The sheet metal workers, all members of Sheetmetal Workers Local 432 in Amarillo, estimated that the strike was 90 percent effective, which would mean that fewer than 100 of the 900 construction workers employed crossed the picket lines posted on Holly Road.

Officials of the H. K. Fergu son estimated that the strike was only 60 percent effective Tuesday, but they estimated that only 225 men or 25 percent of ALL the employees crossed the lines today.


