Two Schools, Store Robbed

Hereford police are continuing investigation of burglaries of two elementary schools and a mill and feed company which took place here sometime Thursday night or Friday morning.

Burglarized were Aikman and Central elementary schools and Inman Mill and Feed Co., located on Dairy Road.

Damage to buildings and equipment and stolen cash amounted to approximately \$300.

Every classroom at Aikman school was ransacked, according to Gene Martin, investigating officer.

The burglars entered the office of the principal, D. C. Martin, and about \$2.50 was taken from a metal filing cabinet.

An unknown amount of change was taken from a beverage machine in the teachers' lounge, Martin said.

A can of tomato juice, taken from the cafeteria, was found, half emptied, by officers.

About \$150 in damage and cash taken was estimated at Aikman. Entry to the building was gained through a door on the east wing.

Deaf Smith County cotton growers Monday will decide, by referendum, if marketing quotas will be in effect for the 1959 cotton crop.

How farmers vote in the referendum will determine whether or not quota penalties will apply, the kind of allotment

polling stations will open at 8 a.m. and close at 6 p.m. Monday. Stations will be located in the County Courthouse, Sims Community House and Ford Community House.

The general rule is that anyone who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1958 is eligible to vote in the referendum.

Scott and McGuire later agreed that it wasn't possible to balance the ball on the back rim from 15 feet away but said the situation was covered in the rule book.

Hereford and Dumas earned the right to play Saturday night for the Hereford Invitational Tournament championship with stellar victories Friday night.

Dumas avenged an earlier defeat by mopping up on Palo Duro of Amarillo, 49-36. Hereford ran up a surprisingly easy 93-47 victory over the Canyon Eagles.

Demons and Whitefaces were to clash at 8:30 p.m. Saturday preceded by a game at 7 p.m. between Lev-

eland and Tulla for consolation honors.

Dumas Friday night had a double honor, bouncing back to even one of their losses and dumping the defending Dons from a shot at repeating as titlists of the tourney.

Big James Walton showed good speed and rebounding ability under the boards as the hustling Demons took advantage of all the breaks.

Dumas coach Rex Fox pulled his varsity late in the final period, after they had run up a 45-31 lead.

Hereford gave the Canyon Eagles a lesson in basic basketball techniques, Friday night: running, rebounding and shooting, as they leaped to a 16-0 lead.

Varsity Herdsmen came back in the third quarter and extended the scoring to 73-32 by the end of the period.

The couple moved to Hereford in 1950 from Friona.

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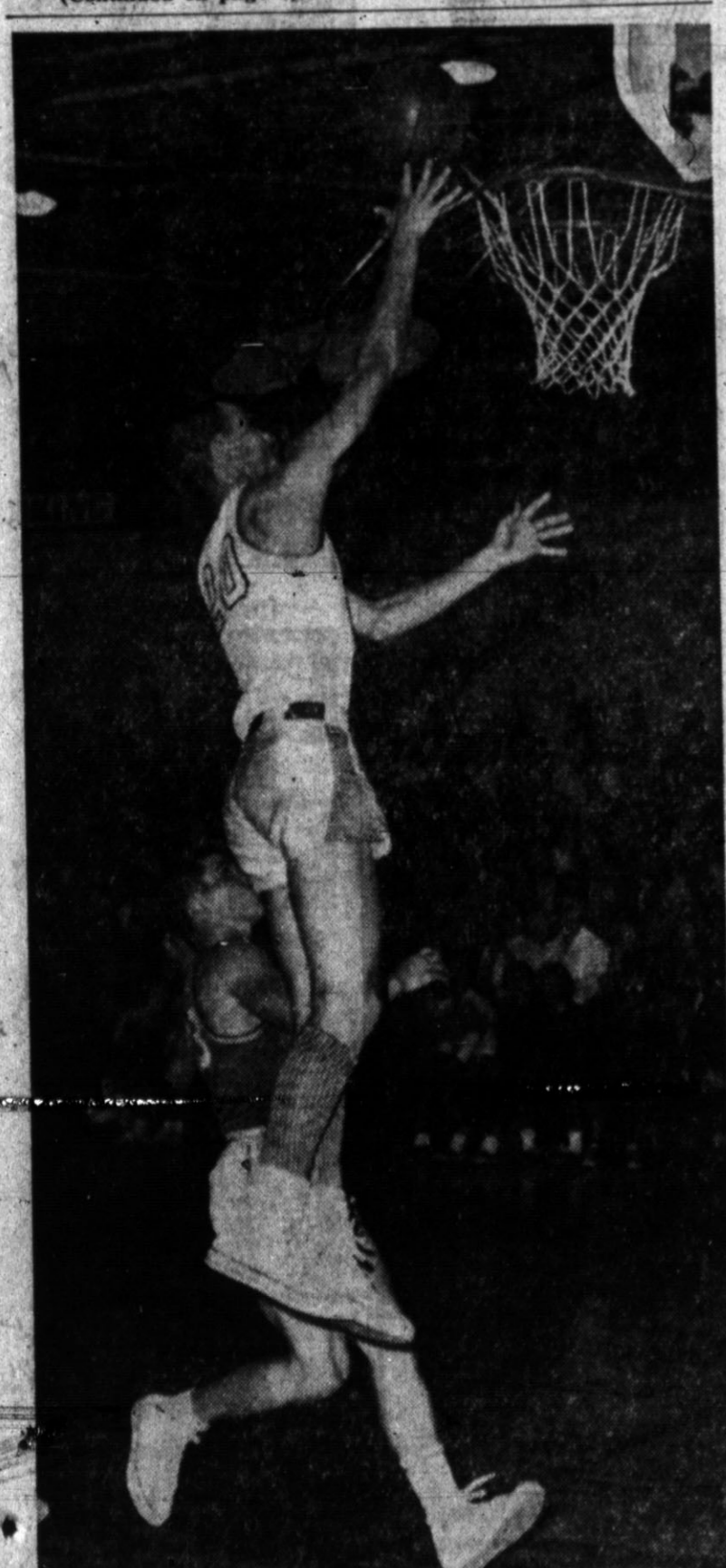

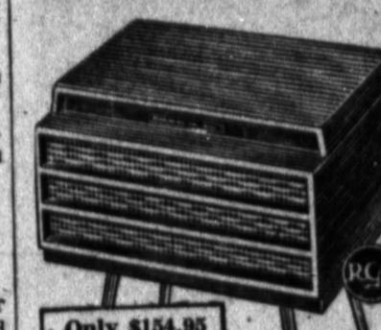

Eugenia Alexander Sends Greetings From Denmark

Eugenia Alexander is not exactly looking forward to spending Christmas away from home, but one of the most exciting experiences of her sojourn in Denmark will be observing Christmas there as the Danish do.

In a recent letter, Eugenia writes, "The Danish people begin decorating the streets about the first of November much as we do in America. Here in Denmark all the people buy what is called a Julecalendar, which is usually in the form of a little house. It has windows for the different days which are in different forms of decoration on the house."

"Starting with the first day of December, they open each day one of the little windows in the calendar and see a picture or verse for that day. Beginning with Dec. 6, they observe the Advent season in the home with the preparation of a green wreath for the table on which are mounted four candles. One is lighted the first Sunday in Advent and an additional one each Sunday until all four are burning.

"Their Christmas cards are purchased with only a picture on them, as they like to write

their own Christmas message on each one. A few days before Christmas we, here at Nebegaard, will go into the forest and cut our own Christmas tree which we will decorate with candles.

"On Christmas Eve everyone will have a part in putting hay out for the herds, go to church about 5 p.m. and come home and eat a goose dinner. Afterward we will have the tree. The "Julemond" (our Santa Claus) who lives in Greenland, comes while everyone is at church or having dinner.

"It will be very cold here at Christmas. Already I have had to buy some really warm clothes. I am about to get used to lugging around five pounds or more of clothing all of the time. All of the students here at Fredericia Gymnasium school are very wonderful to me. They are very patient with my speech, and if I suddenly cannot think of a word they are eager to help. I'm sure they will try to keep me from missing my own home at this season too much.

"The Danes are really very interested in our way of life and ask many questions, some of which are difficult to answer. They cannot understand our racial problems or the ban on the Communists in a Democracy. My first speech was on the racial problem in the United States, and I have a hard time discussing the reason for the Communist Party being outlawed in the U. S.

"They cannot understand how we can say we have a democracy and forbid a political party. They tell me that here everyone knows who the Communists are and what they are doing, so that they can fight them openly."

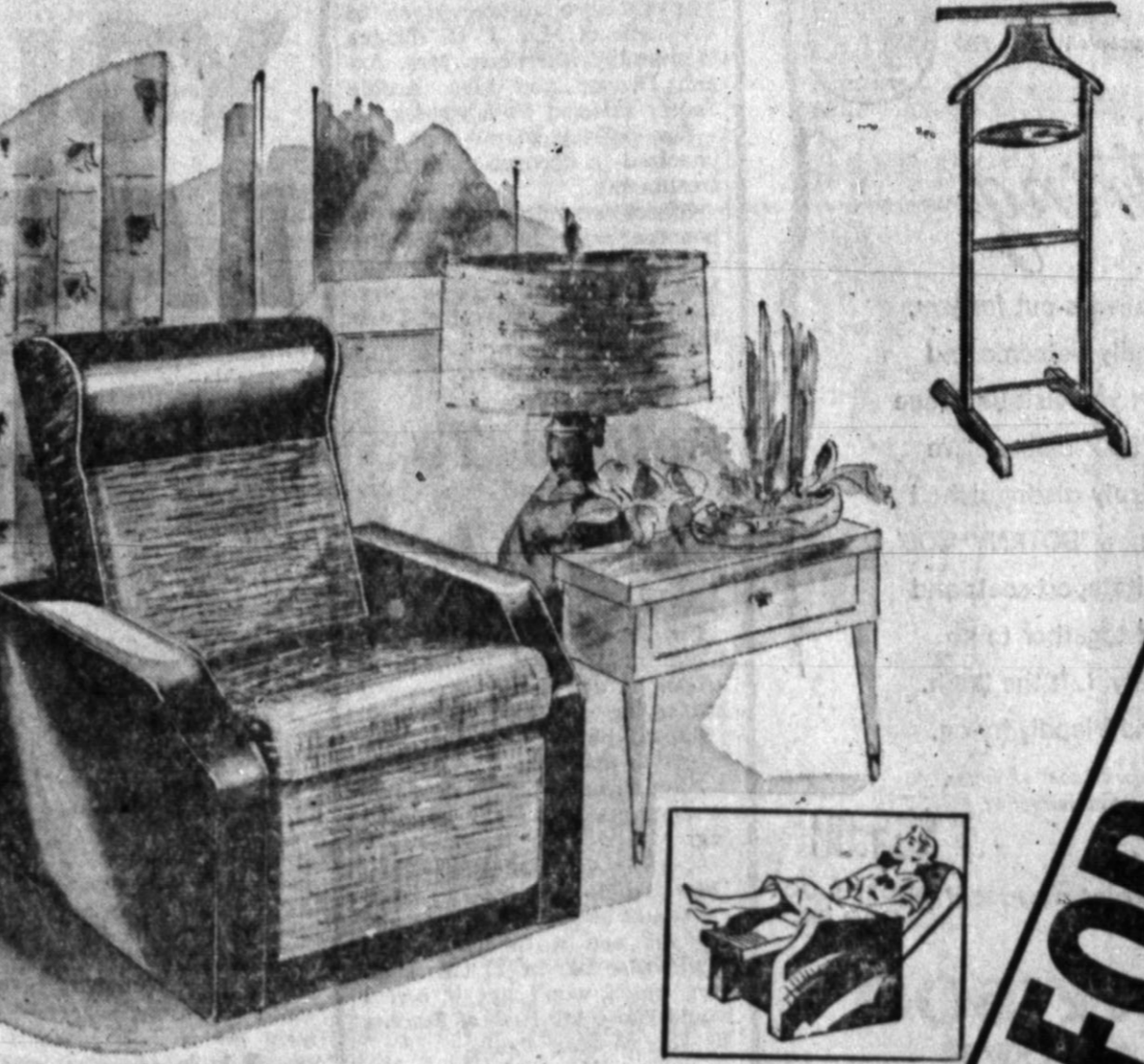

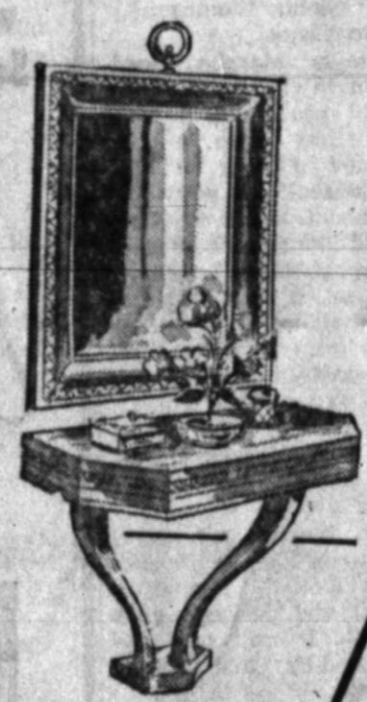

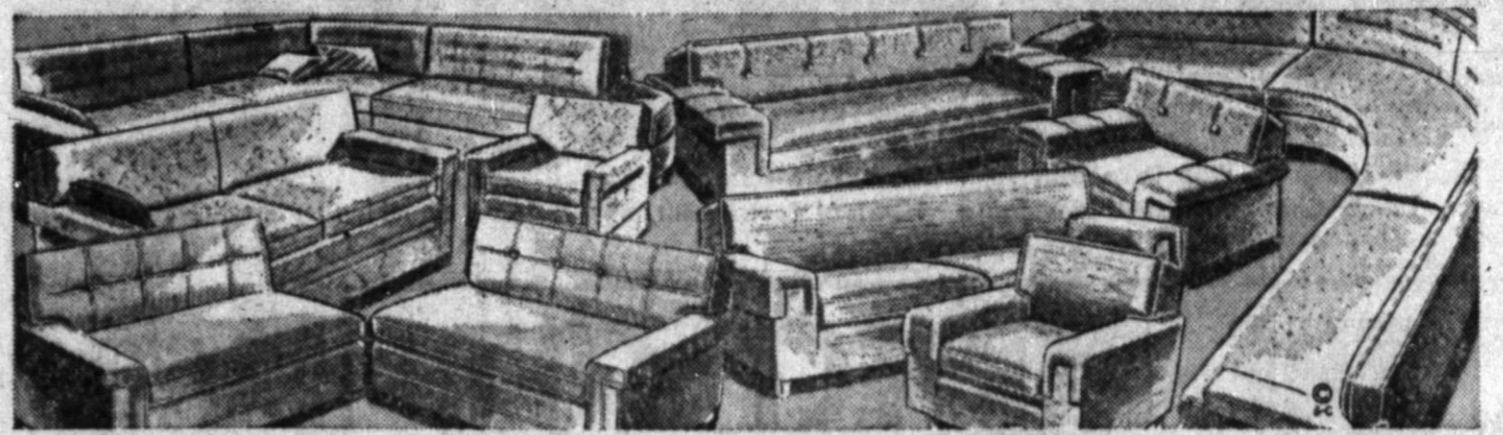

Forming Of Foreign Outlets Goal Of Grain Association

New outlets may be developed for the Southwest's grain sorghum crop and the nutritive level of European diets may be raised as the result of a market development contract executed recently between the Grain Sorghum Producers Association of Amarillo and the Foreign Agricultural Service.

The unprecedented government-feed grain growers agreement is being announced jointly by Max Myers, director of Foreign Agricultural Service and Frank Moore, president of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association after several months of negotiations between John J. McCracken, grain marketing specialist with FAS and Bill Nelson, executive vice president of GSPA.

Signing of the agreement paves the way for extensive promotional and educational programs in Italy and other countries that may be agreed upon. Such programs are made available by the Agricultural Trade Development and Assistance Act of 1954, Public Law 480, which provides for use of foreign currencies derived from the sale of agricultural commodities under the act to help develop new markets for other agricultural commodities.

Nelson, the sorghum growers executive officer, emphasized that efforts will be directed toward developing permanent demands for area grain sorghums through balanced rations rather than a surplus disposal or a sales campaign. Although no specific amount of funds were outlined in the initial agreement, it is expected that projects developed will be "quite extensive" due to the potential for overseas use of the growing

abundance of American feed grains.

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association will provide personnel, goods and services which may involve "dollar" expenditures, while the Foreign Agricultural Service will make available the necessary foreign currencies to carry out the program within the individual countries. GSPA funds for this as well as their balanced program of Research, Market Development and Service are derived from a voluntary deduction of two pounds per 1,000 pounds from farmer deliveries of grain sorghum at local elevators. FAS funds are derived from Public Law 480 funds abroad. Other uses of these funds have been used to maintain defense projects and to promote industrial recovery abroad.

It is expected that the GSPA will immediately initiate programs in Italy including Market surveys and studies, educational and promotional activities including exhibits, demonstrations and assisting foreign grain buyers in grain purchasing and technical problems; fellowships at universities and institutes for carrying out market and nutrition research regarding uses of grain sorghum and other feed grains; and quality testing and sampling of feed grain shipments; as well as translating, printing and distribution of educational and promotional material and advertising.

Already the GSPA has called on Texas county agents to supply feeding information relative to grain sorghum in balanced livestock and poultry rations to an industrial design concern in New York who is designing a feed grain display to be used in the Italian project. The display will consist of at least three trucks with mounted display units which will tour fairs and shows and agricultural events in Italy and other countries.

Robert O'Neill of the American Embassy in Rome who will be in charge of the exhibit was in Amarillo recently going over the proposed schedule with Nelson and other Association officials. Already the schedule includes the trade fairs in Verona in March; Bologna in May; Trieste in June and July and at the National Dairy Show at Cre-

mona in September.

Other organizations and individual concerns interested in feed grain promotion abroad will be encouraged to broaden their programs by participating financially and by assuming responsibility under the GSPA program.

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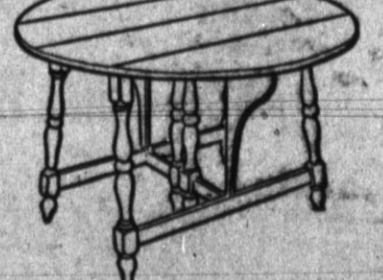
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Editorials

C-C Directors Face Problem

Resignation this week of Bill Lenderman as Chamber of Commerce manager brings directors of the Deaf Smith organization face to face with one of the most serious problems seen in the community in the past decade.

This will lead you to feel that we consider the Chamber of Commerce as an active, integral part of community life. This is right. We believe just that, and we hope the directors will spend much time and thought in making the replacement.

Primarily, it seems to us that they should outline and develop a planned program along lines which the community might best follow. Once this is accomplished, all that remains is to locate and secure a manager who agrees with the program, and who is capable of putting it across.

How Long Will Subsidies Last?

About the time a lot of people were beginning to feel safe in predicting they would never live to see the day when farm allotments and subsidies would be lifted, the corn growers in Iowa marched up to the polls and voted out the corn program.

How the corn grower will fare may be another question, however. Unlike the cattleman, he must compete with the milo grower and other producers who are still receiving subsidies. Nevertheless, should the corn farmer prosper, it is highly probable that other subsidized crops will abruptly come to a halt.

Unquestionably, the American farmer is more prosperous today than ever before in history of the Southwest. His education and social status has been elevated by leaps and bounds since government supports were introduced back in the 1930's.

Subsidies, whether they be to railroads, airlines, mail users, banks or steamship lines are definitely a form of socialism. We pride ourselves on having built a great nation through capitalism and the profit system, while Russia—our nearest rival—upholds government ownership and government operation as being more efficient.

All of the time, we have a more simple and fairer test of the two systems within our own agricultural set-up, along with several other industries. Whereas, the resources and manpower of Russia and the United States may differ, they are fairly static here at home. In addition, we can count the ballots of producers, whose votes are not decided by bayonets and armed guards at the polls.

How other producers, especially in the cotton belt, react within the next five years should settle the argument for a long time to come.

A unified community, following a well-planned program of growth and development should be our No. 1 goal in 1959. Unquestionably, we lost a good man in Mr. Lenderman, but certainly there are other good men to be found. The personnel is secondary only to proper planning and guidance on the part of our directors.

Cooperation In Water Program

The outcome of a hearing on "tail water" waste before the High Plains Board in Lubbock this week should be consoling to most residents of this area.

The violators merely agreed to comply with regulations, and the case became a matter of cooperation in the preservation of a valuable natural resource.

Actually, when you get down to brass tacks, it seems to us that most similar cases will follow this pattern. No one endorses sheer waste of water. Just because it is plentiful does not mean that water is not expendable. As we have said before, irrigation water pretty well belongs to the community, and every citizen of the community should be equally zealous to protect and intelligently use the asset.

Cooperation with the High Plains District and the Commissioners Court of Deaf Smith County will eliminate any future cases along this line. This, we feel and hope will be the outcome.

Certainly, water conservation is highly important; waste, on the other hand is inefficient and costly. The district and the commissioners would much rather help people conserve water than prosecute or haggle with violators. All in all, the road ahead on this particular problem seems to be straight and clear.

'My Friend,' The Policeman

A little third grade girl recently wrote the Hereford police department a letter thanking them for a traffic safety calendar. Needless to say, members of the force were impressed and proud of the letter, and the young lady is to be complimented for her thoughtfulness and action.

These things are important, but they do not afford a fraction of the importance we should place on the fact that a third grade girl or boy looks upon the policeman as a friend and benefactor. In most other countries, the police are hated, dreaded and feared; instead of protection, they often represent oppression and the opposite of justice.

Children seldom speak except from their hearts and wrapped up in the "thank you" letter sent by the little girl, is a wonderful tribute to the American Way of Life. Far from the protocol, high level planning and diplomacy, down on the grass roots level, a little girl thinks of the policeman as her friend. She is so happy she sits down and writes them a letter.

To us, this is a wonderful example of Democracy in action—not as it is painted by the Communists or by our enemies—but as it actually exists today in Hereford, Deaf Smith County, Texas, U. S. A.

"I met Mr. Lookingbill in school as we went to the same school for several years. We were married in the home of my parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kelly, on Sept. 20, 1896. The ceremony was read by the Rev. B. L. Thornberry, pastor of the Primitive Baptist Church.

"My dress was of a brown material, trimmed in cream-colored lace. It was made very simple, with a lace front, mutton-leg sleeves and a gored skirt, which was floor-length. We did not go on a honeymoon,

but moved into a little log cabin, consisting of one large room with a fireplace. There was a shed room or lean-to as they were called in those days, for a kitchen. The cabin had two doors and no windows. Some of the log-cabins had puncheon floors but this one had a floor of one by twelve, and I was very proud of my lovely yellow pine floor.

"We lived here for several years and then moved to Hall County. Here, we had two rooms, but our family was growing and when we built on and had three rooms we thought our house was very spacious. I was always quilting as it took a lot of bedding for my family. I was quilting and had Harry in the cradle under the quilt so I could rock him as I quilted.

Little Trust In Soviet Intentions Of Proposal

MRS. D. R. HOLT—Well, I don't know too much about that. I haven't done too much reading on the subject. But it seems to me that a more than ample period of time has passed since Berlin first became an occupied city. I think it's time for Berlin to be free, but the situation has a double-edged sword. I'm always wary of anything the Soviet proposes.

MRS. GAYLON PATTERSON—Well, I think Berlin should be free, but not at the cost of throwing it to the Soviet. If Berlin were not completely controlled by the Communists, it would sort of be like going in circles. I really don't know enough about the whole thing to have any opinion on what the United States should do about the matter.

C. J. FUSSELL—I'm against it 100 per cent. Definitely we should stay just as we have stated all the way through—that we are definitely against it.

STARTS DEEP OIL TEST

Another deep test for the Palo Duro Basin in Randall County has been scheduled by Frankfort Oil Company. The well is designated Beaumont Stinnett No. 1 and is located on the Stinnett land south of Umberger. The location is 650 feet from the west and north lines of Section 65, Tyler-Tap Survey, and is about eight miles from Umberger. Permit depth for the well is 9,500 feet. The well is an offset to a previous test. A Patterson well was drilled to 1,310 feet in the northeast corner of Section 60, adjoining Section 65 on the west. In preparation for the drilling, a water well was dug on the location and a top-of-the-ground gas pipeline has been laid from the El Pason Natural Gas pipeline in the vicinity to the location. —CANYON NEWS

RECEIVES MAINLINE HIGHWAY

The International-Parks Highway, which follows State Highway 51 in Texas and runs through Dalhart, Hartley, Channing and Boys Ranch, has been designated a new U. S. (Federal) highway though a number for it hasn't been announced. The I-P Highway runs from a junction with Old Mexico highways at the south edge of the Texas Big Bend Park area, to a junction with Canadian highways at Fortuna. I-P Highway Assn. officials said today that Texas Highway Engineer D. C. Greer of Austin informed them that the new federal designation on the I-P route is from Texas Big Bend Park to Pluma Junction in South Dakota. J. O. Satterwhite, I-P Highway Assn. vice-president at Brownfield, pointed out: "This section culminates many years' effort on the part of interested workers to bring together a series of state highways, running north and south through the Great Plains, into a connecting link between Mexico and Canada." The road extends a total of 1,670 miles through the states of Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Nebraska, and North and South Dakota. —DALHART TEXAN

PHONE CO. BUILDS ADDITION

Plans for construction of a new addition to the present Blackburn "6" dial building in Shamrock was announced this week by Clyde Dickerson, manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. The building contract has been awarded to West-Tex Construction Company of Borger. The addition, 35 feet wide by 50 feet deep, will be located on N. Wall, St. Everything in the new addition will match the present building, Mr. Dickerson said. The frameroom will be placed in the addition. The old frameroom in the present building will be remodeled for commercial office work space, wire chief's office, plant storage, mechanical equipment, and men's combination locker and club room. —SHAMROCK TEXAN

COTTON HITS 45,000 MARK

Castro County gins have ground out more than 45,000 bales of cotton so far this season. According to a report compiled by Mr. Edwin Ramey of Dimmitt, the total stood at 43,560 at noon Saturday. Most ginner contacted indicated they felt the cotton harvest would be about over in a week to 10 days if the weather remains good. This has been a nearly perfect year for High Plains cotton. Castro County has about 55,000 acres in cotton and the average will be about a bale to the acre when the crop is all in. While the county usually has a higher production than this, hail storms are considered to have curtailed county production considerably. —CASTRO COUNTY NEWS (Dimmitt)

Dear editor: Most towns in the United States naturally would like to get bigger. I don't know why, most of them have enough money to take care of the area they've already got, in fact, there aren't over fifteen or twenty people in the world and no cities and towns at all that have all the money they want to spend, but it's the truth, growth is what most cities are after.

Well, it looks like they're going to get it. I was reading last night in a magazine that the world's population is increasing by 47 million people a year. The world's population is now two and two-thirds billion, and at the rate it's increasing will be twice that in 50 years.

Clearly, if practically any town can hang on for 50 years, it's bound to grow. They've got to put all these people somewhere and there's no room for them out here on my farm. It looks like about all a chamber of commerce or civic booster club has to do to succeed is to hang on for a while longer.

However, what interested me about these figures was an answer an expert gave on whether there'd be enough food to feed all these people.

He said not to worry, there will be, the farmers of the world will do it, and the reason they will, he said, is that if you offer enough money for the food, the food will be produced.

Now I don't know what sort of farmers this expert is acquainted with, but we don't know the same group. The group I know, since I'm one of them, works in just the opposite fashion. We don't say, if you'll pay us enough, we'll produce this food for you. What we say is, here's all this food, how much can you let us have for it?

And I guess it's as good a system as any. It saves a lot of responsibility. When I start a faming year, I don't know what I'm going to get for my work, but on the other hand the consumers don't know what I'm going to produce to eat. This way nobody's responsible for anything. It's sort of like marriage. Parents don't know how their children are going to turn out, and children don't know how their parents are going to turn out.

(Continued from page 1) and yellowed but I am glad to have them.

"Effie reminded me of a runaway we once had. Two of the girls and I were on our way to visit a neighbor. We were driving two horses to a hack.

"We ran into one of those 'blue northerners' and turned back home. The horses were easily frightened, and when the wind blew the hack against their legs, they ran away. We could not hold the horses or stop them, and as the gate came to view, we wondered what the team would do. They tried to turn in, but hit a post with a rear wheel and threw all of us over the dashboard and the barbed wire fence as if we were shot from a gun.

"Effie got a heavy blow on the head and was unconscious for a time. We had the doctor and she answered every question he asked her. He said she was all right and left.

"We were relieved that she was uninjured. She went to sleep and awoke while we were having supper. She was never so surprised and began asking what had happened. To this day she does not remember the doctor or his questions.

"The children walked about three miles to school, and in all kinds of weather. They carried their lunch in tin pails and they seldom, if every, brought any food home in the pails. They were starved when they reached home. They had a schoolmate who was quite heavy and when they had to face a cold wind home, they would walk behind her, single file, to keep from getting so cold.

"Since our churches were organized in the schoolbuilding, we went to church in the same building. We went to church in the wagon. Some people came as far as 20 miles to church. We enjoyed the services and the visiting afterward and most everyone invited friends home with them for Sunday dinner. Everyone asked you to go home with me for dinner, and you were considered unfriendly if you did not answer them with an invitation to have dinner with you.

"I was pretty unhappy when we moved to Mall County, as I had to cook on an Old Bachelor stove and bake bread in a drum oven. I had to bake several times to have enough for my family of eight children.

"I cooked breakfast in 30 or 40 minutes for breakfast, along with bacon or ham and eggs, with butter and syrup for our sweet food. The children always marveled that I could make 36 biscuits, roll them out with my hands and make them all the same size, but when you cook for a large family for years, it becomes a simple task.

"I cooked breakfast in 30 or 40 minutes. Today, we toast some bread, make coffee and that's it. We had biscuits for breakfast and cornbread for dinner and supper along with plenty of sweet milk.

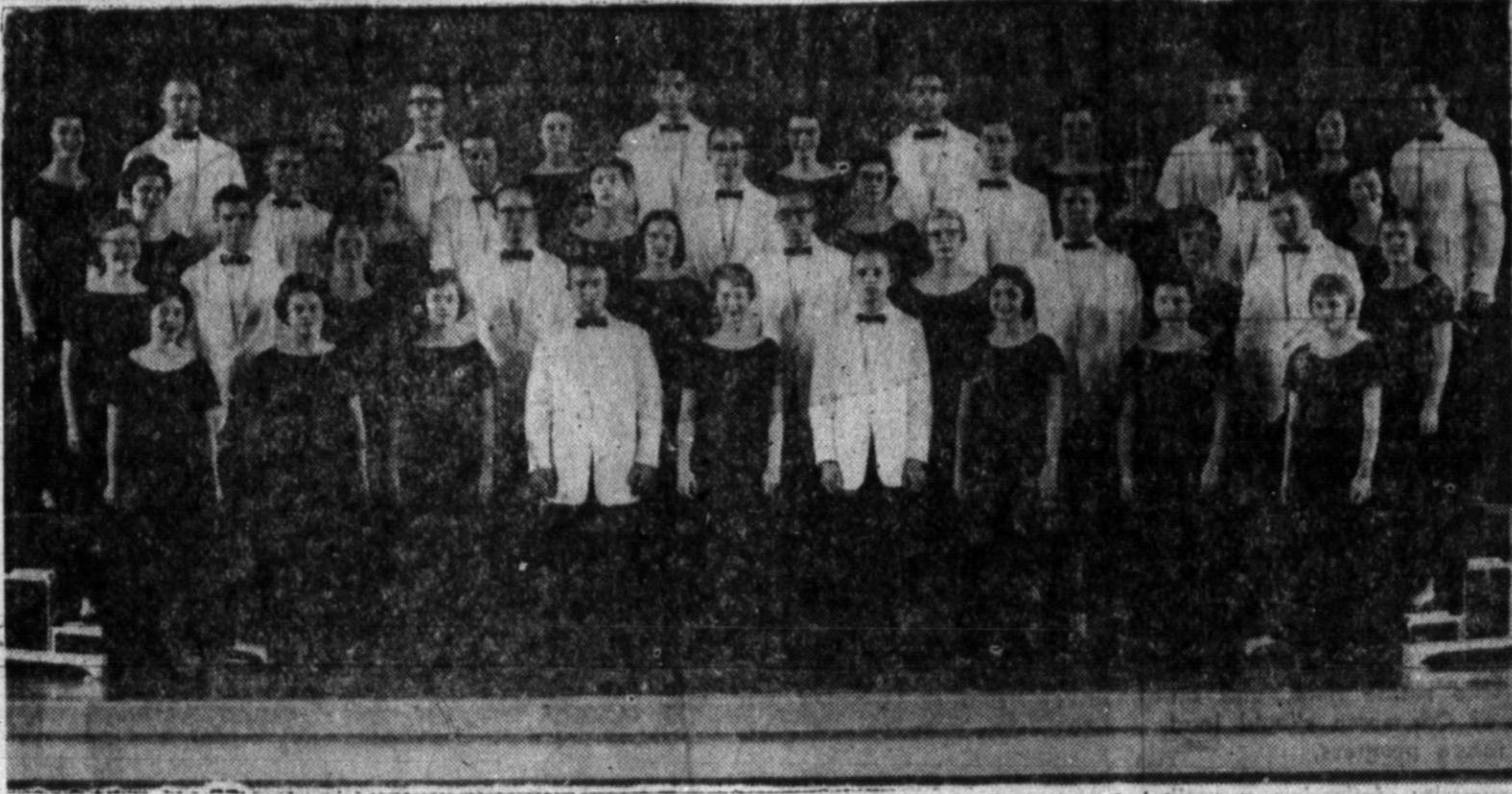
"When we came to the plains, it seemed as if we were dropped into a vast area with nothing but grass, cattle and the far, far horizon. There were no fences anywhere and the cattle could and would come to our very doors.

"One day my husband was working near the house and some cattle grazed near. One old cow, as wild as an antelope, came after him in no uncertain terms. They had long horns which could rip a person through.

"He ran to the house to get away from her. She was so angry that she tried to come on to the back porch with him and would have, except for the fact that he was carrying a pitchfork and managed to fight her off with it. She had probably lost her calf to the coyotes and was fighting mad and he was the first thing she saw that she could fight back. We were badly frightened, for if he had not been there, she would probably have come into the house and wrecked the place.

"We saw herds of antelope, some elk and thousands of quail and prairie chickens. But they are no longer around. The quail are here, but not so many as in the past."

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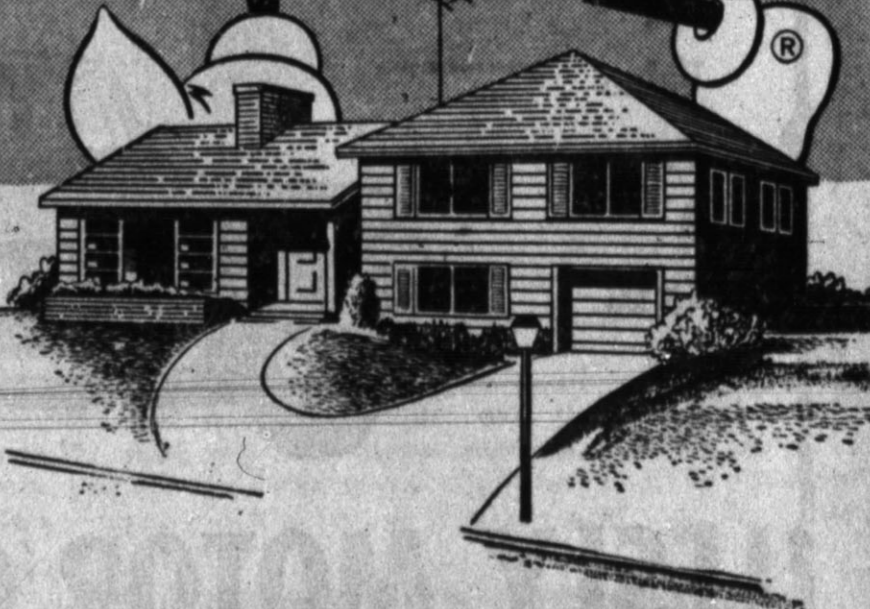

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Beauty at Home

Q. What is a good makeup corrective treatment for a receding forehead?

A. Use a lighter foundation shade on this area, so that the lower part of the face seems darker and the forehead is highlighted into prominence.

Q. Can you suggest a good, effective, "homemade" mouth astringent?

A. One of the best consists simply of unsweetened lemon juice in water.

Q. Will you please tell me just what is the purpose of "skin-freshener"?

A. This is applied after the use of a cleansing cream (when you do not follow with soap and water) to remove the last vestiges of the cream. It is used after a soap-and-water washing to remove any film from the soap and to give a fresh feeling to the face.

Q. Do you advocate the use of hot irons for curling the hair?

A. Not too frequently, since this has a tendency to make the hair dry and brittle. Much better to put up the hair in curlers — or to invest in a good permanent.

Q. What is a good exercise for waistline and hips?

A. Lie on floor on back, shoulders pressed firmly to floor, arms overhead, legs straight out. Raise left leg straight up in air, toe pointing to ceiling. Now cross this left leg over and touch the floor on your right side with your toes, trying at same time to keep shoulders flat on floor. Put the twist in your waistline, and a rolling motion to your hips. Return to position, and repeat the exercise with the other leg.

Q. Please suggest a good treatment for a face that is infested with blackheads.

A. After the regular cleansing, apply the following: To a cup of hot water add one heaping tablespoon of epsom salts. Dissolve thoroughly. Dip cotton squares into this solution, and pat over the face. Repeat for ten consecutive nights. The face should be sponged off with cold water after the epsom salt bath.

Q. What kind of facial mask is a good treatment for whiteheads on the skin?

A. A thick paste of fuller's earth and witch hazel, with some gauze wrapped over this to keep the mask in place. After awhile, wash off with cool, then cold, water.

Q. How can I remove some codliver oil stains from my dress?

A. Sponge with glycerine or

carbon tetrachloride, rub lightly to loosen the stain, then rinse well with water. Finally, launder in warm suds. Very old stains are next to impossible to remove.

Q. How can I, with my makeup, camouflage a raised scar on my face?

A. Use base or stick makeup, two shades darker than over-all tinted base normally used, on the raised area. Don't extend the color beyond the area of the scar. Pat powder on and brush off excess. Blot with a damp towel, puff or cotton. Now apply over-all tinted base makeup and proceed with your general makeup.

Q. How can I impart a narrower effect to a too-large mouth?

A. Leave the corners of the mouth free of color, and just barely reach the outer line of the upper and lower lips. Before applying lipstick, cover the lips with a tinted foundation. Then paint over it only as much as you desire. The tint will keep the unpainted area of the lips covered.

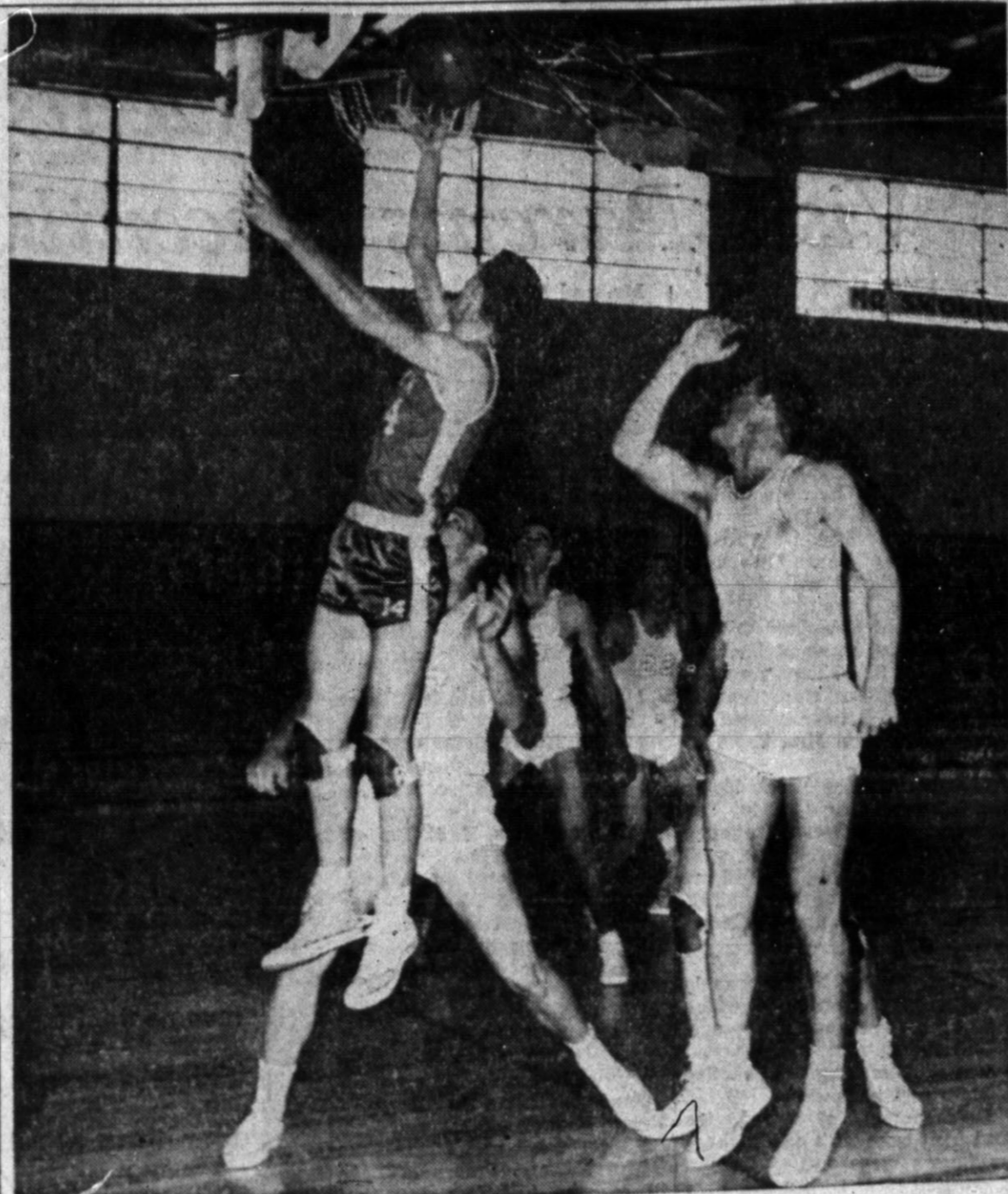

Household Scrapbook

Putty

Make putty of pure linseed oil and a good grade of whitening, mixed in the proportions of about 17 per cent linseed oil and 83 per cent whitening. Before applying the putty, prime the wood with oil paint. The only treatment necessary for the glass is to see that it is clean and dry.

Driving Nails

Nails will stay firmly in plastered walls if they are pulled out after driving them in, then wrapped in a little steel wool and then driven in again.

Hiccoughs

Hiccoughs can sometimes be checked by putting the blade of a table knife on the tongue for a few minutes.

Jelly Glasses

To prevent breakage of glasses when making jelly, put the glasses in a pan of hot water to keep them from cracking. The pan should be a shallow one, and the water should be sufficient to cover the lower third of the glass.

Painting Metal

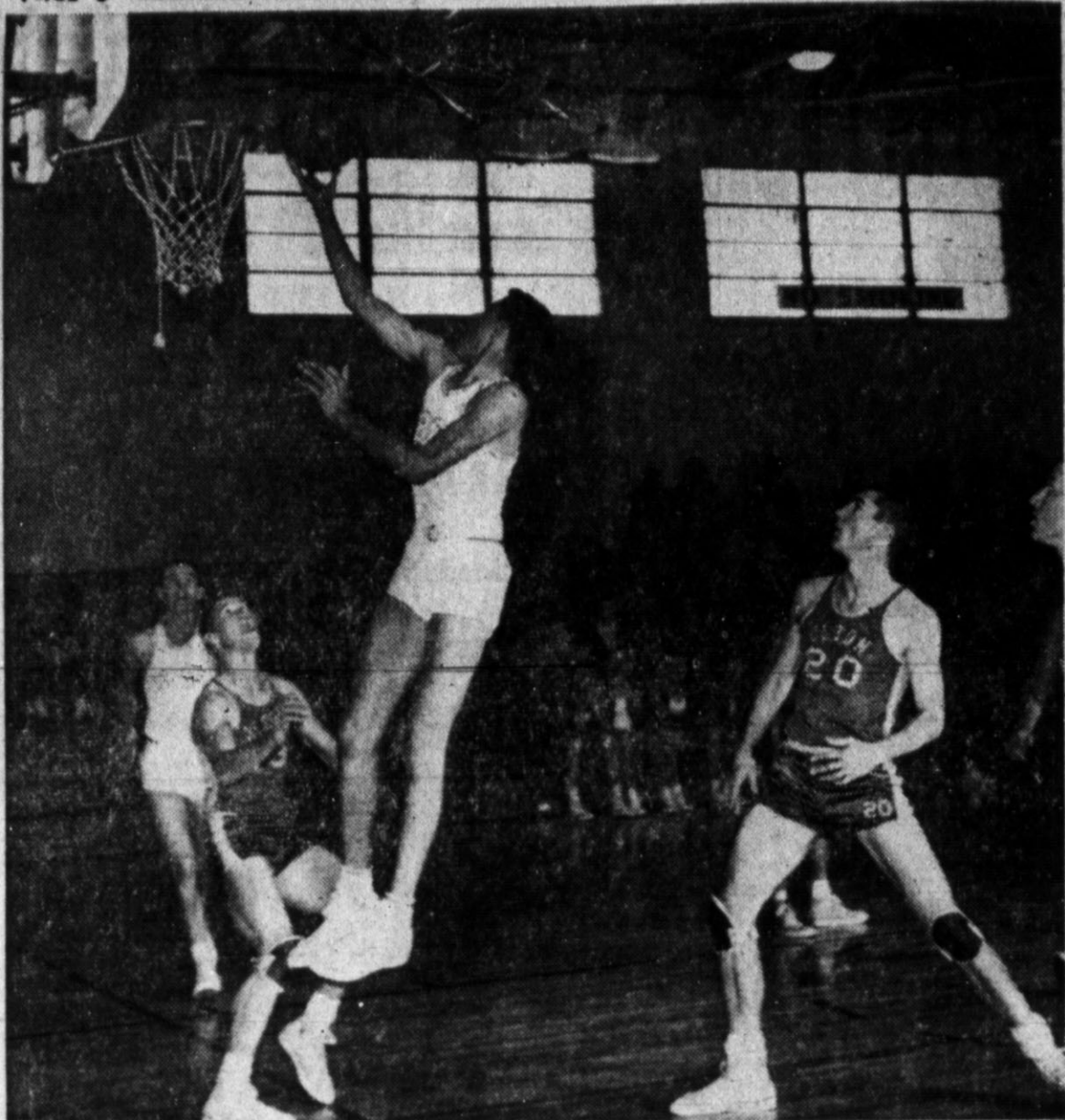
