

Apartment Living Made Pleasant By Fullwood



Even the concrete benches have been made different heights to put even the littlest diner up to table level.

Those who wish to use charcoal have space equipped with grills and cast iron griddle for their favorite method of cooking. A large bin at one end holds the charcoal and at the other end is the sink and hydrant for dish wash-

A high board fence gives privacy to the area. Lawn space between the walks is set to St. Augustine grass which is unusually hardy once it gets a foothold. The blades are course and can stand almost any abuse but severe cold weather

Fullwood says the evening is the most popular time for the nine families living in the apartments to come out for recreation, but sometimes they even come down to cook breakfast in the open.


