

excessive oiliness in my scalp? A. This is, of course, due to over-active oil glands, and it can be aided by a diet free of oily foods and candy, and rich in fruits and vegetables. If 'your hair tends to be oily, try an egg shampoo to counteract the condition. Be almost fanatical about rinsing, since any soap in Texas and Louisiana that left in the hair after rinsing irritates the scalp. Vigorous brushing will help to normalize this

same condition. Q.How can I remove the shine from some of my navy blue and black dresses?

A. Try rubbing the fabric with a piece of flannel dipped in turpentine. Or, first sponge the garment with hot vinegar or amonia (add one and one-half teaspoon of ammonia to one pint of water), cover the garment with a damp cloth, and press on right side.

Q. What can I do to help reduce very thick ankles?

A. One excellent ankle redu er consists simply of walking up and down stairs, if the body is lifted on the toes with each step. Less wearing and almost as good for the ankles and legs is stationary rising up and down on the toes, at least 25 or 50 times a day.

Q. My eyebrows are very unruly, the hairs growing out in several directions. What can I do to help bring my brows under control?

During World War II the canal was a lifeline for shipping which suffered severely in some places from German submarnes. The subs could not operate in the 9-foot-deep cana!. In wartime, the waterway carried 90 million tons of war materials. On June 18, 1949, the goal

of the association as set out 44 years before was realized at 1:12 p.m. when the last soil between Brownsville and Corous Christi was blasted and dredged away.



Representative George F. Burgess told the Victoria meeting that participation of the Federal government was needed. He said that in 1875 a survey had been made and it indicated "cost at such a figure that it put the people to sleep." He added the work could be done for 15 cents a cubic yard

Duane Orr, District Engineer, Port of Corpus Christi, estimates dredging now costs 20 cents a cubic yard. Modern dredges and advances in marine engineering have kept down costs.

Representative John Nance Garner, later to become vice president, said there would be opposition from railroads. He said if the people would apply a bulldog tenacity to enthusiasm already displaced, the canal would be assured.

Eurique Orneals, Special Representative to the Mexican Government, assured the Convention that President Porfirio Diaz was greatly interested.

The association, known as the Interstate Inland Waterway League until 1920, began when the Louisiana-Texas Coast was an almost primitive land. In 1905, the 18 Texas countries bordering the proposed canal route had a combined population of only 250,000.

The second convention was held in Lake Charles, La. At the Houston meeting the following year, Holland was joined by Roy Miller, who shared the vision of a blooming future for the Gulf Coast.

Holland and Miller won their fight for a 53-mile strip of canal off the Louisiana Coast barely 40 feet wide and 5 feet deep. Civic leaders in Texas and Louisiana helped congressional representatives obtain authorization in 1925 and 1927 for a canal 9 feet deep and 100 feet wide from the Mississ-ippi to Corpus Christi.
