# **Migrant** leaders pleased

**By The Associated Press** Leaders of migrant farm workers say they are pleased with efforts to revamp the state's regulations for housing migrant workers, but the reforms still are inadequate.

The Texas Department of Health is proposing revision for the first time of the 1972, which govern housing for 14,000 farm workers who stay in labor camps as they migrate from the Rio Grande Valley to Texas.

'We are very pleased with the regulations, but they certainly could be a lot better," Juanita Valdez Cox of the United Farm Workers of American told the Dallas Times. Herald. "Anything after 12 years is Lowry said. an improvement."

### On revisions made

The new regulations would call for the minimum living space for each worker or family member to be increased from 60 square feet to 100 square feet, said Troy Lowry, a Health Department official overseeing the revisions. Clean mattresses and four-burner stoves would be required for all facilities, he said.

Also, the changes would prohibit the storage of toxic chemicals in or close to living quarters and cattle pens would have to be at least 500 feet away from living quarters,

Migrants have been pushing for

protection from haphazard spraying of pesticides around camps or in the fields. They also want the camps to be better places to live.

One camp in Plainview "was just like the ark of Noah because it had all kinds of animals ... cockroaches, rats, bats, snakes, mosquitoes and flies. You name it," Jesus Moya, an organizer in the Panhandle for the International Union of Agricultural and Industrial Workers, said at a public hearing.

Moya is known for his inflammatory rhetoric.

But three Health Department of-

ficials at the hearing in Pharr, Texas, in the Rio Grande Valley also heard from others on the horrors of migrant housing. Workers told of overcrowding, vermin, bad water and filthy latrines.

The growers, who provide housing and must pay for improvements, have indicated they will not fight the new regulations.

"I can't get excited over this, I'm sorry," said Jerry Walzel, a vice president of the 500-member Texas Citrus and Vegetable Growers Association.

"Our people are trying to avoid any conflict or unionization. ... I realize the Texas Rural Legal Aid and the Farm Workers Union would like to hear some objections from us, but they won't," he said.

However, Walzel said the new regulations won't have a big impact in many camps because most growers know about the rules and already are close to compliance.

The Health Department will gather public input for another month, and unless drastic revisions are required in the proposals, the regulations could be approved by late July, he said.

"With a little give and take, we feel that it can be accomplished without disrupting the whole season," Lowry said. "The growers need the workers and the workers need the growers."

The modified regulations would be another victory for the state's migrant workers.

In 1983, after years of lobbying, the farm workers pushed through regulations setting standards for sanitation facilities in the fields. Earlier this year, a state district judge ruled unconstitutional a state law that banned farm workers from receiving unemployment benefits.

### Congress divided on contra aid

WASHINGTON (AP) - A divided Congress is looking for middle ground on President Reagan's request for \$14 million in aid to Nicaraguan rebels, after the Democrat-led House rejected the plan and Republican-controlled Senate passed it.

Key votes were expected today in the House on Democratic and Republican alternatives. Both would supply \$14 million but differ on how the money would be distributed.

Secretary of State George Shultz said the crucial vote would come on a Reagan-backed Republican proposal, sponsored by House Minority Leader Robert Michel of Illinois. That plan would give \$14 million in non-lethal aid to the Contras through the U.S. Agency for International Development.

"We are working hard on that and we are in there to win," said Shultz. The House Democratic plan, sponsored by Reps. Michael Barnes Maryland and Lee Hamilton of I diana, would give \$10 million to tl International Red Cross or United (See NICARAGUA, Page 2)

# Task force head labels Lucas' claims 'absurd'

#### **By The Associated Press**

Henry Lee Lucas' claims that he confessed to scores of murders he didn't commit, with the help of inside information fed him by law enforce-ment officers, is absurd, Texas Ranger Bob Prince says.

Prince, who headed a Texas Rangers' task force in the Lucas investigation, said Tuesday that to believe Lucas is to assume "a mass conspiracy ... of officers throughout the United States to clear these

cases. That's ridiculous." The Ranger sergeant issued the denial from his office in Austin after Lucas held a news conference earlier

Tuesday in Waco to publicly recant his confessions of hundreds of slayings across the country over a 10-year period.

"He's got everything in the world to gain by getting people to believe he didn't kill anyone," Prince said, calling Lucas' statement that he has killed only his mother, "absolutely absurb."

"Lucas has personally led officers back to well in excess of 100 crime scenes. He has brought up informa-tion on crimes that they were totally unaware of because it is out of their jurisdiction," Prince said. "Do you believe the word of a con- "his claims.

#### Crime victim bill passes House

AUSTIN (AP) - The House has advanced a bill aimed at giving crime victims an expanded role in the justice system by keeping them informed about trials and parole proceedings.

In a preliminary vote Tuesday, San Antonio Rep. Frank Tejeda won 53-0 support for his bill, which faces a final vote today before going to the Senate.

He told the House that crime victims are often forgotten.

"For far too long we've viewed it as the state vs. the defendant. The victim has been left out," said Tejeda.

His bill drew support from organizations such as Parents of Murdered Children and the Coalition for Victims' Rights.

Included in the measure are provisions guaranteeing that victims would be notified of court proceedings involving their case. In instances where the victim was killed, the immediate family would be notified.

#### Judge Sarah Hughes dies

DALLAS (AP) - U.S. District Judge Sarah T. Hughes, who swore in Lyndon B. Johnson as president after the 1963 assassination of President John F. Kennedy, has died at the age of 88.

Mrs. Hughes died about 11 p.m. Tuesday at Presbyterian Hospital, said Lois Swan Jones, an aide to Mrs. Hughes.

Mrs. Hughes had not heard any cases for three years after suffering a massive stroke, Ms. Jones said. She was hospitalized in February and had been in a nursing home since the stroke, Ms. Jones said.

Mrs. Hughes swore in Johnson, a fellow Texan, as president aboard Air Force One on Nov. 22, 1963, after Kennedy was pronounced dead from a sniper's bullet.

She served in the Texas Legislature from 1931-35, and was a state district judge from 1935 to 1961, when she was appointed to the federal bench by Kennedy.

#### Courtroom outbursts said costly

PALO PINTO, Texas (AP) - A 25-year-old man sentenced to death by injection for the death of a Dublin minister might have received a life term if he had not made repeated courtroom outbursts, a defense attorney says.

A state district court jury took less than an hour Tuesday afternoon to condemn Robert Michael Purtell to death for killing the Rev. John H. Basham more than a year ago.

Defense attorney Ken Tarlton said he believes the outbursts "shot us. It just blew it sky-high. We had a shot on life (sentence). ...'

Purtell, a Lowell, Mass., native, took word of the death sentence calmly, with a nod of his head, but three times earlier made outbursts in the courtroom.

## Garn impressed by astronaut professionalism

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) - Senator Jake Garn, who flew on the space shuttle Discovery last week, said the professional manner of the astronauts trying to repair a satellite brought tears to his eyes

"It was a magnificent job, and there are no words to describe what a success this mission was and how proud I am of these people," Garn, 52, said Tuesday.

Garn, chairman of the Senate subcommittee that control's NASA's budget, flew on the mission as a congressional observer. The Utah Republican made the remarks at a news conference with his six crewmates at the Johnson Space Center.

The Discovery crew successfully launched two satellites during the seven-day mission, but was unable to turn on the Syncom satellite using makeshift fly swatter-like tools.

Garn, who had volunteered to perform a series of medical experiments on space sickness, said he quickly became ill after Discovery was launched.

"I was very sick after about nine hours in flight," Garn said. "It was sort of like the stomach flu. On the second day, I was still nauseated. On the third day, it was all gone.

"I did not expect to go from feeling so bad to feeling so wonderful," he said. "The next five days were the most fantastic of my life."

Garn said his experience of training for the mission and spending seven days in orbit will enable him to recommend changes at NASA.

# Pope names new cardinals today

VATICAN CITY (AP) - Pope John Paul II named 28 new cardinals today including the archbishops of New York and Boston.

In an announcement at his general audience in St. Peter's Square, the pope also named two Polish prelates. including the archbishop of Wroclaw.

The pope also named as cardinals the archbishops of Santiago, Chile; Managua, Nicaragua; Cebu, Philippines; Lyon, France; Utrecht, Netherlands; Madrid, Spain; Addis Ababa, Ethiopia; and Quebec.

The new cardinals also include the leader of the Ukrainian Catholic Church, who is based in Rome, and a Rome-based Czech prelate. The new cardinals will be formally

elevated in a consistory at the Vatican May 25.

With the promotions, the pope said he was bringing the number of cardinals under the age of 80, and therefore eligible to vote for a future pope, to 120 - the maximum possible under present church rules.

# **Holocaust survivor** discovers two aunts

DALLAS (AP) - For 42 years, and his father's name, and that's Max Glauben thought he was the only member of his family who had survived the Jewish Holocaust.

His father, mother, brother and grandparents all perished in German concentration camps, and his father's two sisters had last been seen, he thought, as they were led to camp near Lublin, Poland. There, the gas chambers at a death camp.

Glauben was overjoyed.

#### Former U.S. Sen. Sam Ervin dies

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP) - The death of former U.S. Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., the "country lawyer" who presided over the Watergate hearings that led to the resignation of a president, has cost the nation a "towering historical figure" who championed the Constitution.

Ervin, 88, died of respiratory failure Tuesday at North Carolina Baptist Hospital's Bowman Gray Medical Center, said hospital spokesman Roger Rollman. Kidney failure contributed to his death, Rollman said.

A critic of the civil rights movement and a supporter of individual civil liberties during his 20 years in the Senate, Ervin was hailed by former Gov. Jim Hunt as a man who "loved the Constitution more than any man alive today."

Ervin's independence made him a natural choice when Senate leaders sought a chairman for the sensitive and potentially explosive hearings on Watergate in the summer of 1973.

### Remains of missing professor found

MEXICO CITY (AP) - The remains of a University of Colorado professor who disappeared while driving to a teaching job in northwest Mexico nearly three years ago have been found in a ravine in that area, officials said.

The remains, found Sunday by woodcutters, were identified as those of Nicholas W. Schrock by Mexican dentist Judith Torres, who compared them to Schrock's dental records, U.S. Embassy spokesman Lee Johnson said Tuesday.

Johnson said American-made tennis shoes, red arch supports and a Timex watch found with the remains also matched what Schrock was wearing when he vanished while driving to a teaching job in Guadalajara.

He said consular officials in Sinaloa state had been in touch with Schrock's wife, Ruth, in Boulder, Colo., and that she said her husband had used red arch supports.

Schrock disappeared May 31, 1982, while driving on Mexico's Pacific Coast Highway 15. He was 42.

#### Israeli forces begin withdrawal

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Israeli forces today withdrew from positions in the Bekaa Valley in eastern Lebanon where they have faced the Syrian army since Israel's 1982 invasion, the Lebanese army command reported.

The military said the pullout began at 7 a.m., with convoys of tanks, armored vehicles and trucks carrying men, weapons and equipment heading south.

By early afternoon, the Israelis had moved south about 12 miles to the bottom of the valley, said a military spokesman who declined to be identified.

Israeli helicopters crisscrossed the Bekaa, apparently covering the pullback, and unidentified jets flew over Beirut.

The spokesman said Israeli warplanes flew over the valley dropping leaflets warning the Lebanese not to cooperate with Shiite Moslem fighters waging hit-and-run attacks on Israeli forces.

The Cleveland Cavaliers, after 1977, didn't want to hear that it was tainted.







# Guarding against salmonella

With the recent outbreak of salmonella poisoning in the midwest, consumers are concerned about the safety of food they buy at the store.

But they should be equally concerned about food safety at home, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service

nutrition specialist. Salmonella is a common bacteria found in the gastrointestinal tracts of animals and man, says Marilyn Hag-

gard. It most usually affects high protein foods such as meat, poultry, fish and eggs. However, any food that

# Health Lawrence E. Lamb, M.D. Lighting can affect vitamins

that products under fluorescent lighting lose their vitamin content after 24 hours. Does this apply to vitamins and food in all types of containers glass, tin, and cardboard, - or is the entire theory false? In my market and drugstore everything is under flu-

orescent lights. DEAR READER - There is a limited amount of truth to that statement. Riboflavin (vitamin B-2) found in milk is sensitive to ultraviolet light. If milk is kept in glass or clear containers, it may lose from 20 to 80 percent of its riboflavin within just two hours. This does not happen to milk in opaque containers, such as the cardboard cartons of milk.

Vitamin A is also very sensitive to sunlight. The vitamin A in milk in glass containers also can be destroyed quickly. However, vitamin D formation is stimulated by sunlight on your skin.

The story of vitamins, food processing and storage doesn't end there. The way in which food is processed has a lot to do with its vitamin content. Vitamin C can be lost simply by cut-ting the food to prepare it. A good example is cutting or mashing fresh strawberries. Just standing in storage can cause a lot of vitamin loss, and cooking may destroy other vitamins. Adding baking soda to maintain the pretty green color of vegetables causes a loss of both vitamin C and thiamine. In general, the longer a food is stored, the greater the vitamin loss.

I have summarized this problem in The Health Letter 20-8, How Food **Processing Affects Nutritive Values**, which I am sending you. DEAR DR. LAMB - I read recently that some foods can affect blood thinners that are taken to prevent blood clots. The story said that some foods contain a vitamin that neutralizes the medicines and can affect the blood-clotting balance. Is that true? My husband had a light stroke a year ago and recovered well, but he takes Coumadin. Will certain foods affect Use it under your arms regularly for how effective his Cournadin is? I have awhile and see if it helps. tried to give him a good low-fat, lowcholesterol diet and keep his calories down. I emphasize fruits, vegetables, skim milk, lean meats, fish and chicken, and I give him a lot of salads. So far, he has done well, and has his prothnombin time checked to see if his blood clotting is in the right range to prevent a clot from forming. What foods should he avoid, if any, to keep his blood thin?

DEAR DR. LAMB - I have read His Coumadin dose is regulated by his tests, and a change in his diet could

affect his blood-clotting mechanism. You are referring to vitamin K which is the antidote used to neutralize the anti-coagulant Coumadinant if a patient gets too much of it. Vitamin K is abundant in leafy vegetables such as lettuce, broccoli and turnip greens. The Journal of the American Medical Association recently reported on a woman who was taking Coumadin because of an artificialheart valve. She went on a saladbased diet and lost her protection from the Coumadin. As a result, a clot formed from the valve and went to her coronary artery, causing a heart attack. If your husband has been eating a lot of salads and stops them, he may have too much Coumadin, which could increase his chances of bleeding, so be consistent for the best results

DEAR DR. LAMB - I am 45 and in good health. I have always perspired freely. When I first started wearing synthetics, I found that I produced a peculiar body odor. This was fairly easy to control by changing after a few hours.

For the past few years we have lived in a very humid area, and I stain my polyester garments under the arms. They look yellow after three or four wearings even though I shower daily. I have been trying to buy garments made of cotton or natural fabrics, but that is surprisingly hard to do and I suspect that even these garments are beginning to discolor. I would appreciate any help you might offer.

DEAR READER - Synthetics often don't "breathe," and this tends to trap body moisture. That is a perfect breeding ground for bacteria, which cause perspiration to develop an odor. In addition, bacterial action on perspiration can cause perspiration to stain clothing.

You can't expect to eliminate the bacteria that cause the problem by using ordinary soap. Instead, use a product that penetrates the skin. The

becomes contaminated and is then held at improper temperatures can cause salmonella, she explains.

According to the specialist, contamination of cooked foods is often caused by contact with surfaces or utensils that are not properly washed after use with raw meats.

Insufficient cooking of food that has been contaminated can also cause food borne illness. Salmonella are destroyed at cooking temperatures about 165 degrees F, Haggard notes.

She advises following a few simple guidelines to reduce the possibility of salmonella poisoning:

-Wash your cutting board thoroughly after each use-especially if you have been cutting raw meat on

-Wash your hands carefully before handling food.

-Wash raw foods well.

-Heat foods to at least 165 degrees

F before serving. -Refrigerate or freeze leftovers im-

mediately after a meal. -Keep pet feeding dishes and toys

out of the kitchen. The barbeque and picnic season brings special food poisoning hazards with it, Haggard cautions. "It's especially important to make sure protein foods like deviled eggs, hamburgers and hot dogs and other picnic fare, are cooked thoroughly

and kept at the proper temperature," she says. "Any food borne illness we get from improper handling of food at

home may not receive the publicity of a major outbreak from a commercial manufacturing source," Haggard remarks. "But the symptoms and seriousness of the illness are the same."

Refusal is basic to dieting, and dieters can feel virtuous at Thanksgiving by refusing to pass up second helpings.
