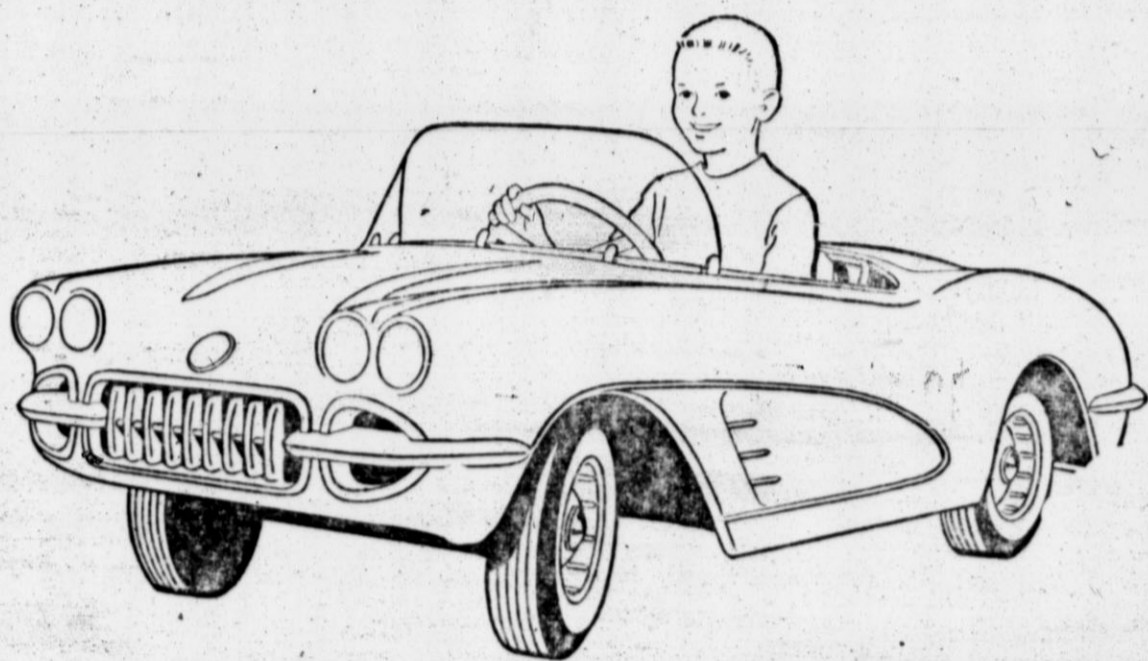

merit rating would result in such an overflow of traffic cases that new courts would have to be created and new buildings to house them.

Others have complained that traffic laws and their enforcement are not uniform and that some drivers - victims of speed traps, for example - will be penalized. Answer to this, says Insurance Board Chairman Penn J. Jackson, is to work out the wrinkles in law enforcement.

Insurance agents, in meetings and conferences over the state, are boning up on the new procedures, planning how to explain them to their customers.

Although the rules apply after Jan. 1, present policyholders will not be affected until their contracts run out some time next year.

Duties of Texas' attorney general should be streamlined down to one main job - that of serving as the state's

top legal officer.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson made this recommendation as he and his staff gained new, streamlined office space. Department moved from the west wing of the Capitol into the top five floors of the just-completed Supreme Court Building.

Wilson said he is an ex-officio member of more than 20 state boards and has to spend nearly half his time at their meetings. Moreover, he said, it makes the attorney general responsible for the activities of agencies over which he has no direct staff control. He cited the Veterans Land Board troubles of several years ago as an example of the problems caused by such a situation.

Wilson advocated strengthening the executive branch of state government by gradually placing more responsibility with the governor. As a starter he suggested having the governor make appointments to replace the attorney general on state boards.

A House Economy In Government committee says it has turned up some cost-cutting ideas.

Use of more prison-made products by state agencies was recommended to the committee by O. B. Ellis, director of the prison system. For example, Ellis said prison-made bricks would cost the state much less than those it now buys. Also, he said prisoners could to the re-binding of school textbooks at a saving of about \$200,000 a year.

Possibility of cutting back the farm-to-market road pro-

gram was explored by the committee. Highway Engineer E. Witt Greer made no recommendation, but said the state is now spending \$73,000,000 a year on building and upkeep of rural roads.

Under the Colson - Briscoe Act of 1949, \$15,000,000 a year is automatically appropriated to build rural roads. None of this can be used for repair which must be paid out of other highway funds.

Rural road program has exceeded its 1949 goal which was to build 25,000 miles. There now are 31,000 miles.

Board of Control could cut costs by combining its Austin warehousing operations, the board's executive director told the committee.

Department of Public Safety announced that its annual fleet safety contest was won by DPS Region 3, headquartered in Corpus Christi.

All DPS vehicles are involved in the contest. To win it, the 188 drivers in the Corpus Christi region drove 157 vehicles 4,688,993 miles with only 18 accidents. More than one-third of the accidents occurred during emergency pursuit driving at speeds of up to 105 miles an hour. There were no fatalities.

Royal Dressing For Big Birds

By CECILY BROWNSTONE
Include the chestnut in the stuffing for your holiday bird if you want a sumptuous turkey dressing.

Nowadays canned chestnuts packed without sweetening are imported; these are convenient but usually they can be found only in specialty food shops. Most use fresh chestnuts and deal with their shells and brown skins in one of two ways.

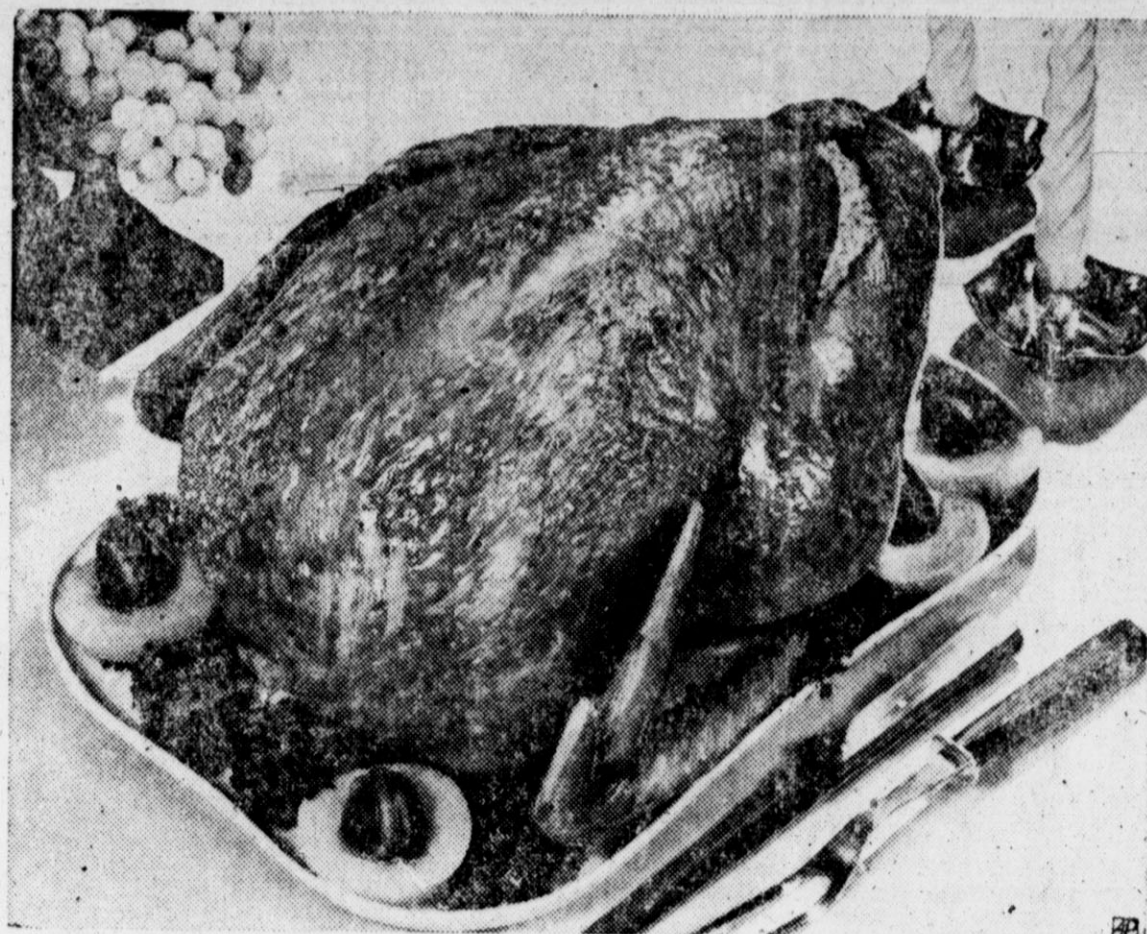
First off, cut a small slit in the flat side of the nut, near the base. That's to keep the nuts from bursting when they are boiled or roasted to make shelling possible.

To use the boiling process, put the slit chestnuts in a sauce-

pan and add enough boiling water to just about cover them. Cover the pan and boil for 7 to 10 minutes, or until the shells may be easily removed. To cool them enough to handle, put them under running water briefly; remember it's fatal to get the nuts too cool before shelling. Remove the shells and inner brown skin from the chestnuts with the help of a small knife.

To roast chestnuts, put the slit nuts in a flat shallow pan in a very hot (450 degrees) oven for about 10 minutes or until the shells may be easily removed, stirring a couple of times. Then remove shells and inner skins.

To cook the chestnuts before adding them to your stuffing,

cover with water and bring to a boil; simmer until tender — this usually takes 10 to 20 minutes. Some cooks like to use stock instead of water for the cooking.

It's easy to stuff a turkey if you put it in a large mixing bowl to hold it and catch drippings. Nowadays turkeys come with a slit of skin at the base of the breastbone so drumsticks may be tucked into it. Then all you have to do is to fold back the wings akimbo fashion.

CHESTNUT STUFFING

Ingredients: 1/2 cup butter or margarine, 1 1/2 cups finely chopped onion, 1 1/2 cups finely chopped celery, 8 cups dry bread cubes (1/2-inch), 1 cup coarsely chopped cooked chestnuts, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning, 1/2 teaspoon sage (if desired), 1/4 cup water or lightly seasoned stock, 1 egg (beaten

until thick and pale colored).

Method: In a 10-inch skillet melt the butter over low heat; add onion and celery. Cook, stirring often, until wilted. Place bread cubes and chestnuts in a large roasting pan. Mix salt, pepper, poultry seasoning and sage (if used); sprinkle over bread and nuts. Mix in onion and celery, using a rubber spatula to add all the butter. Add water and egg; toss together with forks. Makes enough stuffing for a 12-pound frozen turkey (thaw bird before stuffing.)

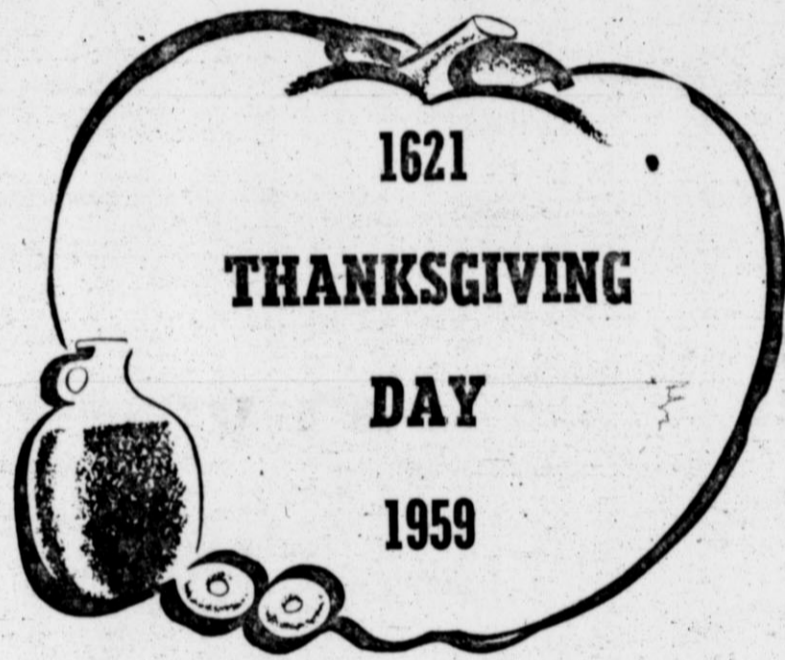

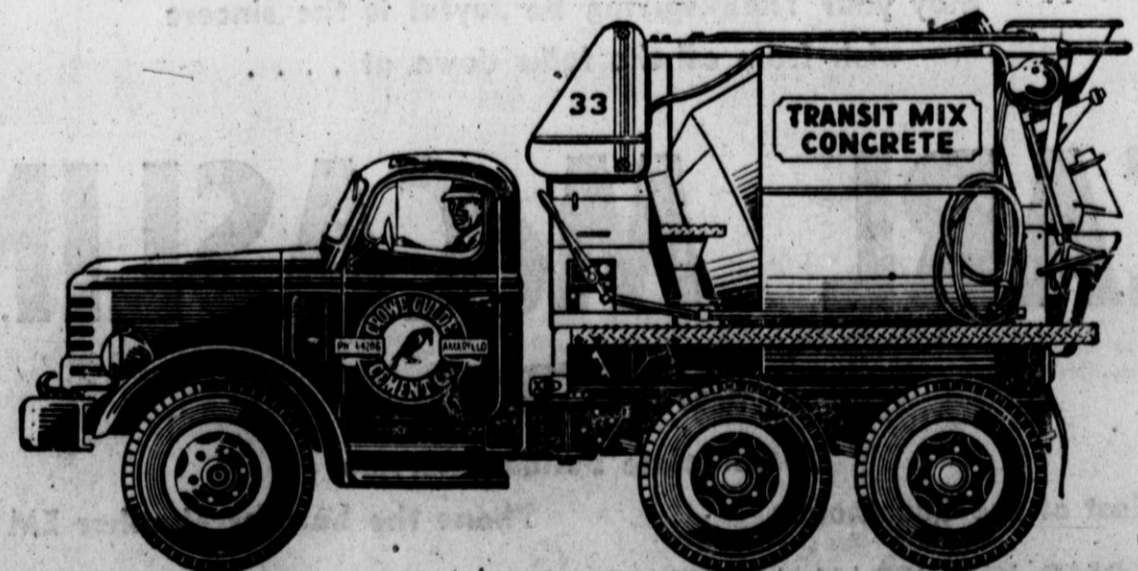

The Earliest Thanksgiving?

On Dec. 4, 1619, a tiny ship anchored in what is now the James River in Virginia. Debarbing the ship's 38 passengers knelt in prayer and celebrated the day as one of thanksgiving — possibly the first such observance in the New World.

Two years later the Pilgrims who landed at Plymouth set aside a day for thanksgiving and Massachusetts Bay Colony celebrated a thanksgiving day starting in 1630. In 1863, President Lincoln designated the fourth Thursday in November as

America's Thanksgiving Day. The Englishmen who landed at the mouth of the James River in 1619 had sailed from their homeland Sept. 16, 1619, to join the growing colony in Virginia. Their first order had read: "Impr wee ordaine that the day of our ships arrival at the place assigned for plantacon in the land of Virginia shall be yearly and perpetually kept holy as a day of Thanksgiving to Almighty God."

Accounts survive of the ship's order and of the fact that the first Thanksgiving was celebra-

ted. But whether it was commemorated from that year on is unknown.

An Indian massacre in 1622 wiped out the small settlement at Harrison's Landing, now the site of Berkeley Plantation, Va. The only survivor was a 12-year-old boy who was carried away by the Indians.

As near as can be figured, the ship was captained by John Woodliffe. His descendants claim that his orders, a copy of which is contained in the "Virginia Papers" described in the May, 1899, Bulletin of the New York Public Library, were given the captain by King James.

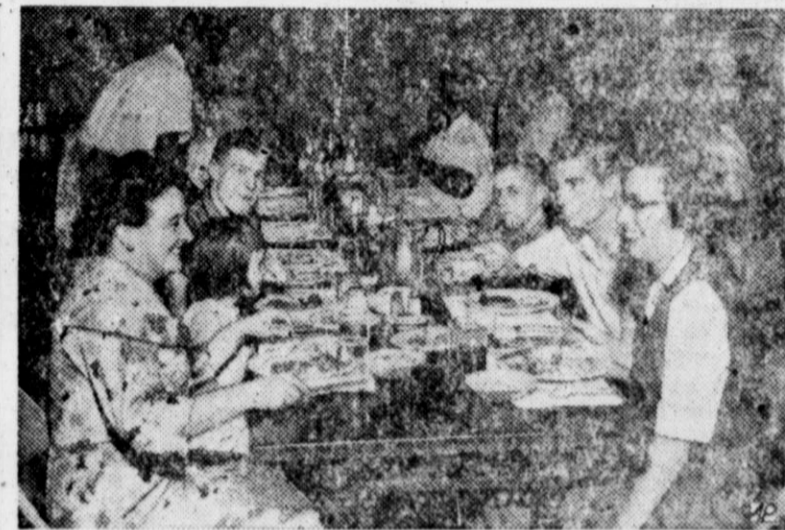

Sierra Sam Works For Science Without Talk

SEATTLE (AP) — Sierra Sam is a patient guy. He sits quietly in his spaceman's seat while technicians attach dozens of tiny recording gadgets to his body.

Sam, a 200-pound dummy, is being used by Boeing Airplane Co. scientists designing instruments to measure the body's

reaction to space travel. Weight and comfort factors dictated the design of the tiny devices which will record pulse and blood circulation rates, respiration, heart action, blood pressure and body temperatures.

Present equipment for measuring physical reactions often is cumbersome and scientists say readings are sometimes distorted because of the amount of energy needed to support the recording equipment.

Boeing has reduced many of the measuring devices to thumbnail size. One thermometer is smaller than a pin head. It will be embedded in a pad of wax and worn in the ear. An instrument to measure the concentration of saturated oxygen in the blood will be worn like an earring and a device to record blood pressure and pulse

ment. Boeing has designed a 15-pound apparatus no larger than a portable typewriter compared with the 100-pound, desk-sized instrument now in use. A chest belt, 75 per cent lighter than a respirometer, will check characteristics of the breathing pattern.

After the models are completed and adjusted to Sam for size they will be turned over to another scientific team for use in simulated space flights.

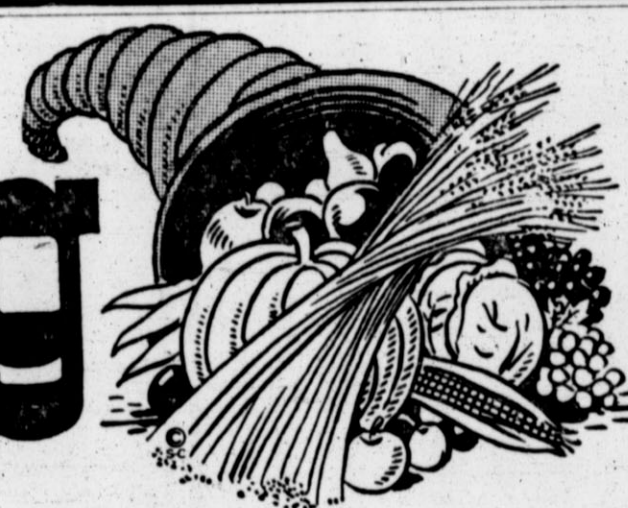

Slugger Still Has Desire To Hit But Would Skip Spring Training

This was in a 15th floor room of a Grand Central Station hotel where the Boston Red Sox stay when visiting the New York Yankees. It was three hours before Boston's last night game on the road and Ted Williams was slumping in a chair with the heels of his black shoes on the bedspread.

"Meet Tex McDonald," Williams said. "He's a hunting pal of mine from Minneapolis. He's one guy who doesn't care what I hit."

Williams could have been thinking of the time this writer mentioned that his .350 lifetime batting average was a thing of the past because at 41 he couldn't play left field regularly or hit 300 plus a bracket he had known since 1939 when he first reached the majors as a youngster of 20.

When's the big announcement?

"The big announcement on what? Williams asked.

You were going to tell about your plans for 1960.

"Oh, that," replied the greatest hitter baseball has known in the last 20 years. "I know what I'm going to do and what I want to do. I'm going to let it happen gradually."

Somehow the rangy left-handed hitter who has won five American League batting titles brought to mind Eddie Arcaro, 43-year-old dean of the jockeys.

"I don't know when I'll retire," Arcaro said a few years ago. "I'll let it come gradually. I'd be lost without a horse."

That seems to be the way

Williams feels. He is letting his retirement as a player come gradually. He enjoys two things. One is swinging a bat, the other fishing in the Florida Keys.

He abhors spring baseball training, especially when it means traveling for exhibition games. The Red Sox, including owner Tom Yawkey, who pays him about \$125,000 a year, and Manager Billy Jurges, want him back next spring, but Williams says he intends to spend a good part of next spring fishing. He may miss part of spring training to conserve his energy.

"You know," Williams said, "just before Leo Durocher quit his television job I told him if he were coming back to baseball as a manager I'd carry his bags."

Williams arose and gave the impression of having a suitcase in each hand.

"Can't you just picture me carrying Leo's bags? Make way, here comes Durocher," I'd say. I'd go with him."

Whether Williams would go with Durocher as a coach or

make a bid for his television job wasn't clear, and the slugger didn't intend to clarify it.

"Pull those shades down," Williams ordered his hunting friend. "I won't be able to see tonight."

The draperies were pulled over the window to prevent the late afternoon sun from bouncing off the wall mirror into Ted's batting eyes.

Williams still had the desire to swing a bat although since Aug. 27 he had done nothing but pinch hit. He still takes care of the sharp eyes which helped him to become the last batter to hit 400 back in 1941.

The apple of his eye, however, is his daughter, Bobby Jo. He took from his suitcase a photo wallet containing 12 of Bobby Jo's pictures.

"She's something. She's 12 now," papa Williams enthused. "She is tall and looks just like her pop."

But Bobby Jo will never be able to swing a bat or hit a baseball like her pop. Maybe nobody will.

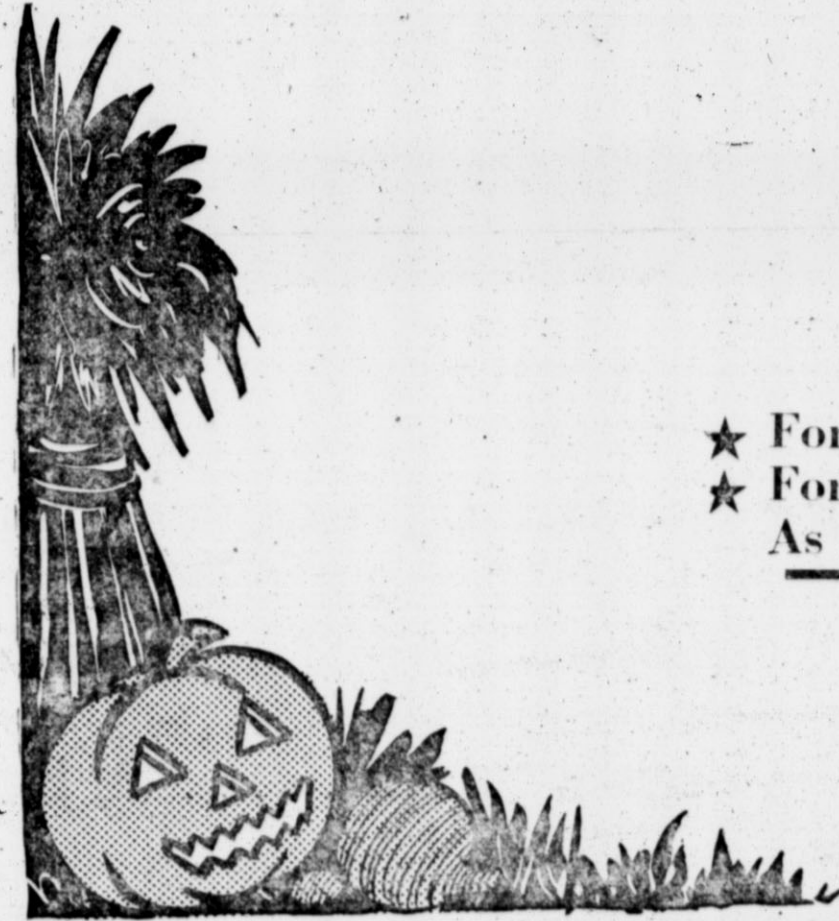

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

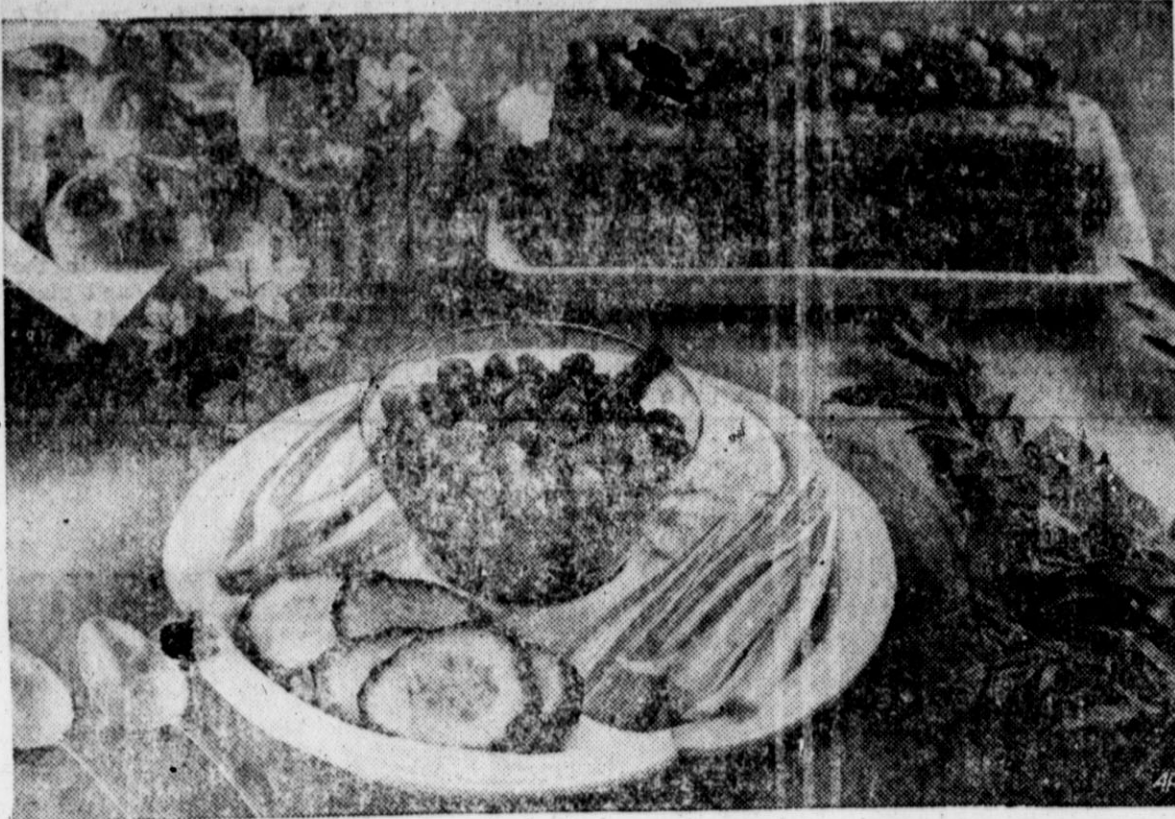

Different Recipes With Cranberries

By CECILY BROWNSTONE
 Neither new-fangled notion nor short-cut modern menu shall keep the bright red cranberry from its appointed task. This small tart fruit, a legacy from America's earliest days, will appear with turkey as usual on our holiday and everyday cool-weather tables. Clipper ships out of Gloucester, New Bedford and other ports once carried supplies of fresh cranberries to help keep their crews fit. These centuries later we know that the little cranberry supplied sailors with vitamin C. Modern health-conscious cooks might note that there's more of this nutrient (ascorbic acid is its other name) in unstrained than in strained homemade cranberry sauce.



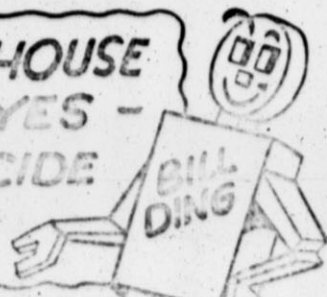
PICTURE RECIPE: For a relish, simmer about 20 minutes 1 pound cranberries, 1/4 cup each cider vinegar and water, 2 cups sugar, 1 teaspoon whole cloves and 2 whole all-spice (both tied in cheesecloth), and 2 cinnamon sticks.

... Indians pounded them along with dried deer meat into a pulp, then shaped the mixture into cakes and dried them in the sun. Interested in how far the berries have come? Then make up a batch of cranberry sauce. Measure out 1/2 cup of dried berries to make a cup. 1. Drain and heat canned peach or pear halves; add them to the fruit with a spoonful of cranberry sauce in each cavity. Over with roast turkey or chicken. 2. Stir some of the cranberry sauce into freshly-made applesauce to serve with roast pork. 3. Dry drained canned pineapple slices on paper toweling, then lightly brown the pineapple in hot butter in a skillet. (The drying helps along the browning.) Ring a ham loaf with the pineapple slices and into each cutout center. 4. Save orange halves when you prepare fresh orange juice. With a kitchen scissors clip out the membranes from inside the orange halves; zigzag or scallop the edges to make pretty cups. Add chunks of fresh oranges to cranberry sauce and spoon into the orange halves. Serve with roast duck when company's coming. 5. Halve canned sweet potatoes and turn them into a baking dish that is attractive enough to come to table. Heat them in the oven with an orange or other simple sauce; about five minutes before you are ready to serve, spoon a layer of cranberry sauce over the potatoes and return to the oven for just long enough to heat the berries but not long enough

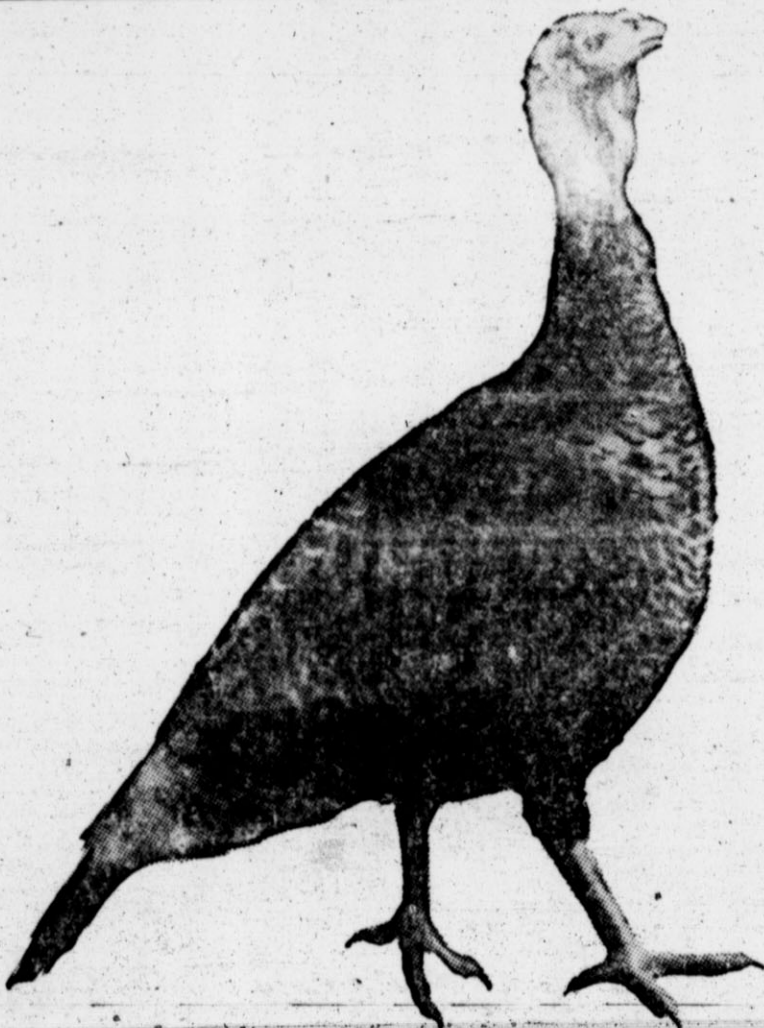
to change their pretty color. And last, a nice conceit: add a bowl of spiced cranberries to a relish tray of celery, carrot sticks, cottage cheese, cucumber slices. Pass with soft rolls and butter for eaters to much while Dad carves a bird or Mother slices a ham or beef loaf. BEAUTY AT HOME Q. What can you tell me about the use of perfume? A. 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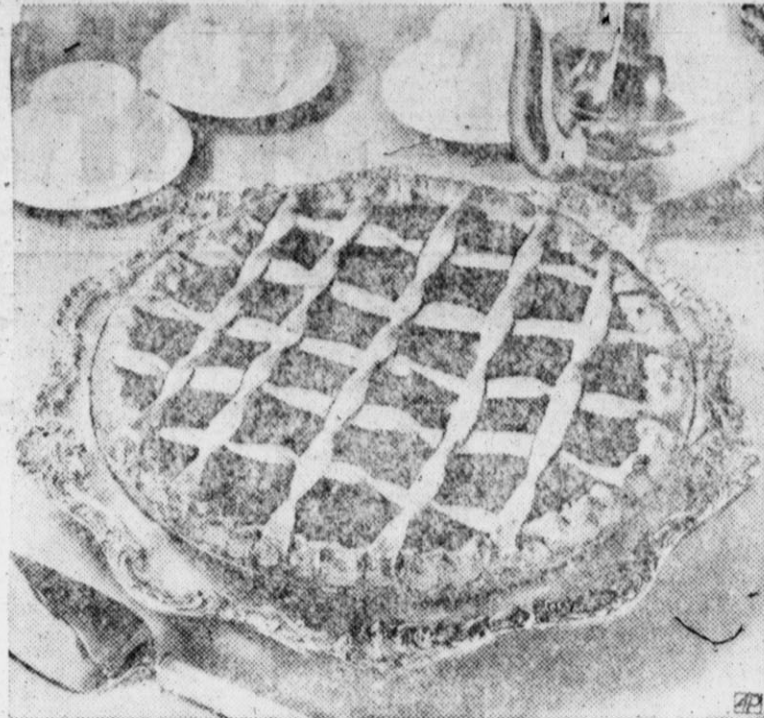

Mince Pie Is Just Thanksgiving Must

Bake your mincemeat pie several days before the holiday. If you have a freezer, store it there. If not, the pie will keep well in the refrigerator; just make sure you wrap it tightly. On Thanksgiving Day remember that it's blasphemous to serve mincemeat pie cold! It's flaky crust and rich filling, in our opinion, come to full fruition only when they are reheated.

Ready-to-use mincemeat is a convenient and exceptionally fine product but many good cooks like to add to it. We think orange gives extra pleasant flavor and that's what we've put in the following recipe.

Some mincemeat-pie experts always add fresh apple, using one or two pared chopped apples for every two cups of mincemeat. Cranberries and mincemeat are, of course, an old-time combination. In recent years other nominations for the mincemeat team have been canned crushed pineapple and canned or cooked dried apricots.

The pastry recipe we give you makes a delicious crust, but it's important to follow directions for cutting in the shortening and butter or margarine. The former should be cut into very fine particles; the latter should be allowed to stay in recognizable pieces.

HOLIDAY MINCE PIE

Ingredients: 2 1/4 cups sifted flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 2/3 cup shortening, 4 tablespoons margarine, 5 tablespoons water, 3 cups ready-to-use mincemeat, 2 tablespoons orange rind (coarsely grated).

meat, 2 tablespoons orange rind (coarsely grated).

Method: Sift flour and salt into a medium-sized bowl. With pastry blender or two knives cut in shortening until particles are fine. Add margarine and cut in until particles are the size of small peas. Sprinkle water over a little at a time and mix lightly with fork until dough holds together; form into a ball, cover and refrigerate about 15 minutes. In a small bowl mix mincemeat and orange rind. Divide dough in half. Roll out one portion into a 12-inch circle; ease into 9-inch pie plate and trim overhand to within 1 inch of rim. Spread mincemeat evenly in plate. Roll out second portion so it is the size of plate; with fluted cutter cut into twelve-inch strips. Weave strips in lattice fashion over top of pie. Fold under edges of strips and edge of bottom crust to form rim; flute. Bake in a hot (425 degrees) oven 30 minutes or until brown.

Note: For a pretty twirly effect that requires no weaving, cut plain 1/2-inch pastry strips; attach one end of each strip to bottom crust and twist as it is laid over the top of pie in lattice pattern.

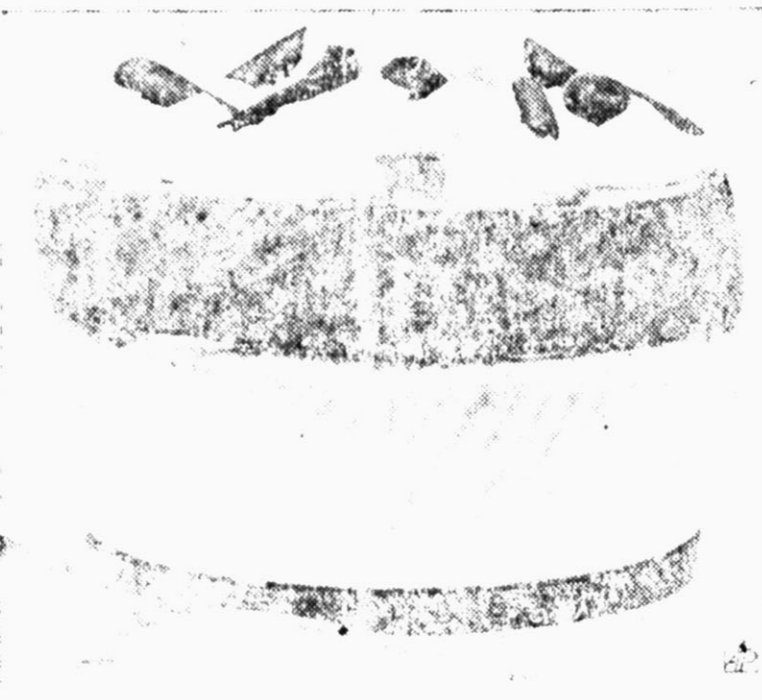
