



The proposed amendments, King pointed out, are included in two identical bills in the U.S. House of Representatives and two others in the Senate. The house bills are numbered H.B. 9869 and H.B. 9875.

King also suggested that state laws might be investigated to provide legislation superceding national regulations, particularly in regard to transportation safety and housing,

An American Duet In German Opera House

BERLIN (#) - Divided Berlin has opera houses in both East and West. In the West, one of the leading baritones happens to be a real westener-from Texas:

But hardly anyone would suspect that tall handsome 31-year old Thomas Stewart hails from San Saba, Tex. German is the language for almost all of the opera's productions and Stewart sings them like a German,

"His German is often easier to understand than that of German singers," says Dr. Horst Georges, one of the opera's top officials, "Stewart has a definite gift for languages.

Stewart's pretty, 31-year-old. Brooklyn-born wife, whose stage name is Evelyn Lear, also sings with the opera.
