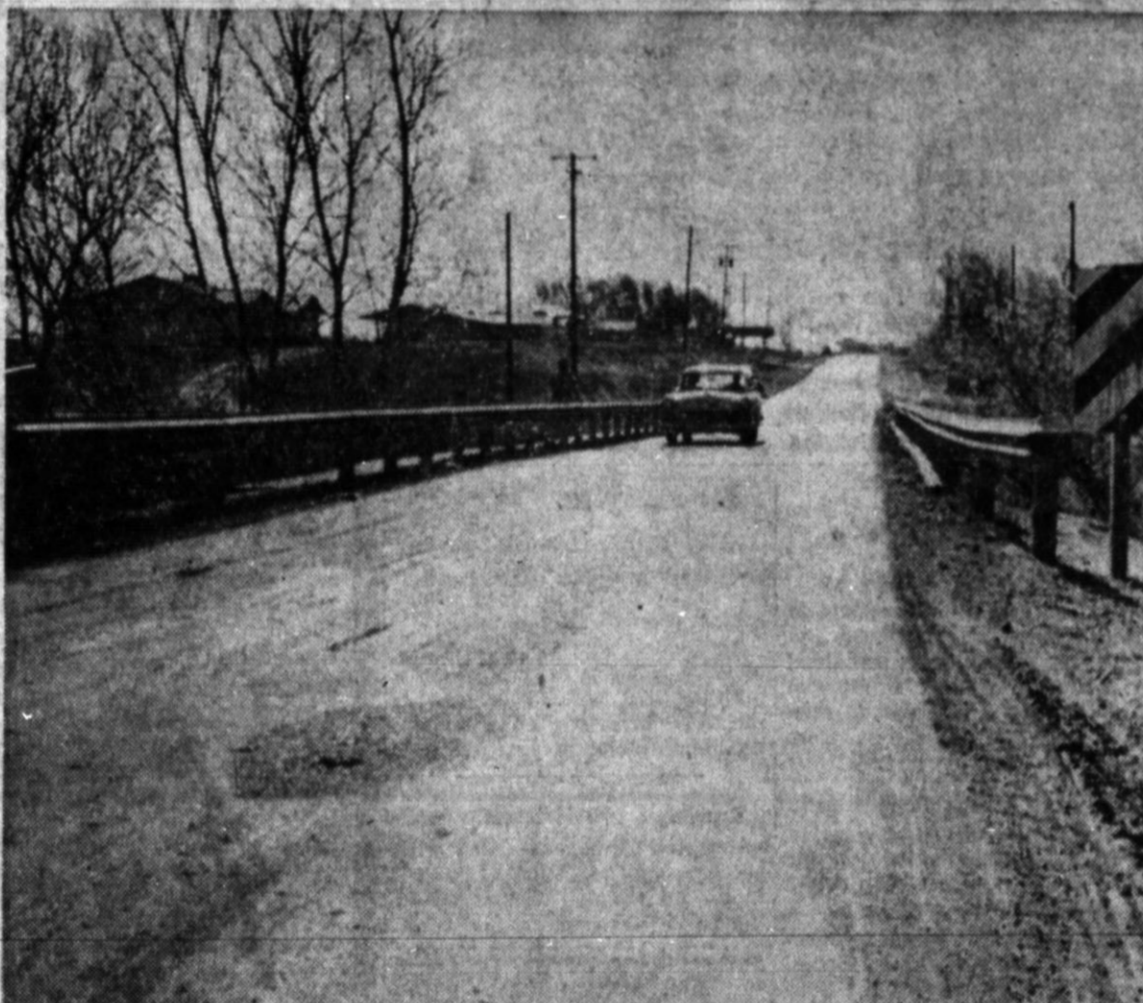

### New Bridge For Tierra Blanca Creek Planned

The construction of a new bridge across Tierra Blanca Creek, on S. Main St., just east of the golf course, has been authorized by the Texas Highway Department. Cost of the bridge is \$77,000. It was announced that work will begin on the project as soon as final planning is completed. W. V. York, senior resident engineer, will be in charge of construction. At the November meeting of the Texas Highway Commission, \$20,000,000 was appropriated for improvements on 3,600 miles of existing farm to market roads in 187 counties. Surface and base strengthening and bridge widening and replacement is included in the work.

### Yule Trimmings Begin To Show

Hereford will take on a festive mood this week as Hereford Jaycee members are scheduled to start placing Christmas decorations on Main St. and Highway 60 today.

Decorations of aluminum garland and colored lights will be placed on Main St., from First to Fifth streets, and on Highway 60, from Highway 51 to Roosevelt. Some decorations also will be installed along Park Avenue.

Decorations this year will include 40 strands of lights, which will be extended across the width of the street and highway, and a 30-foot Christmas tree, which will be placed at the center of the intersection of Third and Main in the downtown district.

This will be the 10th year that the Jaycees, in cooperation with the Merchants Committee of Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce, have undertaken this project.

Four children, ranging in age from 17 months to 14 years, were declared dependent and neglected in a District Court session Friday afternoon and were placed in custody of the Deaf Smith County Child Welfare Board. Judge Harry Schultz presided.

## Migrant Labor Desires Dignity, Economic Reality

In helping to solve problems facing migrant workers and farmers during harvest seasons, Carlos Castillon, executive secretary of the Texas Council of Migrant Labor, told members of the Hereford Migrant Housing Committee that the formation of the local committee should set a precedent among Texas cities facing the same problems. The step that has been taken

is a positive step toward the future solution of the problem. Castillon told the group in a meeting at 3 p.m. Wednesday in the Hospitality Room of the Hereford State Bank.

"But," he explained, "to improve housing conditions is definitely not enough. The program must go much further than that."

In presenting basic data collected by the 56th Legislature-appointed Council, Castillon said that the two basic needs of migrant workers are "economic reality and human dignity."

Being on the move, he explained, the migrant worker cannot make his needs known to citizens. Making their needs known to community citizens, Castillon said, is one of the main objectives of the newly-formed Council.

"As migrant workers stay in a community for a relatively short time and move from place to place often," he said, "they miss education and health facilities. Programs to create these facilities must be formed if a solution to this problem is to be found."

Many communities, he said, get the "cream of the crop" of labor in their locality by making programs such as these and other attractive features available. This helps the economic status of any community, he added.

Many communities, he informed the group, form "labor pools" to get the best labor possible from out-of-state sources. In a "labor pool," he explained, employers advance funds to workers for transportation to the employers' area. He indicated that that form of obtaining competent labor might be helpful to this area's economy.

Castillon said that there are five labor camps in Texas, and the local camp is the only one of its type in the West Texas area. From 25,000 to 30,000 workers move from place to place annually searching for jobs in the state.

"The state must compete with at least 21 other states in getting the best possible help from various sources," Castillon said. "In most cases, workers go to areas which

## Herd Ends Dismal Season, Losing To Phillips, 55 - 6

Hereford's never-say-die Whitefaces got clawed on the ground and out-manuevered in the air as the Phillips Black-hawks struck with vengeance again and again at Phillips Friday night.

When the smoke from the furious attack cleared, Phillips' first, second, third and fourth teams had racked up 55 points, while Hereford finally managed to score six points on the final play of the game.

For the Herd it was the end of a disastrous season during which they managed to win a pair while losing eight. Phillips ended the season with a 9-1 record, losing only to Levelland, who won their second straight district title by downing Littlefield 16-0 Friday night.

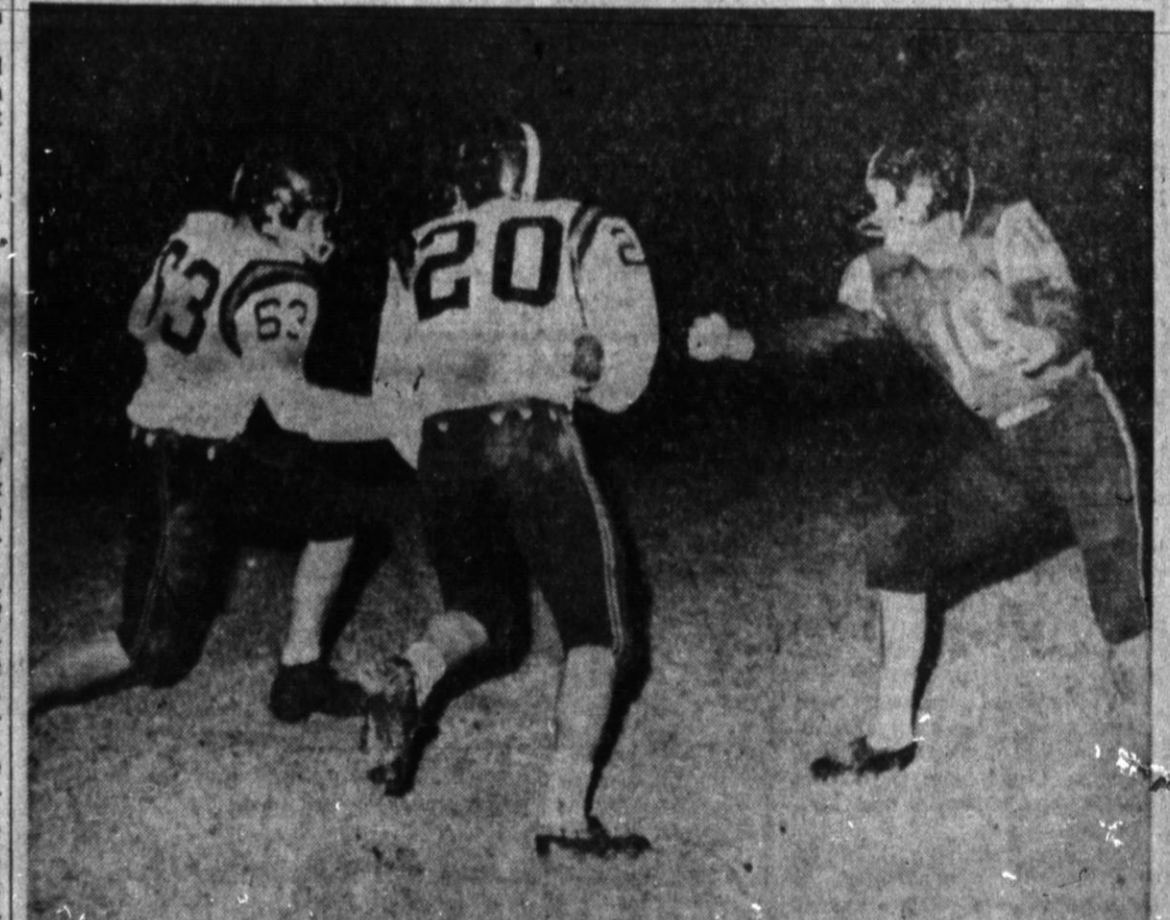
The 49-point spread Friday night was the largest margin of victory chalked up against Hereford this year, the first for head coach Bobby Williams,

who had been line coach at Phillips during the past few years.

Coach Joe Means left in his first team just long enough to assure victory and then started pouring reserves onto the field.

After an exchange of punts, Hereford was penalized back to its eight. Quarterback Billy Dirks was hit in the end zone while trying to pass and Phillips recovered for a safety.

## County Red Cross Recommends Fitness Program

The setting up of a weekly physical fitness program was recommended by Bill Hardwick at the meeting of the board of directors of Deaf Smith County Red Cross Chapter in the Friendship Room of the Hereford State Bank at 3:30 p.m. Friday.

Reports from Mr. and Mrs. Bill Hardwick, who last week returned from the Texas State Red Cross Chapter Conference in San Antonio, highlighted the meeting.

At the San Antonio meeting, Hardwick said, a Red Cross official said people of the United States are becoming "over-motorized, over-mechanized, over-tranquilized and over-televisionized." Hardwick attended meetings on safety services and water

safety programs and Mrs. Hardwick attended meetings on disaster and public relation programs.

Hardwick suggested the physical fitness program as it would "maintain ability and agility to cope with everyday accidents in work and recreation."

Object of the program, he said, should be to change people from spectators to participants and that the program is a community responsibility. The safety meeting, he said, stressed more emphasis on outboard-powered water craft safety.

"Approximately six million outboard-powered boats were responsible for 50 per cent of drownings and 75 per cent of water accidents in 1957,"

Hardwick said. "Outboard power is increasing and control of the boats is decreasing."

At the present time, Hardwick pointed out, there are no restrictions, supervision, safety services or personnel to guard against accidents at Buffalo Lake.

With the cooperation of Potter and Randall County Red Cross chapters, he said, provisions for equipment and personnel to supervise lake activity should be made available.

Hardwick said that tentative plans for a water show at the swimming pool next summer are now being made.

At the San Antonio meeting, he said, they met with Fred Laise, manager of the midwestern area of American Red Cross, and with several other

official holding state offices.

"The local Red Cross Chapter was very well known to them for its activities and services and the fact that the chapter offers more services than many chapters in large cities," Hardwick told the group. "They attributed most of the results to Corinne Neeley, who they say has just as complete an understanding of Red Cross work as anybody in the organization today."

Mrs. Hardwick said that officials at the meeting said that to many people, the Red Cross has become known as a "cold organization." That belief, she said, has been caused as the result of a few weak points about the organization.

"If any chapter notices any weak points," Mrs. Hardwick said, "those weak points should be done away with immediately."

About 15 board members attended the business session of Friday's meeting. They reported on various phases of the chapter, including water safety, first aid, disaster and blood programs.

The author describes the economic prospects of a region whose way of life was once assumed to be enforced property. He concludes by saying "The South is no longer the Economic Problem No. 1 of the nation. In many ways it looks like the No. 1 Economic Opportunity. This region that formerly exported its talent and imported its capital is now importing talent and exporting capital."

Mrs. Kerr cited examples proving this statement, and used a chart to illustrate the comparative economic growth of the three sections — the North, the South and the West.

view of an article by Phillip Graham, "A Song Was Born, The South 'Dixie'."

She said, in part, "This article traces the story of a song the 'South' gave to the rest of the world, commonly known as Dixie. It was an original plantation song written by Dan Emmett in 1859 and became one of Lincoln's campaign songs in 1860. It achieved national acclaim the next year when used in a burlesque show in New Orleans. Each region produced its own version but it was too American to remain the property of any one section."

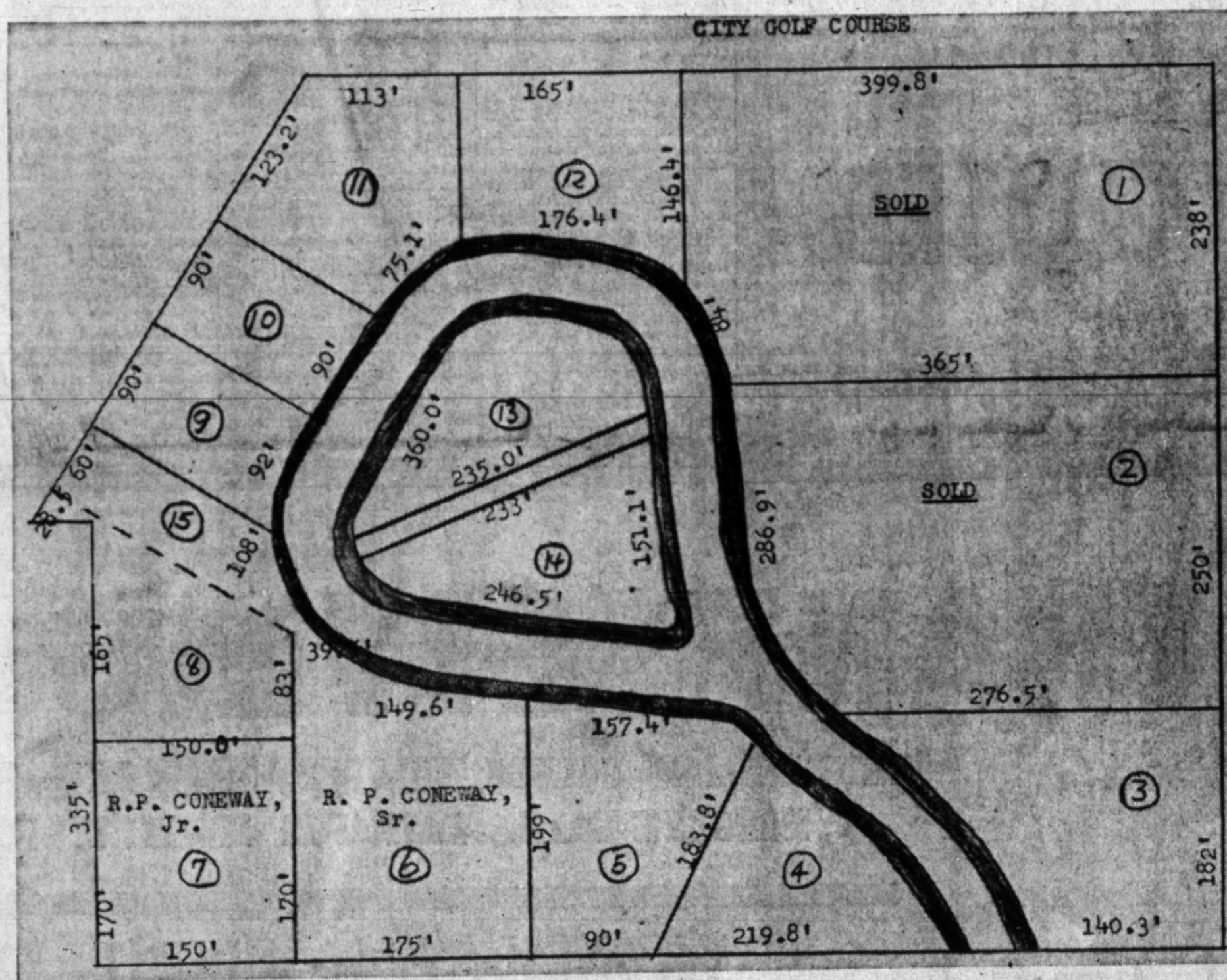

Roberta attended Panhandle Christian College after it was established in Hereford. Many incidents from that period were relayed with the aid of faded, yellow pictures, including one of Roberta wearing a daring, for the time, basketball suit, and

another of the well-known Glee Club, which made trips to Canyon City (now Canyon), Plainview and Amarillo.

In 1916, Roberta married C. H. Dyar, a Hereford businessman and farmer, in a ceremony performed by the Rev. Nance. Together, they travelled and worked with their flowers. He died in 1945.

Most amusing picture, at least to the audience, was of Roberta and several other Hereford ladies doing a take-off on the World War I Liberty Girls during the 50th anniversary celebration of the First Christian Church in Hereford.

Just over seven years ago, Roberta married S. O. Wilson. His hardest job this week was trying to get Roberta to the program, at the instance of friends.

It was made doubly difficult since not even he was told that his wife was to be honored at the dinner.

Roberta squirmed slightly when reminded that she had turned down an invitation to go to Amarillo with a former boyfriend and then had encountered him in an Amarillo restaurant that same day while she was having her first date with S. O. Wilson.

## Winter Months' Driving Safety Rules Are Listed

AUSTIN — Technique in driving, as in any field of activity, is developed to the point of perfection only after much practice and experience. It was declared today by J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association.

"The stars in sports, music and on the stage did not develop their talents overnight," he said. "Neither does a driver become a real pro at the wheel without knowing the rules of safe driving and following them faithfully."

The safety official called attention of Texas motorists to the five fundamental tips for safe driving during winter months:

1. It's up to you. You know that driving conditions are less favorable during the winter. It's up to you to winterize your car, to winterize your driving techniques — and to winterize your determination to avoid accidents.
2. Keep windshield and windows clear. Be sure that your wiper blades, your heater, and your defroster are operating properly. Clean frost and ice from the windshield and from all windows of your car. Ventilate to keep the inside of your windows from fogging.
3. Get the "feel" of the road. In order to avoid unintentional sliding or spinning of your wheels, occasionally try your brakes or gently press your accelerator while driving slowly and as traffic and highway conditions permit. Then adjust your speed to road and weather conditions.
4. Follow at a safe distance. Keep well back of the vehicle ahead so that you will have plenty of room to stop. It takes three to twelve times as far to stop on snow and ice as it does on dry pavement. You may find it hard to explain why you couldn't stop when the other fellow did.
5. Pump your brakes. The best technique for stopping on slick roads, while maintaining full control of your car, is a fast up-and-down pumping of your brakes. Jamming and "freezing" on your brakes is almost certain to lock your wheels. This is likely to throw

your car into an uncontrollable and dangerous skid.

"Faithful adherence to these rules will help even the newly licensed driver to become proficient in operating his vehicle under hazardous conditions," Music declared. "The person who conscientiously applies these rules will develop driving techniques that will move him from the clumsy skidding and stalling class into the expert class."

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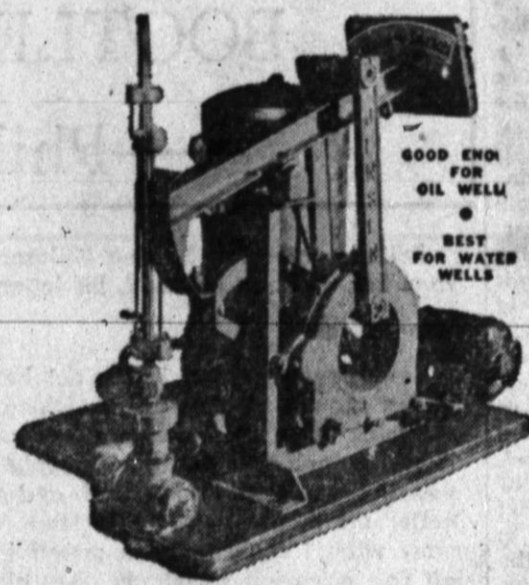
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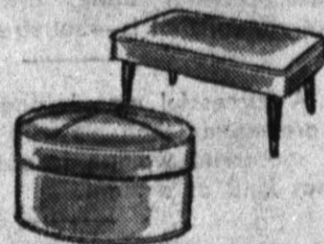

"Objective of the program is to provide solid subject-matter foundation in scientific fields for teachers who are not well-prepared in these subjects, and to update the sometimes years-old preparation of some teachers," said Dr. W. D. Compton, head of the WT chemistry department.

Dr. Compton has been named director of the Institute. He will attend a meeting of Institute directors from all over the nation Dec. 12-13 in Washington.

One of the most attractive features of the institute is that nearly 50 teachers who apply for the summer's work will be paid a stipend of \$75 a week, plus \$15 a week for each dependent to a maximum of four. Winners of the award will also receive a mileage allowance for one round trip from home to Canyon.

WT's Summer Institute, first to be offered in the Panhandle or West Texas, will coincide with regular summer term, which opens June 2 and continues for 12 weeks. Both fundamental and advanced courses will be offered in the departments of chemistry, physics, and mathematics.

Applications from science and mathematics teachers will be received until Feb. 16, 1959. Dr. Compton said, and announcement of winners will be made April 1. Teachers awarded the grants may enroll for college credit, or just for the work, he said.

"The main purpose of the Institute is to provide the work, and not necessarily the college credit," Dr. Compton said.

Scientists of national stature will be sought by the Institute for lectures and seminars. Dr. Compton said. The program of classroom and laboratory work, informal discussion meetings of students and staff, and field trips to scientific establishments in the area will be conducted by Dr. Compton, Dr. J. S. Urban, head of the physics department, and Dr. H. L. Cook, head of the mathematics department.

"Institute participants will be selected by the staff from in-service teachers and science and mathematics in the area served by the college," Dr. Compton said. "There will be no formal geographic limitation on applicants, however, and a number of out-of-state participants is expected."

Although the number of participants receiving stipends will be limited to 48, others who apply may enroll for the work.

"The stipend is probably the most attractive feature of the program," Dr. Compton said. "It enables the teacher to acquire course work he needs at little or no financial sacrifice."

Participants will live on campus and will spend an average of 30-40 hours per week in classroom and laboratory work. Social and recreational activities are planned as part of the Institute's program.

Information regarding the Institute, and applications for the stipends will be sent to school officials throughout West Texas and the Tri-State area about Jan. 1, Dr. Compton said.

National Science Foundation institutes have been held previously at the universities of Oklahoma and New Mexico, but none have been held west of Brownwood in Texas.

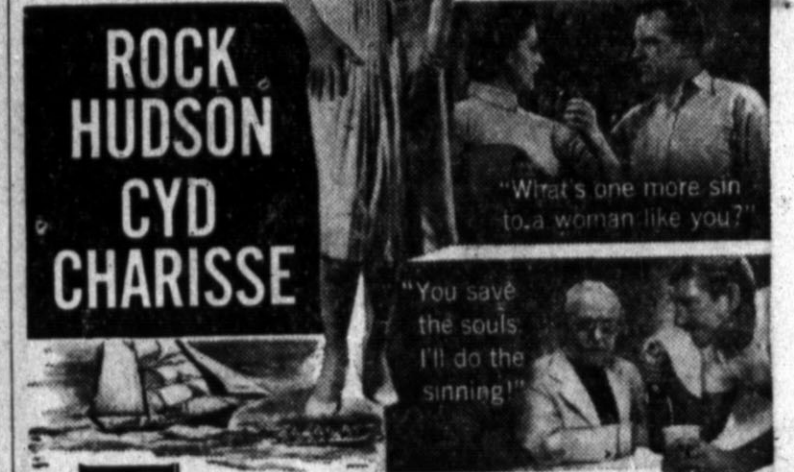
