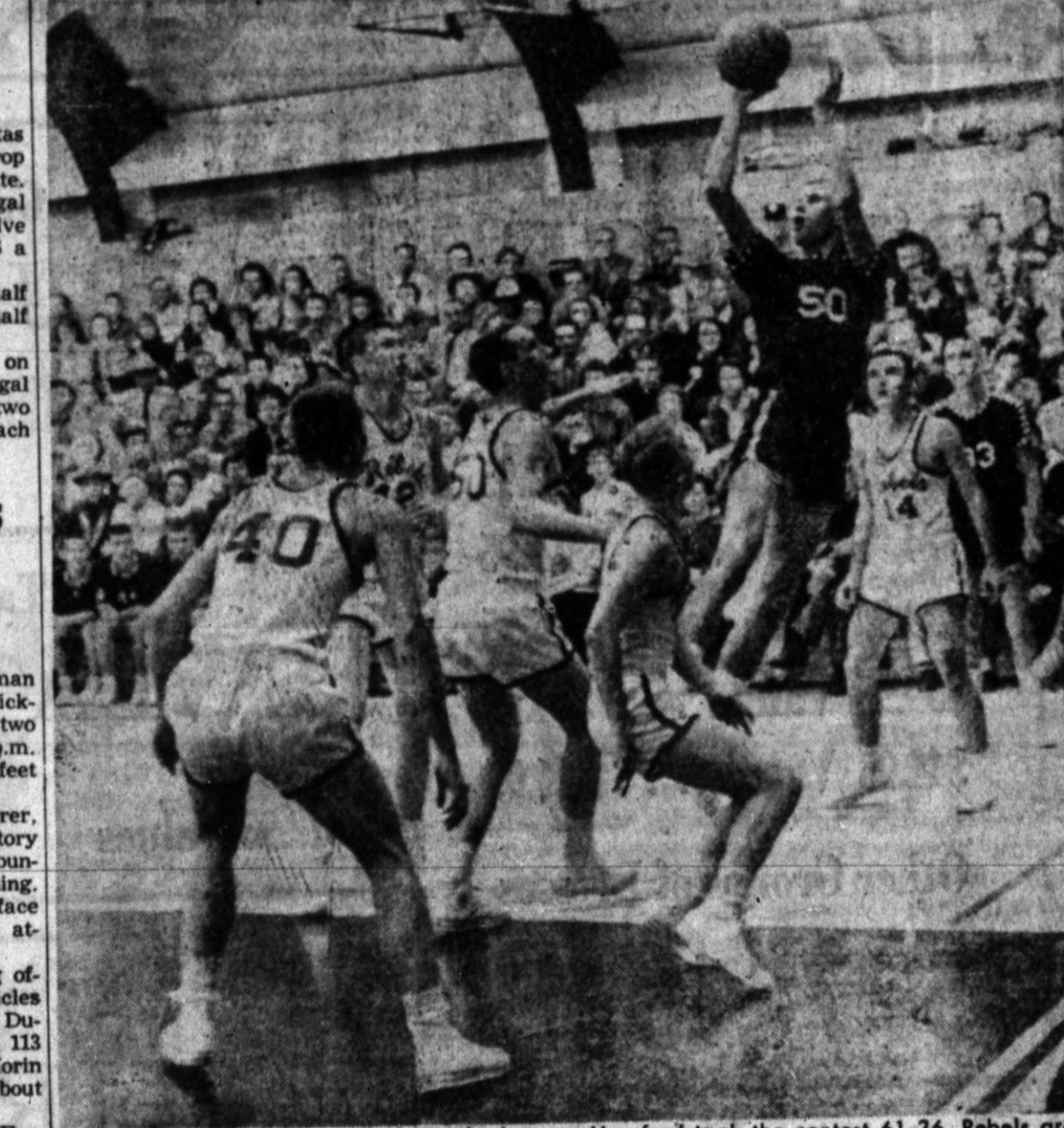

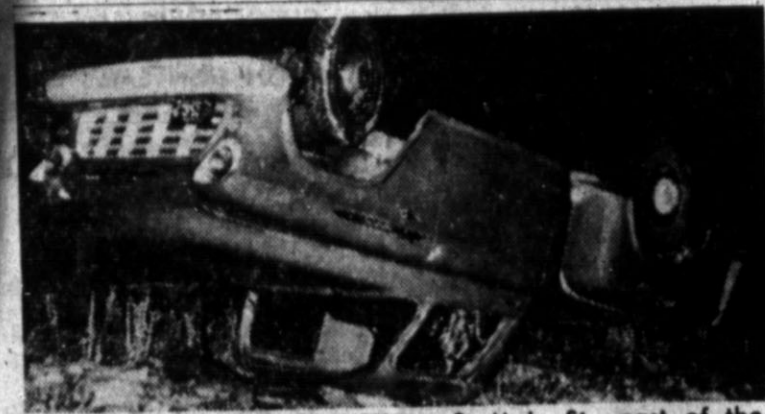

# McConnell Brothers Find Gold Mine In Rabbit Meat

LARAMIE, Wyo. (AP) — The lowly rabbit is the foundation of a business that is grossing \$125,000 a year for onetime All-America end Dewey McConnell and his brothers.

McConnell, one of the University of Wyoming's all-time football greats, was the defensive end on The Associated Press All-America team of 1951. His professional career as a football player was short and he returned to his native Laramie to go into business with his brothers, Albert Jr. and Harry.

They operate McConnell Brothers Diversified Interests, a business founded by their father 30 years ago.

Principal products of the enterprise are processing rabbit meat for mink farms throughout the country and rabbit fur used by felt manufacturers. Some of the meat is fed to the 500 mink the McConnells own.

The plant processed 250,000 of the animals between November and March when the fur quality is the best. When running at full capacity the plant employs up to 50 men. The annual payroll is \$40,000.

Rabbits come from an 11-state area, stretching from Oregon to South Dakota and from Texas, through Kansas to Montana.

The McConnells pay from 15 to 40 cents per rabbit. Most of the raw material, Dewey said, comes from hunters of all ages. "They probably would hunt the rabbits if there wasn't any payment," he added.

When the rabbit season opens, the McConnells send their purchasing agents with seven trucks into areas where the rabbit population is heavy.

Farmers and ranchers cooperate because a band of hungry jack rabbits has been known to do as much as \$10,000 in damage to a single farm.

McConnell said farmers and ranchers told him that three to 10 rabbits will eat as much as one cow. One farmer told the one-time football player that he

got only one, instead of the customary two, cutting of alfalfa. Rabbits got the rest, then turned to stacks of cured alfalfa hay.

McConnell said 55,000 to 60,000 rabbits were taken in the Gillette area of northeastern Wyoming in the 1955-56 season. He said other purchasers have bought as many as 100,000 rabbits in one Kansas town.

Sometimes, when the hunting is particularly good, the Mc-

Connell brothers have to charter additional trucks to haul their raw material.

Rabbit population appears to run in cycles. An area where hundreds graze one season may not have a single one the next year.

The brothers refuse to worry about a source of supply.

They've expanded their Laramie plant and are planning new operations.

They are looking enviously on the market for dog and cat food.

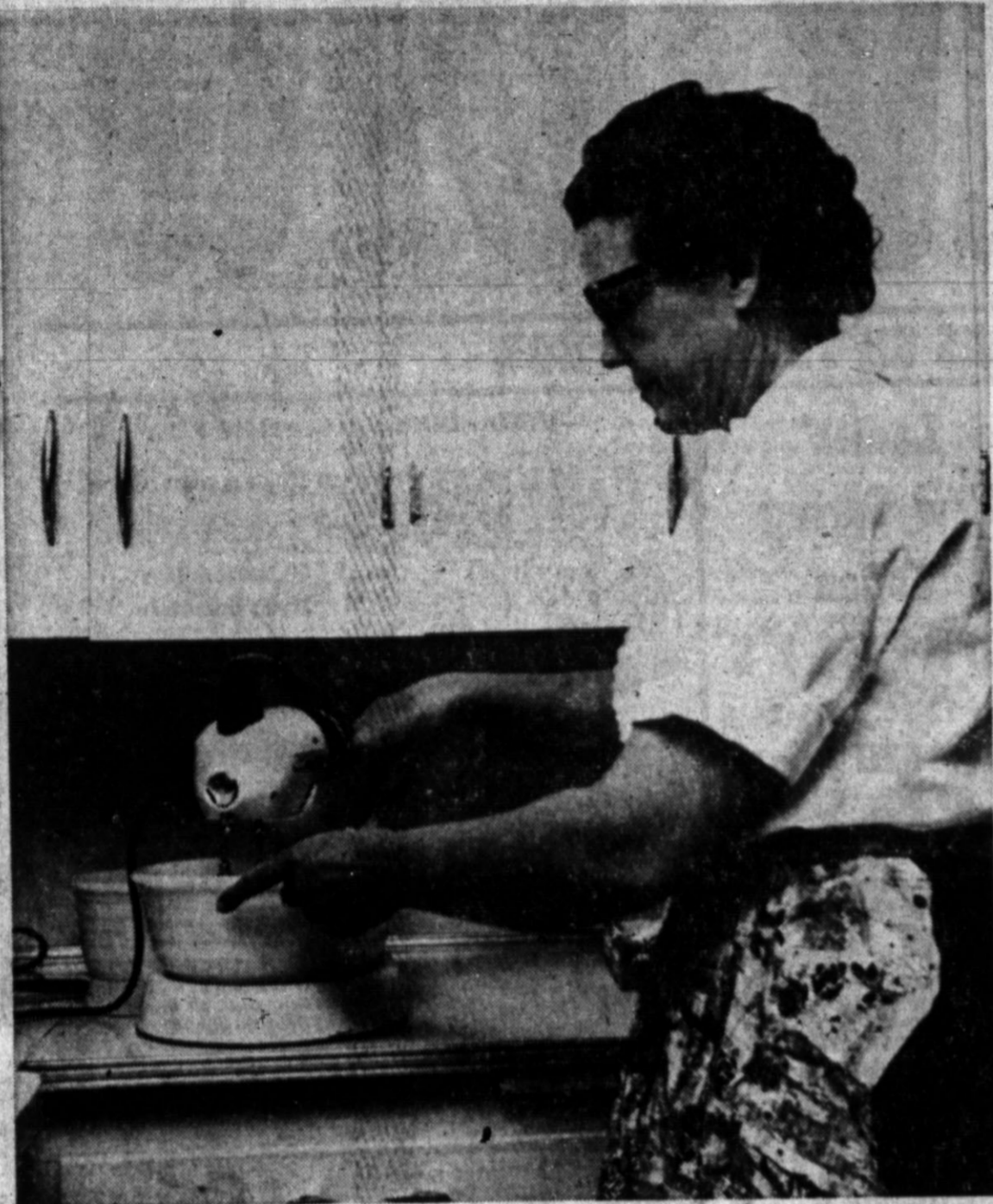

## Let's Cook Something

One of the nice things about Holiday Time is the anticipation and preparation that heralds its approach. You'll notice it first in the kitchen where fruit cakes, cookies and puddings fill the house with pungent aroma of spice and everything nice. You'll be looking for special menus and dishes and will appeal to your family as well as please your most fastidious guests.

Here are some recipes taken from the files of four of Hereford's good cooks, and are just right for now and on through the holiday season.

## Let's Bake An Orange Cake

When Mrs. Tom Robinson, who likes to make other people happy, wants to do something nice for someone, she makes an orange cake — and there isn't anything much nicer that she could do.

**ORANGE CAKE**  
1 package dates  
1 cup pecans  
1 can or box of coconut  
2 cups white sugar

4 cups flour  
1 1/2 cups buttermilk  
2 tablespoons grated orange peel  
1 cup butter - or other shortening  
1/2 teaspoon soda in buttermilk  
1 scant teaspoon baking powder in flour.

4 eggs  
Place cut-up dates, pecans, coconut and orange peel in pan with flour and mix well. Cream

butter and sugar together and add beaten eggs and milk. Combine the two mixtures and pour in greased tube-pan and bake one and one-half hours at 350-F degrees. (Place pan of water in bottom of oven.)

### TOPPING

While cake is cooking boil one cup orange juice, three tablespoons of grated orange peel with 2 cups of sugar for three

minutes and set aside. When cake is done remove from oven, run a knife around sides and gradually pour topping over cake. Let set until cool - over night is best, and topping will be crystallized. Remove from pan and keep covered in cool place. The longer it lasts the better it tastes.

## Let's Try Chicken Fricassee

How About Chicken Fricassee? Mrs. Ansel McDowell, who likes to try out new recipes, comes up with this recipe for Chicken Fricassee. It is fine to serve as a main dish and it doesn't suffer too much from waiting. That's why we choose it for a simple fireside supper. In addition to the Fricassee, Mrs. McDowell gives you a recipe for Russian Dressing for use over head lettuce or tossed salad.

**CHICKEN FRICASSEE**  
1 large fryer or 4 or 5 pound stewing chicken  
1 or more cups water  
Mixed with:  
1 can mushroom soup  
1 medium onion (grated or chopped)  
Big squeeze lemon juice  
dash of curry, thyme or cumin  
pinch of salt  
dash of black pepper  
Cut chicken into pieces and coat with seasoned flour. Brown

on both sides in small amount of fat in skillet or Dutch oven. Remove from skillet and place in a casserole. Mix all the other ingredients together and pour over chicken in casserole. Place in oven at 325-F and allow to cook for two or three hours or until chicken is tender. (Celery soup may be substituted for the mushroom soup if you prefer. Serve while hot.)  
**RUSSIAN DRESSING**  
1/3 cup sugar  
1/4 cup vinegar  
1/2 cup salad oil  
1/3 cup catsup  
1/4 cup horseradish  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon paprika  
1 grated onion  
juice of 1 lemon  
Mix in blender or mixer and chill. Use over head lettuce or tossed salad. A pan of hot rolls, a pot of coffee and your favorite dessert makes this a meal to write home about.

## Let's Make Johnny Marzetti

Just about the best in good, old-fashioned home cooking is Johnny Marzetti. It makes an easy-on-you meal and makes a nice choice for before and after turkey-time. Mrs. Earnest Langley persuaded a friend who had gotten the recipe from her daughter while in the Canal Zone to copy it off for her. Here it is for you - just in time for the holidays.

**JOHNNY MARZETTI**  
1/2 pound oleo  
2 medium sized green peppers  
1 stalk celery  
4 medium sized onions  
1 1/2 pounds ground beef  
2 small cans mushrooms  
1 can tomato soup  
1 can tomato paste  
1 can spaghetti sauce  
1 3-oz. bottle stuffed olives  
1 pound grated Longhorn cheese  
2 boxes wide noodles  
salt to taste

Dice the peppers, celery and onions, and saute in oleo until tender. Add ground meat, salt to taste and brown.

Slice mushrooms and add to above, along with tomato soup, tomato paste, tomato sauce and spaghetti sauce. Let simmer until well done.

Cook noodles according to instructions on package, and add to meat mixture. About thirty minutes before serving, add sliced olives and grated cheese. Place in baking dish and heat in oven at 350-degrees oven. A favorite salad, a pan of hot rolls, an appetizing dessert and a pot of hot coffee makes this a perfect meal in any man's language.

## Let's Bake An Apple Cake

Mrs. Mark Woodall gives you two recipes that are especially tuned to the holiday season, although they taste just as good in June as in January. The apple cake is her husband's favorite. His grandmother gave the recipe to her, and the Butterscotch Cookies seem to be favored by everybody.

**APPLE CAKE**  
Cream together:  
2 cups brown sugar  
1 cup shortening  
3 eggs  
Add alternately:  
1 cup cold coffee  
1 teaspoon soda in coffee  
With the following:  
3 cups flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1 teaspoon cloves  
1 teaspoon nutmeg  
1 teaspoon allspice  
1 teaspoon baking powder (Sifted together)  
Then add:  
1 cup nuts  
1 cup chopped dates or raisins  
2 cups diced raw apples  
Bake in two 5x10x3 loaf pans in 350-F oven 45 to 55 minutes.  
Note - This makes wonderful cup cakes. Place muffin pans half full in 400-F degree oven and bake 18 or 20 minutes.

**BUTTERSCOTCH COOKIES**  
Cook over low temperature until bubbly:  
1/4 cup butter or oleo  
2 cups brown sugar  
When cool stir in:  
2 eggs  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Then add:  
2 cups flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 can coconut  
Spread in 11x16 sheet cake pan which has been greased and floured.  
Bake at 350-F degrees about 20 minutes. Cool and cut in squares. (Note - Be careful not to overbake.)

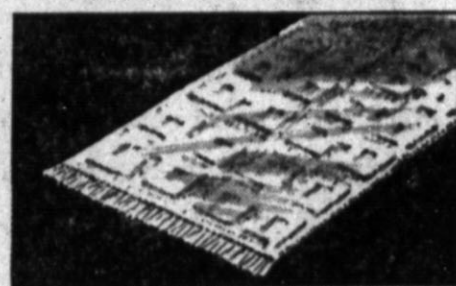

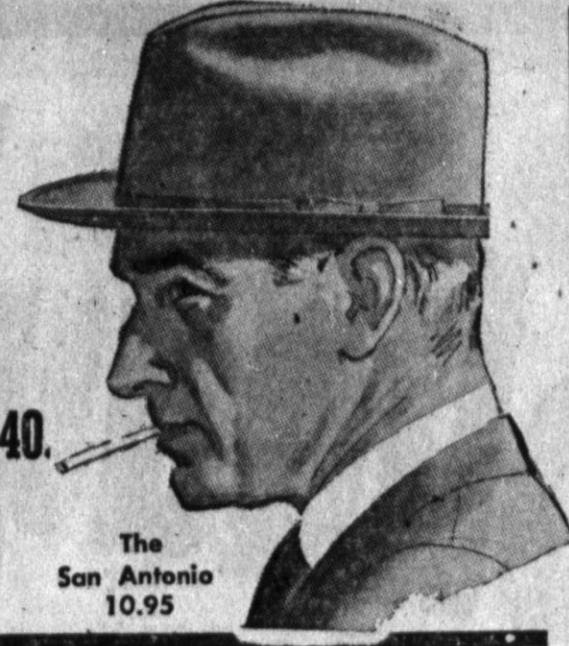

Growers Federation at Denver, Colo., Dec. 3-5. Delegations from several western states will be attending the meeting.

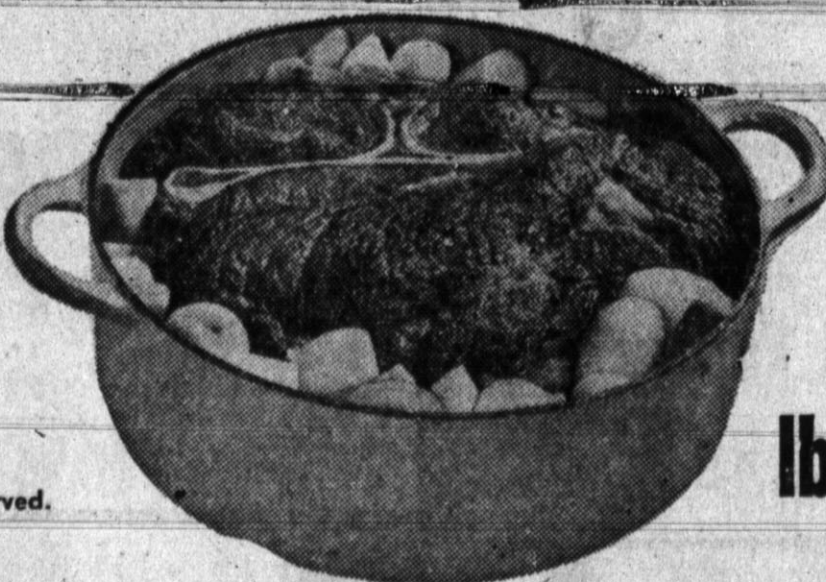

## TEXANS IN WASHINGTON

### Man Remembers 21-Year Old Debt

WASHINGTON (AP) — The other day the elderly Rep. Usher L. Burdick (R-ND) opened a letter and out fell four \$5 money orders — sent to him from Texas by a man whom he had befriended 21 years ago.  
Signed by Louis M. Wood, who identified himself as a member of the Masonic Lodge in Dallas, the letter was penned in neat hand printing.  
"I wish to thank you for aid you extended me in 1937 when I was in Washington, D. C., looking for employment opportunities," Wood wrote.  
As Burdick recalls the incident, Wood, a complete stranger, wandered into his office in 1937 saying he didn't know

what he was going to do, that he didn't have a cent.  
"I just took him out to my (Maryland) farm for six weeks and fed him," Burdick said. "I hadn't heard from him since."  
After telling Burdick that he was a Dallas Mason, Wood added:  
"I have been a supporter of our President who is a Mason himself. President Eisenhower came to San Francisco and appealed for aid for his party so I am sending you \$5 to aid the Republican party which you so ably represent."  
"I am also sending \$5 for any North Dakota charities that you find use for. Five dollars also is enclosed for Masonic Educational Fund for North Dakota State."  
"Enclosed is \$5 for any veterans activity in North Dakota that you may find use for."  
Burdick, who is retiring after 20 years in the House, guesses Texas' Sen. Lyndon Johnson will be the Democratic presidential nominee in 1960 and will be opposed by Nelson Rockefeller, recently elected governor of New York, as the Republican nominee.  
Lyndon Johnson is the only fellow who would get the Democratic vote in both the North and the South, Burdick said. "His attitude on segregation is perfect. He says it has to come, but it should be step by step, the South, Burdick said. "His attitude and the North won't."  
The Agriculture Department has issued a report on the financial outlook of farmers over the country, and in discussing the Southwest, paints a bright picture.  
"This will be a memorable year for farmers and ranchers in Texas and Oklahoma," it said, "particularly in the western halves of these states."  
"After five or more years of drought, production of wheat, grain sorghums, and cotton is excellent in 1958 in most sections. Range and pasture conditions are the best in years."  
The report noted disasters in some local areas, such as flood stricken sections along the middle Rio Grande. It said farmers repayments on loans have been exceptionally heavy.  
"To obtain local information on the extent of recovery from the severe drought," the report continued, "a survey was made in Carson County in the Panhandle of Texas."  
"Here wheat and grain sorghum are the predominant crops and stocker cattle are usually grazed on wheat for four or five winter months."  
"The good yields and sustained prices have permitted farmers to pay overdue accounts, buy some long-needed equipment, make repairs that were neglected during the dry years, and bolster cash reserves that had been seriously depleted."  
After further discussion of the situation in West Texas, the report moved eastward.  
"The credit and financial condition of farmers in the Blackland area of Texas was better in 1958 than in 1957, but the improvement was not as outstanding as it was in the western sections of the Southwest," the report stated.
