



No one would guess that Edwards was more than 100 years old and one of the most talented primidve artists in the Hill Country.

The storming of New Orleans in 1862 is one of the favorite stories of "Uncle Frank." Although only a boy of seven he remembers watching Farragut's gunboats steam up the Mississippi. With him was his widowed moth-

er, who had been visiting relatives in New Orleans. Edwards said the Yankee offiers repeatedly failed in their atmpts to persuade his mother to ake the oath of allegiance to the Union. Finally the boy and mother ere sent through the lines in a

soner of war exchange. We were taken 10 miles inside the Confederate lines west of the city in a mule drawn ambulance," Edwards said. "Released, we then made our way toward Texas as best we could. It took us six weeks to reach San Antonio."

The mother and son joined little band of refugees trying to reach the Sabine River. He remembers now that the boys killed blackbirds to bolster the meager food supply.

Young Edwards went to school in San Antonio for the rest of the Civil War.

During reconstruction days he as sent to Dr. Ben E. Edwards, paternal grandfather, in Saint ouis for his higher education. Afthis schooling he returned to an Antonio.

In 1873, he moved 18 miles west the Culebra Ranch that had been stablished by his father, who ame to Texas from Kentucky in 1845. Ten years later he married Lillian Brockway of Navasota.

After some 20 years on the ranch he returned to San Antonio and entered the real estate field. For six years before coming to the Guadalupe Valley in 1936, he was employed at San Antonio City Hall.

He was past 80 when he began the construction of his rock residence at the foot of Pleasure Hill, nine miles west of here, every bit of which he built himself, even to gathering and hatfling the rock.

The walls of every room in the

house are decorated with murals he painted. He began painting in oil at the age of 80 and surprised everyone who knew him with the charm and skill of his work.

A widower for over 50 Edwards has four living daughters, one of whom is always with or near him. He has 10 grandchildren, 16 great - grandchildren and two great - great-grandchil-

"Uncle Frank," as he is known throughout his part of the valley, can still swim the Guadalupe River at his favorite swimming hole. He gave up deer hunting at the
