Glenrio — Gateway To The Panhandle

WELCOME TO TEXAS — This stone emblem placed just inside the Texas-New Mexico border at Glenrio daily greets thousands of travelers entering the Lone Star State at the Deaf Smith County crossroads, located 68 miles northwest of Hereford by paved road. Glenrio possesses an interesting background, a friendly but small population and a thoroughly self-sufficient community.

'More Facets Than Fly's Eye'

Glenrio does its humble best to paint its serene, sandy presence in the superlative calculated to entice the passing tourist. A service station, for example, engages in duplicity with a two-faced sign, one side introducing the "First Stop in Texas" and the other dismissing the "Last." And the conglomerate motoring public traversing U.S. Hwy. 66 responds rewardingly, the one and only raison d'être for this state-line oasis.

Perched teeteringly on the Texas-New Mexico boundary, tiny (population, 39) Glenrio has more facets than a house fly's eye. Meteorologically, the forecast is consistently dry, but the bootlegger finds

this no windfall: The New Mexico half of this one-street village is wet. Time in town technically is split into Mountain and Central zones. But residents, addled by their time pieces' split personalities, pragmatically chose to operate exclusively on Texas time. The dichotomy of voting districts isn't so easily solved: The Phillips 66 gas station owner ballots at Bippus, 20 miles southeast in Deaf Smith County; a few hundred feet farther west, the State Line Bar operator makes his "X" at San Jan, 17 miles deep in the Land of Enchantment.

'All-Business Session'

School Trustees Mow Down 20-Item Agenda

Both Clark, Kelley Air Suggestions

Hereford school trustees, in a marathon meeting lasting until 1:30 a.m. Wednesday, discussed more than 20 topics in a fact-filled, all-business session with the school system's two new top administrators.

Many of the more pertinent items had been postponed until Supt. Johnny Clark Jr., formerly head man at Olton, arrived to take the reins suddenly vacated this spring by the resignation of Darrell Williams.

Clark, 36, has wasted no time in grasping responsibilities. It was apparent Tuesday night. He took over the superintendent's duties June 1.

ALSO PRESENT was Dillie M. Kelly, who will become business manager for the Hereford schools on July 1. Kelley is presently business manager of the Brownfield schools.

Included on the busy agenda were:

— Setting of the date to receive bids for a new junior high school.

— Granting a two-year contract to Kelley as business manager here.

— Approval of contracts for four new teachers.

— Discussion of the local financial effect of the teacher pay raise bill recently enacted by Texas legislators.

— A PRELIMINARY look at increased expenses in the next budget.

— Upholding a ruling made last year by the board that the school would not pay travel expenses incurred by vocational teachers in excess of state allocations for vocational travel.

— Ordering two new 48-passenger school buses.

— A resolution expressing sympathy and condolences to the family of Mrs. Viola Chisholm, a Hereford High School teacher who died last week.

— SETTING THE cafeteria supervisor's salary and rescinding a motion made at last month's meeting concerning the matter.

— Discussion of the future of the Progressive School property, located nine miles northeast of Hereford.

— Tabling bids for a lot at 226 Ave. D, which the school had obtained in a tax foreclosure and offered for sale.

Construction at Bluebonnet Elementary School, the bus barn, and the addition to Alkman Elementary was termed "on schedule" by architect Herb Brasher and general contractor C. B. Martin, both of Lubbock.

School personnel were concerned, however, that time between completion of the construction and the August 30 beginning of classes would be too short.

New Administrators Outline Suggested Policy Switches

Board Told 'Some Changes Due'

Two men who will take over administrative duties for the Hereford school district met with the school board Tuesday night, airing their philosophies and suggesting proposed changes in the way local schools are run.

School board members — after the four-hour-plus session concluded — expressed satisfaction in the aggressive and dedicated attitude displayed by the professionals.

Meeting with the board were Johnny Clark Jr., who assumed

duties as superintendent of schools here on June 1, and Dillie M. Kelley, who will become business manager on July 1.

CLARK, WHO HAS worked with acting superintendent Don Martin since assuming his position, outlined several policies which he hoped to employ here.

Kelley was on hand to explain how he hopes to manage the school's financial affairs.

Both men suggested changes from past procedures which apparently met with the board's approval.

"Running a grown-up school system such as this one in Hereford is 'big business,'" Clark commented at one point.

"I do not in any way mean to be critical of anyone," he continued, "but I think the board has in the past been forced to drift into an administrative capacity for which the board of education should not be responsible. You have had to handle matters which should not be under the responsibility of the board of trustees."

"I THINK ALL matters which come before the school board should first come through the superintendent's office," Clark later asserted after board members commented that questions were often brought to individual board members.

"You pay us as administrators to handle such things, and I believe they should come before the board only as a last resort . . . and only then when it is a question of proper administration."

HARVEST BEGINS

Hereford Area's 1st Barley Load Is Brought In

The first load of barley — marking the beginning of the 1965 harvest season — rolled into a Hereford grain elevator Thursday afternoon.

E. M. Green, who farms 10 miles southeast of Hereford, hauled in 13,000 pounds of irrigated barley to Pitman Grain Co.'s Hereford facility. The barley was planted Oct. 1.

Elevator spokesmen said the grain had a moisture content of 13.3 — "about as good as you'd ever want to see it."

GREEN, WHO has about 100 acres of barley, said it was all apparently ready to cut. He said his wheat would be ready in about ten days.

Grainmen in the county expected grain to trickle in to local markets during the next week and predicted harvest would be in full swing in about three weeks.

Last year, the first load of 1964 grain was delivered on June 8.

Harvest prospects were cited as being exceptionally good for most grain producers.

Large-scale hail damage and the abandonment of more than 50 percent of the dryland wheat acreage in the county have slightly curtailed earlier promise of a "bumper" wheat and barley harvest this year.

BUT YIELD IS still expected to be above normal on most undamaged crops, grainmen said.

Dryland wheat in some localized areas is looking good but at the same time less than half of the dryland acreage planted will be harvested due to lack of moisture during the early part

FAA FROWNS ON PLAN

Airport Target Range Dropped

The Hereford Municipal Airport will remain solely in the airport business, city commissioners decided Monday night, reversing themselves after an unfavorable ruling by the Federal Aviation Agency on a proposal to locate a trap shooting range on the property.



City commissioners had previously approved a request from the Hereford Gun Club to lease a 300-foot strip on airport property.

The commission's May 3 approval of the request was made subject to the FAA's OK, however.

CITY MANAGER Dudley Bayne revealed during Monday's session that the FAA had ruled against the proposed site, located near the southeast-northeast dirt runway at the airport.

He said the FAA did approve a site which the city commissioners had previously ruled out. Commissioners stayed with their former notion that the range should not be located at the site originally proposed by the Gun Club, and, as a result, the request was given a final no.

On May 3, the commission had agreed to grant the club a five-year lease for the site for a \$25 annual fee.

SEVERAL REQUESTS to use airport property for projects ranging from go-kart racing to livestock feeding had been denied by city commissioners during recent years.

In other action Monday night, the commission rejected two proposed zoning changes and tabled action on a third.

Also tabled was a rate change ordinance proposed by Southwestern Public Service Co.

In other discussion Clark compared the Hereford school financial structure with that of another area school which he described as "above average."
"It looks like we should have as good a school program here as there exists anywhere," Clark said, "but there are some things which should be worked out."
CLARK SAID THAT a survey of last year's attendance revealed that the school qualifies for 11 more classroom teacher

units than the school listed with the state education agency.
"We ran into one factor for which we have not yet found an explanation," he continued, explaining that vocational teachers — and the subsequent salary allocations from the state — are determined on the basis of the number of students participating.
Last year, Hereford applied for and received allocations for two homemaking instructors, but actually qualified for three, Clark said. He added that there

is a possibility that the school will qualify for four vocational homemaking instructors for 1965-1966.
HE SAID THAT although no information had yet been received from the state agency, a call to Austin indicated that teacher pay raise legislation recently enacted would mean an additional \$36,000 in local district fund assignments for teacher's salaries in the Hereford Schools.
Clark said details of teacher pay for the Hereford school system should be available for July's session.

pletion of work before August 15.

Brasher said the bus barn would probably be ready to turn over to the school "about the first of next week."

After okaying minor changes in plans for the new junior high, board members agreed to call for bids to be opened at 8 p.m. on July 8.

Brasher said total cost of the facility — to be located at the north end of Stadium Drive near the football stadium — would be about \$900,000.

INCLUDED IN THE junior high will be a gymnasium which will seat 1,800. Current plans of the board call for use of the gym for high school varsity basketball games.

Architect for the 90,000 square foot facility is Brasher, Goyette, & Rapier of Lubbock, which drew plans for the present construction projects.

Upon the recommendation of Clark, the board agreed to grant a two-year contract to Kelley at an annual salary of \$10,500. The board in the past had contemplated a one-year contract.

Teacher contracts were app-

roved for the following:
Harvey Penner, to teach industrial arts at Hereford High School, Penner, who taught here a few years ago, had returned to Oklahoma to teach because he was unable to obtain a draft deferment here, acting superintendent Martin said. That matter settled, he had applied again for the position.

Linda Kay Newton, a graduate of West Texas State University, to teach first grade at Central Elementary.

MRS. CAROLYN Walker, who taught last year at Wildorado Elementary school, as a special education teacher.

Mrs. Mary Young, a practice teacher at Stanton Junior High this year, to teach special education there next year.

Clark said that information he had received in a call to Austin indicated the recent teacher pay hike legislation would cost the Hereford schools an additional \$38,000 in local fund assignments for salaries in the coming school year.

He said that an exact breakdown of schedules had not been received, but that it should be available for the July board meeting.

In addition to increased sal-

aries, Clark pointed to increased interest and sinking fund needs for the coming year among items to be considered in the new budget.

HE EXPLAINED that an error in the present budget will result in depletion of the fund—used to retire bonded indebtedness. He said the current school budget allotment is \$19,000 short of the actual amount needed to pay interest and principal during the present year.

But the system entered the year with a \$17,000 surplus in the fund, thus the school will be only some \$2,000 short.

He said that the present budget allotted \$235,000 to the interest and sinking fund, but that actual expenditures would be \$254,000.

Clark said the fund next year would require some \$306,000 to make up for the deficit and create a surplus at the end of the year — which he said is needed to obtain desirable bond rates in the future.

"WE'RE LOOKING at a budget increase of more than \$130,000 in salaries and interest fund alone," Clark said concerning next year's budget.

He then asked tax assessor-collector Orpha Click how school tax valuation shaped up for the coming year.

Click said preliminary studies indicated an increase of some \$8 million on the school tax roll.

"If this is true," Clark said, "we should be able to operate on the present tax rate."

Clark asked the board what the policy is concerning travel for vocational teachers, who receive an annual allocation from the state.

The board replied that last year it agreed not to pay expense above the state-allotted amount.

CLARK SAID THAT some of the teachers had exceeded the amount this year. The board agreed to stick with its past ruling and not pay the excess.

In other business, the board agreed to rescind a motion setting the cafeteria supervisor's salary at \$3,250 for a 10-month period.

A question had arisen over the salary when Mrs. Joe Smith, the supervisor, asked how she would be paid during the summer months.

Acting Supt. Martin told the board last month that Mrs. Smith had said former superintendent Darrell Williams had promised her a 12-month salary.

There being no mention of the agreement in the minutes, the board had decided to pay her \$325 monthly for a 10-month period.

CLARK SAID Mrs. Smith had said this agreement was not satisfactory with her.

Clark then checked payroll records and found that Williams had scheduled Mrs. Smith for the 12-month salary.

Board members said this was done without their knowledge or approval, but that due to the new evidence "it would be only fair" to pay Mrs. Smith as she had been promised during the current school year, which expires August 31.

Last week's motion that she be paid for ten months was then rescinded and a new one pass-

A request from Bill Angel of 301 West Park Ave. that his property be rezoned from B to D was denied, along with a request from Durwood Hamby that property on North 385 be rezoned from C to D. Both had received favor from the zoning commission.

Tabled was a request from Hereford Development Co. that her salary be extended to twelve months.

ACTING SUPT. MARTIN said he had been contacted by a resident of the Progressive community, who said residents no longer wished to use the former Progressive School as a community center.

The school was abandoned in 1942 when consolidated with Hereford schools. At that time, the school district agreed to allow residents of the area to use the building as a community house.

Board members took no action concerning the two-acre tract and building.

Members of the board expressed appreciation to Martin, who has served as superintendent since the resignation of Darrel Williams.

The board also commended business manager Kendal Williams, who resigned effective July 1 for a position in another town.

Martin will work with Clark and Kelley during June and July before returning to his former post as junior high counselor in August.

Glenrio Depends On Road Trade

Glenrio has not always been Glenrio. It once was Rock Island, a moniker borrowed from the railroad but replaced because Texas already had a Rock Island. Authentic accounts of Glenrio's younger years are scarce; current residents frequently claim ignorance and poor memories of early events, except for Mrs. Tom Jones, whose pappy rode fence for The Syndicate, the XIT Ranch, starting in 1902.

"At that time there wasn't anything here to speak of," Mrs. Jones said from her 48-year-old house stuck back in the blistering sand dunes and shoulder-high yucca plants.

BUT THE PEOPLE who man the tourist-oriented businesses insist that Glenrio once was a rollicking, self-sustaining little desert community. It had a newspaper, "The Tribune," and a printing office. A one-teacher school succumbed early to consolidation.

Two stories high, surrounded by shade trees and famed for its satin pillows, the Hotel Cooper offered headquarters for "fishing and horseback riding, tennis and croquet," and staged a Saturday night dance that matter-of-factly was a "must" for the region's only deputy sheriff.

RANCHER GLENN Sullivan, an on-and-off resident since 1908, claims the Fourth of July celebration used to attract 3,000 persons. And the Rock Island depot has been gone less than a decade.

The post office, quartered in a seedy, two-room, white-washed cubicle on the New Mexico side, still observes regular hours.

Mrs. Barbara D. Smith, transplanted from Kentucky, has served as postmaster for eight years, doubles as an unofficial chamber of commerce manager and enthusiastically hopes to boost annual receipts (\$900 in 1964) into the third class category. She also serves as "librarian" for a 100-book case, provided recently by a trio of residents to hold volumes supplied by the New Mexico State Library.

GLENRIO IS a friendly town — and a resourceful one, made so by the variety of predicaments routinely presented by the Niagara, homogeneous flow of tourists stopping at its doorstep. "This is a close-knit little community," says Mrs. Jones, adding that once in awhile intra-community exchanges only seem innocuous. Either way, Glenrio is a gateway to two states, both of which have shaped its varied complex.

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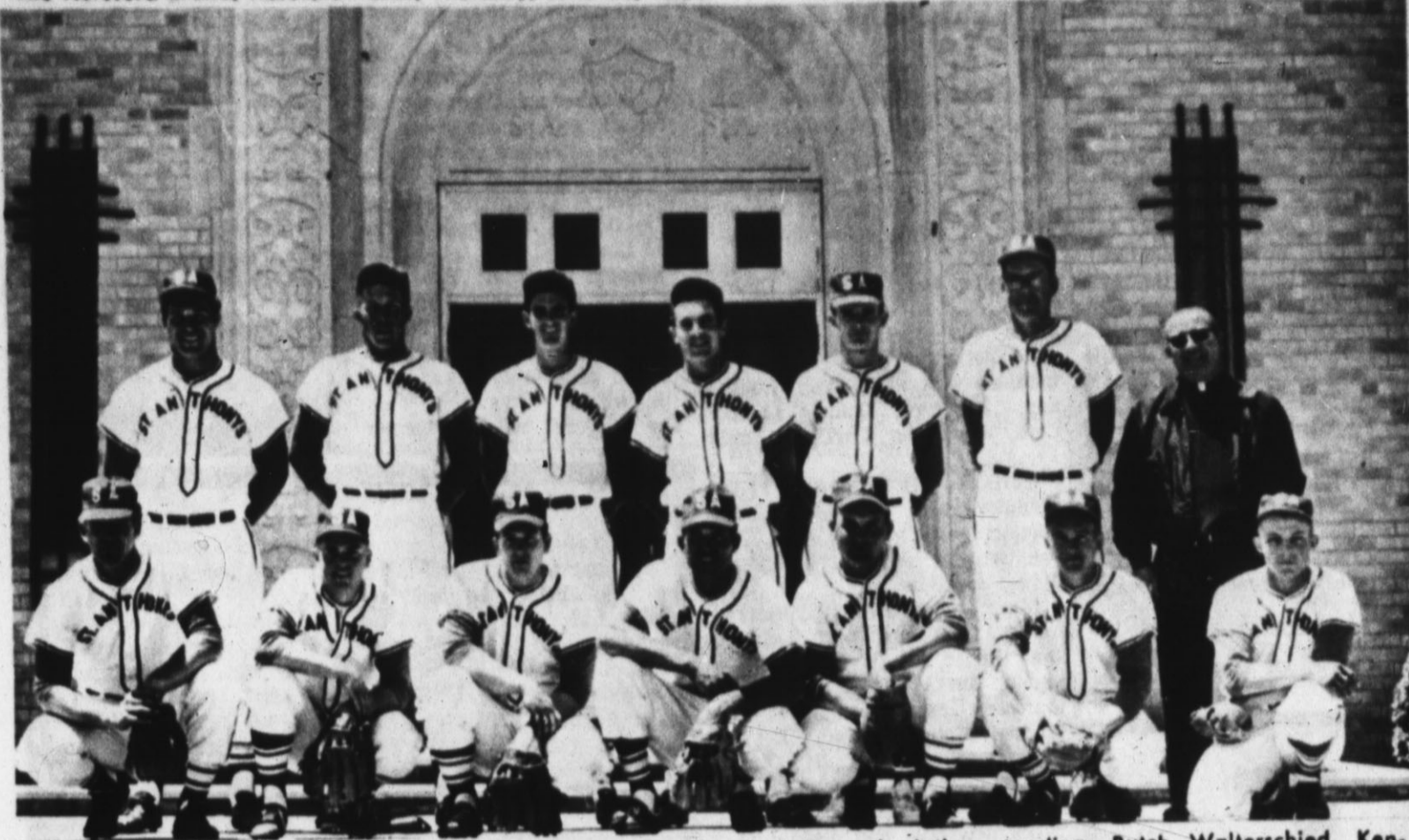

WHY DOLPHINS SUCCEED
DURBAN, South Africa — Marine scientists are puzzled over the apparent mass suicide of 30 dolphins in the antishark nets laid off this eastern coast's beaches.

They are investigating the theory that something interfered with the dolphins' delicate underwater direction — finding equipment. Dolphins usually emit high-pitched squeaks which help them to detect and avoid obstacles.

All 30 dolphins drowned. They are mammals and must surface regularly to breathe.

One clue being closely studied is that the dead dolphins had sardines in their stomachs. While chasing a shoal of sardines the dolphins may have temporarily "switched off" their underwater "radar," said a spokesman for the South African Marine Biological Research Institute.

Dolphins are frequently sighted off Durban but they seldom become entangled in the nylon antishark nets.
