two classes of the Fifth Grade were housed in the Methodist Church and five classes were located in the basement of the Baptist Church...

The group spent the first night in Dalhart, and North Dakota, then will enter Canada sometime this afternoon at Weyburn.

Irrigated Wheat Yields Increased With Fertilizer

Wheat on irrigated test plots conducted on the Harold Shearhart place, 11 miles north and two west, pointed as high as nine bushels more to the acre in increased yields from application of fertilizers. County Agent Hugh Clearman said today.

Table showing fertilizer application results: 190 lbs. Sulphate (37.5 bushels), Watered three times (36.8), Fertilizer cost approximately \$6 per acre, 300 lbs. Nitrate of Soda (37.8), Fertilizer cost approximately \$11.70 per acre, 155 lbs. Amonium Nitrate (37.3), Fertilizer cost approximately \$6 per acre, No fertilizer added (29.5).

Around Town

Rainfall this week was definitely spotted. Hereford got a trace Monday afternoon and shortly afterwards Benny Womble at Dawn reported an even inch. The highest report was one and three-fourths inches at Dawn. F. H. King and Carl Berend, four miles north and four west of town, also reported one inch, along with slight hail damage, which knocked leaves from corn stalks and damaged grain sorghums.

Moisture was also reported in a strip southeast of Hereford and in the Summerfield area. Generally speaking, the showers were spotted and ran under the quarter-inch mark.

Letting, the only crop to stand possible damage from moisture at the present time, was apparently coming along fine. Harvest in a few early fields started the ball rolling. As in the past, however, most of the Hereford lettuce will be harvested late in September and through October. Yields and quality bid to be excellent this year, and producers have their fingers crossed in hopes of a good market.

Births Total 35 In August To Set New Record Here

The population of Hereford is growing by leaps and bounds. This can be proved by the fact that more babies have been born at the Deaf Smith County Hospital in August, 1954, than any other time since the hospital was built. Twenty-two girls and 13 boys were born in August, making a total of 35. That amount broke the record set in June, 1953, with 31 new arrivals, 16 boys and 15 girls. The boys seem to out-number the girls in the long run. From January to September, 1954, 116 boys were born compared to 126 girls, making a total of 242. In 1953, during the same months, 109 boys arrived compared to 93 girls, making a total of 202.

Following installation of the new manager, Bill Lenderman, directors of the Deaf Smith Chamber of Commerce announced plans this week for an aggressive and constructive program of work.

Tom W. Alderson, president, said "We are going to make our Chamber of Commerce a sound business organization, operated on sound business principles, and our business will be to make Deaf Smith County and Hereford a better place in which to work and live. After all, the business of our Chamber of Commerce is Community Building and to do a job of which we will all be proud. It is going to take the active support of all our citizens. The employment of a manager will not solve the problems that confront our community. It is Mr. and Mrs. Average Citizen who co-operatively go out and get the job done. Of course the manager will guide the program to its completion, and will do his share of the work. Our Chamber of Commerce should not be thought of as a promotional institution, but as an organization composed of people of the community who have banded themselves together to improve the community in a physical, as well as a social and economic sense." Some of the major projects that are now being planned by the Committees of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce will be the development of an Agricultural Program that will build the income from this source in the area to both the producer and the merchants. The directors also plan immediate steps to secure necessary

property for construction of a much needed airport that will serve the area. Building a trade area sales program that will result in good will and increase the sales of our merchants is another phase of the program, along with interest in county and municipal affairs and support of local officials in all constructive programs such as sewage, paving, park and recreation facilities, traffic safety, schools, and public health. Method: Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar into mixing bowl; stir in cheese. Stir cream and milk together; add to dry ingredients; stir just until dry ingredients are moistened. Drop in 10 mounds on small ungreased baking sheet. Bake in a very hot (450 degrees) oven about 12 minutes or until lightly browned. Serve at once.

1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup raisins (washed and drained)

Measure shortening, sugars, vanilla and eggs into mixing bowl; beat thoroughly. Sift together flour, soda, salt and cinnamon and mix well with shortening mixture. Stir in raisins and rolled oats—dough will be quite stiff. Sprinkle a board or pastry cloth with extra granulated sugar. Roll out dough to about 1/4 inch thickness; sprinkle with granulated sugar. (About 1-3 cup sugar is needed for rolling and sprinkling on top.) Cut with large round cutter. Bake on greased cookie sheets a few inches apart in a moderate (375 degrees) oven 12 to 15 minutes.

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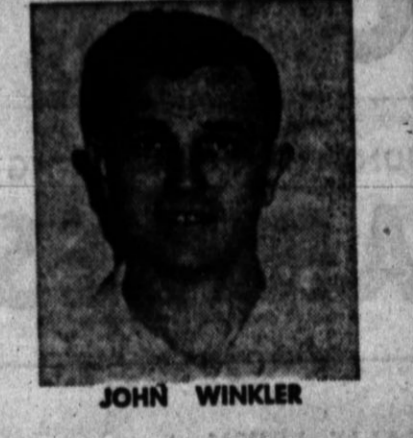

Courthouse Sketch Will Adorn New Telephone Directories In This Area

Hereford's best read book — the telephone directory — will have a new look.

For the first time in several years, the new Hereford directory cover will not carry the familiar "Spirit of Communication."

The new Hereford telephone directories are scheduled to be mailed to customers in mid-September and the cover of the new directory will have an artist's sketch of the Deaf Smith County Court House.

The design, "The Spirit of Communication," long used on directory covers here and throughout the Bell System, is a sketch of the statue atop the A. T. & T. building in New York.

This symbolic figure, originally

called "The Genius of Electricity," has been the subject of much discussion. Frequently, telephone customers call the business office to ask if it is a sketch of Mercury, or if Buster Crabbe, the swimmer and movie star, posed for it.

"We selected the Court House for our directory cover because it is one of the most familiar landmarks in Hereford," A. O. Thomas, district manager for the telephone company, said.

The structure, which reflects the foresight of its designers who planned for the future growth of the community, was completed in 1910.

The new books will be mailed to customers here about September 16, Thomas said.

Apple Pan Dowdy Dessert Recipe From Tennessee

Those who became acquainted with Mrs. Jimmy Sparkman while she did secretarial work in Hereford may be surprised to know that she is also an excellent cook. Mrs. Sparkman, the former Jo Ann Pittner, now lives in Maryville, Tenn., where her husband is stationed with the Air Corps. She and her neighbors have been picking apples right off the tree lately to make Apple Pan Dowdy which is a popular dessert in that section of the country. It will be no less popular here with those who try her recipe which follows:

Apple Pan Dowdy
 Arrange in a baking dish:
 6 cups pared sliced apples and sprinkle with:
 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 1/2 cup white sugar
 a pinch of salt
 Pour in:
 1/4 cup water
 Mix together until crumbly and spread over apples:
 1/2 cup flour
 1 cup brown sugar
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 cup melted butter
 Bake at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes or until bubbly and crumbly. Serve either warm or cold with whipped cream. Rhubarb or peaches may be substituted for the apples.
