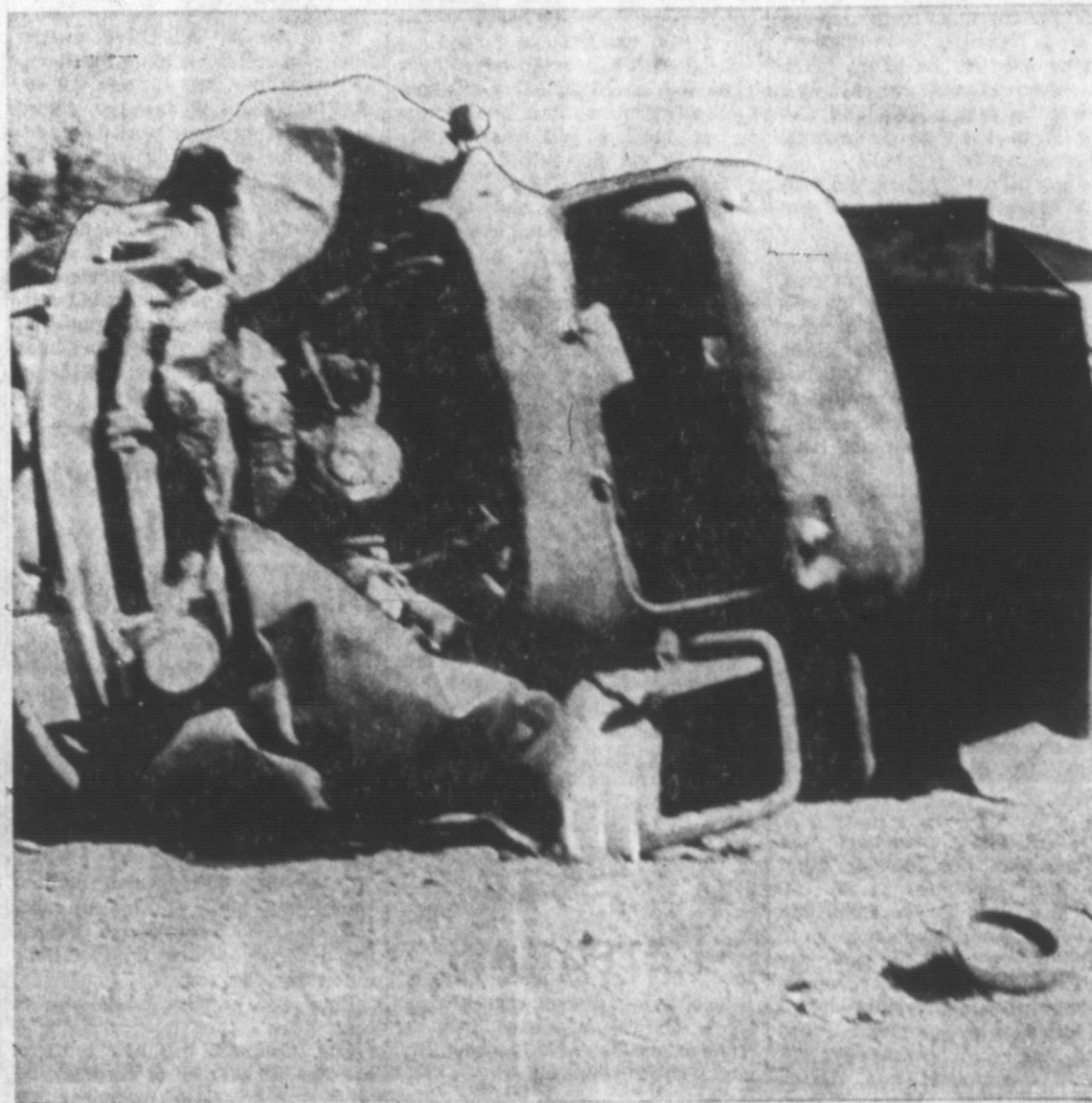

Red Cross Sets Annual Meeting

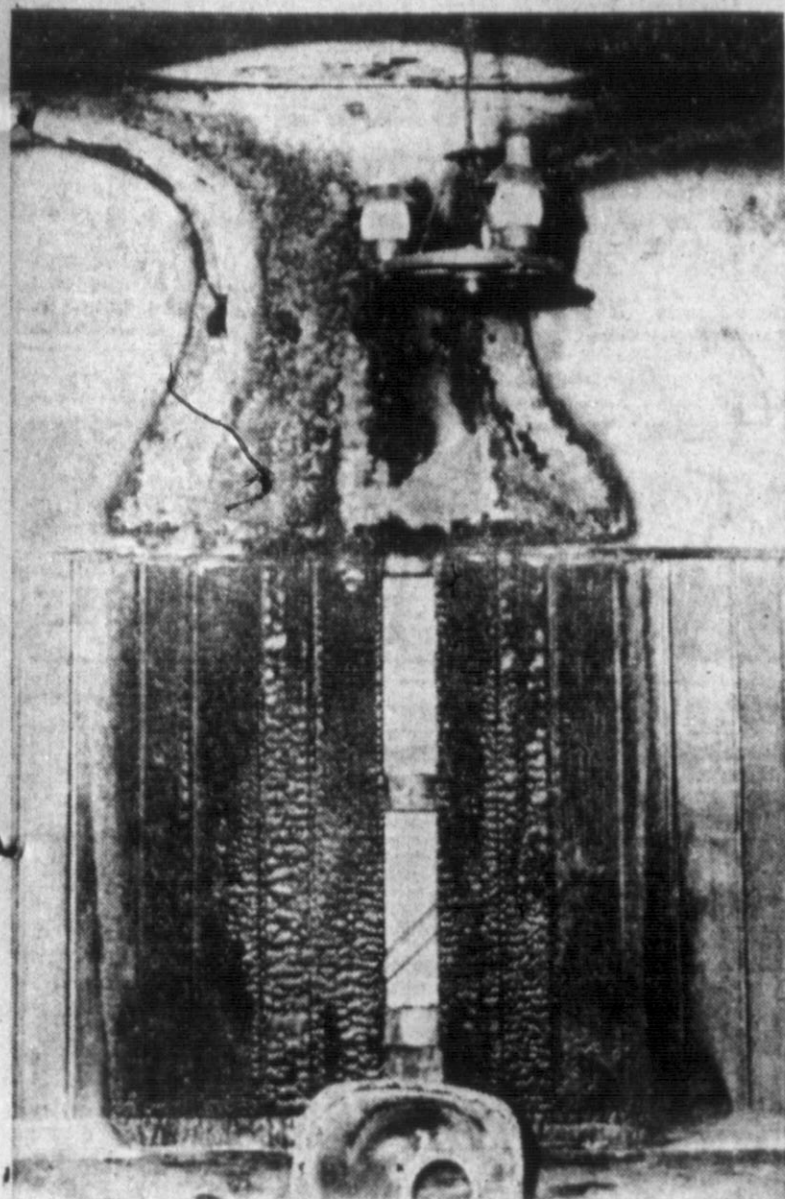

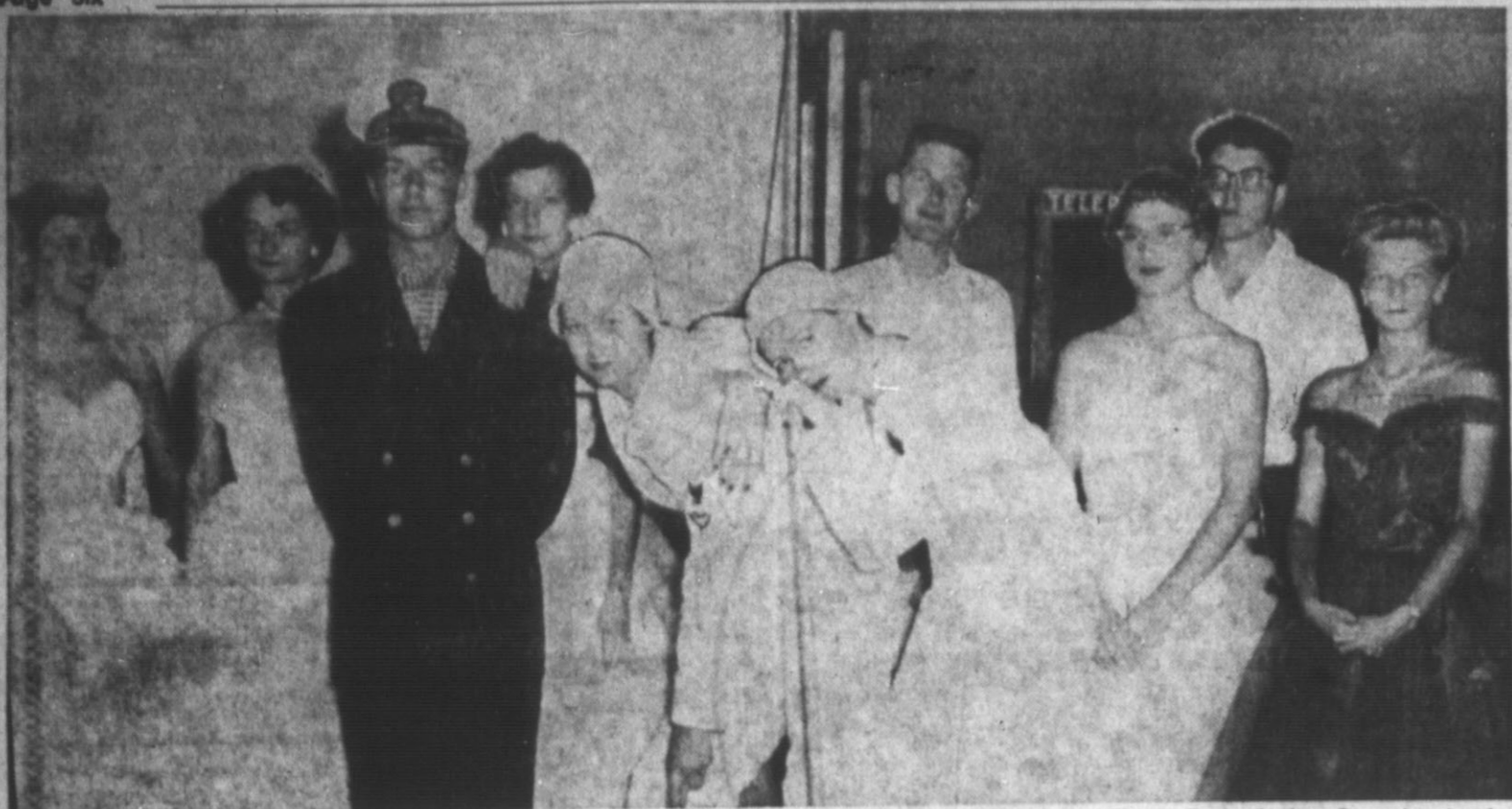

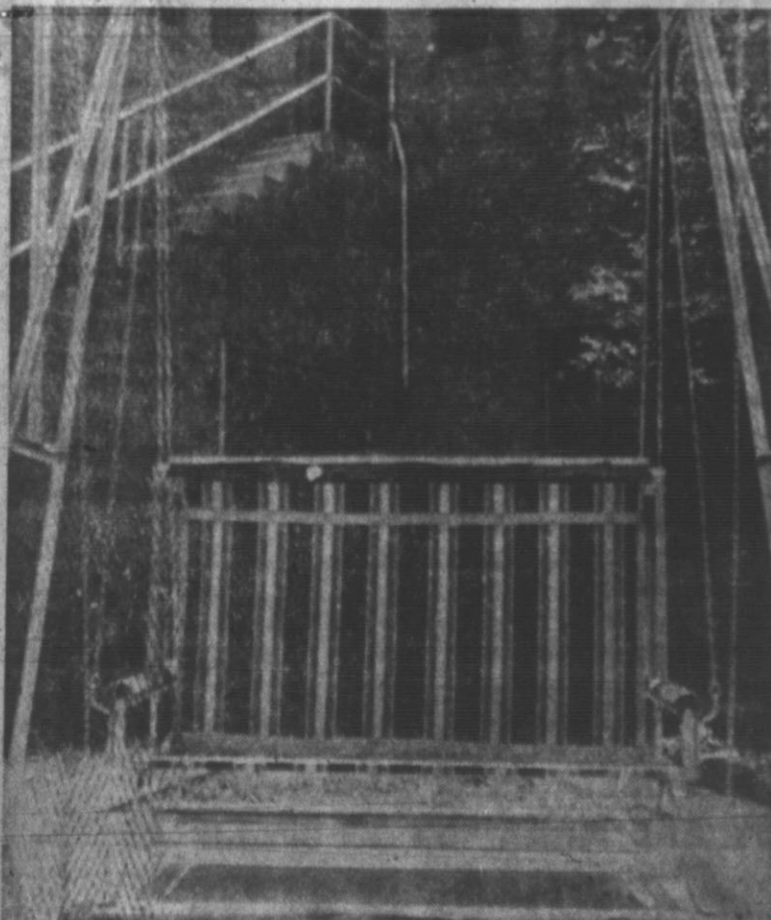
Apartment Living Made Pleasant By Fullwood

When Bob Fullwood, owner of apartments above his piece of business at 232 West Third Street, saw how much the tenants enjoyed a few old tables he put out the back for picnicing, he was inspired to provide some real facilities for the folk upstairs.

A look through the attractive wire gates, with handy catches, which open onto the patio at the back, is apt to be somewhat of a surprise for people accustomed to driving down back alleys in the business district.

As one looks across the croquet court with its smooth all weather surface, he is apt to be attracted by the large swing with its striped awning that invites both young and old to sit a spell, or sway as vigorously as they feel like propelling with their feet.

One isn't apt to go directly to the swing, however, without pausing to watch the gold fish swimming around the pool at the base of the fountain. Fullwood took parents, youngsters and fish all into consideration in the construction. Adults may go about the business of preparing a meal or playing a game without having to fish Junior out of the water because sturdy iron rods extend from the fountain to the rim all the way around the pool. When cold weather makes a deep freeze out of the pond, the fish may go inside the fountain to find winter quarters.

When it comes to food, the picnic unit seems to have everything. All of the tables are equipped with outlets for electric appliances that have been molded right into the concrete tops, so the fun won't be spoiled by short circuits and other danger from wiring. Even the concrete benches have been made different heights to put even the littiest diner up to table level.

Overhead bug repelling light bulbs are installed in the twin sockets which are controlled from the tables. Those who wish to use charcoal have space equipped with grills and cast iron griddle for their favorite method of cooking. A large bin at one end holds the charcoal and at the other end is the sink and hydrant for dish washing.

A high board fence gives privacy to the area. Lawn space between the walks is set to St. Augustine grass which is unusually hardy once it gets a foothold. The blades are coarse and can stand almost any abuse but severe cold weather. Fullwood says the evening is the most popular time for the nine families living in the apartments to come out for recreation, but sometimes they even come down to cook breakfast in the open.

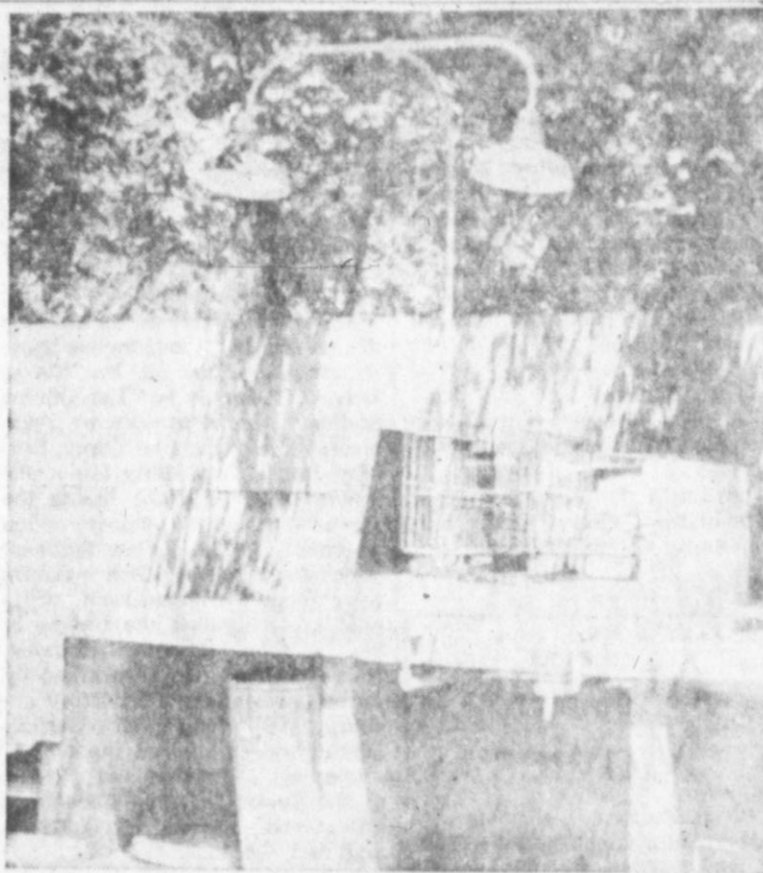

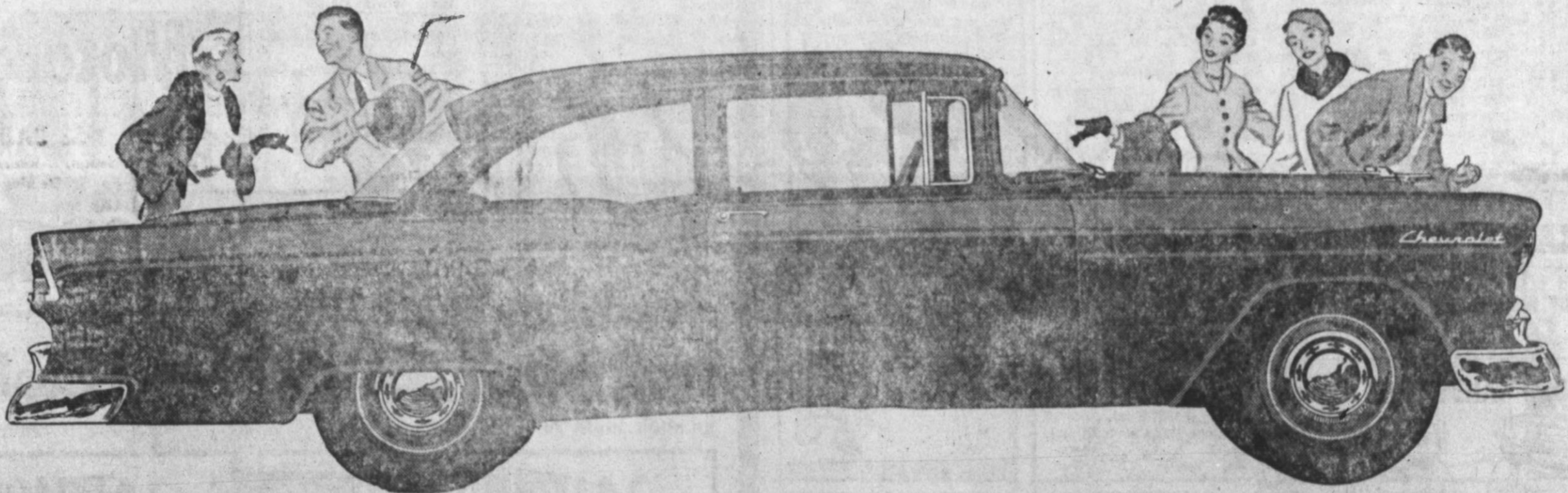

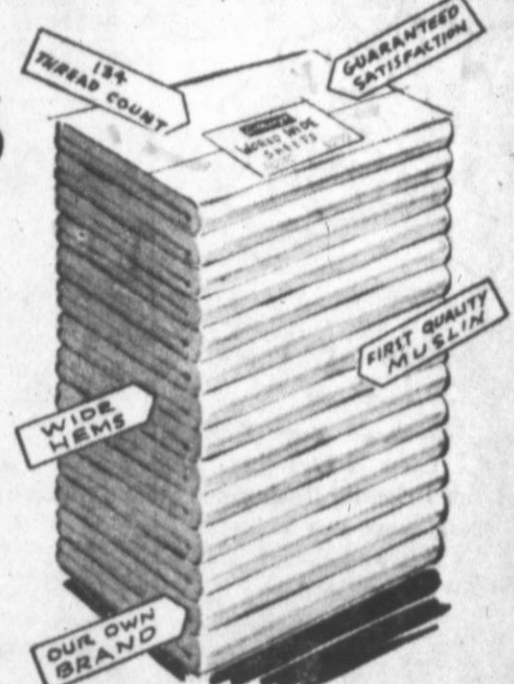
