





persons whose work counts toward old-age and survivors insur-ance is scheduled to increase on the first of January, John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office, reminded employers, employees, and self-

employed people today.

This scheduled increase in contribution is in accordance with the 1950 amendments to the social security law, and was enacted by Congress in anticipation of future obligations of the program.

Raise To Two Percent Employees in jobs covered by the law will have 2 percent instead of the present 1% percent deducted from their pay beginning with the first of January up to earnings of \$3600 a year; their employers will contribute an equal amount. The new rates will apply to all taxable wages paid after December 31, 1953, regardless of when earned.

The social security tax for the self-employed is scheduled to increase from the present 21/4 percent to 3 percent, for the period commencing Jan. 1, 1954. Since the self-employed whose work is covered by the law pay their tax just once yearly at the time of filing their Federal income tax return, they will pay the present 2¼ percent social security tax on their 1954 income that counts toward social security. This will be due not later than March 15, 1954. Their first payments at the increased rate of 3 percent will be due March 15, 1955, for the calendar year 1954.

New Tables Coming In the meantime the Internal Revenue Service reports that employers will be furnished late this year with income tax withholding tables and Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) tables reflecting rates applicable next year.



Church Women Dedicated To "Eternal Vigilance"

Meeting in Atlantic City, N. J. 2,500 delegates of United Church Women unanimously dedicated themselves to "eternal vigilance" against any abrogation of the U.S. Constitution or Bill of Rights, either by totalitarian governments or by "certain undemocratic activities on the part of some of our own lawmakers."

A resolution asserting that this nation has "to an alarming degree" tended to ignore the principles of the U.S. Constitution and Bill of Rights, expressed grave concern at "the extent to which the United States have become a vast whispering gallery of charges and counter-charges."

In other resolutions the church women opposed racial segregation in public schools; urged the U. S. government to separate the Point Four Program from U.S. military programs, adopt the United Nations Covenants on Human Rights, fully support the United Nations and the UN International Children's Emergency Fund, and strive to secure international reduction and regulation of arma-

Episcopal Churcuh Asking For Extra Capital Funds

Members of the Protestant Epis copal Church in the United States will be asked to contribute an "ex-Mrs. Bill Smith of Amarillo, Mary tra" \$3,825,000 during 1954 as a Lou Roberson of Lubbock and the capital fund for educational and missionary enterprises, says Presiding Bishop Henry Knox Sherill. Of this total, \$2,000,000 will be for theological education - the demand for additional clergy still being unmet across the nation; and Mrs. Hicks Roberson and \$500,000 will be earmarked for the education of Negroes; \$625,000 for the needs of the communion in Japan; \$100,000 for an Episcopal cathedral in Manila, P. I.; \$200,000 for the expansion of St. Just's School in Puerto Rico; and \$400,000 for new projects in both domestic and overseas missions.

### Editorials

#### A Jilted Town

(Taking inventory is a New Year custom with most businesses and, as citizens count their assets and liabilities, it might also be well for them to inventory their own town and community. Just for the sake of comparison, the following "Jilted Town" editorial is reprinted from the West Texas Today magazine. Maybe it is false pride or smugness, but we thought Hereford passed the tests with flying colors.—Editor)

This is the story of a town that missed out on a big opportunity through its town mistakes. It lost a 7-million-dollar plant because it wasn't attractive enough to the people who had thought of building a factory

A 7-million dollar manufacturing plant would have made a big difference to Union City and its 10,000 inhabitants. It would have been a continuing source of prosperity.

### Vandalism Costs Tax Payers \$400

The tax payers of Hereford this week spent approximately \$400 for some new street lights. The expense, though definitely called for at the time, occured as the result of vandalism.

It all happened when a group of boys became bored with nothing to do and started heaving bricks through street lamps on Third Street. With characters of this type roaming the streets, the need for lamps is even more urgent. On the other hand, it should also serve as a warning notice to parents that their boys are perhaps getting on the wrong track. This, if followed through, could easily be the best \$400 the tax payers of Hereford ever spent.

Vandalism of such a vicious type is often followed by petty theft, burglary and ultimately the reformatory. At best, wanton destruction of public property indicates that the perpetrators are definitely not ready to accept the responsibility of citizenship.

The situation should be handled in the hame with the parents acting as police, judge and jury. Boys with such lack of maturity definitely should not be allowed the responsibility of operating an automobile and one of the most apt punishments might well include being "confined to quarters" for 30 or 60 days, especially at night. Action along this line, in addition to saving future tax dollars for the people of Hereford, might well save untold heart-aches for the families of those involved.

TAXES-Not too high, too low! The company was prepared to pay its own way wherever it went, and the low-tax bait backfired. The company's executives hadn't been able to see how the county could provide necessary public services without sufficient tax revenue.

HOUSING-From their hotel windows, the company's officials had seen a frightful slum right in the middle of the business district.

RECREATIONAL FACILITIES - "A picture show and pool rooms" were not enough in the way of recreational course . . . none of the facilities that a town of this size could support.

SCHOOLS—The town ranked lowest of the eight considered in the quality of its schools, and the company wanted its employees' children to have the advantage of good schooling.

TRANSPORTATION - No air service. This weighed heavily, as the executives were accustomed to reaching branch plants by air.

LABOR—The investigating team was told that the labor supply was inadequate in certain respects . . . information which was not true and which showed a lack of proper statistical material for prospective in-

FUEL-Coal and fuel oil prices were higher than in other cities, and there was no natural gas supply.

GOVERNMENT-Most damaging of all, however, was the company's criticism: "There is nothing wrong with Union City that a good city government couldn't cure."-From Changing Times Magazine as quoted by Alabama State Chamber of Commerce.

### Thanks to Scouters For Well Done Job

In absolute contrast to another editorial on this page was the recent presentation of Boy Scout awards and advancement badges for a large group of Hereford youngsters.

Scouting, though frequently under fire in recent years as various individuals protested occasional methods, has continued to grow in scope and in numbers. District Judge Charles O. Betts declared in lifting the injunction, "Texas laws do not prohibit a communist - dominated union from ng husiness in Texas. I car legislate in this court."

All of which means that there will be a concerted drive by the opponents of communism to pass an anti-communist law at the next regular or special session of the legislature.

Appeal Notice Given State attorneys served notice of

appeal from the decision.

Judge Betts continued in effect, however, a temporary injunction against Emanuel Coutlakis to restrain him from organizing labor for the union involved, the International Fur and Leather WOFKER

In this action, the judge backed Shepperd's charge that Coutlakis had not submitted proper credentials to receive an organizer's permit from the secretary of state, and that the union had failed to file certain records with the secretary of state as required by Texas law.

Union attorneys presented evidence before Judge Betts showing that the required records had been filed since issuance of the

If the full 25-member committee endorses the plan when it meets January 13, the special session issue will be in the governor's lap. More than 88 percent of school administrators are reported as favoring the plan.

But even if legislators also favored the plan, the lawmakers will still face the problem of finding money for the pay increase.

However, if the U. S. Supreme Court upholds the gas tax law, the pay increase problem will be

Cost Of Increase Estimated cost of the pay in crease, to the state, based on an 80 percent share, is nearly \$23 million. Local school districts will pay 20 percent, instead of a fixed

total of \$45 million per year. State assistance on construction costs of about 20 percent is calculated by giving each district \$100 credit per teacher against their local fund assignment.

Texarkana, a teacher representative, said he hoped a special legislative session could act in time to give teachers the raise for the current school year.

More Oil, More Money State tax officials were a little more hopeful over the revenue outlook as the Railroad Commission boosted the January oil allowable, halting a five-months decline.

Texas oil quotas for January were hiked by 29,443 barrels daily. Resumption of full flow in the Spraberry area of West Texas will provide the increase.

Inspections so far show that about half of the cars tested needed minor repairs.

State water problems will get a going over when the Water Resources Committee meets here January 15.

Representatives of local water authority areas will assist the committee in making over-all plans for the state.

Assistance Asked Railroads have been urged to continue reduced freight rates on exatesk-feed for drought-designat-

ed counties beyond their Decem ber 31 deadline. "The forthcoming winter weather will produce effects that will be disastrous in the extreme unless the program can continue," Governor Shivers warned in a telegram

to the Western Traffic Association's executive committee. The reduced freight rates are course imperative if this need is to be met," he added.

More May Need Hay Shivers noted that the program is just now getting started and is moving satisfactorily although only a small part of the need has been met. Agricultural Commissioner White said he also was concerned about the situation.
