Top Executives Say Recession Is Dying

HOT SPRINGS, Va. (AP) have tended to err on the opbusiness executives said today the 1981-82 recession is finally dying, although the pain of low profits and high unemployment will linger a while longer.

The executives also were keeping a wary eye on the budget battle in Washington, concerned that government deficits soaring above \$100 billion, could make for a puny recovery.

The overall forecast of economic recovery - beginning in the current April-June quarter - was released today by the Business Council, a group of about 200 leaders of major U.S. corporations.

The group is holding its semi-annual meeting at a resort in the western Virginia mountains.

The group's economists report said national economic

- A group of the nation's top tomistic side recently, forecasting last October, for example, a fourth-quarter end to "the sluggishness" of the U.S. economy.

> "The economists are unanimous in believing that we will not fall into a recession," said that report, issued at the start of what now appears to have been the recession's worst quarter.

This time, however, the executives and their forecasters are far from alone. Most government and private analysts say companies have set the stage for production increases by agressively selling off inventories and that the July tax-rate cut will provide the recovery spark by encouraging consumer spen-

activity, as measured by inflation-adjusted gross national product, will rise slightly in the current quarter and then "accelerate to a 4.3 percent annual rate during the second half" of the year.

That is about what the Reagan administration is forecasting, though some officials say there is a chance the GNP still will be down a bit this quarter.

"The upturn in economic activity will end the rise in unemployment," Business Council report said. But the rate will rise from the March level of 9 percent to a post-World War II record of 9.2 percent before declining, it said.

That prediction came on the day the government was releasing April unemploy-

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A Democratic candidate's announcement that he is

At his news conference Thursday, Clements suggested that some kind of "consideration" changed hands between Attorney General Mark White and Railroad Commissioner Buddy Temple before Temple dropped out of the Democratic runoff.

Temple announced Thursday that he would bow to par-

ty unity and give the nomination to White without a June 5 runoff. Temple had finished a poor second to White in Saturday's primary.

But Clements told a Capitol news conference the party unity explanation was "nonsense.

"I think they have done it on the basis of some special consideration and hat I'm interested in is what was paid and to whom," Clements said. "There was a secret meeting and I want to know what went on in the secret meeting and I want to know what consideration was between these two individuals."

Both Temple and White had said there was no meeting.

Nevertheless, Clements said he thought voters would view Temple's move as a "secret deal," and would feel "cheated" to his and the Republican party's benefit in November.

Deaths Increase

Austin--Texas traffic deaths incrased by six percent last year compared to 1980, according to statistics compiled by the Department of Public Safety. The mileage death rate, however, decreased by two percent. The rate was 4.2 deaths per hundred million miles traveled in 1981 as compared to 4.3 in 1980.

"A total of 4,701 fatalities were recorded on our state streets and highways for 1981," said Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director. "This was the fifth consecutive record year for motor vehicle deaths in Texas."

DPS reports 2,071 city traffic deaths in 1981 which is 44.1 percent of the total fatalities, while rural highway accidents claimed 2,630 lives or 55.9 percent of the deaths.

Adams noted that DWIrelated deaths last year totaled 1,082, an increase of eight percent above 1980.

"Fatalities attributed to drunk driving made up 23 percent of the total killed, according to investigating officers. However, we believe this figure would be as high as 50 percent if Texas law required blood alcohol measurements from all drivers involved in fatal accidents," he said.

Motorcycle deaths reached 442 in 1981, rising 17 percent compared to the previous year. Seventy-five percent of the cyclists killed were not wearing helmets.

"Total accidents reported by state and local officers last year numbered 458,017, six percent higher than 1980," Adams pointed out. "Our statistics also show that 206,196 persons were injured in Texas traffic mishaps in 1981. That amounts to an 11 percent increase over the previous year."

Statistics show motorists traveled 111.036 billion miles last year compared to 1980's 103.255 billion miles. This represents an increase of 7.5 percent.

Jobless Rate **Breaks Record**

WASHINGTON (AP) -Unemployment in the United States jumped to 9.4 percent last month - breaking the post-World War II record the government announced today. Some 10.3 million people were out of work.

April's jobless rate was up 0.4 of a percentage point from the previous month, more than enough to set a record. Not since 1941, when the government began compiling monthly statistics, has unemployment topped 9 percent. In that year, the jobless rate hit 9.9 percent.

At the White House, presidential spokesman Larry Speakes called today's announcement disappointing and said, "We remain sensitive to the plight of the unemployed."

He said he could not predict how far unemployment would rise or when it would begin declining. "We're looking for signs of economic recovery by late spring-early summer," Speakes said.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., charged that the new figures show conclusively that Reagan's economic program has failed to do

anything but "deliver pink slip after pink slip after pink slip to millions of decent men and women."

"Ronald Reagan's bread lines grew longer by 450,000 people," Kennedy said, adding that the "country is now harvesting the bitter fruits of a failed and unfair economic policy. ... Americans all over the country are losing their homes, their hopes and their pride,"

One economist said the current high unemployment is the price of bringing down inflation and others, both in and out of government, predicted the rate will climb even higher before turning around. Since last summer, when

the recession that still plagues the economy set in, unemployment has risen 2.2 percentage points. In July, joblessness nationwide stood at 7.2 percent.

By March, joblessness had risen to 9 percent - equalling the post-World War II record set in May 1975, the high point of the last severe recession. Some 9.9 million people were out of work in March.

DALLAS (AP) - A \$5 million classaction lawsuit prompted by last week's nationwide roundup of illegal aliens has been filed against the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service in federal court here.

Dallas lawyer Adelfa B. Callejo said the suit, filed Thursday, seeks an immediate injunction against the INS to prevent the agency from deporting parents of children born in the United

The suit contends the INS is guilty of age discrimination because U.S.-born citizens 21 or older are permitted to have their immigrant parents live in the United States as "immediate relatives." Citizens under 21 do not have that right.

The lawsuit mentions two families, each with three children, but does not name one of the families for fear its members might be deported.

Mrs. Callejo said the six children range in age from 1 to 10, have lived in Dallas all their lives and have never been to Mexico.

'They are as American as apple pie and hamburgers," she said. "They all fear the threat of being deported to Mexico, where their lives will be totally different and their economic conditions difficult or desperate, and their life plans threatened or destroyed."

Mrs. Callejo said she and David Bolton, the lead attorney in the case, would meet with U.S. District Judge Robert Porter today to ask for an in-

School Board Refuses To Ban 'Huck Finn'

HOUSTON (AP) - School board trustees have denied a request by several black parents to ban Mark Twain's novel, "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn," which the parents contend is degrading.

Trustees of the Spring Independent School District unanimously agreed Thursday night that the novel should remain in the curriculum.

One parent, Dora Durden, complained in February that the term "nigger" used thoughout the book was humiliating to black students.

James Crews, principal of Westfield High School, appointed a committee of two teachers and a librarian to investigate the complaints. The committee recommended the district continue to use the novel.

Mrs. Durden and another parent, Joseph Malveaux, later asked the school board to place the book on the optional reading list.

Blue Hair Out In Austin School

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - An Austin junior high school principal has banned blue hair.

Marcos Perez sent three eighthgraders home from Burnet Junior High on Thursday because they had dyed their hair a brilliant blue. When two of the students returned - their hair still blue - Perez ordered them to in-school suspension the next day.

"In my opinion, (their hair) wasn't appropriate. They were attracting too much attention and disrupting the educational process," said Perez.

Diane Johnston, mother of one of the boys placed on suspension said, "I think this is a serious matter, when

my son is not allowed to go to school with the others."

Suspended students are ordered to sit quietly all day in a separate classroom. They are not allowed to attend classes or take part in school ac-

tivities. Mrs. Johnston said her son and his friends opted for blue hair when "they ran across this can of blue hair spray, the punk rock type. It comes out very

Charges Filed Against **421 Motorists** During Roadblock

SAN MARCOS, Texas (AP) - The Department of Public Safety said today it filed 421 charges against motorists during a 12-hour roadblock of Interstate 35 north of here.

DPS spokesman Larry Todd said 3,932 motorists were stopped during the roadblock, which ended at 3 a.m. today.

Todd said 16 motorists were cited for driving while intoxicated, nine arrested on drug-related charges, three for carrying prohibited weapons, and one motorist was arrested for driving a stolen vehicle.

He said 188 were issued citations for not carrying proof of liability insurance. He said the remainder of the citations were for not having proper drivers licences or vehicle registra-

The DPS used 40 officers to operate mobile command posts on both sides of the interstate. The Hays County Sheriff's Department, the Drug Enforcement Administration, and the Immigration and Naturalization Service assisted the DPS.

Britain Still Skeptical

Ros Trying To End Conflict

A top Argentine official headed to the United Nations today to pursue a diplomatic solution to the Falkland Islands crisis, but Britain was skeptical of the effort, warned it might bomb the islands' main airfield again, and refused to rule out strikes against mainland Argentine bases.

The Argentine official, Deputy Foreign Minister Enrique Ros, left Buenos Aires Thursday night for U.N. headquarters in New York to discuss possible ways to end the conflict that erupted April 2 when Argentine forces seized the Falklands from Britain.

British Foreign Secretary Francis Pym accused the Argentines of scuttling peace efforts and told reporters in London today that British warplanes will bomb the airstrip on the Falkland Islands capital of Stanley if Argentine troops repair the

damage of two raids in the

past seven days.

"If necessary we will bomb the airfield again," Pym said. He also refused to rule out bombing Argentine mainland airfields, although he said Britain did not want to do this. "But I would not want to exclude any possibility,"

Britain lost two more of its Sea Harrier jet fighters in bad weather off the Falklands Thursday, the British Defense Ministry said, and British newspapers speculated today they collided in the air after taking off on a combat patrol. This left 17 of the original 20 Harriers with the armada still operational.

Amid growing expectations the British will soon assault the South Atlantic islands, Pym told the House of Commons in London:

"If all endeavors to meet a sensible, reasonable and fair settlement fail, then regrettably nobody is in any doubt what we are going to do - we cannot allow the occupation our islands continue...Our resolve is un-

diminished.' Pym blamed Argentine insistence on sovereignty over the Falklands for the collapse of a U.S.-Peruvian peace plan that he claimed could have

brought a cease-fire today. He said Britain was pursuing the only surviving diplomatic option, a U.N. plan he described as having a "similar basis" to the Pervuian proposals.

"The Argentine government claims to have accepted these (U.N.) ideas. We are skeptical of this claim," Pym

Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher said the British government accepted another peace plan put forward by U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar as a "framework" for negotiations. But she said British military activity would continue until Argentina agreed to remove its troops from the Falklands.

Informed sources said Perez de Cuellar's plan calls for a cease-fire, a phased withdrawal of Argentine and British forces from the war zone, and U.N. administration of the Falklands while Britain and Argentina negotiate their future. Argentina responded to this with a statement accepting U.N. "intervention" and proposing an immediate cease-fire but saying nothing about the rest

Mrs. Thatcher said this was 'a very evident ploy to keepthem in possession of their illgotten gains."

The Argentine government announced that it sent Deputy Foreign Minister Enrique Ros to U.N. headquarters in New York Thursday night to discuss possible ways to end the undeclared war.

An Argentine war bulletin Thursday said 19 of its troops had been killed and 37 wounded in British attacks on the Falklands since Saturday. It said this included eight killed and six wounded in a helicopter attack on the patrol boat Sobral Monday, and it was assumed that the rest were casualties in the British air attacks on the Falklands airstrips.

The casualty summary apparently did not include losses aboard the cruiser General Belgrano, which a British submarine torpedoed and sank last Sunday outside the blockade zone declared by Britain. The Argentine government has reported the rescue of 680 crewmen, and the ship's full complement was 1.042. But unofficial reports said it might not have been fully manned.

In addition to the two pilots missing Thurday, the British have reported 22 dead. Twenty of them died when an Argentine missile set the destroyer Sheffield afire and forced its abandonment, and 24 other Sheffield crewmen were injunred, one seriously, the British Defense Ministry announced Thurday.

Quick Action Not Likely To Be Seen

WASHINGTON (AP) -Despite new declarations of Reagan administration support, proposals to restore prayer in public schools and prohibit busing for desegregation are unlikely to be approved in Congress this vear.

Democratic opposition in the House, the likelihood of a liberal filibuster in the Senate and the press of other business seem likely to torpedo quick action on those issues during the 97th Con-

Some Democrats said they believe President Reagan is seeking to use social issues like busing and prayer to turn voters' minds away from a faltering economy.

"He is appealing to the public to forget about economic problems and give their attention to things like prayer, abortion and the elimination of busing," said Rep. Don Edwards, D-Calif.

Edwards is a liberal member of the House Judiciary Committee, which has jurisdiction over busing and prayer legislation. He predicted efforts to restore prayer and bar busing will fail in the committee.

On busing, Attorney General William French Smith said for the first time Thursday that he believes a bill in Congress to sharply limit the power of federal courts to order school busing is constitutional.

On school prayer, Reagan announced Thursday at a White House Rose Garden ceremony that he soon will

propose a constitutional amendment to reverse the 1963 Supreme Court decision banning voluntary school praver.

Reagan told a group of 100 conservative religious leaders, including Jerry Falwell of the Majority Majority, that he wants to "restore a freedom our Constitution was always meant to protect."

"No one must ever be forced or coerced or pressured zo take part in any religious exercise, but neither should the government forbid religious practice," Reagan said.

Religious values are "deeply embedded in our national character," Reagan said. The president said "well-

meaning Americans" have taken away the right to pray in select in the name of freedom...For the sake of religious tolerance they have forbidden religious practice in our public classrooms.

"No one will ever convince me that a moment of voluntary prayer will harm a child or threaten a school or state," he said.

The president conceded it would be difficult to get such an amendment through Congress, where a two-thirds vote would be necessary in the House and Senate. Once through Congress the measure would have to be ratified by three-fourths of the state legislatures to take effect.

In New York City, the B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation League asked Reagan to withdraw his proposal within hours after it was made, calling it "an ill-conceived and divisive attempt to undermine court rulings based on a cardinal principle of the Bill of Rights."







Emergency Personnel React to Disaster Drill

the skin. Vapors are nonirritating, and deaden the sense of smell. Some of these materials are highly inflammable, and containers may explode in the heat of a fire."

The drill was set up to fulfill requirements of Deaf Smith General Hospital as part of its accreditation process. Only a handful of people knew it was coming, including Spain, hospital administrator Jim Bullard, police Chief Don Brush, and Sheriff Travis

McPherson.

"It (the drill) was necessary if for nothing more than to let us see how we respond in a situation like that," Bullard said. "And, we are required for our accreditation to perform one outside disaster per year."


Involved in the drill were firemen, policemen, sheriff's department personnel, ambulance personnel, emergency room personnel, and local physicians and nurses, none of whom knew the drill was coming.

The victims were HHS Key Club members, who had spent as much as two hours getting their "wounds" put on and setting the tragedy up. A total of 13 victims were placed at the scene, with two of them supposed to be dead as emergency personnel arrived.

Only a few minutes after the alarm was sounded the first volunteer firemen arrived, some of them in their private vehicles. As they ran to the scene, they were informed by Spain or hospital representative Shawn Poland that they "were dead."

Realism was such that the intersection quickly became a collection of curious onlookers, newspeople, confused rescuers, and the "victims."

In fairness, Spain pointed out that the tanker used in the drill was one that had just a few hours before been used at a fire at the city dump, and many of the firemen responding to the call recognized it as a city vehicle.

"We had just used that tanker to haul water to the dump," Spain said. "Many of the firemen knew that and they just thought they were still hauling water and came right on in."

Still, the truck had been tagged with a red placard with the symbol "10-51" on it. According to Spain the firemen should have been a little more cautious in responding and taken care to put on their gas masks before moving in.

"This reminded us that any time a tank truck has placards on it you should proceed with caution," Spain added

After cancelling the toxic gas part of the drill, the rescuers began extricating the victims, assisting hospital and ambulance personnel. The victims were examined as to injury, and transported to the hospital in order of severity of injury.

At the hospital the victims were met at the emergency entrance by an organized team of medical personnel. Dr. Duffy McBrayer was at the scene to assess the severity of injury and to direct the victims to the proper area for treatment, whether it was the emergency room or to

Volunteers were on hand to help the ambulance drivers unload the victims into the hospital.

This was the first time, according to Bullard, that the hospital had used the rear emergency entrance in this type of drill. "We usually come through the front door right into the emergency area," Bullard said. "We found the back doors to be a

little more congested than the front, but it was better for crowd control since more curious people come to the front door in an emergency."

"I think two things we learned in the drill was that it showed the firemen to be a little more careful of what they walk up on," Bullard continued. "And, we learned to appreciate them (the firemen) even that much more."

"We know we can take care of people once they are pulled out of a situation, but we can't get them out," he explained. "We would have been in serious trouble if the gas had been there because we would have had maybe eight people at the scene to take care of some 20 victims."

In conclusion, Spain said, "this was pretty realistic, except for the fact that an accident involving a toxic chemical in this area probably would have occurred on Highway 60 on the railroad tracks. You would be surprised as what comes through Hereford on trucks on by rail."

"We were reminded of a lot of things...we learned a lot of things here today," he said.



'Inside the Third Reich' Rides On Clackety Wheels

NEW YORK (AP) - ABC's "Inside the Third Reich," based on the memoirs of Nazi war criminal Albert Speer, goes deeper than the documentaries on Germany and World War II to provide a personal perspective on the power of power and the people who used it to maim the

Speer's best-selling autobiography, written during his 20 years in prison and published in 1970, comes to television Sunday and Monday nights in a production that resembles a classy chassis slowed by clackety wheels. This five-hour movie will keep viewers in their seats, not on the edge of

Filmed in West Germany, "Inside the Third Reich" examines the men behind the monster - Hitler's inner circle. They are portrayed as a band of crude maniacs, except for the sophisticated Speer, the only important Nazi to plead guilty at the Nuremberg war crime trials.

Speer was born into Germany's social registry. His father, played with aplomb by Sir John Gielgud, is an architect.

With his superior breeding, Speer's sins may be viewed

Actress Misses Premiere of 'Evita'

VIENNA, Austria (AP) -It was two nights before opening, and Isabel Weicken was going home from a successful preview performance in the title role of "Evita," the musical based on the life of the tempestuous Argentine leader. She never made the premiere.

As she approached her apartment building late March 12, two men smashed her nose and eyes. The beating left her face covered with bruises, almost ended her career and caused an uproar that is still shaking Vienna's staid cultural

Several days later police arrested the suspected organizer of the assault who said he was paid 25,000 schillings - about \$1,500 - to arrange the attack.

The man told police that he was paid by Werner Ploner, the former boyfriend, agent and housemate of Vera Gutman, who alternated in the role of Eva Peron with Miss Weicken.

"The whole thing is hard to believe, it's so crazy," said the 42-year-old Ploner, one of Austria's leading theatrical

Space Stations May Be Harmful

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) - Large orbiting space stations planned for the future may spontaneously generate enough electricity to create levels of X-rays dangerous to astronauts, according to a University of Iowa scientist.

Dr. Stanley Shawhan said at a briefing Thursday that an instrument flown aboard the space shuttle found that the craft generated electrical activity as it sped at orbital speeds through the plasma fields of outer space.

The electrical levels did not reach hazardous strengths because the craft was not large enough and was not in space long enough, Shawhan said. But he added that massive space stations planned by the National Space and Aeronautics Administration may face serious problems from the electricity.

"If you are talking about space structures that are miles in dimensions, then you're talking about electrical potentials that are kilovolts (thousands of volts)," Shawhan said. "With kilovolt potentials, you get deep penetration of charged particles and you X-ray production."

The scientist said the X-rays would be strong

enough to expose film such as that used by dentists.

"Those X-rays could be dangerous for (space walkers) or just for living conditions," said Shawhan.

Electrostatic currents build up on the spacecraft in a manner similar to creating static electricity by shuffling one's feet over a carpet. If the static electricity, or field of electrical potential, is not harmlessly discharged in space, it can convert ions and electrons in the plasma field into X-rays.

Shawhan said the electrical potential created also attracts electrons and ions that flow back against the spacecraft with sufficient force to degrade some painted surfaces. The phenomenon could also cause short circuits in some electrical instruments aboard the craft, he said. The comments came dur-

ing a Washington briefing monitored here. During the briefing, several scientists reported preliminary results from experiments flown last March on the space shuttle orbiter Columbia. The scientists said the experiments proved that the space shuttle would be a valuable platform for conducting scientific studies in orbit.

Miss Gutman gave 10 performances before withdrawing last month from the musical. "My career is ruined," she told reporters before leaving. Friends say the young actress is bitter and depressed, and has vowed to start over in the United

Because of the notoriety, Miss Gutman said she received a petition from 180 West German artists asking that she be banned from performing in their country. The actress also lost her German manager and a number of scheduled television appearances.

The 34-year-old Miss Weicken returned to the role on April 6 after a nose operation and an extended convalescence on the island of Cyprus. Although the musical is not selling out, it has been doing well at the box office, and Miss Weicken has been receiving standing ovations. It closes tonight.

The musical by Tim Rice and Andrew Lloyd Webber was being done in repertory with Lehar's "The Merry Widow."

Meanwhile, three men remained in custody for the attack, and the Vienna prosecutor's office will not say if charges are to be filed against Ploner.

Oil, Gas Consumption to Decline

RENO, Nev. (AP) - Oil and gas consumption in the United States will continue a steady decline next year, signaling "fundamental changes in energy use patterns" in the nation, a group of independent petroleum producers said Thursday.

Overall energy use should decline for the third straight year, while oil demand will decrease "for an unprecedented fourth consecutive year," according to a report issued by the Independent Petroleum Association of America.

The group, which is holding its midyear meeting here this week, said oil demand is expected to fall 4.5 percent in 1982, primarily because of the recession, energy conservation and a shift to other fuels such as coal and nuclear






