**Three Cultural Club Members On Week's Program**

NW HEREFORD — Three Club members gave talks on "Spring Planting" at the regular meeting of the Cultural Home Demonstration Club Thursday afternoon in the home of Mrs. Thomas Barclay.

Mrs. Leona Packard spoke on "How to Buy Plants". She stated that early spring buying was very important and one should avoid buying plants with a strong top growth.

Mrs. Packard also said to be sure and look for aphid on leaves and stems of plants when buying them. This is a disease that you sure do not want to get started in your gardens and shrubs, she stated.

Mrs. Earl Dehart spoke on "Quick Guide to Best Flowering Shrubs and Trees", stating that the crab apple will grow from eight to 15 feet in height in a short time with proper care, and the Oriental Cherrie is also a good quick growing shrub which will reach a height of 25 feet. Mrs. Dehart also suggested that the red-flowering dogwood was another good flowering shrub.

Mrs. Louis Olson talked for a few minutes on "How to Keep Big Shrubs in Bounds".

She stated that now is the time to prune trees and shrubs, also rose bushes and other flowering shrubs. She advised that pruning means cutting out

the dead and diseased canes, and that shearing is a form of pruning to make plants retain their uniform size and shape. Mrs. Olson also gave the correct ways of pruning a rose bush and other shrubs. She emphasized that now is the time to prune.

During the business session, the committee recommendations were read and approved. The club voted to send \$5 to the Rotary club for the Junior Livestock and Poultry Show.

### Contractors Warned of Ceiling Price Regulation For Industry

The new tailored ceiling price regulation on construction covers practically all contractors. OPS, price officials said today, but most contractors are not aware that they are required to make certain filings with the district office.

Until these filings are made, they are not in compliance with the price stabilization program. "Contractors are not required to make filings on jobs that were in progress at the time the regulation (CPR93) became effective November 20 of last year," Hoyle Bowles, head of the Industrial Materials and Manufactured Goods Section of the Lubbock OPS, said, "neither do they have to file if they had properly filed under Ceiling Price Regulation 34, the regulation covering services."

haunted, was written to cure the hardships worked on contractors by CPR 34. The new filing requirement provides that the filing must be made on any contract job started since November 20 within sixty days after work starts or the contract is accepted. In general, the new regulation establishes ceiling prices on the basis of current costs for labor, materials and equipment, plus a specified markup for profit, based on customary profits during a base period.

Except for actual increases in labor and material costs, it is not expected that the new regulation will result in any general increase in charges for construction work, price officials said.

The regulation covers transactions in which the seller furnishes labor service or any combination of labor, materials, equipment and service for building

construction, highway construction, heavy construction, railroad construction and a broad range of miscellaneous construction. Also included are transactions which involve shop fabrication by the installer of materials; the sale of installation or erection service by a manufacturer who installs or erects a commodity manufactured by him and charges separately for the installation or erection; and any transaction involving both the manufacture and installation or erection of a commodity with a single charge for the entire service.

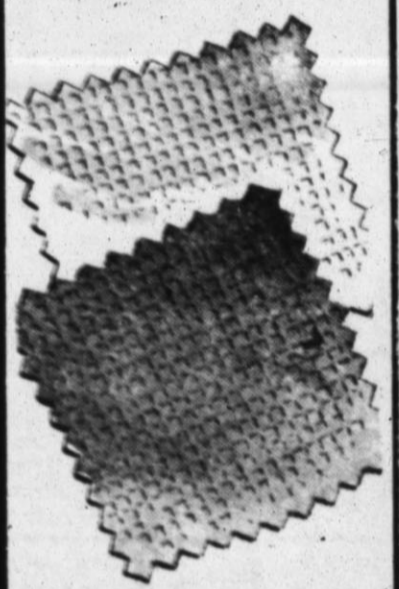

Quite a few people have been calling and coming in to ask about the letter written regarding P.T.A. last Sunday. Most everyone seems to think that it is a fake. A publicity stunt. Honest, folks. I don't know. I didn't think so, or I wouldn't have printed it. Bob Thompson gave it to me and I am sure he considered it genuine. It was written in ink, on theme paper—and was signed. Maybe the name was fictitious, but I was acting in good faith. Maybe I have been duped. Maybe it's a bad situation, if the letter was not genuine it can be attributed to ignorance rather than to insincerity.

Quite a few people think George Graham wrote the letter. I don't think so. In the first place, I don't think he could do such a good job. In the second place, I don't think he would. Mrs. Clyde Cave says she used to be a teacher—and she absolutely believes it impossible for a former teacher to have written it. I really don't know. I still think it was genuine.

City politics, drawing near the deadline, seems to be shaping up. A series of petitions were being circulated this week encouraging the present city officials to run again—in behalf of instituting the Home Rule form of city government. This is possible, now that Hereford has a population of 5,000—and it looks like the only sensible answer. A lot depends upon getting an honest, competent City Manager, however. These situations can be very, very bad. They can also be ex-

ceptionally good. It all depends upon the City Manager. Such a situation recently split Colorado City wide open. Other small cities have grown and prospered under the plan.

Hereford is undergoing another minor building boom. Several houses are now under construction and several more are slated to start within the next 30 days. Rumor has it that at least four large buildings will be started along the tracks within two or three weeks, mostly processing and warehouse facilities. Building costs are tremendous, but most people seem to think they will get higher rather than lower. Automobile prices have also staged a phenomenal jump. Wool and cottons are down from a year ago. Foods seem to be as low, maybe a little bit lower—but car prices are certainly up. Part of this is due to the new tax levied last fall, and part to price increases.

Next week-end will see the annual Rotary-sponsored Junior Livestock Show in Hereford. This is a truly fine thing and deserves community-wide support. We talk a lot about potatoes and lettuce and carrots, even wheat, but livestock is still the basic commodity of the territory—and it keeps right on going without too much propaganda and promotion. This is because it is established as a practical, profitable industry in the community. The annual show encourages and furthers interest in livestock. However, it is getting big, mighty big. The Rotarians even talked about turning it over to the Chamber of Commerce, but everyone urged them to keep on sponsoring the show. A lot of people promised to help. The time has come when they need that help. Let's all pitch in and do everything they ask.

Another phase which deserves credit is the fact that the Rotarians this year dropped the lottery angle in paying for the show. Lots and lots of people are happy about this development. The Junior Livestock Show was too excellent to draw fire by being underwritten through a lottery. Understand they have the money now, thanks to generous donations.

Last year Tom McFarland, Walter Galley and several farmers from the Dawn community almost got on their knees and pleaded for a small tract of castor beans at a meeting in Vernon Texas. The Baker Company officials said, "No, our acreage has been allotted." However, the Deaf Smith delegation wouldn't take "No" for an answer. Finally, Baker allocated enough seed to plant 800 acres. Last Thursday the Baker Company announced employment of a local representative—and are offering 10,000 to 12,000 acres in this area for 1957. Dr. Domingo, company scientist, says some details still have to be worked out—but he believes the Hereford area may in the future become one of the nation's No. 1 castor bean areas. The company now has two processing plants: one on the Atlantic coast and one on the Pacific coast. Now that beans are being grown inland, rather than imported, there is even talk of a huge castor oil plant for an inland location. If things work out, it might be around here. Who knows.

And if things should turn out this way, it will be chiefly because a bunch of guys just simp-

wind erosion throughout most of the district. Wheat is also doing a good job of holding the soil where there was enough moisture at planting time and the wheat grew off satisfactorily. Fields without good cover will need to be chiseled or listed.

Several hundreds of acres of hairy vetch, their report says, were planted in early fall and good stands are reported at this time. The legume is affording cover, improving the soil structure and adding nitrogen to the soil for plant use.

## Old-Fashioned Pork Roast Good To Build Meal Around

If you are wondering what to serve in between winter and spring, try pork roast surrounded with vegetables, accompanied by Hawaiian Fruit Ring. For dessert—if you are in a patriotic mood—you may like to use your favorite cherry pie recipe as the tart cherry combines wonderfully with pork.

1 cup diced orange sections  
¼ cup sugar  
1 cup orange juice and water

1 package orange jello  
1 cup hot water  
1 tablespoon grated orange rind  
3 tablespoons chopped macerated cherries  
1 cup drained pineapple tidbits cut in half

Combine oranges and sugar and let stand ten minutes. Drain and add water or orange juice to make one cup. Dissolve jello in hot water and add the orange juice mixture and orange rind. Chill until slightly thickened and fold in the diced orange sections and pineapple and cherries.

Pour in ring mold, individual molds or 6x10 pyrex dish. This may also be made in fancy dishes.

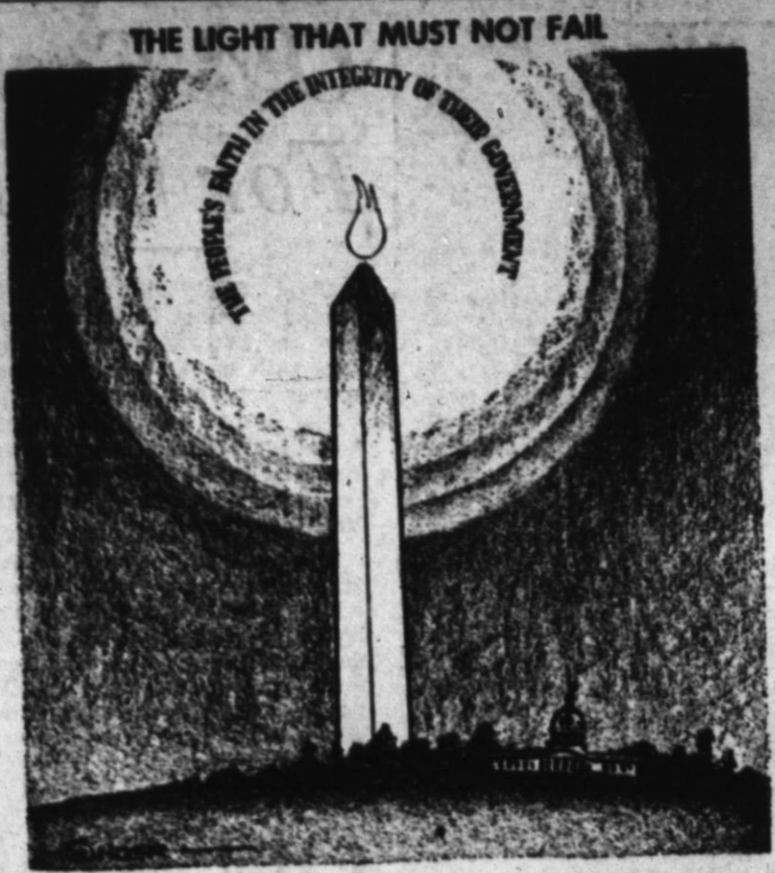

**Name Specialist For Green Bug Study At Pantex**

PLAINVIEW — An Oklahoma A&M entomologist, Dr. Donald Ashdown, has been employed to take charge of a research project on an old enemy of the wheat growers, the greenbug.  
Harold Hinn, general manager of the Harvest Queen Mill and Elevator Co. of Plainview and coordinator of a greenbug-control research fund, announced Saturday that Dr. Ashdown would take over the project at Pantech Farms near Amarillo about March 1.

The project, to attack the problem of greenbugs as a menace to Texas wheat, is a cooperative project between Texas Tech, the Texas A&M College Experiment Station, and the Division of Cereal and Forage Insects Investigation of the Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine.  
All original research at Pantech is being carried out by cooperation between Texas Tech and Texas A&M college.  
"During the past two years, wheat production in the Plains

area has been reduced 75 to 80 per cent due to the greenbug and other pests. Something must be found that will stop the damage", Hinn said.  
Santa Fe Railway Co. originated the greenbug control project and is a major contributor to the research fund. Santa Fe was joined by Rock Island Railway Co., Harvest Queen Mill and Elevator Co., Producers Grain Corporation of Amarillo, Uhlmann Elevators Co. of Fort Worth, Burrus Mills of Dallas, and country and terminal grain elevators of 35 West Texas towns.  
Funds are being provided to support the investigation over an initial period of three years.

The 34-year-old Ashdown is a native of Utah. He received his B. S. degree from Utah State Agriculture College in 1942 and his Ph. D. from Cornell University in 1948.

During the past four years, in which he was in charge of research in the fruits and vegetables branch of the Oklahoma Experiment Station, he worked closely with Dr. R. G. Dahms, noted Oklahoma entomologist, who is in charge of greenbug investigation for the Federal Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine.

At Pantech, Dr. Ashdown will be dealing with a treacherous little insect that can wipe out entire fields of young wheat in a few days. Due to the limited climatic conditions in which the greenbug is destructive, widespread damage due to the insect may be noticed only twice in a decade.

Some research has been carried out on the control of the greenbug, but thus far it has proven either too expensive or limited in its effect. Dr. Ashdown's definite path of investigation is unknown at present, but in addition to insecticides he has expressed special interest in systemic insecticides, a seed treatment which might immunize the plant against the bug.

In carrying out the study of infestation and its control, considerable thought and study will be given to the influence of fer-

tilizers on both production and resistance of the wheat plant to greenbug infestation.  
More than 5,000 acres of wheat land will be available as needed for greenbug research on the

Pantech Farms. The farms have been operated by the Texas Tech Division of Agriculture for research since 1949. Three other major projects are in progress on the farms at present.

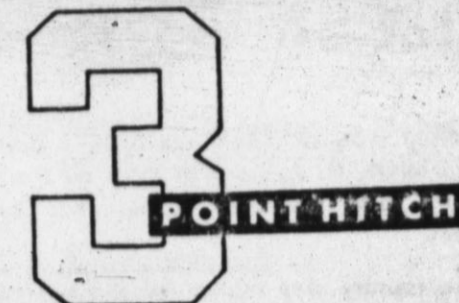

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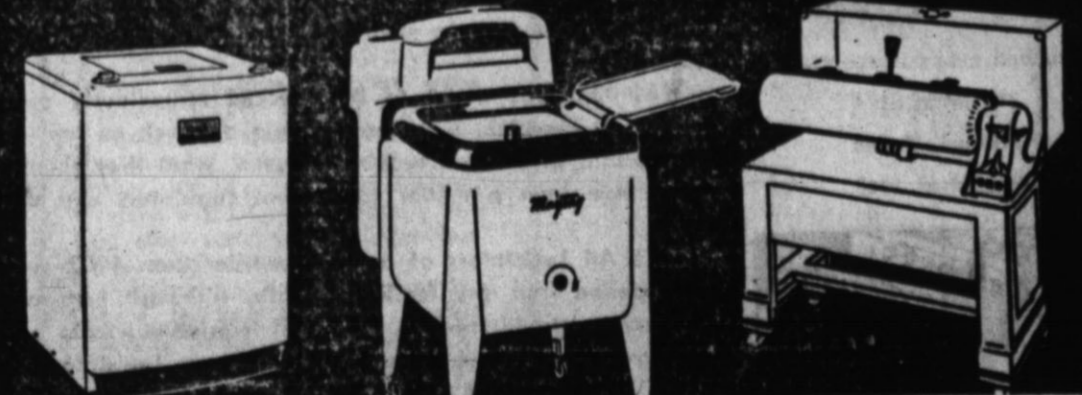

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## Deaf Smith County As Described In New "Handbook Of Texas"

This article was taken from the "Handbook of Texas", a two-volume work containing approximately 15,000 articles dealing with every phase of Texas life from the primitive Indian to the present time.

### Deaf Smith County

Deaf Smith County is in the extreme western row of counties of the Texas Panhandle. Created in 1876 by the act of the legislature which laid out fifty-four counties on the Llano Estacado, the new county was named in honor of Erastus (Deaf) Smith. The area of the county is 1,549 square miles; its altitude is 3,200 to 4,000 feet; the annual rainfall averages twenty inches; the mean annual temperature is 56.6 degrees. The population of Deaf Smith County, since its organization in 1890, has had a gradual increase: 1900, 843; 1920, 3,747; 1940, 6,056; 1950, 9,073. The surface of the county is smooth prairie which becomes rolling on the western edge of the Panhandle. The soil is loam, varying from deep chocolate to sandy. The Tierra Blanca is the only stream, but underground water is easily accessible for irrigation of the sweet and Irish potatoes, soy beans, corn, clover, alfalfa, and wheat which constitute the principal crops. The leading industry is stockraising; the area is one of the leading centers for registered Herefords. There is no timber in Deaf Smith County; the minerals are largely undeveloped, but pumicite, sulphur, volcanic ash, clays, and caliche exist. The presence of fluorine and iodides in the soil has caused the county seat, Hereford, to be called the "Town without a Toothache" because of the absence of dental decay within the area.

One of the earliest Anglo-American expeditions to cross the area now included in Deaf Smith County was that of William R. Shafter, who entered it from the south in 1875. He found the territory still occupied by Indians. Early settlers in Deaf Smith County were ranchers who built scattered dugout headquarters and moved with the herds. By 1876 large ranches, including the XII, had been established in the area. Railroad building and the selling of railroad lands brought farmers to the county. One of the first barbed wire fences in Texas was erected in Deaf Smith County in 1881; it was a drift fence put up by the T Anchor Ranch. When the county was organized in 1890, the herds of Herefords already within its boundaries gave the name to the county seat, Hereford, which is the shipping point and distribution center of the county. Points of interest include the old dugout line camp on Tierra Blanca Creek where the cowboy strike of 1887 was planned, and the ruins of slab houses erected by prehistoric people. The County is served by the Pan-

handle and Santa Fe Railroad. Dawn and Glenrio are local markets.

## Beauty at Home

**Q. How can I best combat enlarged pores in my skin?**

A. By diet and cleanliness. Plenty of green vegetables, fresh fruits, and at least eight glasses of water a day. Scrub the face thoroughly several times daily, and follow with rubbing cotton-wrapped ice over the face, concentrating on the affected areas.

**Q. What makeup will make thin, hollow cheeks appear rounder?**

A. Apply a lighter shade of foundation than on the rest of the face, in the hollow depressions under the cheekbones.

**Q. What rinse after the shampoo will bring out the highlights in red hair?**

A. Very good for this is navel oil in water. You need a handful of clean, channeled navel and two quarts of water. Boil for six minutes.

**Q. How can I take special care of the skin just around my eyes?**

A. Keep oil or cream on that soft area overnight, and it's even permissible, and quite smart, to apply cream on the upper lids during the day. Spread it on the lids in one gentle sweeping motion from inner to outer corner.

**Q. What is a good softener for water that is too hard for a good shampoo?**

A. Baking soda or cornstarch.

**Q. How should the older woman apply her rouge?**

A. She should be snoring about this. Too many older women think that lots of rouge gives them a youthful look, but instead

it makes them look artificial. Cream rouge is best for the woman over forty. Use it carefully.

**Q. What are the general tips on hairdressing for the various face-types, as advocated by hairdressers?**

A. Waves over forehead and dipping off-center for the square face; upward lines and soft curls for the round face; and a side part for the long and heart-shaped face.

**Q. Just what can I do to combat double-chin?**

A. Use night cream faithfully and regularly, stroking and patting on, going up and out from the base of the throat to the tip of the chin. Also, use the "resisting" kind of exercise to help build up the chin-supporting muscles. Put back of left hand against right side of face. Force chin to resist and push all way around to left shoulder. Reverse positions, alternating moves.

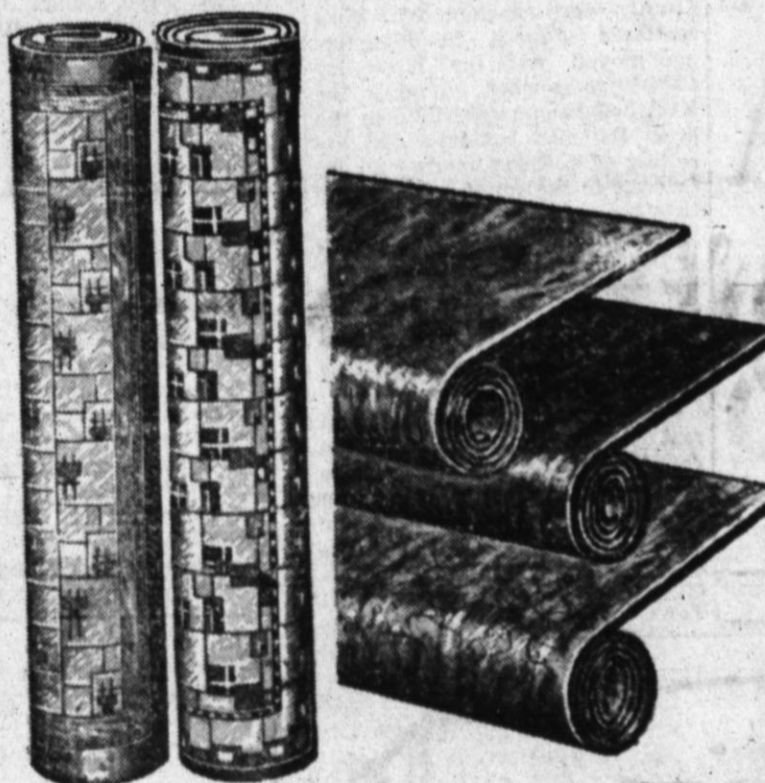

Fred Barrett and Sons, Hereford potato growers and shippers, announced through the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce recently that they will plant between 250 and 300 acres of potatoes there this coming season.

The present plans call for processing and shipping the spuds

from Muleshoe. Barretts will carry on the Muleshoe work in conjunction with their operations in Hereford, which will remain the same.

Announcement of the new Muleshoe industry came after the Chamber of Commerce and local real estate men there an-

nounced that sufficient land had been purchased for the Barretts.

According to the Muleshoe Journal, Barrett, his four sons and one son-in-law are connected with the business. One or more of the families will move to Muleshoe, according to the report.

The acreage secured is scattered throughout the northern and northeastern section of the county in tracts of 40 and 80 acres each. This was done to prove the soil and to have acreage in various parts of the county to avoid hail damage as much as possible.

It is expected that the Barretts will get their crop on the market from Bailey county from a week to 10 days ahead of the Hereford crop.

Utilizing heavy fertilization and forcing the growth, the Barretts hope to have their crop ready for market between June 20 and July 4 with favorable weather.
