Once you have determined if you have any allowable employe business deductions, and, it so, how you must handle them, you are ready to decide whether to accept the standard deduction for personal expenses, or to itemize.

The new tax law contains some money-saving new personal deductions-including interest on installment purchases, child care, contributions and medical costs.

But the new law makes no change in the regulations govern ing the standard deduction. These

Regardless of whether your deductible personal expenses came to 10 percent of your, adjusted gross income, you may claim 10 percent, if that does not exceed the following dollar limits.

On a joint return, the 10 percent standard deduction may not exceed \$1,000.

On the return of manied per sons filing separately, the standard allowance may not exceed \$500 for each. - .

On the return of all others, the standard allowance may not exceed \$1,000. Itemizing your personal deduct-

ions (and remember that these may include some business-connected employe expenses you could not deduct from your gross income) may do the following for

1. It may allow you to claim more than 10 percent of your adjusted gross income, since itemiz ing removes the 10 percent limit.

2. It may let you claim more than the dollar limits set on the standard allowance, since itemizing removes the dollar limits. Consequently, if by itemizing

your personal deductions you can exceed either or both of these limitations you will save money by itemizing, since you will be setting aside additional income, tax free, You will find, in the instructions booklet mailed to you with your tax

Also, you may deduct for losses through damage or destruction of your property by fire, automobile accident, shipwreck, or the forces of nature. Limitations are set out on pages 12 and 13 of the instruct-

There are five major new nonbusiness deduction provisions in the new tax law, which you may be able to use to save some tax money:

1. Contributions — formenly, you were limited to 20 percent of your gross income. The new law lets you claim 30 percent, if a third of what you claim is for contributions (gifts, including church assessments) to:

Churches, a convention or association of churches, and tex exempt educational institutions and hospitals. (Educational institutions and hospitals operated by cities, states, or the federal or other governments can qualify.)

To qualify for the extra 10 percent (or any part of it) compute your contributions deduction like this:

First claim up to 10 percent of your adjusted gross income for your contributions to the special, limited list given above.

Your additional contributions (including any others to the special group of institutions) may add up to a maximum of 20 percent of your adjusted gross income. 2. Interest - Formerly, you

could not claim as interest the charges on installment purchases which were not specifically identified on your bill as interest. You may now do so, up to s maximum of 6 percent of your average unpaid monthly balance.

You can get your average unpaid

monthly balance by adding up yo

unpaid balance at the end of



ing by 12. Your installment charge interest deduction may equal 6 percent of the result.

3. Medical, dental and pharmaceutical costs - You formerly could deduct only the part of these costs that exceeded 5 percent of your adjusted gross income, with certain dollar limits, and no special provision about pharmaceutical costs.

Under the new law: 1. You may begin deducting your medical and dental costs at he point where they exceed 3 percent of your adjusted gross income. Persons 65 or over may disegard this 3 percent rule.

2. But you may include your charmaceutical eosts - medicines and drugs - among your medical and dental bills only after they exceed 1 percent of your adjusted gross income. This does apply to persons 65 or over.

Medical and dental bills may include the costs of such things as artificial teeth, medical and surgcal braces, and the like.

3. Your medical, dental and phrmaceutical deductions may not exceed \$2,500 for each exemption you claim (not including exemptions for age or blindness; with these top limits:

4. Heads of household, surviving widows and widowers qualified to file a joint return or to calculate their tax as though it were a joint return, and couples filing a joint return, may claim up to \$10,-000. Others may not claim more than \$5,000.

or legally separated under a degree who have not remarried) may claim a deduction up to \$600 for the care of children and others (as outlined below) while the taxpayer is working or seeking work.

The deduction may be claimed

A child or stepchild under the age of 12, of the taxpayer; or a person, regardless of age, who is mentally or physically incapable of caring for himself. But the deduction for the care of

these may be claimed only if the taxpayer is entitled to claim an exemption for them. For married women the deduct-

ion is allowed only if she files a joint return with her husband, and it must be reduced by the amount their adjusted gross income exceeds \$4,500.

5. The old tax law lets you de duct from your taxable income any periodic amounts you pay as alimony or separate maintenance under a court decree of divorce or separate maintenance.

The new law permits-but on separate returns only-the same deductions, even though the payments are not made under a court decree, provided they are made under a written agreement signed after Aug. 16, 1954. It also permits also on separate returns onlydeductions for payments made under a decree for support entered after Mar. 1, 1954.

The husband may deduct under these new provisions only when his payments are required to be in cluded in his wife's income.

You may not deduct lump-sum settlements, or payments specifically for the support of miner children. And any such payments by a husband need not be included in







"Irrigation in Reverse" on e might say of Roger Brumley's experiment on his place about 18 miles west on Harrison Highway. Usually a lake is used to catch the run-off from irrigation in this section of the country but Mr. Brumley is taking the water from a lake in his pasture to water a wheat field east of the lake.

Heavy rainfall in the area last fall filled the big take which covers approximately 125 acres. With 500 acre feet of water evaporating into the air while a half section of wheat threatened to die of thirst Mr. Brumley worked out a plan to lift the water for irrigation.


Upon the dry bank the pumping system which includes one bowl on a 10 foot column has been set in a channel 15 feet deep which had been dug from the water out of the pump sight. A two foot suction is allowed below the bowl. This channel is two feet lower than the lake so all of the water will eventually flow through the channel to be lifted by the pump.

A Chevrolet motor, powered by butane operates the pump and lifts the lake water 64 feet up the hill through a 12 inch ripe to au irrigation ditch which carries the water to the wheat which is being watered in the same manner as crops using well water. The water travels through the big pipes for a quarter of a mile before it flows into the irrigation ditch at the rate of 1350 gallons per minute, accord-

There still is plenty of time, the Governor believes, to complete the program.

Minor Water Bilis Two minor water bills got an okay in the House.

One gives the State Water Board power to review proposals for federal projects. Veto power for the governor, originally in the bill, was stricken out.

The other requires water districts to register with the state board. Important water conservation measures, involving millions of dollars, have not reached a vote in either house.

Insurance Bills

Two big insurance bills were hung in committee. Rep. Floyd Bradshaw's omnibus bill would regulate fire and casualty companies of all kinds. Sen. Searcy Bracewell's would regulate life companies.

Regulations in Bradshaw's bills would: Raise minimum capital and surplus requirements (combined) to \$200,000 for fire companies; \$300,000 for casualty; and \$500,000 for companies writing more than

one line. One advocate of his bill said, 'Insurance companies have to be born big."

Governor Shivers, on the other hand, said that just because an insurance company is small doesn't mean it isn't sound. Bracewell's bill would raise min-

imum capital and surplus requirements of life companies to \$200,000 and require that it be kept in cash or bonds, not in real estate.

Rep. Vernon Smith charged that 'vicious and false propaganda" by out-of-state insurance companies had impaired confidence in Texas insurance.
