Ordinance Seeks Clean Property

LABORER DEAD AFTER STABBING

Indicts Man For Murder

Victim Dies In Incident At Cafe

A 34-year-old man who had been a laborer here for some three months was slain in a cafe at the Labor Camp Sunday night and a Hereford Latin American was being held Wednesday on a charge of murder with malice after being indicted by the Deaf Smith County Grand Jury in connection with the incident.

The dead man, Curtis Grant, who had come here recently from Macy, Neb., apparently died instantly after being stabbed once in the throat.

The stabbing occurred about 8:15 p. m. Sunday.

INDICTED for the slaying was Assincion Reyna, 59, a resident of the Hereford area for several years.

Reyna was indicted Tuesday afternoon by the grand jury - which had convened Tuesday morning - after the jury heard statements from several witnesses at the scene of the inci-

Few details concerning the incident were available

Sheriff Lowell Sharp said the stabbing occurred seemingly "without provacation" in a small cafe at the Labor Camp

THERE was no struggle preceding the stabbing, witnesses

UF Leaders Are Encouraged

New Ruling Bans **Unsightly Grounds**

An ordinance requiring that all property within the city of Hereford be kept clean and sanitary was passed by city commissioners in regular session here Monday.

The ordinance requires that all lots be maintained free from rubbish, weeds, and other unsightly and unsanitary waste and places responsibility for upkeep of property upon

owners or occupants. Passage of the ordinance highlighted a meeting which also saw the commission order installation of traffic signals at the intersection of Park Avenue and Avenue K and Park and Avenue B.

One zoning change and approval of some new equipment for the fire department also were included in business conducted during the session.

THE ORDINANCE passed Monday — coupled with a previously existing ordinance concerning vacant property makes it unlawful to allow proper to collect unsanitary waste. Among requirements of the

ordinance are the following: -"Filling up and draining such lots that shall have unwholesome place or places where stagnant water may ac-
