




(Continued from page 1) Absentee voting for the City Christmas Plan election, which opened March 19, will end April 3.

Lighty salt, pepper, and flour about 2 pounds tenderized round steak. Brown in 4 T oil. Put steak aside and brown in fat about 2 medium onions, chopped fine; 2 whole bell peppers, slivered; about 1/2 cup chopped celery; 1 can mushrooms, drained, and, if desired, 1/2 cup chopped fresh green onions with tops. Return meat to skillet and add 1 cup water. Mix ¼ - 1/3 cup soy sauce with 1 T. brown sugar and pour over meat. Simmer very slowly about 30 minutes. Add 1 can bean sprouts and 4 fresh tomatoes, guartered. Simmer 30-40 minutes more. Add 2 T. soy sauce to % cup water. and add as needed during cooking period. Flavor improves with longer cooking. Serve over

Complex Excise Tax System Due For General Overhaul

The focus of Congressional effort to bring new senxe and bal--ance to the nation's tax structure likely will fall next on excise taxes - and, in my view, a sweeping review of the subject is long overdue. Congressman Wilbur Mills, the chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, has announced that pubic hearings will be held later this year on excise taxes. The purpose of the hearings, he said, will be similar to that which led the Committee to give thorough review to the income tax structure. That study directly resulted in the recent enactment of the income tax reduction and revision bill.

My prediction is that from the hearings to be held will emerge a major revision -if not an outright repeal of the excise tax structure. Certainly there will not be time this year to complete hearings and committee sudy in the House and Senate, drafting of bills, debate and decision on the floors of both Houses of gress. Possibly the matter will come to a decision on the floors of both Houses of Con-Congress. Possibly the matter will come to a decision next year, in the First Session of the 89th Congress. I'd expect that certainly before the end of 1966, major changes — if to repeal - will have been enacted.

Aside from the time consuming aspect of Congressional proculture on this kind of very involved matter, an important reason why action will not be taken swiftly is because the Congress and the country will want to judge the effects of the income tax reduction bill signed by the President last month. 
