day Friday.

Bob Harris, project manager for the H. K. Ferguson Construction Co., was not available for comment.

Curtis Johnson, secretary for Local No. 196 was on vacation, during the strike, according to sources in the Amarillo office and Assistant Secretary Charles Barrett was reached by telephone, but refused to comment on the strike.

The grievances of the pipefitters apparently stemmed from the work being done by other crafts, that should have been done by the pipefitters, under the terms negotiated in the original contract, the workers explained.

The pickets were removed at 2:30 p.m. Friday afternoon, but it was thought at the time that they would return Monday morning. However, negotiations were reached between the construction firm and the striking men and all of the workers returned to the job site at the regular time Monday morning.

The short strike followed another strike by the sheet-metal workers at the plant on April 28. The strike stopped the construction for five working days and a district court injunction, finally ordered the workers back on the job site.

The temporary injunction was extended at a later date, until September 30, practically eliminating the possibility of a grievances hearing before the scheduled completion of the plant, sometime in September.

All of the workers waited at the entrance to the plant site Friday morning, somewhat congesting the flow of traffic to the plant. Deputy Sheriffs of the Deaf Smith County Sheriff's Department were on hand to prevent any possible trouble, but the workers began to leave the plant and by 9:30 p.m. less than 100 men were at the gate.

tival cost \$3,000 last year; but the entire amount was raised by the Band-Aides, the parent sponsored organization of the band.

The board felt that a rejection

of the trip at this time would hinder the band program, which is increasing in vast rates.

Assistant-Principal W. O. Caraway presented an insurance policy to the school board for approval. The student policy is similar to one used in recent years for protection of the students while they are at school

and on their way to and from the school.

The policy accepted by the board was that of Standard Life and Accident Insurance Company. The cost is \$3.50 and it is strictly a voluntary program, Caraway emphasized.

Football players must pay an additional \$12.50 premium according to Caraway, which will be paid by the school.

Several other plans were available, but the Standard Life plan was selected.

The board appointed an Amarillo accounting firm to conduct the audit scheduled for the 1963-64 term. Cornell & Co. was approved by the board for the audit.

The board approved the payment of the bills without a discussion or formal reading of the July bills. The only discussion concerning the bills was that of the water bill which was up considerably higher than in previous months.

The board approved the borrowing of \$35,000 from the First National Bank for 90 days to meet the payment of bills and other costs at the opening of school.

The old Masonic Hall building belonging to the First Baptist Church, was approved for use of four additional classrooms for the coming school year.

The board also approved the use of a school bus for the 26 FFA boys and two teachers, who will travel to Colorado before school begins.

The board set a "special meeting" for Thursday morning at 6 a.m. at the Western Wheel Inn. Bill Gentry asked that the room be cleared at the Tuesday night meeting of everyone not on the official board as he had "something to discuss with the board."

The board then left the building and inspected the remodeling being done at one of the schools. The tour began shortly after 11 p.m. Tuesday.

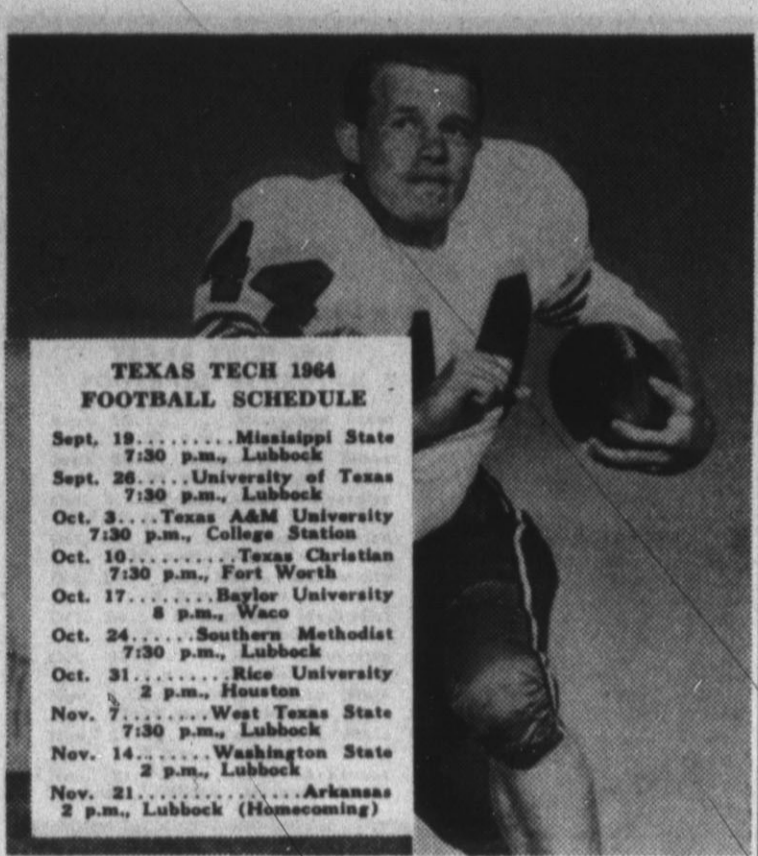
The meeting was adjourned following the tour.

this past summer has created a problem at the jail.

"We're not thinking so much in terms of 'air conditioning,'" pointed out Commissioner Donald Hicks, "as we are in 'air circulating'. The air inside the jail will stifle you when the facility is full to capacity", he said.

Forty prisoners were being housed in the county facility Monday morning.

Also considered during the day was the utilization of one room not now being used, as a dispatcher's room "Conditions have become crowded in the sheriff's office," Sheriff Lowell Sharp said, "and we need the additional room for a dispatcher's room."

Commissioners approved the repair, but took no action on Sharp's request for an additional dispatcher and another automobile for the sheriff's department, although they discussed the situation at length.

Sharp pointed out that when the new jail was constructed, the court and the sheriff's department had estimated 25 to 18 prisoners would be the maximum.

Area Research In Irrigation Units Planned

A \$29-thousand irrigation research project is scheduled to get underway this fall in the Southern High Plains area of Texas and New Mexico.

Members of the committee include Leo Forrest, manager, and Sam Morgan, staff assistant, Deaf Smith County Co-op, Hereford.

The project, designed to take three years to complete, will determine:

- * Efficiencies of irrigation pumps now in use;
- * Efficiencies of power units used at drive irrigation pumps;
- * Operational and maintenance characteristics of power units including fuel or electric power consumption under prevailing conditions of High Plains irrigation pumping, and
- * Costs of pumping irrigation water by classification of well

depth, capacity of well and power classification.

The project, to be conducted by the Agricultural Engineering Department of Texas Technological College, Lubbock, will cover a 300-mile radius of Lubbock in which there are over 6-million acres of land under pump irrigation and many thousands of wells and pumping plants.

The Texas Irrigation Research Committee is sponsoring the project and invites the participation of all rural electric systems and power districts in the U. S. that serve irrigation pumping.

DE Makes Plans For School Year

Distributive Education program in Hereford schools has started its new 1964-65 season, Don Paris, instructor said Wednesday, and new pupils who wish to participate but have not previously enrolled were asked to see him today or Friday between 9 and 12 noon at the high school.

Many, he explained, enrolled before the end of school in the spring and have been carrying on their work schedules this summer.

However, some of those who enrolled in the spring have not been placed in businesses this summer and Paris has asked that such students also see him this week.

Twelve second-year students are returning to the DE program this autumn. During the past school year, students were employed in 15 different businesses ranging from wholesale to service businesses. Last year's program had 30 students enrolled.

Students who are working this summer and are already carry-

ing on a full distributive education program need not see him before the opening of school. "Such pupils are already set up for the year," he explained.

He stressed the fact that many new students, enrolling this autumn for the first time in Hereford schools, should see him as soon as possible if they intend to enroll for DE. "We know that we have many new pupils in Hereford," he explained, "and many of these might like to participate in the DE program this year. I hope students will contact me as soon as possible."

CAP To Stage 'Rescue' Drills At Airport Here

Hereford Airport will host a SARCAP, code designation for a practice search and rescue mission of the Civil Air Patrol this weekend. Flyers, radiomen and ground rescue teams will be arriving Saturday evening for preliminary briefing from all over the Panhandle and South Plains. In addition to Civil Air Patrol personnel, RACES (Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service — the Civil Defense communications network) and Air Force MARS (Military Auxiliary Radio Service) will provide additional mobile communications.

The Amarillo Civil Defense office will send its communications van and a panel truck equipped as an emergency ambulance. Cadets of the Civil Air Patrol will camp at the field and will provide guards for the aircraft and command post area as well as participating in the ground rescue phase of the mission.

Cadets are not permitted to fly in Civil Air Patrol missions. Saturday evening the Cadets will be treated to a movie at the Star theatre dealing with the exploits of one of the most renowned squadrons of the Air Force in action during World War II.

Charles Duvall, Hereford Composite Squadron Commander, has been designated as Mission Coordinator. He has named Lt. Milton Adams as Flight Operations Officer, Curtis Tra- week as Ground Operations Officer and Lt. Bill Thompson as Communications Officer. Captain Minden of Amarillo will serve as Administrative officer. Cadet Sgt. Jim Owen, Commander of the Hereford Cadet group, will serve as Cadet Commander for the mission. Lt's Benny Womble, Carroll Newsom and Sgt's Bill Bradley and Charles Frye will each have command positions of responsibility and Sgt. Wes Owen will serve as medical officer.

Purpose of the mission is to give participating units practice in organizing and conducting a search for a downed aircraft. Wreckage will be hauled here from Amarillo and spotted in an isolated area. No local member will know where the locations of the wreckage are.

A briefing will give the "flight plan" of the simulated aircraft, where it last reported — its origin and destination, a description of the aircraft and the passengers aboard.

After the wreckage is sighted from the air, ground rescue teams equipped with mobile radios will be dispatched to the scene to render first aid to the "Survivors" and to evacuate them. Guards will be posted over the wreckage to prevent souvenir hunters from destroying evidence vital to FAA crash investigators in determining the cause of the "crash".

Breakfast will be followed by a chapel service conducted by unit chaplain Jerry Franz at 6 a.m. Individual crew briefing will follow the chapel service and the first rescue aircraft should be airborne by 6:30 a.m. The public is invited to watch the demonstration.
