McConnell, one of the University of Wyoming's all-time football greats, was the defensive end on The Associated Press All-America team of 1951. His professional career as a football player was short and he returned to his native Laramie to go into business with his brothers, Albert Jr. and Harry.

and Harry. They operate McConnell Brothers Diversified Interests, a business founded by their father

0 years ago. Principal products of the enterprise are processing rabbit meat for mink farms throughout the country and rabbit fur used by felt manufacturers. Some of the meat is fed to the 500 mink the McConnells own.

The plant processed 250,000 of the animals between November and March when the fur quality is the best. When running at full capacity the plant employs up to 50 men. The annual payroll is \$40,000.

Rabbits come from an 11-state area, stretching from Oregon to South Dakota and from Texas, through Kansas

The McConnells pay from 15 to 40 cents per rabbit. Most of the raw material, Dewey said, comes from hunters of all ages. "They probably would hunt the rabbits if there wasn't any payment," he added.

When the rabbit season opens, the McConnels send their purchasing agents with seven trucks into areas where the rabbit population is heavy.

Farmers and ranchers cooperate because a band of hungry jack rabbits has been known to do as much as \$10,000 in dam-

age to a single farm.

McConnell said farmers and ranchers told him that three to 10 rabbits will eat as much as one cow. One farmer told the one-time football player that he





EISENHOWER LIKES NEW PLAN WHEREBY

Top Students Gain Recognition With Varsity Letter Jackets

Recently a Denison, Texas, superintendent came up with the idea of awarding "Varsity Scholastic Jackets" to outstanding scholars, along similar lines as awards made to football players, basketball players, band students and in other extracurricular fields. The idea struck a popufar keynote across the country and last week President Eisenhower personally sent information on the plan to the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare for careful study and possible recommendations.

The idea, simple enough, is aimed toward giving equal recognition to scholastic achievement with that to athletic prowess. Supt. W. H. Goodgion, originator of the plan, has a practical 12-point system on which the awards are based, and reports much interest in his school, where it will be put into practice this year, when 24 letter jacket awards will be made.

Some football coaches, in constant competition with high school bands for brawn, have already been complaining unofficially because band member awards often equal those in athletics. There is also the point that athletic awards are generally made from gate receipts, while scholastic awards as suggested will necessarily have to come out of the tax payer's pocket.

WILL COMPLETE PIPELINE SOON

Oil from the Motley County Roaring Springs Field will soon move to market through a pipeline which will intersect the Stanolind line at Whiteflat. C. A. Prater, representative of the Scurlock Oil Co., Pacific Coast Building, says Houston is securing easements for the pipeline right of way for the approximately 16 miles between the field and point of juncture. An acre of land has been purchased from Jess Perkins for the erection of a pumping station at Whiteflat. The eight inch pipe line will have a capacity of about 8,000 barrels per day. The line will follow the old Matador Northern Railway right-of-way for part of the distance, according to reports, and pass Matador east of East Mound cemetery. It has been estimated that construction of the line can be completed within approximately 30 days, provided favorable weather is encountered and other factors affecting the work do not develop problems.-MATADOR TRIBUNE

The Republicans say the Democrats elected a lot of spenders, and the Democrats say if it hadn't been for them the Republicans would have spent five billion dollars more than they did in the last session.

What puzzles me about this is that in the same newspaper I read a statement by the former president of the National Council of Economic Advisors that "the American consumer could be called the hero of the recent recession. The consumer's sustained and confident spending sparked the upturn."

As I understand this, the public kept on spending money and whipped the recession, if they'd held on to their money we might have had a real depression, and what I want to know is why can't the government be as broadgauged about this as you and me, although it must have been you, not me, who's the hero, as I didn't do much spending, on account of the non-progressive, recessionproducing credit policies of some stores. However, from long experience, I'd like to hasten to say that this question is mostly theoretical, actually the government does believe in spending, but not in admitting it. and while I have never seen an administration that campaigned on more spending, on the other hand I've never seen one that stayed in office on that basis. Leastwise, each administration has spent more than the previous one for the past 30 years, and you can't look at the budget and tell which party drew it up.

The way it looks to me, while the country can't spend itself into prosperity, on the other hand it can't economize itself there either, which still leaves the question of how we ever got any prosperity in the first place. In short, I don't know anymore about economics than the

All I know is that while maybe a dollar saved is a dollar earned, still on the other hand a dollar earned these days sure ain't no dollar saved.
