



Fattening Of Lambs Is His Best Method

BY ROBERTA CAMPBELL

What a refreshing experience to hear something bleating around a farm besides the farmer.

Daniel Larsen, wno believes it is the farmer's responsibility to help find a solution to the present agricultural dilemma, is fattening over 2000 lambs to keep his farm operations, eight miles south of Hereford, from being "Bensonized".


Since the lambs in the feed pens have been a money-making project for him, he is anxious to see others try it because of the number of feed products available in this locality.

Fattening lambs for market is not new to the Larsens. They had 25 years experience behind them when they moved to Hereford from Utah five years ago.

"Economy of Operation" is the key to Larsen's operation, which would, of course, first of all include economy of feed.

Variety is another key word to the success of lamb feeding and here Larsen feels we have the finest alfalfa hay he has ever spread over a manger. To supplement the hay he has used maize, whole sugar beets, lettuce, sugar beet tops, corn and wheat for pasture and maybe some other protein in his feeding program.

The feeding plan which Larsen has found very successful begins (Continued on Page 5)



DANIEL LARSEN has reason enough to look happy over the gain his 1100 lambs are making on the variety of feeds available in the locality. They were shipped up from South Texas and put in the feed lots in October and will move to Northern markets at 100 pounds in February. The 35 pounds gain will be made on alfalfa hay, maize, sugar beets and tops,
