Morris Fielder entertained Rotarians Monday at their regular meeting with several numbers on his accordian and piano.

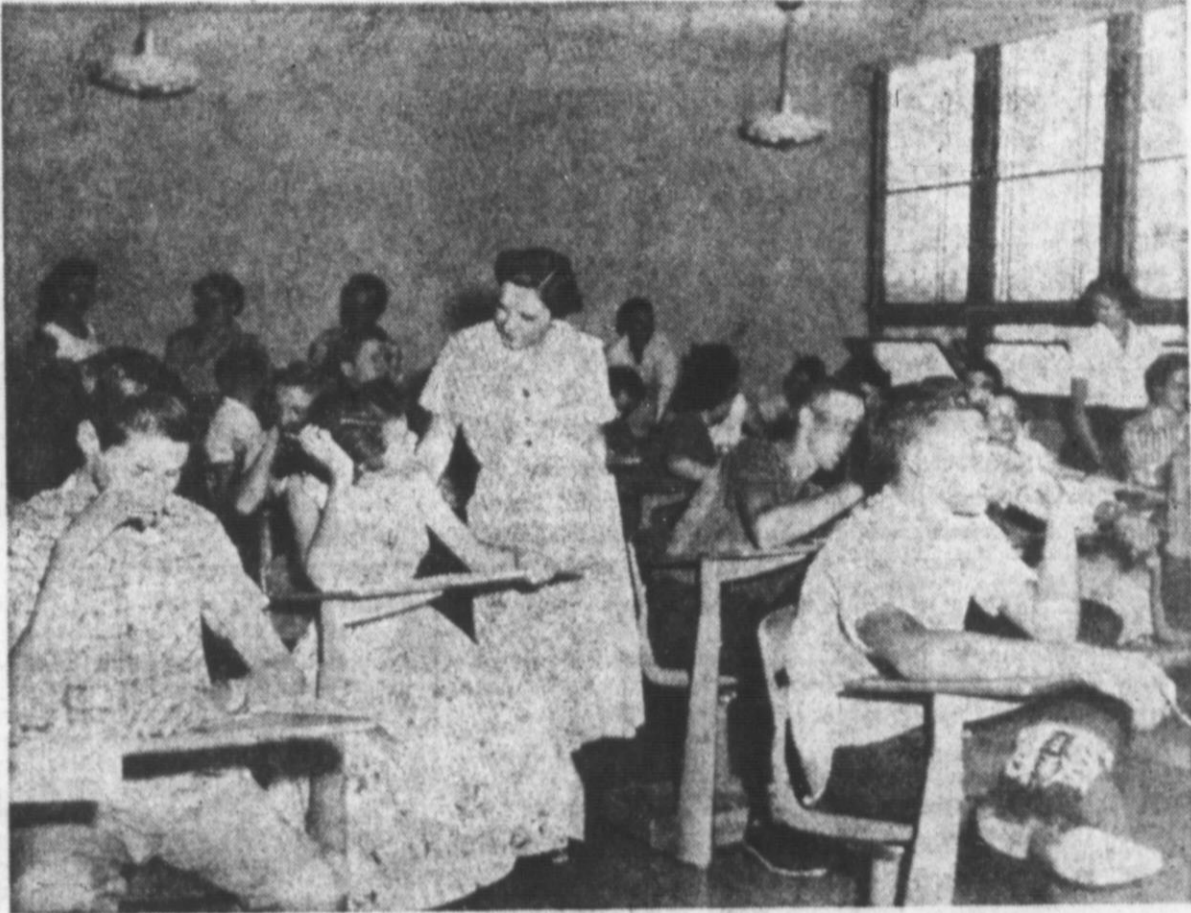
The "Football Review" at the Star Theater will be held Friday at 1:30 p.m. All members of the Whiteface team will be introduced and free refreshments will be served.

Enrollment Underway At Hereford Schools

Faculty Numbers 111 In All Schools In District

A faculty list for Hereford schools totaling 111 was announced today by George Graham, superintendent. The list includes the names of 103 teachers and eight administrators.

The final faculty member, Mrs. C. J. Crump, was named Tuesday night.

Registration at Hereford High School got underway Tuesday, with seniors beginning picking their courses. Juniors registered Wednesday and sophomores will enroll from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. today.

Also registering Wednesday were sixth grade students. Seventh

grade students will sign up today and eighth grade students Friday. First and second grade children will enroll from 9 to 12 Friday at Central and Shirley schools and Dawn children will enroll next Tuesday. All Hereford schools begin classes Sept. 6.

The division line between Shirley and Central Schools will be the same as last year. It will run from South Lawton to Highway 60, thence west to Schley, thence north to Park Avenue, thence west to Avenue B and north to the city limits. The middle of the street is considered the dividing line.

Graham said, "We will start with that line and make any necessary adjustments later."

Besides Graham, other administrators include Pat Sullivan, principal of High School; W. C. Quantz, principal of Stanton Junior High; Wm. R. Phillips, assistant High School principal; Miss Della Stagner, elementary coordinator; D. C. Martin, Central School principal; Dan Trew, Shirley principal; and L. C. Thomas, fifth grade principal.

TO FILL OUT UNEXPIRED TERM

Hair Named On School Board

Hereford Rural High School Trustees Tuesday night, in a called meeting appointed W. R. Hair to fill out the unexpired term of Ira Scott, who resigned as a member of the Board one week ago.

Contacted by Board President Robert Wagoner, Hair said he would be pleased to accept the appointment.

In other action, the Board unanimously voted to include a combined shop building, fuel tank, storage room, and field

house as an alternate bid when calling for bids on the contract to build the new Ela Aikman Elementary School. The building would be built on the high school grounds.

The Board also hired one new teacher and a school nurse, voted to sell two old school buses, discussed departmental budgets, and called for bid of a pickup for the Grounds Department.

Hair's appointment came on a roll-call vote of the Board. Two nominations were made, and Hair received all votes but one, that of H. H. Miller, who made his own nomination. Mrs. Earl Plank nominated Hair after five men had been mentioned for the post.

Miller made the motion to include the shop building and field house as an alternate bid. The motion was seconded by Wilbur Axe. The Board called for an L-shaped building to be planned.

Mrs. C. J. Crump was named as a new High School English teacher and Mrs. Earl Springer as school nurse. Mrs. Springer, a graduate registered nurse, will divide her duties between all of the schools.

School buses to be sold are a 36 passenger 1946 model and a 48 passenger 1946 model.

Budgets recommended by department heads were studied by the Board, and the overall budget for the coming school year was discussed.

All members of the Board were present for the meeting. Next regular meeting date is Sept. 13.

Lake Claims Life Of Young Umbarger Boy

A 12-year-old Umbarger boy drowned Tuesday morning at Buffalo Lake despite the efforts of his young cousin to save him.

Robert Higgins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gayle Higgins of Umbarger, was the victim. Robert was fishing at the lake, according to witnesses, and waded out into the water. He apparently stepped into a deep hole.

A cousin of the boy, Wendel Wilson, was credited with heroic efforts to save his cousin. Despite Wilson's efforts to get Robert out of the water, the youth drowned.

The tragedy occurred at about 9 a.m., Tuesday morning. There was no adult near the scene, when the eighth grade student drowned. The boy would have had his thirteenth birthday Monday.

Funeral services for the youth, who attended school in Canyon, were held Wednesday at the First Baptist Church in Hereford. Rev. Howard Scott officiated.

Robert was born in Los Angeles, Calif. He moved to Deaf Smith County with his parents in 1943.

Survivors include his parents; one brother, Herbert Allen; and one sister, Martha Frances.

Pallbearers were Dewey Fort, Paul Cornett, Henry Wiggins, Dan Higgins, Woodie Hicks and Ed

Coke. Burial was in West Park Cemetery.

New Grade School To Be Named After Ela Aikman

Hereford's new grade school will be named Ela Aikman Elementary School.

Members of the Hereford Rural High School Board of Trustees Tuesday night voted unanimously to name the school in honor of the late Ela M. Aikman, who taught for 27 years here before her death Nov. 11, 1949, Armistice Day. The motion to name the school after Miss Aikman came from Tom Robinson, who himself had been one of her students. It was quickly seconded by Mrs. Earl Plank and the Board endorsed the name unanimously.

Members of the Board said Miss

Aikman, who began teaching in the second grade at Central School in the school year of 1923-24, was one of the most-beloved teachers ever to teach in Hereford.

Supt. George Graham said that the tribute to Miss Aikman would probably be second only to the one made to her at the time of her death by one of her second grade pupils. Graham recalled that the day after her death a little seven-year-old boy, with tears in his eyes, gave her what was probably the highest award a teacher could ask. The youth said, "School's out for Miss Aikman now."

Junior Red Cross helps The Junior Red Cross helped in the drive by donating \$25 from their reserve drive.

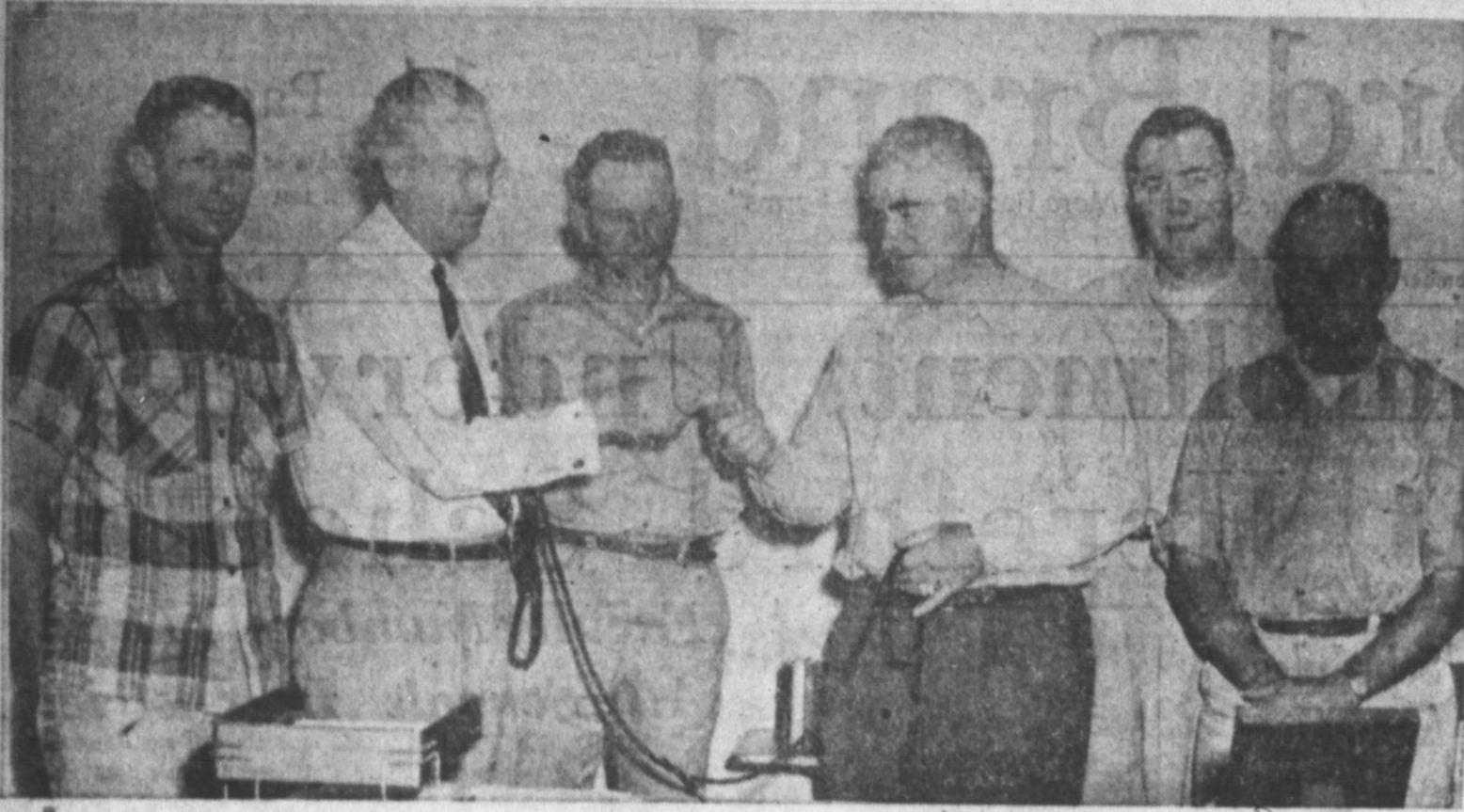

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF DEAF SMITH COUNTY, TEXAS:

That an election be held in said County on the 20th day of September, 1955, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election there shall be submitted to the qualified electors who own taxable property in said County, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon, the following proposition for the issuance of bonds, to-wit:

"SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Deaf Smith County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said County in the principal sum of ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$150,000), to mature serially within any given number of years not to exceed thirty (30) years from date thereof, to bear interest at a rate not to exceed THREE AND ONE-HALF PERCENTUM (3-1/2 percent) per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity for permanent improvement purposes, to-wit: planning, acquiring and equipping an airport, including a site therefor, and buildings and other facilities incidental to the operation thereof, pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, in Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution and Chapter 1, Title 22, and Article 45d, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended?"

THAT THE SAID ELECTION shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Chapter 1, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, and all persons who are legal voters of said Deaf Smith County, Texas, and who are resident property taxpayers of said County and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.S. Election Code adopted by the Fifty-second Legislature in 1951, and that printed or such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$150,000 AIRPORT BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF." "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$150,000 AIRPORT BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

EACH VOTER may mark out with black ink or pencil one of such expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition; or, in the alternative, each voter may vote on the proposition by placing an "X" in the square appearing on the ballot beside the expression of his choice.

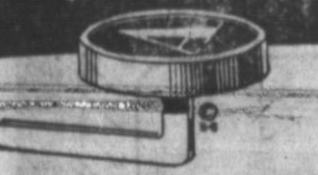

There must be more food preser- vation this summer than ever be- fore as the office gets so many calls for information. If canned food spoils the first thing to check is the seal on the jars. If a jar is sealed, you know, you can't pull off the lid, before putting the food away check the seal. If the seal is good and the food spoils check your pressure cooker gauge as un- der-processed food will not keep. These are the two most common reasons for food spoilage.

Mrs. Albert Stengel says in freezing okra she steams the okra instead of blanching as she thinks it gives a better product.

A new way of using honey has been devised by Mrs. H. L. Her- shey. She has been substituting honey for some of the sugar in banana nut bread. Instead of one she uses 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup hon- ey and 1/4 cup flour. Then follows the recipe. The addition of flour takes care of the moisture in the honey. Mrs. Hershey is becoming more famous with the good banana nut bread she makes. Her neigh- bors know she is a very good cook.

Recipes for pickled okra have been requested at the office. Before we got a recipe Mrs. Earl Poarch worked out this one: Soak okra overnight in a brine made of two teaspoons alum and 1/4 cup salt in 1/2 gallon water. Rinse okra in clear water and pack into jars. Cover with a hot solution made of 2 cups white vinegar, 1 1/2 cups water, 2 tablespoons salt, 2 teaspoons must- ard seed and 1 teaspoon dill seed. Add hot green pepper, if the family like hot pickles and relishes. Seal while hot. Mrs. Poarch says this makes a good product.

There are some pretty chunk pickles on sale at the H. D. Mar- ket and Gift.

Remember, distilled white vine- gar is used for vegetable pickles and cider vinegar is used on fruit pickles.

That the Panhandle should win more laurels will not be a surprise to those who know, but when Hereford comes into the possession of the Blue Ribbon for the world's highest record in the production of alfalfa seed, she will do no more

than should be expected. R. H. Morton, owner of the Hereford View Farm did not think he had done anything extra until he began to thresh the crop, when he discovered an extra yield of seed. It was first told that his crop of a few acres would yield nine bushels per acre, but when the land was carefully measured and the seed weighed, it found that the yield was 30.21 bushels per acre. It is estimated that the broom corn crop in the Panhandle this season will be worth approximately \$1,000,000. A. J. Lundgreen, whose crop is near Amarillo, comprising approximately 1500 acres, states that he will make about \$40,000 from the yield on the crop of broom corn, which is by far the largest ever known in the Panhandle.

25 Years Ago
"All set!" That is the word that is coming from the office of J. F. Hill, president of the Deaf Smith County Fair, which is to be staged at Hereford Sept. 16-18. Not only is that President Hill's exclamation, but from practically every

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

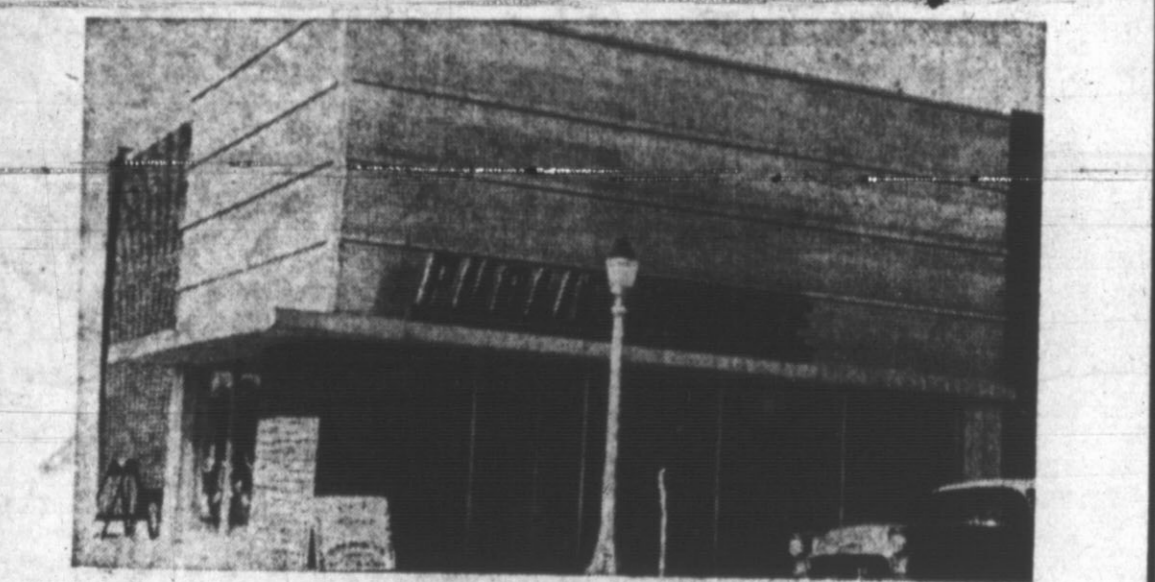
