He added: "Many who worry about the welfare state fail to consider that our relief load actually is lighter than it was in 1939. Now our welfare cost amounts to 7 cents of every tax dollar, while in 1939 it amounted

Baggarly pointed to two areas of concern: "With our population explosion, our educational system is being sorely taxed. Something must be done in this area. Another problem which we face is the growing problem of the aged. With life being extended, we are constantly being faced with problems concerning the aged. Maybe we need to look again at our 65-year retirement system; maybe it's out of date.

It definitely will be out of date once medical science has conquered cancer and heart disease. After that is done, we can expect people to live 125 years or long-

And he concluded, "But when these problems are solved; they will be solved by the liberals, not by the conservatives."

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





thing is for us as citizens to look at our problems with an open mind, in a spirit of fairness, willing and eager to listen to all sides, the slave of no man and no party, determined to find the truth, to serve the people as a whole, and to accept and follow the sovereignty of our own It is not easy to know the truth

but at least we can be honest and sincere in our attempt to get the truth and to serve not any selfish interest but the people as a whole. That is the principle upon which democratic government was founded. There is always the danger that we shall think of our citizenship too narrowly, that we

shall fail to realize its relationship to our lives as a whole. When we think of citizenship we are likely to think of voting, or of serving on a jury, or of our services as public officers, or of paying taxes, or even of the possibility of being drafted into the army to serve as soldiers. These are the specific tasks, but back of them stands life itself, the art of living so that life shall be good and beautiful, free and worthy of the hu-

man race. You cannot separate your citizenship and the exercise of your civic duties from the rest of your life. Citizenship begins at home. It is the foundation of our whole life — physical, mental and emotional.

The home is the foundation of our life and happiness, the first school of citizenship and democracy. Your ambitions, interests, ideals, tastes and habits influence the performance of your civic duties. If your life is noble and rich, your citizenship will express that nobility. If you are good parents, you are more likely to be good voters. The purpose you have as a parent will carry over and influence your decisions at the ballot box. If you are a good workman, with joy and a sense of perfection in your daily task, you will make a better member of a jury, because through your labor you will have gained a better understanding of humanity. If in your relations with your family and neighbors you have a spirit of goodwill and mutual helpfulness, that spirit will be your contribution toward better citizenship and a better society. If you are dishonest in your thinking and indifferent to the well-being of others, these qualities will show up in your dealings in pub-lic life.

In closing I would like to say that citizens who are good Am-ericans try to become strong and useful, worthy of their nation, so that our country will become ever greater and better.
