<b>Quick Eggs Benedict</b> Heat 1 can (8½ or 9 oz.) cheese rarebit in top of double boiler over boiling water. Split and toast 4 English muffins; spread with 2 cans (2¼ oz. each) deviled ham. Just before serving top each muffin half with 1 hot poached egg; spoon hot rarebit over eggs. Serve at once, two halves per person. (Note: Or use 1 cup of your favorite cheese sauce in place of rarebit.)	<b>Party Fruit Compote</b> Serve a compote of canned fruits — apricots, cherries, Mandarin orange sections, peaches, pears, pineapple and plums garnished with fresh mint and maraschino cherries. Almost any fruit combinations may be used. (Save extra fruit for salad or dinner-time first course.) Drain fruit syrups into medium-sized saucepan; add lemon juice, stick cinnamon and dash of ground ginger. Simmer about 10 min. to blend flavors; remove cinnamon; cool. Pour syrup over fruits; chill well.	<b>Tuna 'n' Noodle Bake</b> Combine 2 cans (15 oz. each) tuna and noodle dinner, 1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup, ½ cup milk and ½ cup ripe olives sliced from pits (about 12 olives); turn into 1-qt. baking dish; sprinkle with crushed potato chips (about ½ cup). Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 20 min., or until bubbling hot. Note: Or substitute 2 cans egg noodles and beef for tuna and noodle dinner.)

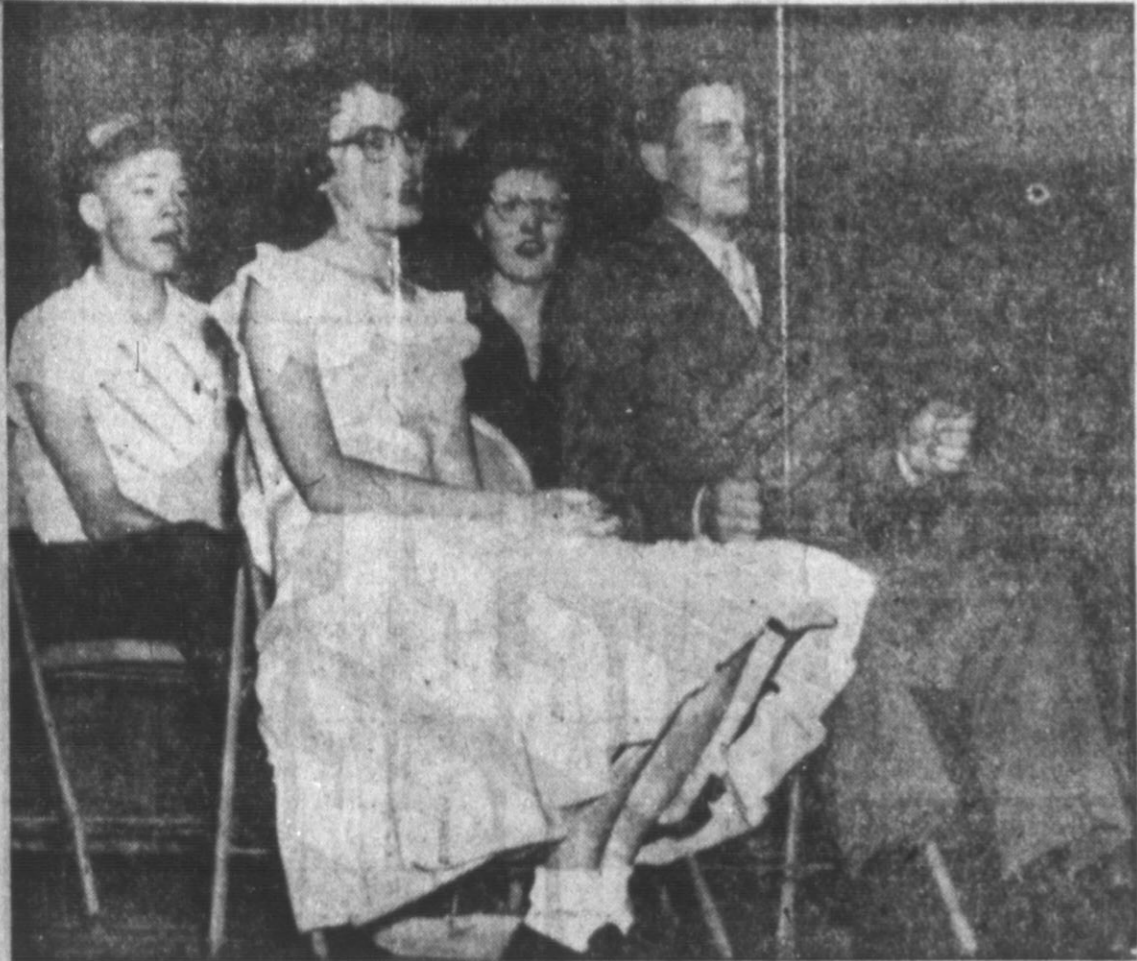

## How Can I?

Q. How should sweaters be laundered to prevent stiffness?

A. Dissolve two tablespoonfuls of white soap flakes in a cup of boiling water and then stir into a gallon of warm water. Dip the garment up and down in this, squeezing instead of rubbing. Rinse in several waters of the same temperature.

Q. How can I destroy silver fish?

A. Sprinkle bubach powder on shelves and in drawers, and force it into cracks and crevices with a blower, and it will destroy the silver fish.

Q. How should bananas be baked?

A. Baked bananas will be more delicious if they are first dipped in lemon juice, then rolled in crumbs, before baking.

Q. How can I remove scorched spots from woolen garments?

A. If the material cannot be washed rub lightly with a piece of white flannel that has been wrung very dry out of cold water and slightly moistened with glycerine. If there are any glycerine stains they can be sponged out with alcohol.

Q. How can I avoid clogging the sink drain?

A. Hot grease should not be poured down the drain pipe of the sink. It will congeal as soon as it strikes the cold pipe and tend to clog it.

Q. How can I remove iodine stains?

A. To remove iodine stains from the article of clothing, soak it in lime water.

Q. How can I make a good salad if one has unexpected guests?

A. Make a salad of canned peaches, pears, apricots, or any other fruit. Serve on crisp lettuce leaves with mayonnaise, or French dressing. Grated cheese should be sprinkled over the top.

Q. How can I get rid of dandruff?

A. A remedy for dandruff is to rub pure olive oil into the scalp, then follow with a good shampoo within a few hours. It also causes the hair to grow.

Q. How can I take away that greasy look from coat collars?

A. Go over them occasionally with a cloth moistened with household ammonia.

Q. How can I avoid having to pick paper scraps after children have been cutting out dolls?

A. Why not spread an old sheet on the floor for the children to sit on when cutting paper dolls. It will save their clothes as well as the rug, and the scraps can be easily gathered up in the sheet when they have finished playing.

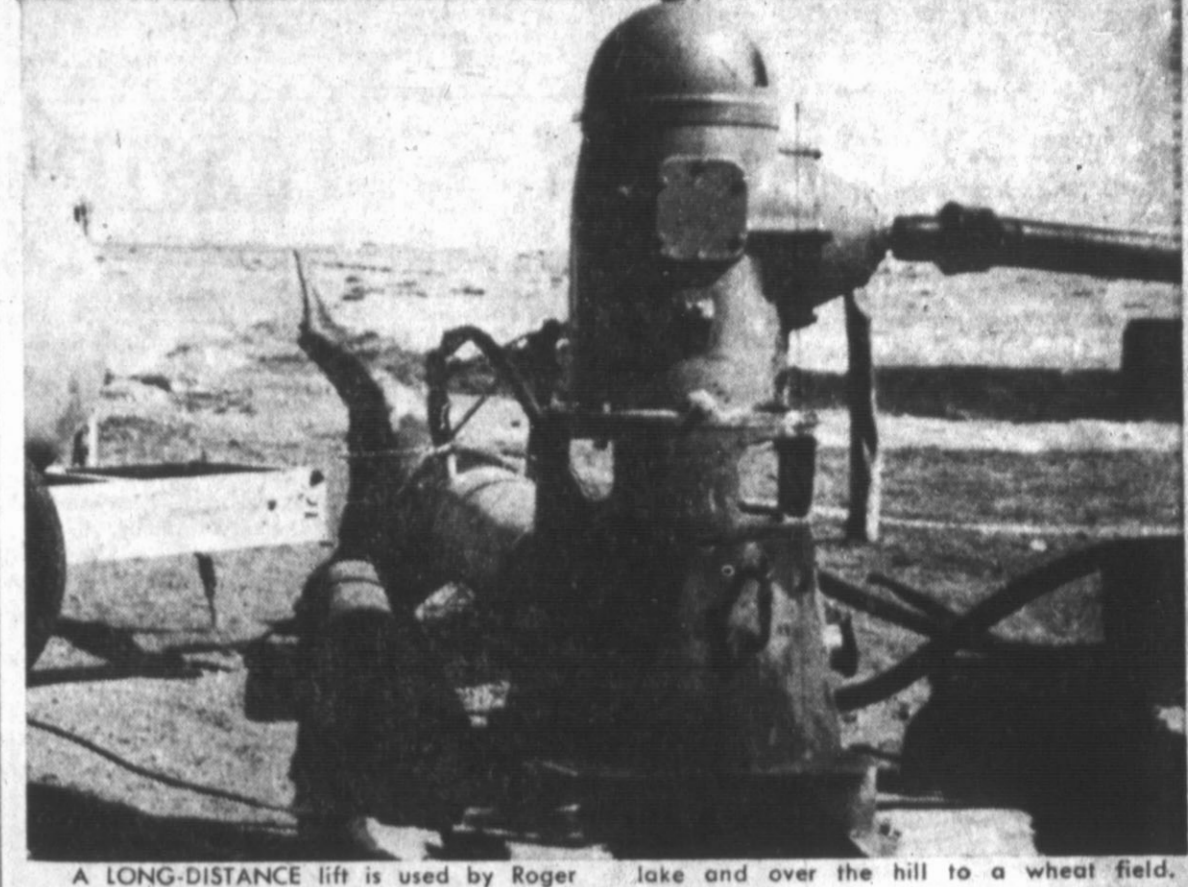

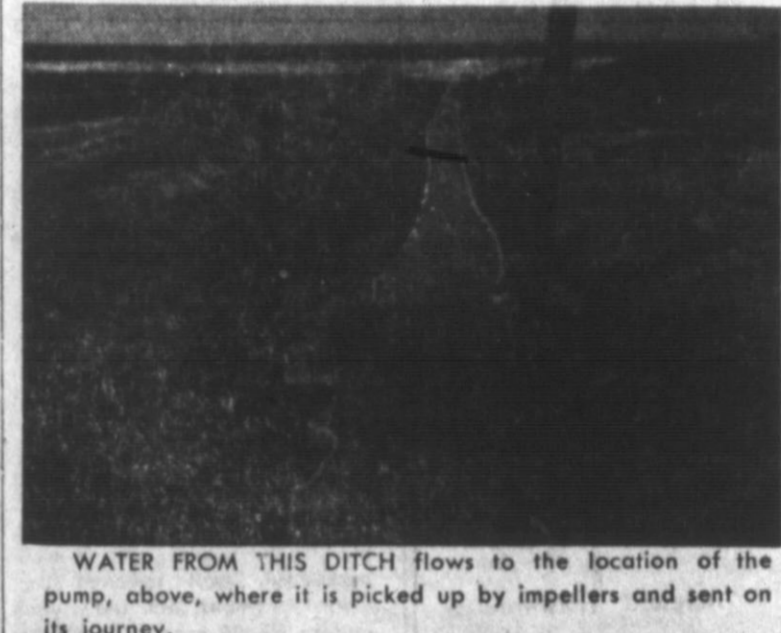

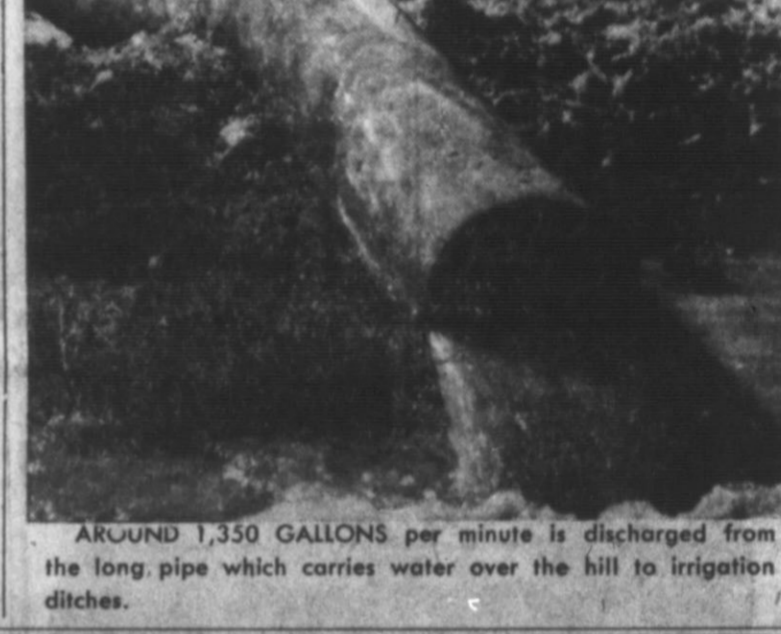

### Rancher Employs Lake Water For Irrigating Crop

"Irrigation in Reverse" one might say of Roger Brumley's experiment on his place about 18 miles west on Harrison Highway. Usually a lake is used to catch the run-off from irrigation in this section of the country but Mr. Brumley is taking the water from a lake in his pasture to water a wheat field east of the lake.

Heavy rainfall in the area last fall filled the big lake which covers approximately 125 acres. With 500 acre feet of water evaporating into the air while a half section of wheat threatened to die of thirst Mr. Brumley worked out a plan to lift the water for irrigation.

Upon the dry bank the pumping system which includes one bowl on a 10 foot column has been set in a channel 15 feet deep which had been dug from the water out of the pump sight. A two foot suction is allowed below the bowl. This channel is two feet lower than the lake, so all of the water will eventually flow through the channel to be lifted by the pump.

A Chevrolet motor, powered by butane operates the pump and lifts the lake water 64 feet up the hill through a 12 inch pipe to an irrigation ditch which carries the water to the wheat which is being watered in the same manner as crops using well water. The water travels through the big pipes for a quarter of a mile before it flows into the irrigation ditch at the rate of 1350 gallons per minute, according to (Continued on Page 2)

# Highlights and Sidelights FROM 40th State CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Tex. — Top news of the week is the arrest of Bascom Giles.

The former land commissioner was charged with conspiracy to commit theft of \$83,500 in state funds.

Giles' indictment was issued by the Travis County grand jury following investigation of alleged irregularities in the veterans' land program.

He was released after posting a \$60,000 bond—first set at \$100,000 and later reduced.

Strict secrecy has shrouded Travis County's land fraud indictments.

An unknown number of them have been made. Names of others indicted will be announced as arrests are made.

District Attorney Les Proctor said the indictments were sealed "in the interest of law enforcement." He would not estimate how long it might be before the names could be made public.

Proctor also had asked for a special jury to prevent any let-up in the investigation.

District Judge Charles O. Betts signed an order calling a special grand jury into session on March 10. His order does not limit the jury to land investigations, although that is its actual purpose. Betts' order will keep the jury in session until the last Saturday in July. The previous grand jury's session expired March 5. Rumors in Capitol corridors have it that the most outstanding breaks in the land investigation are yet to come.

**McLarty Returns**  
T. J. McLarty of Denver, Colo., one of several real estate promoters indicted in connection with veterans' land transactions, returned to Texas to post a \$26,400 bond and talk to legislative investigators.

He has asked the privilege of having other witnesses and records subpoenaed.

**Shepperd Busy**  
A report from the Attorney General's office reveals that since the beginning of the veterans' land investigation in October of last year, John Ben Shepperd's office has been a beehive of activity. Shepperd estimates he and his assistants have traveled over 18,000 miles and have put in over 41,000 man-hours of time on the veterans' land investigation. Shepperd has met with grand

**Session Pausing**  
Half of the regular session of the 54th Legislature is gone. Governor Shivers said he wasn't perturbed at the slow start on important tax, water, appropriations and other legislation. He hadn't expected lawmakers to finish much legislation in the first half of the session.

There still is plenty of time, the Governor believes, to complete the program.

**Minor Water Bills**  
Two minor water bills got an okay in the House.

One gives the State Water Board power to review proposals for federal projects. Veto power for the governor, originally in the bill, was stricken out.

The other requires water districts to register with the state board. Important water conservation measures, involving millions of dollars, have not reached a vote in either house.

**Insurance Bills**  
Two big insurance bills were hung in committee. Rep. Floyd Bradshaw's omnibus bill would regulate fire and casualty companies of all kinds. Sen. Searcy Bracewell's would regulate life companies.

Regulations in Bradshaw's bills would: Raise minimum capital and surplus requirements (combined) to \$200,000 for fire companies; \$300,000 for casualty; and \$500,000 for companies writing more than one line.

One advocate of his bill said, "Insurance companies have to be born big."

Governor Shivers, on the other hand, said that just because an insurance company is small doesn't mean it isn't sound.

Bracewell's bill would raise minimum capital and surplus requirements of life companies to \$200,000 and require that it be kept in cash or bonds, not in real estate.

Rep. Vernon Smith charged that "vicious and false propaganda" by out-of-state insurance companies had impaired confidence in Texas insurance.

**SHORT SNORTS:** Rep. Herman Yeak suggests the 150-member House be cut to 100 representatives. . . A bill by Sen. A. M. Aikin Jr., to double drivers' license fees, won a favorable committee report. Also approved was a House bill to increase college tuition fees from \$25 to \$50 a semester. . . Rep. Joe Chapman has offered a bill to soften the driving - while - intoxicated law. . . Bills to create a state utilities commission for rate regulation were pocketed in sub-committees in both chambers. . . Political talk has Senators Crawford Martin, Jerrard Seerest and Dorsey Hardeman in the 1956 races for attorney general or lieutenant governor. . . Agricultural Commissioner John C. White, only Democratic nominee in 1952 to reject Republican cross-filing, is being discussed as a possible choice of Texas liberals for governor.

juries almost daily. Thus far, the Bexar and DeWitt Co. grand juries have returned a total of 188 indictments against eight persons involved in veterans' land sales.

In addition, the State has filed three criminal complaints in Travis County.

Ten civil suits have been filed against 25 separate promoters. The total recovery sought by Shepperd in these 10 suits is \$1,604,000.

Attorney General Sepperd plans to meet with 13 different grand juries during the month of March. He forecasts that his month will see the returning of "hundreds of criminal indictments against most of the persons involved."

Shepperd has added a complete new division to his department to process veterans' land civil and criminal cases. It is headed by Cecil E. Burney of Corpus Christi, an ex-prosecutor and former president of the State Bar of Texas.

VETERANS HOSPITAL

The Hoover Commission Task Force recommendation that the Amarillo Veterans Hospital be closed is understandably causing quite a furor. My immediate reaction to the report was carried in the Amarillo paper. I want to here and now state that the newspaper report was an exact reflection of my feeling on the matter at the time the report came to my notice, and my reaction has been confirmed and fully supported after reading the report. It is a very simple thing for a few individuals to take a group of facts and figures and add, subtract and multiply them. Such practice will, no doubt, produce a mathematical answer that might be difficult to challenge. However, the thing that seems to be forgotten is the fact that we are dealing with human problems, and in so doing, the human equation must be applied before the end result will be correct. Frankly, I am completely astounded at the recommendations of this task force. To me, it represents how quickly the debts that we owe the veterans of this nation can be forgotten. This report reflects a cold-blooded attempt to justify the closing of some veterans hospitals on a strictly fact-and-figures basis without regard to the human beings involved. It no doubt represents a coldly efficient approach. The thing that occurs to me is that the men who caused the need for hospitals for veterans in this country were the dictators who could be rightfully called the most coldly efficient men in our time. In other words, these dictators placed efficiency first and last. The human beings to them were merely cogs in the wheels to create their efficient machine that they hoped would rule the world. When these human beings reached the point or the condition that they could not produce, they became expendable and were disposed of. It must be remembered that it was the veterans of this country, many of whom are patients in these veterans hospitals, who destroyed these dictators and protected and preserved the freedoms and the human dignities that we in America so dearly love.

March 2, concerning the health proposal of this administration, to wit, H. R. 3458 and H. R. 3720. This was the beginning of the hearings on this controversial legislation. The reason it is controversial is because many feel that it is the opening of the door for socialized medicine. I pointed this out to Mrs. Hobby during the hearings, and she seemed to be very much surprised that the Members had received any communications indicating that this health legislation was even closely akin to socialized medicine. Her surprise to the contrary notwithstanding, I have received quite a number of communications referring to these administration health proposals as the opening wedge for the final socialization of medicine. Whether or not these accusations are true will, of course, depend upon what develops in the hearings. Mrs. Hobby takes the position that this is the voluntary approach. In answer to a direct question of mine, she advised the committee that neither she nor the administration had had any plans or discussion to move into the field of compulsory health insurance should the proposed voluntary plan be unsuccessful. Her statement concerning this feature was "The objective of this proposal is to accelerate the extension of voluntary health insurance." In other words, this bill would create a situation where the federal government would give certain guarantees to health insurance companies so that these companies would write health insurance that they now refuse to write. That is, the federal government would protect them to a certain degree against any loss they might suffer because of the policies they had written. It is a very complex situation and involves several other features besides the re-insurance feature.

One of the alarming things that was pointed out in Secretary Hobby's testimony was her statement that "There are an estimated 9 million persons in the United States with serious mental disorders, most of them untreated, and those who are receiving institutional care or treatment occupy nearly half of the nation's hospital beds." I say "alarming," because this figure constitutes approximately six percent of the population of this country. Many of these mental disorders are the direct result of nervous disorders traceable to war service. It occurs to me that the Task Force of the Hoover Commission might do well to discuss some of these matters with the Secretary of Health.

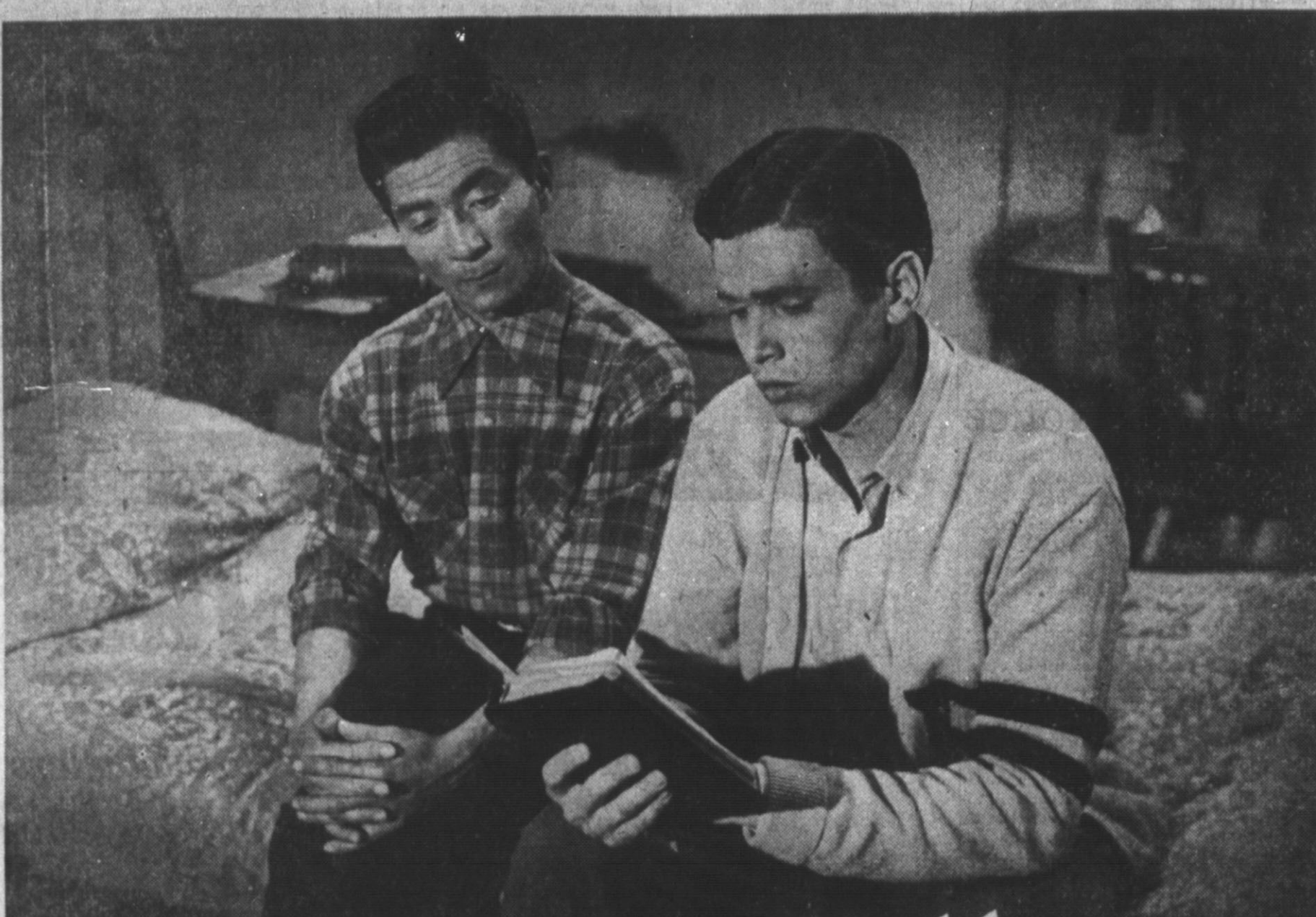

# Long Time Ago

**45 Years Ago**  
Tuesday afternoon ominous clouds indicated that something was doing in the weather department. So about dark a gentle rain set in from the east and continued for several hours—off and on. It was just what you would call a "general soaker" but a good rain, between one-third and one-half of an inch falling. At Hereford the government record shows 0.36 inches. The rain was general over the country and the Panhandle.  
At the earnest solicitation of friends in the city, the Mayor has caused to be published a proclamation calling upon all able bodied persons in the city to devote April 1 as "Clean Up Day." While perhaps the Mayor has no legal

authority to make the day a legal holiday, he feels that the citizenship needs only the suggestion and all will gladly take part in making Hereford the cleanest town in the state of Texas.  
J. P. Bourrell who lives near Frio four miles south, was in town Tuesday and was telling about a big tank he had just completed, building it himself. It measures 30 feet in diameter and four feet deep—the bottom is made of concrete while the wall is constructed of 2x4's held together by iron and wire bands. The capacity is over 700 barrels, and cost about \$50 complete. Mr. Bourrell intends to use the tank for domestic water supply and to irrigate a small truck garden and orchard.

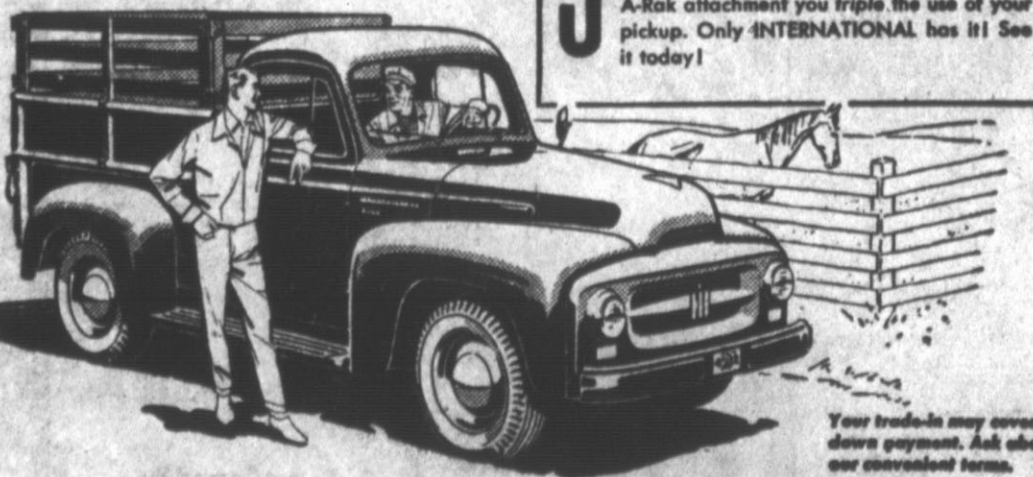
