44 Per Cent Of Goal Reached In Fund Drive

Special Gifts Division Leads In Contributions

The Howard County Community Fund took on renewed vigor Thursday with cash and pledges aggregating approximately \$14,000, or about 44 per cent of the \$32,000 quota.

With modest exceptions, bulk of the funds turned into date represents contributions from the special gifts divisions, said General Chairman Ira Thurman.

Deposits totaled \$11,230 Thursday morning, and Thurman said he had on hand more than \$1,000 in checks of nearly \$1,500 turned into headquarters.

Wednesday afternoon a rally to place the appeal of the Community Fund before T&P workers was held at the railway shops under the direction of W. G. Wilson, Jr., assisted by S. H. Newberg.

At the rally Ted O. Groehl recalled the splendid work done by T&P employees in support of the last war loan campaign and added that "we know we can count on support for anything worthwhile for the community. Any one of the six agencies covered in the Community Fund would be worth what we are asking altogether—a day's pay," he said.

Mayor George Dabney said "I am proud to recommend to you the agencies provided for in this fund; they will be a help to our community and I am proud of our community." He urged his listeners to consider the fund agencies as auxiliaries to the home and "to give on the basis of your value to the community and the value of the agencies."

Carl Blomfield, chairman of the special gifts division, Thursday pointed out that even in the best organized drives it is impossible for workers to contact all people. There are many holding back, awaiting a contact. We sincerely urge Big Spring and Howard county people not to wait but either to leave as generous a gift as possible at the headquarters in Empire Southern Gas company, or to mail in their checks.

He also joined Thurman in an appeal for more generous gifts than last year, "for this is the big drive which covers six agencies instead of about three. We urge you to consider your part in this light," he said.

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World Arms Slash To Get Full Airing

Soviet Proposal Put On Calendar Of UN Assembly

NEW YORK, Oct. 31. (AP)—Soviet Russia's proposals for world arms reduction were assured a full airing in the United Nations assembly when the 14-nation general committee decided today to include the disarmament question in the assembly's agenda.

The committee agreed unanimously to send the armaments issue to the 51-nation assembly and to have it referred immediately to the assembly's political committee.

The proposal to put the question on the agenda was offered by British Delegate Philip J. Noel-Baker as soon as the general (steering) committee met at 10 a. m. EST.

"I accept the proposal of the representative of the United Kingdom," said Soviet Delegate Andrei Y. Vishinsky.

No other delegates spoke on the question. Committee action on the arms issue was confined to the Soviet proposals, but it was taken for granted that once they came up the debate would embrace all arms proposals including demands by the United States that adequate inspection and enforcement measures be adopted along with any limitation action.

These safeguards were expected to provide the issue over which the major powers would clash when the debate finally started.

Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov seeks to reduce arms and outlaw atomic weapons by agreement, but Warren R. Austin, chief of the U. S. delegation, declared last night that the United Nations must go beyond that to guard against secret armament.

Noel-Baker's action was the first indication that Britain favored a discussion of the armaments question. He had protested that he was unable to enter into an immediate discussion of the question at the end of Tuesday's session when Molotov called for comment on the Soviet proposals.

There still was no indication what position Britain would take on the Soviet proposals themselves, but it was regarded likely that she would back U. S. demands for an inspection system, since that has been the British position in the controversy over atomic control.

Molotov was not present at the committee meeting. Austin later said definitely that the United States would offer concrete inspection proposals when the political committee started work on the arms question.

Acting on a five-nation demand, the steering committee decided to place the long-fought issue of Franco Spain on the assembly agenda and send it to the political committee for action. —Give To Community Fund—

Highway Link West Of Knott Opened

Lewis Holding The Whip Hand In Coal Deal

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. (AP)—John L. Lewis appeared certain today to emerge from his fight with the government a bigger winner than ever.

With Lewis still holding the whip hand—backed by the tacit but nonetheless real threat of another strike by his 400,000 soft coal miners—all signs point to eventual new government concessions in the negotiations scheduled to start tomorrow.

Whether a walkout will intervene remains to be seen, but here are the signposts that say the United Mine Workers' chief in the end will get at least part of what he wants.

1. Lewis apparently has won the first round—getting the government to talk higher wages with him.

The officials who are going to negotiate with him—Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug and Navy Capt. N. H. Collisson, Federal Coal Mines Administrator—still haven't agreed to reopen the present contract, but they say they are willing to discuss anything that is on Lewis' mind.

2. The government is anxious to avert a coal strike in November, with winter's chill approaching. And the administration is well aware of what would happen under the miners' historic no-contract, no-work stand should Lewis cancel the agreement on schedule November 20.

3. Top administration advisers acknowledge that they are searching for a satisfactory pay concession to Lewis—yet one which would not upset the labor-management apple cart and set a pattern for other union demands. —Give To Community Fund—

Govt. Delays Any Action On Cotton Price

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. (AP)—President Truman took the cotton price situation "under advisement" today, but White House Secretary Charles G. Ross said he expects no immediate government action.

Ross said at a news conference that the matter is being studied both by Mr. Truman and Reconstruction Director John R. Steelman.

Asked whether he expects any action today, Ross replied: "I do not."

Earlier, Rep. Sparkman (D-Ala.) had predicted some government move, possibly by nightfall.

Ross said he did not know what action may be taken, adding that he was up to Mr. Truman and Steelman.

Top level OPA officials lined up against any suggestions that price ceilings be yanked from manufactured cotton products.

One price executive told a reporter: "Nothing OPA could do would help at this time."

"The fact is that both cotton and some of its products have been priced out of the market," he said, adding that part of the recent drop in prices resulted from action of buyers "shopping around at cotton mills" instead of begging to buy everything available.

This official said there also is a difference of opinion among cotton-state congressmen as to what should be done.

Some southern lawmakers want price controls retained, he said, on the theory that they serve as a magnet to hold all cotton prices up. Others were said to believe that removal of controls on manufactured products would permit all prices to rise, and recover some of the loss in raw cotton prices. —Give To Community Fund—

C. W. Furr Dies At Amarillo

An additional \$20,000 in insurance checks for 1946 cotton crop losses has arrived at the AAA office and is being distributed among 10 Howard county farmers, J. G. Hammock announced this morning.

Some 85 farmers of the county have been paid a total of \$188,555.34 to date for complete losses, Hammock said. That figure represents 90 per cent of the total Howard county growers applied for through the government several weeks ago.

News Agent Is Found Slain On Roadside

DALLAS, Oct. 31. (AP)—Marlin Camp, connected with the circulation departments of the Dallas Morning News and the Wichita Falls Record-News, was found slain early today near Decatur, Wis. county.

His body, a pistol wound in the head, was found near his abandoned automobile. Reports received here said an attempt had been made to burn the car.

Camp, a 26-year-old ex-serviceman, was returning to Dallas from Wichita Falls. He had distributed bundles of this morning's edition of the Dallas News to northwest Texas agents, and had left Wichita Falls with bundles of the Record-News to be dropped off at Henrietta and Bowie. He lived at Forney, Dallas county.

An employee of the Record-News told the Dallas Morning News that a man, whom he had not seen before, was with Camp when he left the Record-News plant at 4:10 a. m.

The abandoned car was found at 9 a. m. between Decatur and Alvorado. A discharged pistol cartridge was in it. The front seat bore blood stains. It was taken to Decatur where state officers sought clues through fingerprints.

A short time later Camp's body was found by a state highway department employee while mowing grass along the highway. —Give To Community Fund—

Milk Supply Here At Critical Stage

Big Spring's milk situation is critical and prospects are that it will not improve substantially for several months.

Processors and producers agreed that two factors combined to cut the flow from the milkshed almost in half in the past 30 days.

One was the seasonal decline in production, herds normally tapering off on amount of milk in late autumn. The other was an unfavorable feed situation which has aggravated the decline by leaps and bounds.

The drop is general, and in Big Spring where creameries sell only grade A milk, no immediate relief is in sight. Midland and Odessa, already hard hit, are using recombinated milk.

Charles A. Weeg, who was reared in Big Spring, has been appointed as administrator of Brackenridge hospital at Austin, it has been announced.

Weeg, 36, has been with the hospital as accountant and business manager since June 1, 1934 when he was graduated from the school of business administration at the University of Texas. He was chosen from a field of 19 applicants from various cities in Texas, according to City Manager Guion Morgan of Austin. The appointment is effective Nov. 1.

In 1942 Weeg left the hospital to enter the service with the medical administrative corps of the army of the US, rising eventually to rank of sergeant major. He went overseas with the 26th division, which became a part of Patton's Third Army. Give Every-Day Lamb Roast A Different Twist With Stuffing

Unusual Way with Leg of Lamb
Alligator Pear on Hot Shell
Roast Stuffed Leg of Lamb
Potatoes in Bread Crumbs
Endive Salad
Vanilla Ice Cream with Melba Sauce
(Recipes Serve Four)

Roast Stuffed Leg of Lamb
2 thick slices bread, with crusts
1 tablespoon bacon fat or butter or margarine
1-4 teaspoon salt
1-2 teaspoon sage or poultry seasoning
1-2 teaspoon onion, cut fine
Boiling water to moisten
6 pound leg of lamb
Salt and pepper
1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
2 tablespoons flour
1 onion, sliced
1 carrot, sliced
3 tablespoons fat

Break bread in pieces. Add bacon fat, butter or margarine, salt, sage or poultry seasoning and onion. Add boiling water to moisten and mix gently with a fork. Have leg of lamb boned and stuff with this mixture. Skewer and tie. Place in roasting pan and sprinkle with salt and pepper, poultry seasoning, flour. Place sliced onion and carrot over lamb and pour fat over all. Put in a 450o oven and roast for one-half hour. Reduce heat to 350o and roast two and one-half to three hours, basting occasionally, adding water if necessary to prevent burning. The meat thermometer should register 180o for well done lamb. Remove to hot platter and garnish with pile of lima beans alternating with potatoes in bread crumbs.
Potatoes in Bread Crumbs.
1 egg, beaten
2 tablespoons cold water
Fine bread crumbs
Small potatoes
Wash and pare small potatoes. Coat with egg beaten with cold water. Roll in bread crumbs. Put in roasting pan with meat and cook, basting occasionally until tender.

Contrast Flavors In Carrot Dish For Taste Variety

Sweet-sour sauce gives a distinctive flavor to diced carrots. For a colorful luncheon table, serve it with a ring mold of green beans or spinach (simply pour vegetables into ring mold, cover with sauce made of liquid from vegetables, heat thoroughly in oven.)

Sweet-Sour Carrots (4 servings)—
1 pound diced carrots
1-2 cup liquid from carrots
1-4 cup vinegar
5 tablespoons sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch
1-2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons table fat

Drain the carrots, reserving the liquid. Combine the carrot liquid and vinegar. Thoroughly mix the sugar, cornstarch and salt in the top part of a double boiler. Add the liquid and stir until well blended. Cook over boiling water until it thickens, stirring constantly.

Honey-Baked Pears Are Sugar Saving Dessert Dish

Here is a wonderful recipe for baking pears! It's a flexible recipe, too. If you prefer pears less sweet, you can reduce the proportions of sugar and honey to 1/2 cup each, instead of 3/4, as the recipe reads. If you prefer not to use honey, use double the amount of sugar. Or use syrup instead of honey, but remember corn syrup is only half as sweet. Or even use part molasses, if you like a tangy flavor.

Just be sure you use the right kind of pears. The variety at its best right now is Full Russet Bosc, a russet-skinned pear with distinctive tapering neck and luscious flavor. You'll want to select slightly firm pears for baking. For eating fresh, choose pears which yield to gentle pressure.

Honey-Baked Pears
For breakfast or dessert
6 large firm Pears
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup honey
3/4 cup water
2 tbsps. lemon juice

Wash pears. Do not pare or core. Leave whole. Combine sugar, honey, water and lemon juice in saucepan. Stir well and bring to boil. Let boil rapidly 5 minutes. Place pears in 1 1/2 to 2 quart baking dish and pour syrup on top. Cover dish. Bake at 350 degrees F. until nearly tender, about 30 minutes. Remove cover. Increase heat to 450 degrees F. and bake 10 minutes longer, basting frequently, to glaze. Serve warm or cold, with plain or whipped cream. 6 servings.

Youngsters' Hallowe'en Pranks Live Up To Ancient Legends

DON'T tell Junior, But...

Youngsters who celebrate Hallowe'en by soaping windows and installing crows in bellfries are closer to the most ancient spirit of the occasion than are their law-abiding elders.

That's because Hallowe'en long antedates the Christian All Saints' Day, with which it is now associated, and goes back to pagan times, when it became a holiday for wicked spirits. Later on, when Christianity outlawed Druidical rites, the last night in October still was recognized as a special occasion for "witches, ghosts, and devils."

"It is a well-known fact," declares the Encyclopedia Britannica, "that when a new religion is established in any country, the god or gods of the old religion become the devil of the new."

The devil often appeared to his worshippers, in early Christian times, disguised as an animal. He might wear a stag's skin and have antlers on his head, in imitation of a heathen god. Such figures have been found in paleolithic drawings.

Thus Hallowe'en traditionally represented a reversion to paganism, a night when former gods (now devils) were supposed to ride high. Generations of Christians long maintained a fondness for the old-time heathenism, and on Hallowe'en they backslid.

Youngsters are still doing it—against the wishes of those who with jack o'lantern-waving and ducking for apples. But Junior may be following a hoary precedent when he starts out with a pumpkin, and ends up in the police station.

However, the jack o'lantern and apple-bobbing school also can claim antiquity.

A Roman harvest affair, in which nuts and apples played a part, was grafted onto the Druids' gathering of evil spirits; and even in the Middle Ages parents doubtless suggested that this phase of the occasion be emphasized by their young. In fact, apple-bobbing is depicted in medieval prints.

But witches and devils are far



more deeply rooted in the autumnal night, with Hallowe'en carousals antedating even the dawn of agriculture.

In those days it was a herdsman's holiday—which may explain the cow in the bellfry, if not the cabbage hurled on your front porch.

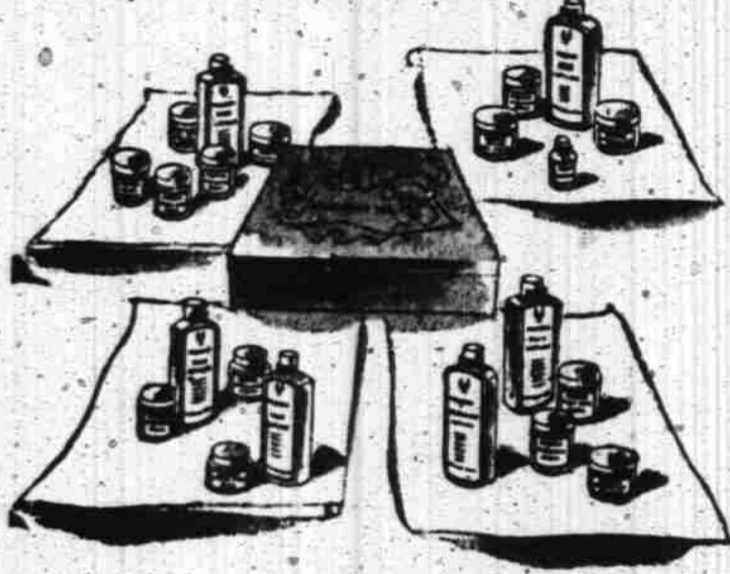

Shoe Ceilings Are Discarded

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. (AP)—Decontrol of the nation's \$2,000,000,000-a-year shoe industry becomes effective today after the White House publicly directed OPA Chief Paul Porter to throw shoe price ceilings into the discard.

Friends of Porter said he had refused to take any action until ordered to do so. Also in compliance with White House wishes, they said, he removed ceilings on all leather and hides.

These sources told a reporter the White Administrator resisted the White House request because he was opposed to piecemeal removal of controls before OPA is ready to publish its major decontrol list.

Steelman issued the order late yesterday and OPA followed through within a few minutes with its brief decontrol announcement.

OPA officials said retail shoe prices might soar 20 to 30 per cent above present levels before they begin to turn downward.

Porter demanded the White House directive, it was learned, because he publicly had taken an opposite stand in a statement of October 18, shortly after President Truman had released all meat and livestock.

Products made from leather—particularly shoes—are too important to the family budget to be released from price control at this time.

No Progress In Pilots' Strike

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. (AP)—Temper shortened on both sides today as the TWA pilots' strike stretched into its 11th day.

A company threat to turn to non-union fliers and a union charge of attempted intimidation marked the first major break in the policy laid down by Federal Mediator Frank P. Douglass to leave all statements to him.

Douglass, matching his patience against an unrelenting union stand, said he still had hopes of bringing the belligerents together. The chairman of the National Mediation Board planned to meet again with David L. Behncke, president of the AFL Air Line Pilots Association whose 1,400 members in TWA walked out October 21 in a demand that pay for pilots for four engine planes be raised to a top of \$15,000 or more a year. They now earn about \$12,000.

Meanwhile the expressed hope of both sides that the government might take over the 28,000 mile international system pending settlement of the year old dispute faded still further.

A well-informed official told reporters that the air coordinating committee, President Truman's advisory body on aviation, had shown little disposition to recommend such a step at a second secret meeting called to hear Douglass report on his mediation efforts. —Give To Community Fund—

Ceilings Off Of Pulpwood

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. (AP)—OPA today removed price ceilings from pulp wood imported from the three Canadian Provinces of Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

The price agency said it had decided that ceiling prices established in Canada by the Canadian government were "sufficient to insure satisfactory price control and no purpose will be served in having parallel OPA ceilings."

Only a few days ago OPA had raised its own ceilings on these same imports to the level of the Canadian ceilings, retroactive to August 19.

At that time OPA said approximately 1,000,000 cords of pulpwood are imported annually from the Canadian provinces. This represents about 30 per cent of total pulpwood consumption in the northeastern United States.

The new Canadian ceilings which were raised last July 8 ranged from \$8.50 to \$18.25 a cord on board cars at Canadian shipping points.

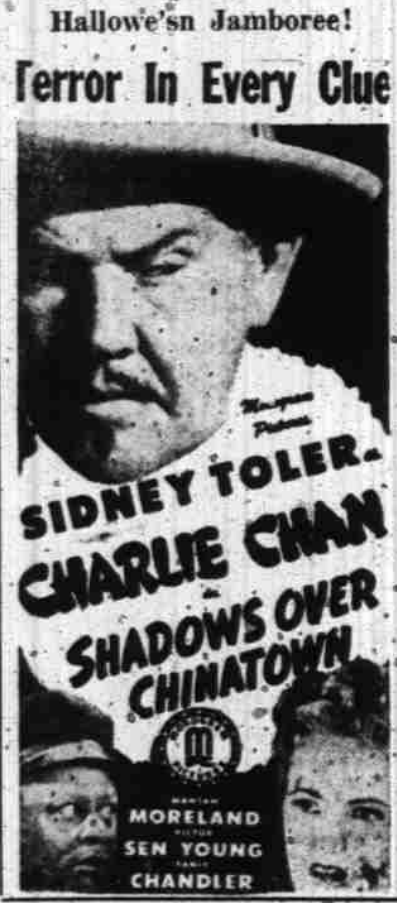

SECOND TO BOBBY LAYNE

Travelin' Tray Tidwell A Beaver In Poly Machine

NEW YORK, Oct. 31. — Bobby Layne of Texas, Ben Raimondi of Indiana and Gene Roberts of Chattanooga, sport the outstanding offensive records on the nation's gridirons but the busiest man with a football these days is Travelin' Tray Tidwell, Auburn's quadruple-threat freshman.
Layne tops all the collegians in yardage gained both on the ground and in the air. Raimondi is the leading passer and Roberts has covered more yardage while running with the ball than any of the rest.
Tidwell, however, is the workhorse of them all. In Auburn's five games he has carried or thrown the ball 171 times, scampered a total of 386 yards on 84 running plays and completed 44 of 87 passes for an aggregate of 483 yards.

Alabama's great Harry Gilmer with 718 yards each.
Raimondi held his lead among the passers with 46 completions in 92 attempts for a total of 563 yards.
Gilmer, in the runner-up spot, has tossed exactly 100 passes in six games, completing 45 of them for 535 yards.
Roberts, who carried the ball 22 times for 116 yards in Chattanooga's 23-13 loss to Miami of Florida, is the fifth man to top the list in the individual rushing department, which has had a different leader each week this season. He has carried the ball 85 times and gained 564 yards.

His grand total of 869 yards makes him the runner-up to Layne in individual offense. Only three players stand ahead of him in the passing department, based on the number of completions, and only ten boast better ball-carrying records than his.
In addition to carrying or throwing the ball 40 times more than any other player, Tidwell has punted 17 times, run back 20 kicks and, apparently finding a spare moment in some game, caught one pass.
His achievements in his initial collegiate season, with an Auburn team that has won three of its five games, have landed him in the fast company. Statistics announced today by the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau show that Tidwell's companions among the first five individual offensive leaders to date are definite All-American candidates.
Layne retained his leadership in combined offense by booting his total to 942 yards on 112 plays.
Third is Herman Wedemeyer, All-American back from St. Mary's, with 736 yards, followed by All-American Glenn Davis of Army and

Rudy (Little Doc) Mobley of Hardin-Simmons is the runner-up with 520 yards, followed by Joe Rogers, of Villanova, last week's leader, with 510. Lloyd Merriman of Stanford with 499 and Glenn Davis of Army with 468.

It should be interesting to local folks for several reasons. For one thing, the Pecos eleven is coached by a former Big Spring, Carl Coleman, who helped Pat Murphy with the Steers here some years back. For another, in the Pecos club it proffers one of the strongest high school brigades, AA or A. In these parts.
If a third excuse is needed for the fans to start a pilgrimage in that direction, the rubarub will feature one of the great backs in state prep circles.
That would be John Medanich, 170 pounds of muscle and power, who has yet to be slowed this year.

Tonto Coleman, the ACC mentor and brother-to Carl, chanced to see the War Birds play recently and his praise of Medanich was lavish. Tonto insists he never saw a better high school operative, and Coleman has been around the prep scene a long while.

Dry Leader Sues Network

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 31. (P) A \$33,063.048 suit seeking dissolution of the 169-station Columbia Broadcasting System was filed in Federal District Court here against CBS, five of its officials, the Schenley Distillery Corporation and Schenley Distilleries, Inc.

The civil action was brought by Sam Morris, Dallas, Texas, evangelist and active campaigner against the use of alcoholic beverages, and Henry M. Johnson, Louisville lawyer and president of the Kentucky Sunday School association.

The petition accused Columbia of "unjust discrimination in not selling time for abstemious broadcasts by Sam Morris, the designated spokesman for the anti-liquor drinking forces." It alleged that requests for broadcast time had been made "repeatedly" and in each instance refused.

The petition said the broadcast-

Some cattlemen in the party making the Hereford Breeders' tour last week expressed belief that registered herds in the association looked as much as 100 per cent improved over conditions at the tour date last year. Without exception, the animals are carrying more flesh than the visitors expected. Of course most of the animals have been fed liberally, especially during the dry weather, but there are some exceptions and the results were surprising. One instance was at the Rodes ranch, where some animals had received ample feed to prepare for the showing circuit. About 45 head

of cows in a nearby pasture, however, had been on the range continuously, and still impressed the crowd favorably. Considerable comment also was heard on the improvements Alex Walker has made in his registered animals.

On Friday the group saw a fine bunch of young Herefords, which had fared mostly on the range, at Loy Acuff's place, west of town. Although not fat, they were in good enough condition to emphasize their quality. Mentioned here are only a few, since all registered herds showed to advantage on the tour, and improvements have not been confined to any particular group.

Lost Time In Strikes Sets New Record

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21. (AP)—Strike idleness during the first nine months of 1948 exceeded by nearly three times the working time similarly lost in all of 1945, the previous record year.

Government figures which showed this today placed at 96,225,000 the number of man-days lost due to management-labor disputes during the January-through-September period.

For all of last year the total was 33,025,000. Earlier peaks were 28,425,000 in 1937; 26,219,000 in 1927 and 23,048,000 in 1941.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics, which compiled the figures, said the number of strikes and lock-outs for the first nine months of this year totaled 3,575, compared with 3,784 for all of 1945.

The reason for the big jump in man days lost, officials said, is that postwar strikes have been bitter and for keeps, hence extended for longer periods. During the war walkouts generally were small, spontaneous and quickly settled.

Although the regular show has been cancelled, a pig show still is a possibility, Lewter said. If definite arrangements are made, it will be scheduled for Nov. 15.

Eight-Semester Rules To Stay, Super Opines

Supt. W. C. Blankenship, who leaves Friday to attend the interscholastic league's legislative advisory council meetings at Austin over the weekend, says he does not believe the body will vote a return to the 8-semester eligibility rule in athletics.

According to the Big Spring school official, one of three representatives of Region Two of the league, too much bookkeeping is involved in keeping that legislation up to date. Most of the officials sounded out on the rule have approved the present regulation, which permits a boy to play an unlimited number of semesters, if he meets age stipulations. The Region Two committee will submit the report of a study on whether or not the one-year eligibility rule should apply to athletes who play in games other than regularly scheduled league contests.

Also up for discussion are the practice of allowing coaches a percentage of athletic game receipts, high school football trips to college and bowl games, the league's backing of baseball, spring training rules and reclassification. Blankenship said he favored the elimination of spring football workouts entirely, if baseball came into the picture. The addition of that sport to the league program has been fairly well assured.

Other Industrial Controls To Be Cast Off By The CPA

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. (AP)—The Civilian Production Administration, beginning to chart its exit from the federal scene, today prepared to cast off two wartime controls over industry.

Highly placed officials reported that CPA Chief John D. Small shortly will revoke order L-99, which "freezes" cotton looms to the production of essential fabrics, and L-101, which limits the size and shape of glass containers.

In addition, CPA aides said, Small has created a committee headed by Lucius Foster, chief of the agency's priorities bureau, to decide (1) what additional curbs on industry can be scrapped, (2) when the scrapping should occur, and (3) what agencies should inherit the remaining controls when CPA goes out of business.

Officials emphasized that the industrial decontrol will be no such headlong rush as OPA's erasure of price ceilings, but they added that the program will cut the control list to a minimum by December 31. The agency expires under law on March 31.

Foster's informal committee, made up of CPA bureau and division heads, will submit a report to President Truman in December. It will make recommendations as

US Oil-Gas Reserves Are Still Heavy

FORT WORTH, Oct. 31. (AP)—The United States still has more than 20 billion barrels of crude oil reserves and 148 trillion cubic feet of natural gas reserves despite having fueled the greatest war in history, Maston Nixon, vice president of the Southern Minerals Corporation of Corpus Christi, asserted here.

In an address at a banquet of the Independent Petroleum Association of America, in annual convention here, Nixon said "this means we have the equivalent of approximately 40 billions barrels of crude reserves when we look at the combined oil and gas reserves."

He added that "this country is not facing a shortage of petroleum."

"The ability to convert natural or casinghead gas to motor fuel is just another refining improvement as the development of the cracking of crude," the Corpus Christi executive said, in asserting that the "know-how" of the American oil producer and refiner barely had been touched when World War II was brought to a close.

"Natural gas becomes a charging stock to supplement crude oil," he added.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. (AP)—The State Department said the Army has shelved indefinitely its plan for a round-the-world flight of B-29 Superfortresses.

Lincoln White, State Department press officer, told reporters the department received a "preliminary letter" on the subject a few days ago.

After sending the letter, however, White said, the State Department followed up with a request

that no action whatever be taken on it "pending further study by War Department planners on detailed arrangements in connection with the flight."

Reporters, mindful of the possible international implications of sending a fleet of potential atom bomb carriers around the globe, asked if the State Department had requested the "no action" instruction. White replied "No."

Army Air Forces officers have been saying for weeks they were ready to launch the flight "in a matter of days" if the State Department approved.

Open Weather Aids Farm Field Work Throughout State

AUSTIN, Oct. 31. (AP)—Field work made good progress in most parts of Texas as open weather prevailed, the United States Department of Agriculture reported today for the week ending Oct. 28.

Some further delay was caused by local rains in eastern and southeastern counties.

Soil moisture was sufficient for current needs, and range and pasture feed was adequate to abundant over most of the state.

Principal corn-producing counties nearly completed harvesting activities.

Warm weather was needed to

mature the grain on much of the late planted sorghum on the high plains, and combining was not expected to reach its peak until after frost.

The rice harvest was fairly active, and digging and threshing of peanuts was resumed.

Many cotton fields in the upper coastal and some south central areas the cotton harvest progressed. Field work was resumed under favorable conditions in all commercial vegetable areas.

Small grain pastures made rapid growth and gave excellent grazing, the USDA reported. Cattle, calves, sheep and lambs were generally carrying good flesh.

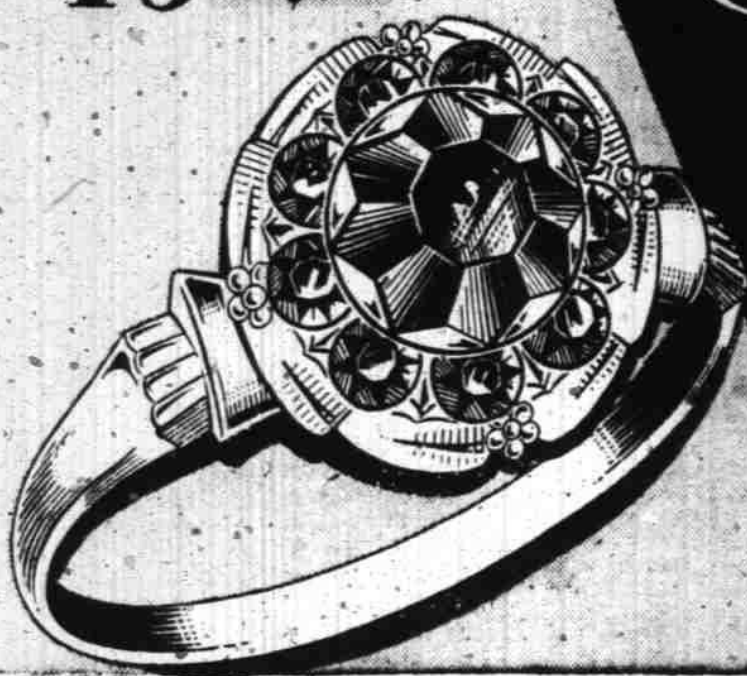
