





City Street Repairs Due: 'Now Or Later'

But feelings are running higher on this one than any issue presented in some time. At stake is permission for the city to issue \$220,000 in street improvement bonds. One group of citizens appeared when the proposal was first made, voicing some opposition. As a result, the city dropped one part of the proposed street improvement list and modified another.

But the issue remains basically the same. Does Hereford need to spend \$200,000 for street repairs? Your elected representatives on the City Commission have said it is vital for the continued progress of the town.

Regardless of some of the areas included for improvement, the question boils down to whether the City should spend money to protect its estimated \$2,000,000 investment in paved residential and business streets. It doesn't take a trained engineer to drive around town a few minutes and see that there are numerous holes and thin spots.

True, our streets would hold up pretty well for another year or two, possibly even longer. But wouldn't it make a lot more sense to spend some money now for repairs than to rip all the paving up and start from the beginning in a few years? Wouldn't it figure that a \$2 million investment would cost more to replace in ten years?

As for Third Street and its proposed widening. This street is termed a fire lane for the city fire department. Ask any of your volunteer firemen if they don't have a queasy feeling when they ride down that street on an emergency run, knowing that one careless driver could send them smashing into a parked car. Third Street is a major traffic artery for Hereford. It

Turnout of voters for Tuesday's city bond serves not only those who live on each side, but also those in all other parts of town.

> From a practical aspect, the value of property along Third Street would be improved if the street were widened. This has been true in other cities and other parts of Hereford. Why should it be different on Third? Who knows, maybe there would be fewer cars with battered right rear fenders parked along the street, if th were wider.

Still another aspect of the proposed bond issue, and one that has been ignored previously is that the City of Hereford found itself with a \$10,000 deficit on widening U. S. Highway 60 in the city.

This came about when the Texas Highvay Department told city officials that their part would be \$40,000. The city then stuck this amount aside. But they had nothing left when the THD came back and said their estimates had been wrong and that the kitty must be raised \$10,000. Rather than hold up the entire project, the city borrowed the money.

If the bond issue carries, and if the costs are about the estimate or lower, the city can immediately pay off its loan for the extra \$10,000.

Hereford has always been a progressive town, It has boasted of its many paved streets. But defeat of the bond issue might mean that its streets could become filled with holes. As one of the few small towns in the state which showed a population increase, it now stands at the crossroads. It can continue to be progressive and attractive, which could attract new businesses and industries. Or it can become stagnant, preferring to do nothing.

True, progress often is expensive. But is it more expensive than withering away? The voters can decide this for themselves when they vote Tuesday.

Cooperation Key To Area Progress

Recent proposal for a County-City "Summit Meeting" could pave the way for a more efficient operation within both governing bodies unless like some of the international meetings, it should accidently wind up in torrid disagreement.

For some time city-county relations have been strained on several subjects, including Moreman Street paving, tax evaluations and fire protection. A meeting of the type proposed should contribute toward amicable settlement of these and other controversial points. At least, it can be a step in he right direction.

We probably recognize the viewpoints of both sets of commissioners more clearly than the average person, chiefly because we are exposed to opinions on both sides and there are most definitely two sides.

Actually, however, the money which operates both governmental sub-divisions pretty well comes out of the same pockets; certainly, this is true concerning the 7,600 people who live within the city limits. The average tax payer, we feel, would like to see close cooperation between the two groups. Such unity, among other things, could contribute to a more economical and efficient operation for both the county and the city. One radio unit, for instance; one set of fire fighting equipment, and on and on. Even a central tax collecting office for the school, city and county could prove highly efficient and practical.

We cannot always expect our elected officials to agree. On the other hand, we do have every right to expect them to fill the duties of their offices in the most efficient, economical manner possible. Furthermore, we have a right to expect them to conduct themselves on an adult level

program, plays a very important role in attaining this prime goal. To make music a vital part of the educative process, the emphasis should be placed on education through music rather than education in music.

"We believe that our music program helps to develop a clear thinking American citizen through self-discipline, proper sense of values, good working habits, responsibility, cooperation, proper competitive spirit, leadership, fellowship, and participation in social experiences offered."

"We believe in the Phillips Schools that the basis for a strong, sound music program lies in the musical experiences of the elementary school. Attitudes are formed here that determine both qualitively and quantitively the strength of the choral groups in the upper grades; here begins the joy of exploration of music in its various forms; here the singing voice is developed by using it day to day without self-consciousness."

It is well to remember that these remarks come from an educator, rather than a music department head or a choir director. At least, they offer a possible answer to the ever-growing number of "mental" cases, now estimated at "one out of each 10 persons" in this country.

Supporting the theory of music education at the elementary level is parallel thinking in athletics. Hereford, for instance, now has 10 coaches who concentrate at least part of their time on football; four in high school, three in junior high and three on the elementary level. All of us appreciate winning football teams, but when it comes to the number of students participating, you would find hundreds in music as compared with tens in football. The argument for both activities is pretty well the same.

If the Phillips superintendent is even halfway right in his summary of benefits, it does seem that our schools should carefully study and at least consider music training on the elementary grade school

at all times, and we feel that they will continue to do just that.

Any city-county rift recalls the old saying that "a house divided against itself cannot stand" and, without general cooperation, it is not logical to expect the county or the city to continue to grow and prosper. The proposed joint session can, and we hope will, be the first step in this direction. The key to such a goal is well expressed in the Bible passage which says:

"Do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

Prudent investors would also verify the value of whatever the demand is for the product, and what competition is to be faced.

> "Above all," Thompson concluded, "prospective investor s should evaluate their own knowiedge of the field they are entering and their qualifications including the adequacy of their capital. Remember that there is no easy way to make a fortune, and that there is no substitute for experience."

Editor's note: The Bootleg Philosopher on his bindweed farm discusses economics this week, a subject he may be as well qualified on as any other, if you follow us. Dear editar:

You couldn't call me an economist, although I have one qualification a good many of them have - I have more ideas on economics than I have credit at the bank - but I have been puzzled lately by what the experts are saying about the state of the national economy.

As I understand it, the experts are split. One group says the country is in pretty good shape, nothing to worry about; the other group says we're in rather serious shape, there's plenty to worry about.


Now personally I have never had to wait on a group of experts to tell me whether I was well off or not. I have never based my economic position at any given moment on what a national survey has found out about me. No doubt it takes a group of experts to find out what the national economic growth rate is, but in my case all I have to do is look out the back door with a view of this bindweed farm and remember what my last bank statement showed.

However, I recognize that what my economic position is and what the national economic position is, are two different things. I don't reflect the country as a whole, and I hope the country as a whole doesn't reflect me. The situation couldn't be that serious.

But it does seem pretty confusing to have the experts in Washington disagreeing so completely on whether the country is well off or not, it's not fair to have Congress not knowing whether to raise taxes because a booming country can afford it or to lower them because a declining country can't, and therefore I have hit on an idea for settling the matter.

The thing to do is to let the Supreme Court decide it. Let some lawyer bring suit, I don't know who against, the United States Treasury, I guess, claiming the country is in bad shape and therefore taxes ought to be lowered. He could start the suit in a local court, work it on up through the state and finally on up to the Supreme Court, and along about this time of year, or the year after, the court would rule, and its opinion would thus become the economic law of the land. Then we could all settle down and look back and know for sure that back in February 1961, the country was either well off or bad off, by a five to four decision of the Supreme Court.






