
All farm and ranch operators who are age 65 or over, and all farm and ranch workers who are also that old, are rem by Hal Geldon, Amarillo social security district manager, that the 1965 changes in the law make it imperative for them to file their social security claims im-mediately. This applies even though they are still active on the farm and ranch.

The hospitalization insurance, which is automatic, and the med-ical insurance, which is optional at a \$3 per month premium beginning next July, require that social security claims be filed before those provisions can apply. Persons already 65 need to take such action now, those who do not file in the current enrollment period will have only one other chance to enroll, and that will be at a higher cost in the October-December 1967 enrollment period.

Geldon urges all persons affected by the above information to talk with a representative of the Amarillo social security office when he visits in Hereford on Nov. 16 and 23, Tuesdays. The representative will be in the courthouse from 9 to 10:30

Even though a person's earnings may be too high to permit immediate payment of monthly retirement benefits, Geldon wants to feel sure that no eligible persons have lost out on the health insurance program because of lack of information

# New Criminal Code Might Empty Jails

Texas new Cade of Criminal proceedure is ar, unknown quantity with most laymen across the Lone Star State and, at this point, it poses scores of questions by many lawyers and by law enforcement officials. A drive is already underway, in fact, to ask the legislature to repeal the new code, and reports indicate that support of the repeal drive is expanding over the state.

While complaints regarding the code and its contents are wide in scope, the prime target of repeal advocates appears. to be that section which denies arresting officers the right to question accused criminals until after they appear before a judge: We also hear conversation to the effect that a magistrate can be called out at all hours of the day and night-or the accused must remain in jail. All in all, it does seem that considerable indiscretion appears throughout the lengthy document.

As a newspaper, it is not our object or intent to interpret the law. However, we do feel that a reasonable amount of common sense must be exercised in the origin and enforcement of our laws. We feel sure that some officers in the past have

We say this because so many business firms and corporations have already shifted into data processing to lower costs, and to maintain prompt billing proceedures. Since our taxing agencies represent the largest businesses in our community, it is only natural that they should also follow the trend.

Adaptation of such a plan is conducive, too, for revival of the proposal to combine county, school, and city tax collections at one point and under the supervision of a single group with one central spot for paying all taxes. Total volume of the three agencies would be tremendous and, no doubt, would afford possible savings for all three agencies. It would also hold evaluations pretty well in line.

Meanwhile, what happens to our elected officials in case such a merger should ever occur? This is the big question, and af fords one of the first reasons why no consolidation has been seriously considered. It would require some basic changes in state laws, and no such alterations appear to be under consideration.

The fact that our county commissioners decided to "go modern" emphasizes the point that our entire governmental system, designed in horse and buggy days can probably never function efficiently in these days until some of our stated legal methods have been revamped. If and when this does occur, however, it will demand tremendous study and planning as pointed up through the new criminal code. Certainly, we will want things better, and not worse.

# Veterans Argue Park Rights

Letters in The Brand Thursday pointed out both sides of the city park proposal in comprehensive degrees. In a nutshell, the VFW based their decision on failure to agree with terms of the city proposal and the fact that they did not consider the city planning in bests interests of the community. Sponsors of the proposal, on the other hand, contend that nothing is being done with the park under present circumstances.

Both arguments appear quite solid. In fact, most of the controversy over the entire deal seems to have arisen within the ranks of the two individual veteran organizations-and not with the general public. Certainly, these folks have a right to argue the point among themselves, and no one would want ot nullify this right. At the same time, it is important to realize that the feelings expressed come from the members, and not from the general public-

Back when the community deeded the park land to the veterans on a token purchase basis, everyone thought it was the thing to do and, when you get down to brass tacks, it seems to us that most people still feel just as proud of and appreciative for the veterans as they did back when the transaction was culminated. Furthermore, if the Veterans have plans for the area, it is still their land—and it is their right to do with it as they choose. Certainly, no citizen should become angry because the group does not wish to make such a sizeable donation.

In addition, some efforts have been made to develop the area by members of the two veteran groups. If they have not materialized they are not by themselves in this field of endeavor. Besides, the area saw very little development under county ownership back before it went to the vet-

The city, on the other hand does have extensive plans for development of the area and it could materialize into a nice community project, through which they would hope to benefit the entire population. Without the land, it is doubtful if the development will materialize. These things the veterans have studied and pursued, probably to a greater extent than most other citizens

Consequently, it seems to us that no individual or group has any grounds to get mad at anyone else. Legally and morally, the veterans are within their rights to make any disposal they wish of the property without undue public criticism or censorship.
