Hereford Churches Plan Special Easter Services

Special Easter services were announced this week by most Hereford churches, and at least three local churches will hold joint sunrise services Sunday.

Services as announced:

First Christian Church
Thursday at 7:30, Candle-Light Communion. A "significant" and "heart-touching" service. The Meditation is "Conserve Your High Moments," and Miss Shirley Root is soloist.

St. Anthony's Church
Sunday at 10 a.m. the Blessing of the Palms, with procession commemorating the entry of Christ into Jerusalem.

Maundy Thursday, Sacrifice of the Mass with procession commemorating the Last Supper. Confessions will be heard from five until six and from seven until eight o'clock p.m.

Good Friday a communion service will be held in remembrance of the death of Christ at 3 p.m. Confessions will be heard from five until six and from eight until nine p.m.

There will be no services Holy Saturday morning, but the blessing of the new fire, the Easter candle and baptismal water will be at 10:45 p.m. Saturday, followed by the Easter Vigil Mass at midnight commemorating resurrection of Christ on Easter Sunday. Masses will be held Sunday morning at 6:30, 8 and 10. The senior choir will render the ancient chant under the direction of Dr. Eugene Albracht.

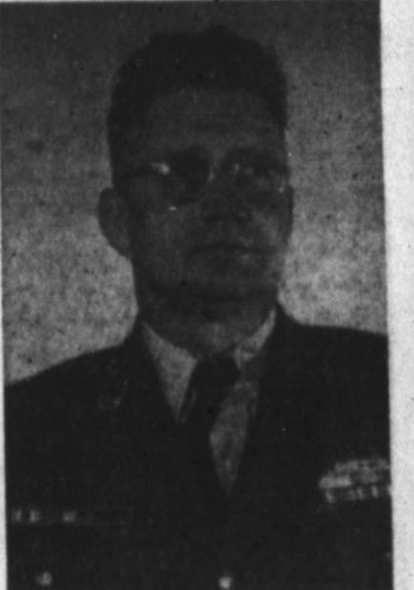
First Methodist Church
Thursday and Friday evenings, 8:30 p.m. Communion service will close the Friday evening service. On Easter morning there will be two church services, one at 8:30 and one at 10:55.

St. Thomas Episcopal Church
There will be a Good Friday service held in Canyon Friday from 2 to 5 p.m. Also Easter Sunday there will be a Communion Service held at the church in Canyon at 9 a.m.

At the church here, on Easter Sunday, a children's service will be held along with the 11 o'clock service and also a Communion Service. At four in the afternoon, an Easter Egg hunt will be held, followed with a picnic after the hunt.

Assembly of God Church

Bids For New Bridge Across Tierra Blanca Creek Sought

Deaf Smith County commissioners had a long drawn out meeting Monday, but about the only business which was completed was a favorable vote on asking for bids for a new bridge across the Tierra Blanca Creek 3 1/2 miles southwest of Hereford.

Acting jointly with the Parmer County Commissioners Court, Deaf Smith County Commissioners agreed to pay half the costs of the bridge, with Parmer County paying the other half. The bridge will be located in Precinct 3 on the boundary line between the two counties. It crosses the creek at the intersection of the east line of Section 27 and the west line of Section 28, which is 28 miles west of here and 4 1/2 miles south.

Bids will be taken on the bridge April 23. It will replace a bridge which is now in use. It is the second bridge approved by the Court this year in Precinct 3. The first bridge, which was bid in at \$5500, is located two miles east of the bridge to be bid on.

The Court also discussed plans for changing the present insurance setup, the recent changes in voting precinct lines and poll tax lists, but no action was taken.

A special meeting has been called for Friday to complete business at hand.

Funeral Services Are Held Friday In Hereford For Henry G. Hastings

Funeral services for Henry Gyles Hastings, 78, were held Monday at 2:30 p.m. at the Presbyterian Church with Rev. Russell Wingert, pastor, and Rev. J. R. Sharp of Canyon officiating. Interment was in West Park Cemetery.

Mr. Hastings was born Sept. 25, 1877 in Weatherford. He married Ina Tomlinson in October of 1908 in Tulsa, and they moved to Hereford Feb. 20, 1917 from Tulsa. Mr. Hastings was a retired stock farmer and was a member of the Presbyterian Church.

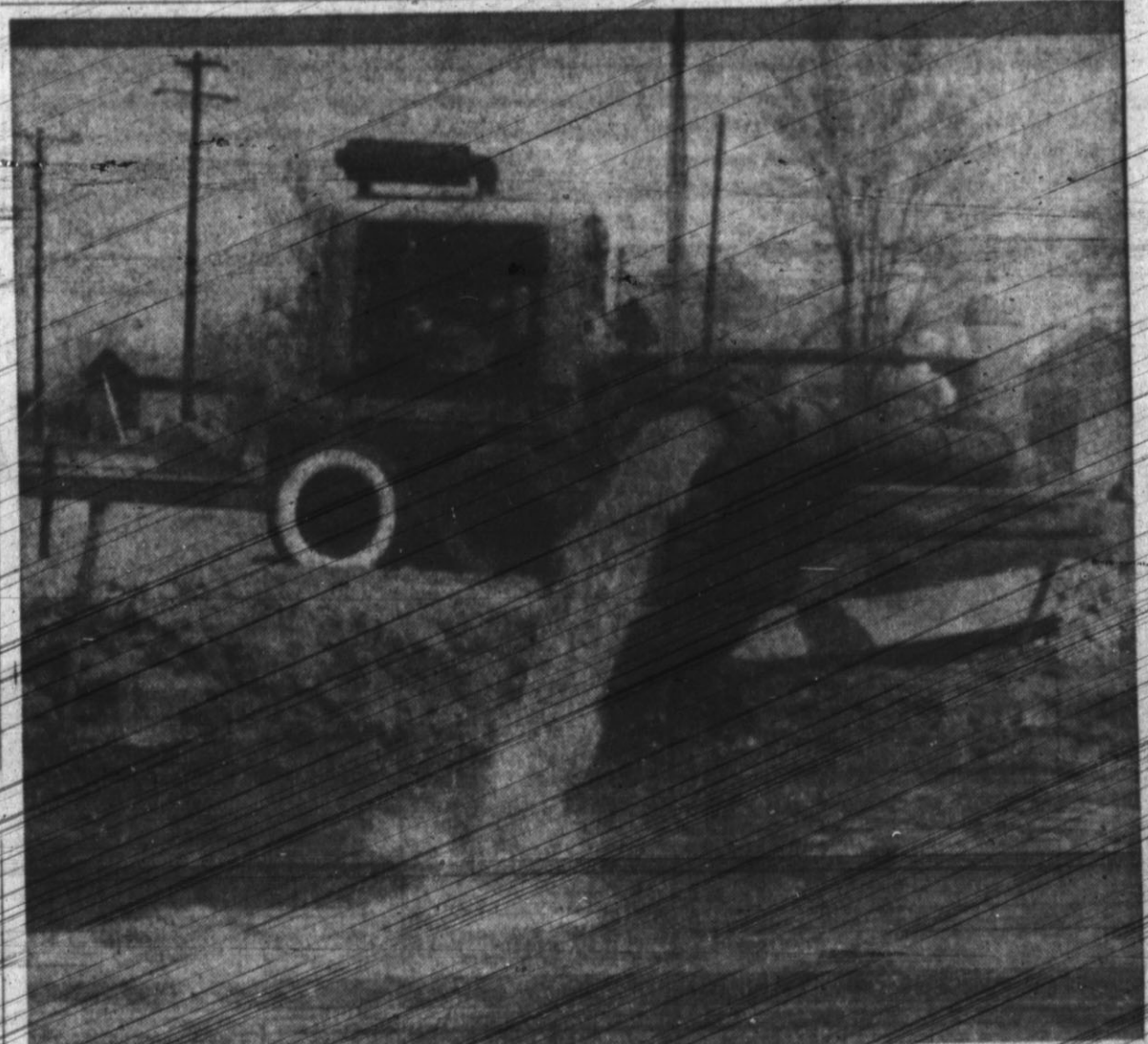
Several bids were submitted, and Board members said all were higher than had been anticipated.

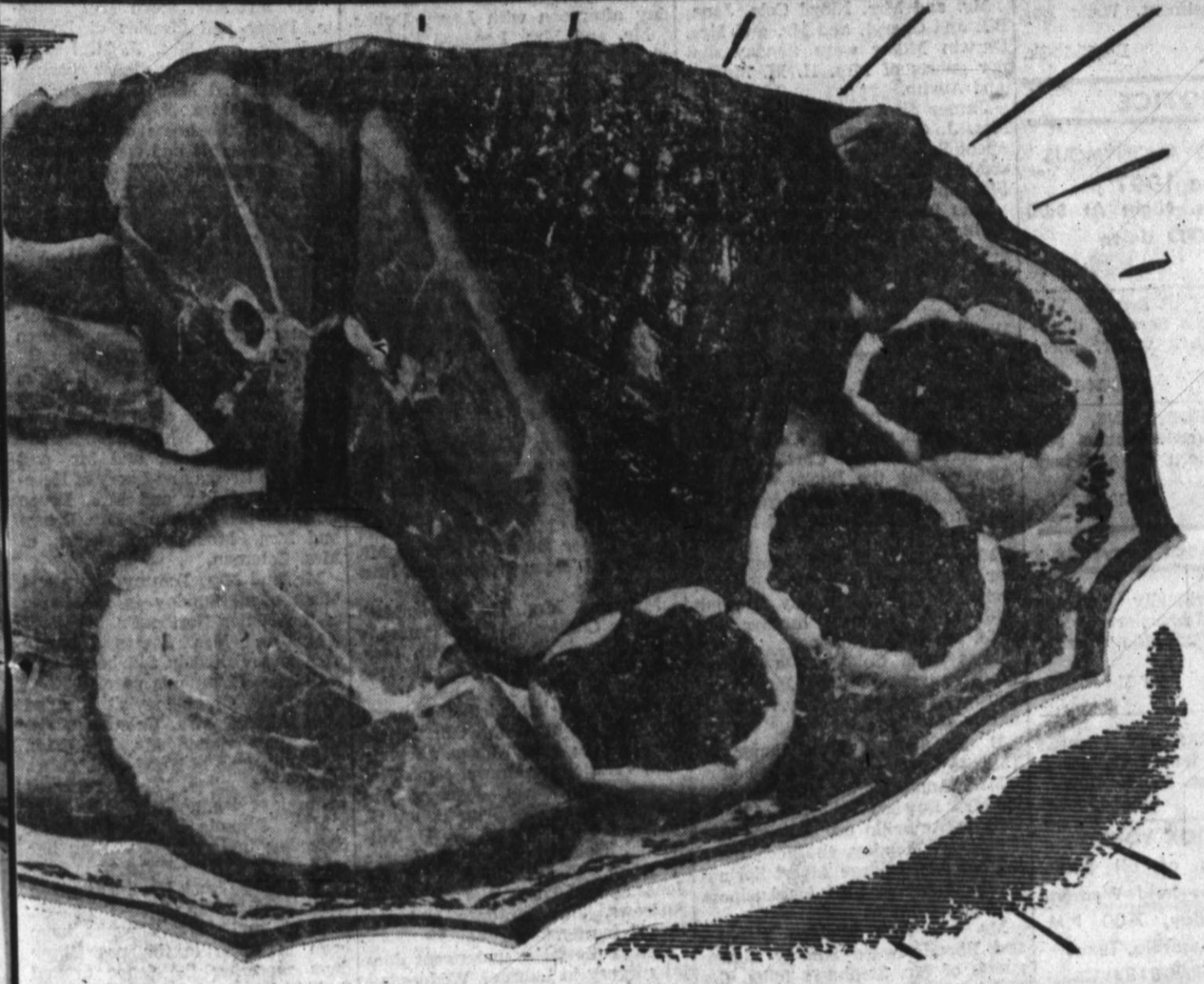

More and more of the small farms in Texas are becoming "industry conscious." Very few of them, however, are getting to first base. Civic leaders in Hereford have had this idea for more than 10 years, but the deals fail to materialize. It started away back when the line with dreams of a huge commercial alcohol plant and more recently, centered around possibilities of a fertilizer plant.

Meanwhile, the area has grown and expanded as a grain storage plant and as a vegetable producing and processing center. All in all, it is most difficult to put your finger on any specific reason why some giant canning plant, alcohol plant or other manufacturer has not chosen Hereford as the site or expansion. Maybe it is because everyone takes a "let ohn do it" attitude. Most people agree that the area could use the payroll, that it would be a step in the right direction. Still, we are on the outside looking in.

Most industries, in my opinion, will seek to locate in points where the community offers advantages in raw materials; advantages in freight, labor, taxes or utilities. This naturally means that local industries should run hand-in-hand with products of this particular area. And since the products are expanding, rather than decreasing in diversification, it is logical to believe that chances for industrial expansion are becoming better and better as the years pass. Local industry, in fact, already accounts for much of the wealth and progress of the community.

Some of these Red Cross block chairmen are either getting smart or lazy. For a long time Hereford boomed in the building of residences, but seldom did you see a new business house. Recently, the worm has turned. Lots and lots of business property is now under construction. Dick Walker is doubling the size of his building at Third and Schley. The new Lucky-4 motel is already adding another tier of courts. Mark Benefield is coming along nicely with the plush motel he is erecting. The new Moore grocery store is going up at the 60-51 intersection - and the Buy-Rite furniture construction is underway on Park. Otis Hall is also working away on his "Big Red Barn," another furniture outlet to be located west on Highway 60. Add to this the Thomas building on Park and 51, and you have quite a jag of business construction al-

ready in 1956.
The grapevine also has it that Humble will soon start construction on a super station at the Highway 60-51 intersection, probably around April 15. Most of these improvements are on the fringe areas of town. However, recent changes of property around the courthouse indicate probable growth in that area in the future.

I thought I had a deal with Charlie Holt about cherries, but it looks as if he got away from me. Anyway, I went through 1955 without any cherries - and the prospects don't look any too good for 1956. I think I will finally give up and plant those trees myself.

I heard the other day that the City of Canadian sponsored the sale of rose bushes to residents on a "cost basis." Understand they started out with 500 bushes and finally wound up handling around 3500. I doubt if such a deal would work here, due to the fact that tax-paying dealers would have a legitimate gripe about unfair competition. However, I guess the city could give a rose bush with every parking fine paid. I have been trying to talk them into giving trade stamps for a long time, but can't seem to do any good. Anyway, it is an idea which might appeal to some of our garden clubs or civic groups.

Hereford, for many years, was considered the town with the most beautiful trees, lawns, flowers and gardens in the Panhandle. We have grown so fast, however, that we are losing this identity. We still have the same wonderful soil, abundance of lowest water and ideal growing weather for yards and gardens. The trouble is that too many people are like me - just lazy, but reluctant to admit it.

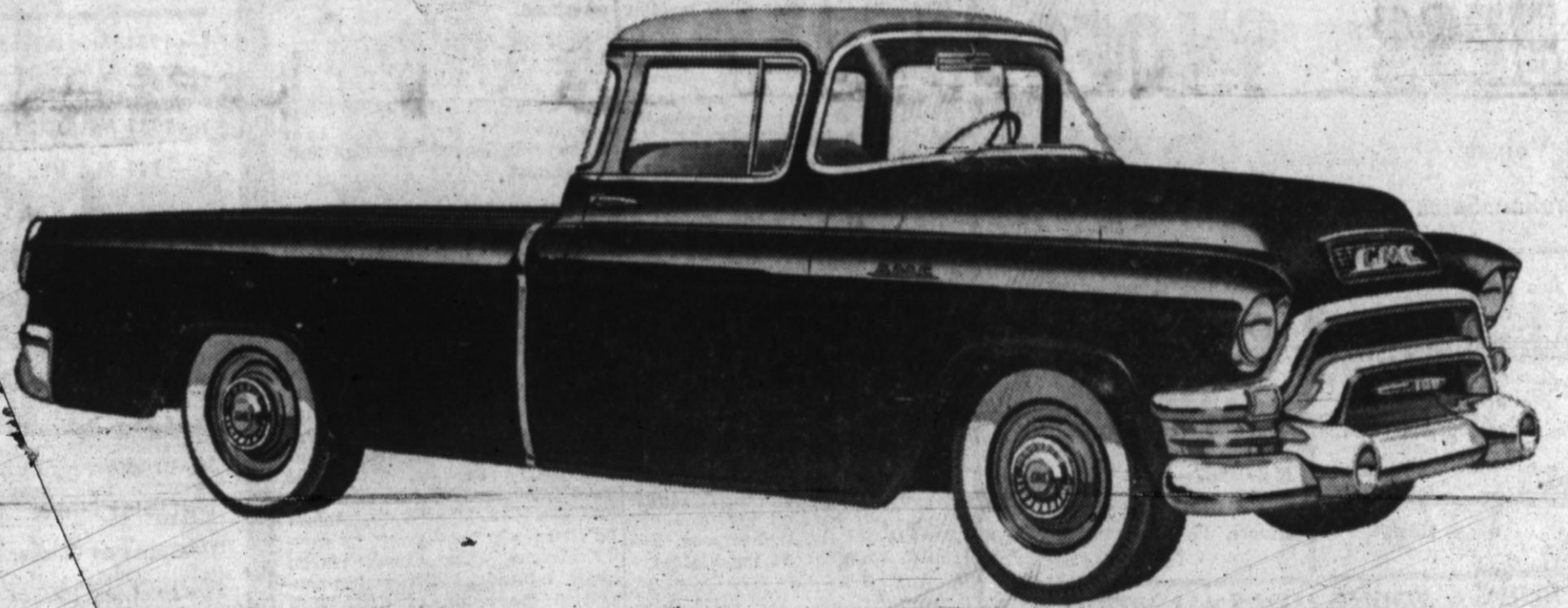

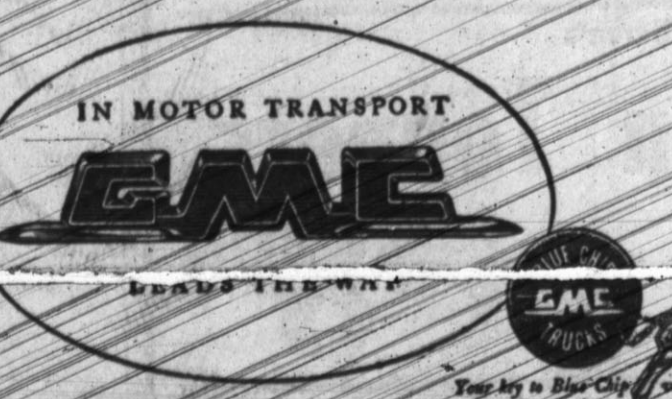

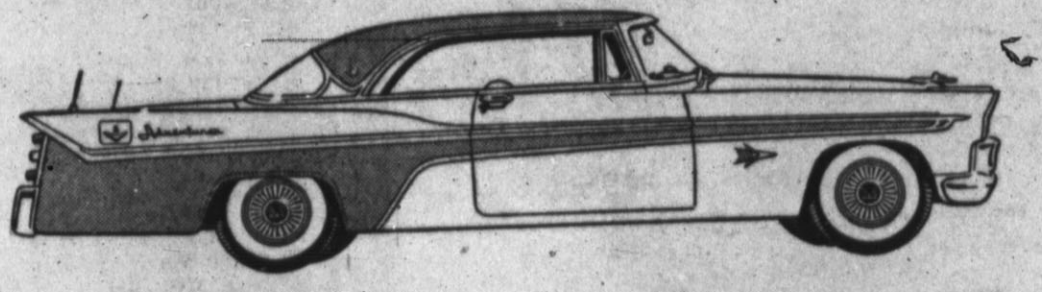

The Defense Ministry said the veterans would be given the regular training program and those who fail to respond to calls without proper reasons will be punished under the conscription laws.



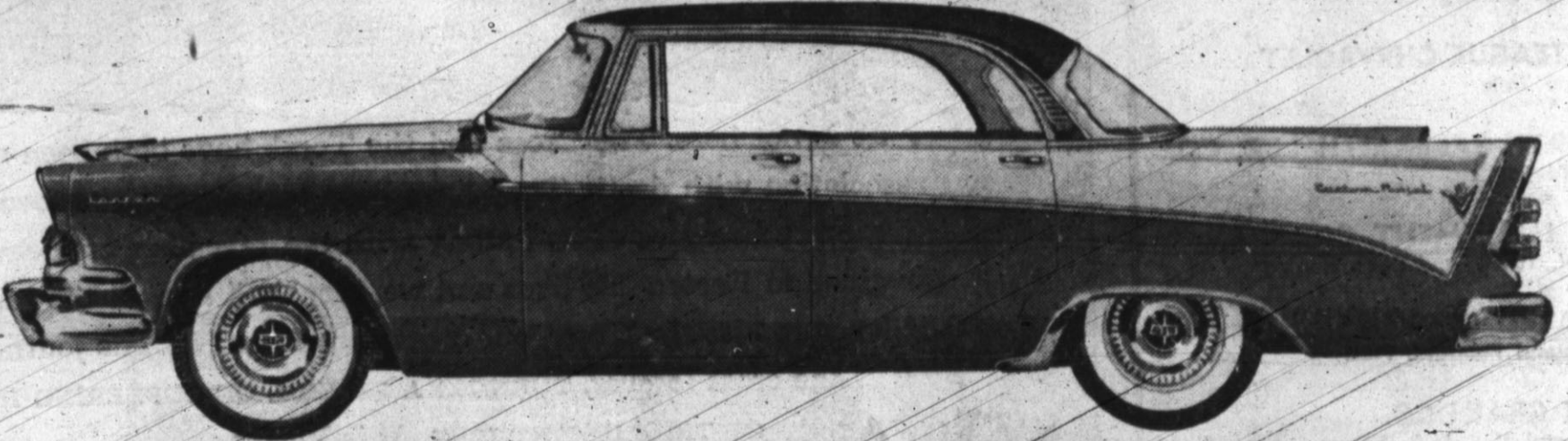

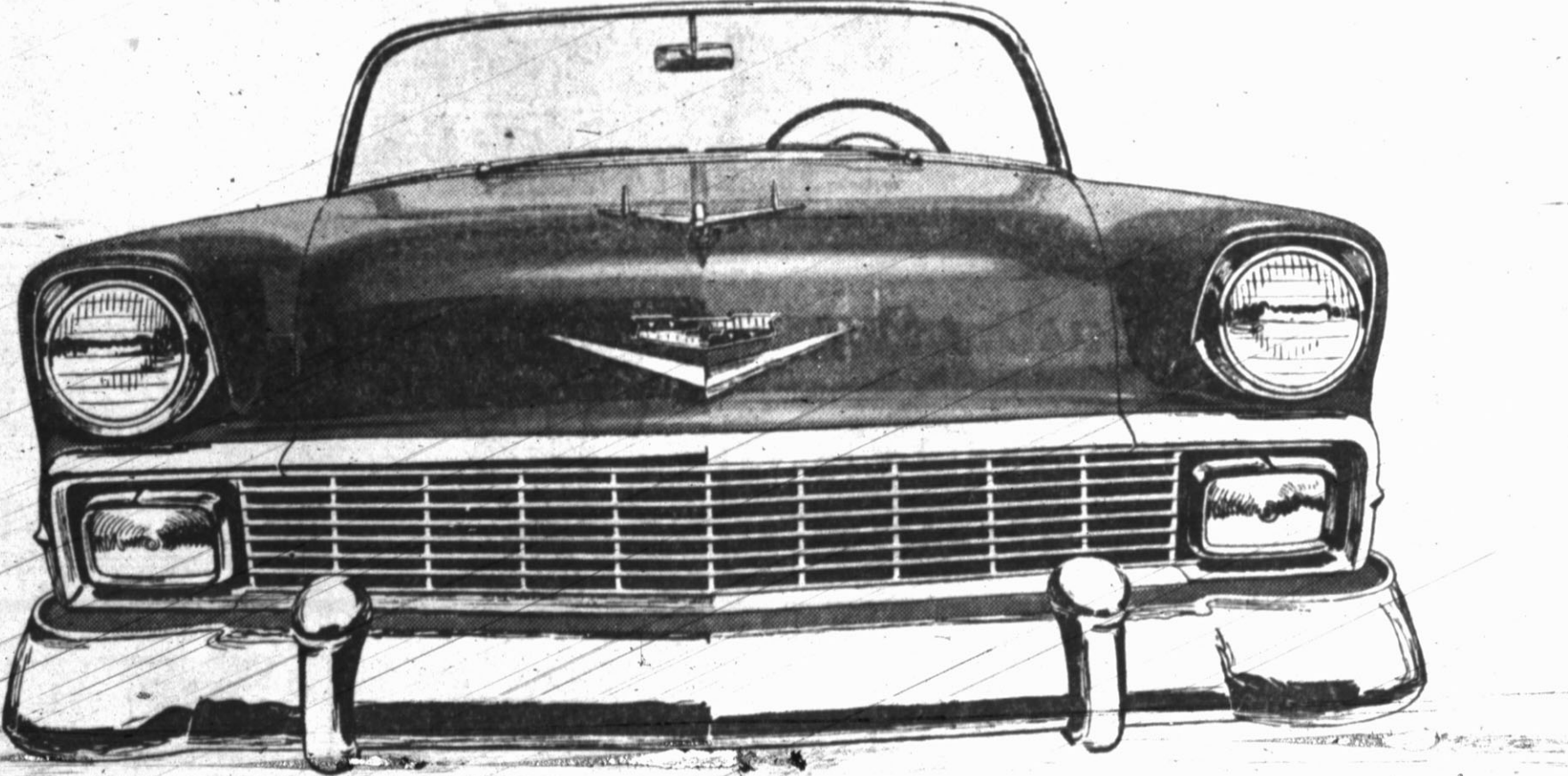

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO SUBMIT CHARTER AMENDMENTS

A RESOLUTION PROVIDING THAT NOTICE BE GIVEN OF THE INTENTION OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS, TO SUBMIT TO THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE CITY FOR APPROVAL OR REJECTION AMENDMENTS TO THE EXISTING CHARTER OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD.

WHEREAS the City Commission of the City of Hereford deems it advisable at this time to submit to the qualified voters of the City of Hereford amendments to the existing charter and

WHEREAS the City Charter of said City has not been altered or amended within two years next preceding this date

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS:

SECTION ONE: That it is the intention of said City Commission to pass an ordinance on the 10th day of April 1956 for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said city, at an election to be held for that purpose, the following amendments to the existing charter:

AMENDMENT NO. 1: To amend Sections One and Two of Article IV of the City Charter of the City of Hereford so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. Governing Body. The governing and law-making body of the City of Hereford shall consist of four members and a mayor and said body shall be known as the City Commission of the City of Hereford, Texas."

"Section 2. Elective Officers. The members of the City Commission of the City of Hereford shall include four commissioners and a mayor, all of whom shall be elected from the City at large and shall be the only elected officers of the city."

(a) The mayor shall be elected and hold office for a term of two years at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in April in each odd numbered year, and the present mayor shall continue in office until he is replaced by his qualified successor to be elected in 1957.

(b) The commissioners shall be designated respectively Commissioner, Place No. One; Commissioner, Place No. Two; Commissioner, Place No. Three; and Commissioner, Place No. Four. The two present commissioners are hereby designated as Commissioner, Place No. 1 and Commissioner, Place No. 2 respectively, and the said present commissioners shall continue in office until they are replaced by their qualified successors to be elected in 1957. Two additional commissioners shall be elected at a special election held for that purpose on or after the 1st day of September, 1956. Such additional commissioners shall be designated Commissioner, Place No. Three, and Commissioner, Place No. Four, and shall serve in that order respectively until the next regular election, and thereafter until their successors are elected in 1958.

(c) Hereafter, Commissioner, Place No. One, and Commission-

er, Place No. Two, shall be elected and hold office for a term of two years at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in April of each odd numbered year, and Commissioner, Place No. Three and Commissioner, Place No. Four, shall be elected and hold office for a term of two years at an election to be held on the first Tuesday of April in each even numbered year.

AMENDMENT NO. 2: To amend Section Eight of Article V of the City Charter of the City of Hereford so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 8. Corporation Court. There shall be established and maintained a court designated as a Corporation Court for the trial of misdemeanor offenses, with all such powers and duties as are now or hereafter may be prescribed by the laws of the State of Texas relative to Corporation or Recorder's Courts."

"The said Court shall have jurisdiction within the territorial limits of said city of all criminal cases arising under the ordinances of said city, and shall have concurrent jurisdiction with the Justice of the Peace of the Precinct of Hereford in which the City is or may be situated of all criminal cases arising under the criminal laws of the State, where the offense is committed within the territorial limits of said city and the punishment is by the fine and the maximum of said fine, under the laws of this state, may not exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00). Said court shall have no civil jurisdiction, except for the forfeiture and collection of bonds given in proceedings hereon. It shall also have jurisdiction of violations of ordinances of the city enacted for the preservation of its water system, watersheds of the city's water supply, its sewer disposal plant and its garbage dumping grounds, whether such offenses are committed inside or outside of the Corporate limits of the City of Hereford, and the violations of any nuisance ordinance within five thousand feet of the Corporate limits of the City outside of the city limits."

SECTION TWO: That the Mayor is authorized and instructed to publish a copy of this resolution in the Sunday Brand, the official newspaper as aforesaid, for not less than twenty days prior to the date on which the proposed ordinance is to be passed.
