Banda Crowned Three Way Queen For Homecoming

The Three Way Eagles didn't let down the home community folks Friday night when they added another victory to their string at homecoming.

Three Way hosted Cotton Center Friday night, and the game was called on the 45-point rule at 1:42 of the third quarter when the Eagles were leading Cotton Center, 58-12.

It was another aerial show for Eagle Brett Stegall, who connected in the first quarter on a 14 yard TD aerial to Oscar Guillen, followed by a 21 yard TD to Oscar Guillen in the same quarter.

Stegall found Steven Zapata twice in the first quarter in the payoff zone. He hit Zapata for TD aeriels of nine yards and 11 yards.

Robert Zamora slammed over from the two yard line in the second and Saul Guillen lofted an 80 yard TD pass to Oscar Guillen.

Cotton Center scored twice in the second quarter. Frist was on a John Poindexter 75 yard TD ramble, and Joe Herrera slammed over from the one to complete scoring for Cotton Center.

In the third, Robert Zamora made it over from three yards out for the Eagles, with Jesse Medina scampering for 12 yards to paydirt for the Eagles with 1:42 left to play in the third. Because of the 45-point rule, the game was called at this point.

Stegall completed 14 of 20 passes for 342 yards, and four touchdowns. Total yards in the air for Three Way was 422. Rushing yards for Three Way was 115 yards in 15 carries. Top runner was Robert Zamora with eight carries for 71 yards.

Steven Zapata latched onto seven passes for 250 yards, while Oscar Guillen caught four passes for 137 yards.

Total yardage for Cotton Center was 97 yards, with 71 yards rushing and 26 yards passing.

The Friday night game took Three Way to 7-0 for the year. They will be open next Friday night, and will take on Dawson the following Friday.

Trophies will be presented for the best decorated home and business after they are judged shortly before Halloween, according to the CofC manager.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock late last week sent checks totaling \$56.6 million in local sales tax to the 1010 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Muleshoe's share of that amount was \$17,728.24, up from the \$14,939.19 check of a year ago. The latest payment sent Muleshoe's total for the year some 12.52 percent above the figures at the same time last year. Total received to date in 1985 is \$185,625.45, compared to the \$164,967.77 for a year ago.

In Cochran County, Morton received \$3,706.69, a slight increase over the check in the amount of \$3,682.76 for the same period a year ago. They show a yearly increase of 9.06 percent. Payments to date for this year are in the amount of \$42,381.32, compared to the \$38,860.80 for the same time a year ago.

Littlefield received a check in the amount of \$17,476.58, slightly over the \$16,127.01 for the same time in 1984. Their increase for the year to date is only 0.29 percent. Payments to date for this year are in the amount of \$217,710.29, compared to the \$217,077.17 for the same time a year ago.

At Friona, their sales rebate check was down from the check

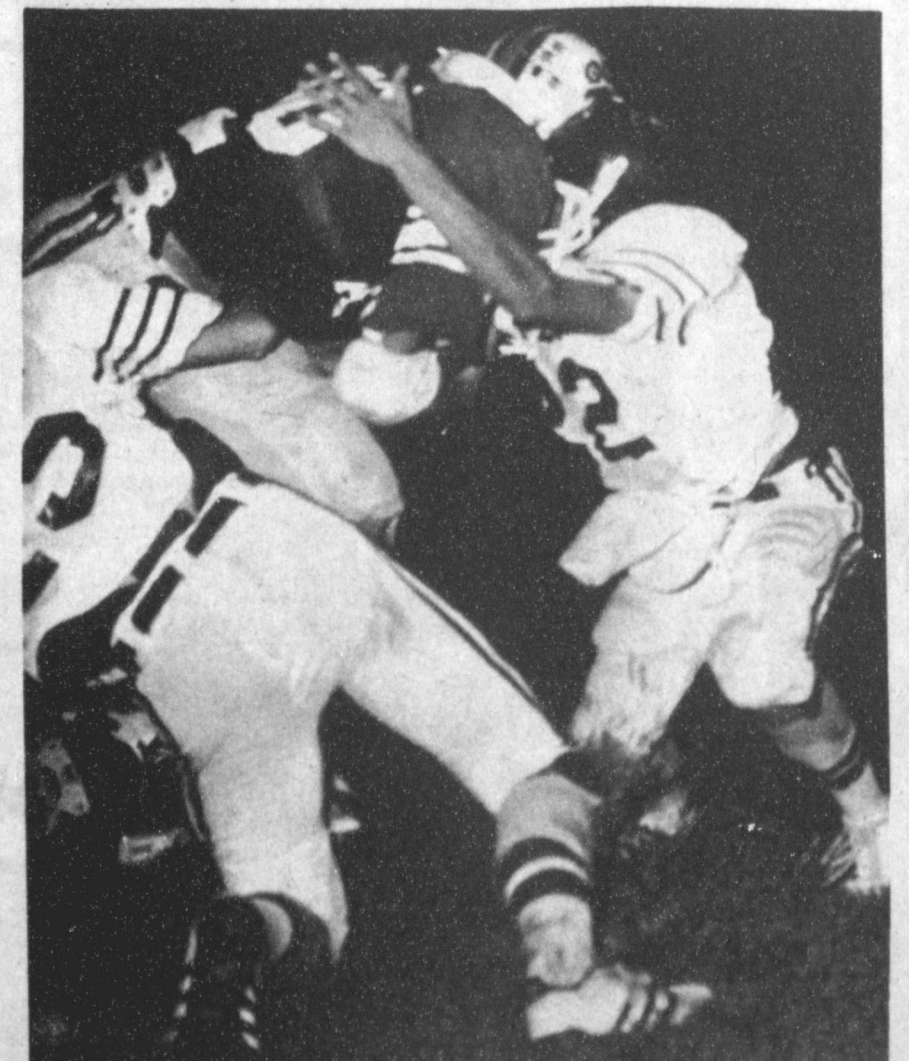
No Pass, No Play Does Not Affect Varsity Players

Muleshoe Independent School's Athletic Director and Head Football Coach Dale Keeling breathed a sign of relief late last week when grades were tabulated and he did not lose one varsity player to the "no pass, no play" rule.

Coach Keeling said two or three of players were 'borderline' but through extra class-time, and study, each and everyone of the varsity players made a passing grade. "We would have really been hurt if we had lost a player," Coach Keeling said, "since we don't have that many varsity players to begin with."

However, Coach Keeling said three to four junior varsity players were lost to the ruling; and seven or eight seventh graders and the same number of eighth grade football players were lost due to the ruling.

Idalou lost one varsity player; Slaton lost five players; Seminole and Plainview each lost seven players; Hale Center and Springlake-Earth each lost six players.

Great Plains Foods Purchases Elevator

Late last week, all vestiges of the former Ray Griffiths and Sons Elevator were permanently erased from the structure located at the north end of Main Street in Muleshoe.

Great Plains Foods, Inc., home-based in Dallas, purchased the business on September 6 and since that time have started renovations, and re-painting of the longtime Muleshoe business.

With the acquisition of the Muleshoe facility, Jeff Smith, general manager, said this brings the total facilities owned by Great Plains Foods, Inc. in this area to four.

Great Plains Foods also owns a facility in the Y-L community purchased February 19; and two facilities north of Hereford at Milo Center. Their total storage capacity is now 92,000,000 pounds.

"Right now, the harvest is 90 percent complete," said Smith.

Longhorns Fall To Farwell Steers In Friday Action

Lazbuddie Longhorn Tim Lust completed six of 13 passes Friday night, for 129 yards, and one touchdown, even though the 'Horns lost to the Farwell Steers 22-7 at Farwell.

Lazbuddie's TD came in the first quarter on a 75-yard pass play from Tim Lust to Paul Gonzales.

Farwell scored in the second on a one yard run; in the third on a one yard run and again in the fourth on a 15 yard run.

Farwell had 355 offensive yards with Kurt Miller carrying 10 times for 91 yards and Paul Gonzales latched onto a total of five aeriels for 112 yards.

Lazbuddie only punted one time, with Todd Daniels booting the football 45 yards. The 'Horns had 11 first downs.

The Longhorns had 113 yards rushing and 129 through the air for a total of 242 yards.

Lazbuddie Coach Harrison said, "The score does not indicate how close the ball game was. The kids played well and had several opportunities to score, but were unable to carry through. We are real optimistic about the rest of our season's schedule."

Electronic communication may cause changes in corporate structure

COLLEGE STATION — Corporations will become more impersonal as they change over to the world of electronic communications and the evolving companies won't need as many levels of management, says a specialist in organizational behavior who has studied the evolution of companies.

Dr. Dick Daft of Texas A&M University's College of Business Administration believes the changes will increase as firms expand their use of computer networks.

Electronic systems link offices around the world, allowing communications through teleconferencing, computer systems or simple recording devices. Computer networks make it possible for firms to transmit in a matter of minutes important data for making decisions. Office automation is also changing the nature of organizations, said Daft.

But all the teleconferencing and electronic mail in the world can never replace what people get out of talking to one another in person — that wink, a frown, a friendly gesture, he said.

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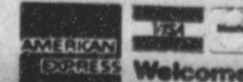

Child Abuse Program Presented To Study Club

"To know of someone being abused and not reporting it is also against the law and may be punishable by a \$1,000.00 fine and six months in jail. If you know of a case of abuse, you can call 1-800-252-5400 which is the hot line in Austin. You may also call one of the local members of the Department of Human Resources. A person reporting child abuse or neglect, in good faith, is protected by law from liability, and their identities are kept confidential."

Barnett also told of ways that the Department needs help. Foster families are in need of taking care of these children. Big Brothers group and church groups can form different programs to help. There are volunteer programs that you can help in. So if you have time on your hands, call Mrs. Otwell or Barnett and they will certainly be able to use you, he continued.

After the program, Mrs. White read the minutes of the previous meeting and they were approved. Mrs. Witherspoon read the correspondence from the State Convention, thanking each one who had a part in helping decorate the tables for the banquet at the convention.

Get Zinc From Food Rather Than Pills

Zinc -- the same mineral used for covering pipes and galvanizing buckets -- is an essential element in the diet, but not necessarily one you need to get from a pill.

Zinc is available in a wide variety of foods including red meat, liver, poultry, eggs and seafood, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Dr. Alice Hunt.

She says zinc is also found in whole grain products like whole wheat or rye bread, oatmeal and whole corn, although it's in a form that is less available to the body than the zinc contained in meat.

For example, two 3½ ounce servings of red meat, two slices of whole wheat bread and an egg would meet an adult's daily requirement for zinc.

"Most people will not need more zinc than they can get from eating a balanced diet, and in fact, can create a mineral imbalance in their bodies by consuming zinc supplements," she says.

The Recommended Dietary Allowance for adults is 15 milligrams of zinc per day, with an additional five milligrams during pregnancy and an extra 10 milligrams during lactation, Hunt notes.

According to the nutritionist, the most prominent signs of a zinc deficiency are loss of appetite, failure to grow, skin changes, impaired wound healing and decreased taste acuity.

"If you think you have a zinc deficiency, it's important to consult with a doctor before taking supplements because too much zinc will interfere with other vital body functions," Hunt cautions.

The nutritionist adds that taking large amounts of zinc in some forms can cause vomiting and gastrointestinal irritation, and may also interfere with other essential minerals in the diet.

million, a 20 percent increase over 1984 payments.
Fort Worth received \$2.1 million for a 1985 total of \$27.4 million, up 10 percent. El Paso's payment of \$1.3 million brought its total to \$16.9 million a 14 percent increase over payments last year.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$25.3 million to the state's five Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA check for \$10 million pushed 1985 payments to \$141.5 million. Dallas' DART payment of \$10 million brought its total of \$125.3 million this year.


Austin's Capitol Metro received its second check -- \$2.7 million -- for a yearly total of \$4.9 million. VIA in San Antonio received \$2 million for a total of \$25.1 million in 1985. Fort Worth's MTA payment was for \$509,586, increasing payments this year to \$6.5 million.

October checks represent taxes collected on sales made in August and reported to the Comptroller by September 20.

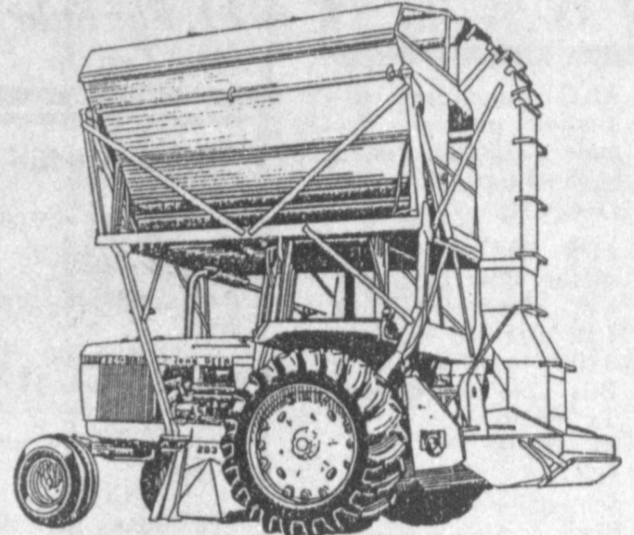

Committee urges changes in meat, poultry inspection procedures

COLLEGE STATION — The meat and poultry purchased by American consumers is generally wholesome and safe, but inspection could be improved by new technology for detecting contamination and by revision of inspection practices, says a National Research Council committee which includes a Texas A&M University researcher.

Although USDA now monitors about 100 chemicals in meat and poultry under its National Residue Program, the committee claimed that the program was not adequate to ensure maximum protection and urged initiation of a risk assessment system to define hazardous exposure levels.

The study, co-authored by Dr. Norman Heidelbaugh of Texas A&M, suggested that even though the USDA's inspection service had been effective, it could better protect the health of meat and poultry consumers if its operations stretched from the farm to the table. The inspection service currently focuses on slaughterhouses and processing plants.
