## Seven Enter School Board Race

### 2 Incumbants File For Hospital Board

Two more entries have been filed in the School Board race. They are Mrs. Herbert Griffiths and Mrs. Don Bryant. This makes a total of seven running for the three places up for election this year.

Others who have filed in the race are Aubrey Heathington, David Stovall, Ernest Ramm, Lewis Wayne Shafer and Cleve Bland.

The three whose terms expire are Aubrey Heathington, Eugene Black and W.E. Meyers. This election will be held Saturday, April 1, at the Muleshoe Junior High School. Absentee voting will begin March 13 and the last day for absentee voting will be March 28. Absentee voting will be held in the Bailey County Clerk's office in the courthouse between these two dates.

Election judges for the School Board election will be Ernest Kerr with Jesse Leal, assisting.

In the Bailey County Hospital District Board elections, only two men have filed for the five places that are open. They are incumbents Dr. Charles Lewis and Creston Faver.

Candidates have until March 11 to file to have their names printed on all the ballots, including absentee. March 20 is the final date to file for the election. Anyone filing after March 11 will have their name written in on the absentee ballots.

Absentee voting will begin March 13 and continue through March 28 in the Bailey County Clerk's office in the courthouse, with County Clerk Hazel Gilbreath in charge.

To become a candidate in the election, candidates must secure petition blanks from the Secretary of the Board, Mrs. J.G. Arm, and must return them to her. Each petition requires 10 co-signers who are eligible voters in the county.

Polling places for the election are: Voting Precinct One, Bailey County Courthouse; Polling Place Two, West Camp Baptist Church; Polling Place Three, Richland Hills cafeteria; Polling Place Four, Three Way School; Polling Place Five, Muleshoe High School cafeteria; Polling Place Six, Bula School; Polling Place Seven, Needmore Community Center; and Polling Place Eight, Bailey County Volunteer Fire Department Sta.

## Ross Goodwin Attends Annual Water Conservation Meet

Ross Goodwin, President of the Board of Directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, and his wife, Cap, attended the annual convention of the Texas Water Conservation Association in Fort Worth on February 24th and 25th. The Goodwins reside at 1929 W. Avenue D, in Muleshoe.

Goodwin is a member of the Board of Directors of the Irrigation Panel of the TWCA, and a member of that organization's Resolutions Committee. As a member of this Committee, he had the responsibility to work on several of the TWCA resolutions released by the Association on February 25th.

One of the resolutions adopted by the TWCA strongly urged the Water Resources Council of the Federal Government not to recommend to President Nixon the adoption of the "Proposed Principles and Standards for Planning Water and Related Land Resources", now pending before it. Goodwin noted that the proposed standards would establish such a high discount rate for federally funded water projects that only a few of the smaller of the thousands of projects now pending could be undertaken. Goodwin also noted that attorneys with the TWCA reported that federal funding would be limited to projects costing less than 10 million dollars - as compared to the proposed West Texas - Eastern New Mexico water import proposal which will cost more than 9 billion dollars.

Goodwin also reported on another resolution that urged the U.S. Congress to modify the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (FWPCA) of 1971 to make its goals realistic, and to retain with the States their rights to set water quality standards. The references to groundwater were also asked to be stricken from the pending FWPCA.

On February 18th, Goodwin also attended the first interim hearing of the Texas Legislative Natural Resources Study Committee. At this hearing the Water District, in response to one of the Committee agenda items, presented testimony to show the effectiveness of the

# Bob Bullock Files Writ Of Mandamus, Asks Calvert To Pay Election Expense

Secretary of State Bob Bullock said today that he has filed a Writ of Mandamus action in the Texas Supreme Court asking that State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert be directed to pay with state funds primary election expense vouchers, which Bullock had submitted and Calvert had refused to pay.

"The United States Supreme Court ruled just a few days ago that state funds may be used to pay for primary elections in Texas," said Bullock. "We must now determine through our highest state court, however, whether an Act of the Legislature is necessary to authorize state financing and operation of the primaries or if the Secretary of State's office already has the authority to do so under Article 1.03 of the Texas Election Code."

Bullock said a Special Session will be necessary to appropriate funds before September 1 for the continuation of state services in the second year of the biennium.

"However," Bullock said, "A Special Session would not be necessary until after the primary elections in May and June if the Court holds that the Secretary of State presently has sufficient authority to finance the primaries."

"If the Court rules that specific legislative authorization, beyond that in the Election Code, is required, a Special Session would have to be called before May 6th. In this case, Governor Smith would have the awesome responsibility of deciding whether to submit just the primary financing issue to this session and calling another session to deal with appropriations, taxes, and other matters only a few months later; or, including all necessary items in a single session."

"If it is decided to have two Special Sessions, many will probably yell, 'Waste of money; do it all immediately.' If the Governor elects to include all items now, the time, patience and pocketbooks of all Texas citizens will be taxed. It has the potential for being nothing more than a three-ring political circus."

"House members, because of redistricting, are in many cases running against one another. Others are seeking higher office or simply reelection. Some are just quitting because they are disenchanted. Basically, the same situation is to be found in the Texas Senate. Not to be overlooked are the state-wide candidates who have the power to engineer legislation by the gavel, vote or persuasion."

"Under these circumstances, a Special Session just a short time before the May primaries would not produce sound and productive legislation. It would only provide a political forum for the ambitious and professional politicians without having to pay for radio, television and newspaper advertising."

"Regardless of when the Special Session is or what emergencies are considered, it would be unfair to the people of this state to jeopardize the solution of serious problems by injecting political considerations. Governor Smith is most concerned that politics be kept to a minimum in any Special Session."

"Regardless of how our Texas Supreme Court rules, I will accept its decision. I regret having had to present this problem to the Court. Its nine members did not create the problem. The problem was created by those who spent most of their time in the Regular and Special Sessions of 1971 plotting their political futures for 1972 despite repeated written requests for action on primary financing, the methods needed and the consequences to be suffered for their failure to act. The consequences are with us today."

"We started weeks ago attempting to resolve this problem. We predicted at that time that we would encounter political obstacles, and we certainly have."

made up of laymen and doctors from each division.

Some of the more important goals of the foundation are: increased funds for research, which is number one on the list; to have at least six rheumatologists in the Chapter area by 1975 (one in each main city - Lubbock, Amarillo, Odessa, Midland, and San Angelo - plus the one already in Big Spring; to establish a chair of rheumatology at Texas Tech so doctors will have good knowledge in the diagnosis and treatment of rheumatic diseases when they

go into practice; have a Department of rheumatology established at Texas Tech by 1978; have a diagnostic and treatment clinic for the indigent (or pay on sliding scale?) in each main city and provide transportation to those needing it; establish a research center at a medical school - such as the one in Dallas at Parkland - set up in conjunction with Southwestern Texas Medical School. (This could be in Lubbock or Amarillo); have workshops for nurses, physical therapists and other Allied Health personnel

for attendance at courses and symposiums held in other areas; set up a fellowship and/or scholarship fund to award to medical students who choose to study rheumatology; a symposium, for credit, for area physicians; funds for drugs; fund to make grants to doctors and Allied Health personnel for attendance at courses and symposiums held in other areas; and free beds in hospitals for arthritics; train volunteers for home visitation. The chapter is involved in many activities at the present time including: the distribution

of literature to persons seeking advice in which to date, many thousands of pieces have been distributed in response to requests; it supplies literature to area doctors for their patients, upon request; sends nine copies annually in West Texas - to physicians - of the professional bulletin on Rheumatic Diseases (600 physicians and AHP) which contains the latest information on the diagnosis and treatment of the rheumatic diseases; conducts forums for arthritics and others interested in the di-

seases, with panels of doctors and physical therapists including self-help programs and exercise classes; sponsors programs by specialists in rheumatology in the area and offers programs and professional films to the County Medical Societies; provides speakers and films as programs to clubs and organizations and shows films on various aspects of arthritis on TV and programs on radio stations; sends newsletters containing articles by doctors and helpful information on arthritis to over 15,000 people who have indicated they would like to receive these; supplies books and subscriptions to hospitals and libraries and conducts Public Forums, especially in smaller towns; and operates "Loan Closets" of self-help equipment for needy arthritics.

Chapter continue to increase its income by greater efforts in each city and by campaigning in every little town in its 83 county area, including contacting all rural people residing outside of any community. Dedicated volunteers are needed to assist staff members for the earliest accomplishment of this ambitious program. In the next article of this series, some facts on arthritis including the number of cases reported, the cost of arthritis and the amount of money spent on arthritis will be discussed along with information on research being done.
