C. E. GATLIN LOSES \$50.00 IN PRIZE MONEY TO A. J. BAKER OF CASTRO CO. TWO BALES **AUCTIONED OFF FOR PRICE 25 CENTS**

It cost C. E. Gatlin, farmer, one and one half miles south, just \$50 last Friday because he decided he could take the first bale prize by getting up early Saturday morning, instead of bringing in the bale Friday night. A. J. Baker, thirty five miles south in Castro courty, the man who won first bale contest last year, chugged into Hereford at 11:00 o'clock Friday night with his first bale, made sure of his prize by telephoning a member of the Cotton Committee, and took the Chamber of Commerce prize of \$75 for the first bale. Mr. Gatlin drew the \$25 second premium.

Each bale weighed approximately 460 pounds. Their arrival was made the occasion for the formal opening of the new Johnson & Moore Gin, where the two bales were put through the new saws before an interested crowd of spectators. The gin men were kept busy most of the day demonstrating their new outfit to the stream of visitors, among whom were many ladles.

The two bales of cotton were auctioned off to the highest bidder by Auctioneer W. S. Williams Saturday afternoon, the sale being held on the vacant lot opposite the First National Bank. Both bales were bought by F. B. Tillotson, manager of the Hereford Gin, who paid twenty five cents flat for the cot-

Picking has begun in spots now, and cotton is slowly beginning to open. Within the next ten days or two weeks, if the weather remains favorable, both gins should be kept busy handling the fleecy staple as it pours in.

Hereford Community Suffers Very Severe Blow in Death of Her First Citizen, Mayor William M. Knight

Hereford bowed her head in genuine rrow last Saturday evening when ord spread rapidly through the city that Mayor William M. Knight had been released from his sufferings and had passed to the Great Beyond. The end came about 5:30 o'clock at the Hereford Sanitarium, when he had been gradually losing an unequal battle since being stricken with paralysis six months ago.

The body was taken to the E. A Johnson residence, where Judge Knight had made his home for many years. Sunday afternoon the body was carried from the house to the Baptist church by the Knights Templar, of which he was a member, and followed by about twenty personal friends of the decease At the church the Rev. W. P. Garris of the Methodist church read a chapter of Scripture and delivered an earne prayer after which Rev. W. R. Hill the Baptist church spoke at ac length. 


