Hereford is to have the honor of entertaining the Clavis-Canadian division convention of the South West Trails convention, Thursday and Friday, June 15 and 16.

This information was contained in a letter to the Hereford Chamber of Commerce from W. A. Palmer of Canadian, secretary of the association, received yesterday. The dates have been accepted by the Hereford officials and arrangements will be made accordingly. Delegates will be here from all towns along the trail from Clavis to Canadian.

The meeting will open with a session, in order to allow local people to attend the session, and the business session and convention work will be completed the following day. Detailed program will be furnished Mr. Palmer at an early date.

The South West Trail is Hereford's tourist feeder, and every effort should be made to make this division convention a success in every sense of the word.

NEARLY FIVE INCHES ARE RECORDED IN FIVE DAYS

Since last Sunday, May 28, a total of 4.65 inches of rain has fallen in Hereford according to the official weather gauge, and many local weather observers declare the cans in their back yards raise this total quite a bit. It has rained more or less every night, some of the showers being light and some of them exceedingly heavy. There has been some hail in streaks and some crops have been hurt. Texas and Tucumcari have had had windstorms and hail, with heavy damage.

This country is thoroughly and absolutely soaked to the bottom, and the clouds still hang overhead and promise more. Stockmen are going to have trouble over what to do with all their grass, and town folks are due for a lot of scurrying on the weed crop. GRAIN SORGHUMS ASS'N WILL MEET AMARILLO JUNE 2

George H. Alford of Dallas, Secretary of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, will be chief speaker at Amarillo Friday afternoon at the City Hall at two o'clock, when the Texas Grain Sorghums Association is launched, according to D. P. McCallib of Amarillo, Panhandle Plains Supervisor of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, who was in Hereford Wednesday.

"We have received messages from many parts of Texas stating that delegations of farmers would attend the first meeting of the Texas Grain Sorghums Association, and we feel free to announce that from the interest being taken in the formation of an association for the systematic and orderly marketing of kafir, millo, feterita and other grain sorghums, the association will be ready to incorporate within sixty days after the first contract is signed," Mr. McCallib announced. "We can safely say that never in the short history of farmers' cooperative commodity marketing associations in Texas has there been such a deep interest taken in the formation of a farmers' marketing association. The indications are that we will beat the organization records of the cotton, wool and mohair, wheat, melon, peach, alfalfa, sweet potato, prairie hay, dairy products, tomato, and other associations, forming the Texas Grain Sorghums Association in one half to one fifth, the time required by them," he concluded.

Lightning Plays Havoc With Electric Co. Wires

Lightning played havoc with the wires and transformers of the Hereford Light & Power Co., last Saturday night and deprived about fifteen customers of the company of lighting facilities for over forty-eight hours.

An intense bolt blotted out the transformer on Twenty-Five Mile Avenue, near the residence of Jim Rutherford about midnight and the wires were down and spitting fire for a few minutes. The current was cut off, the fallen wires removed, and the damage repaired on Monday. Meanwhile the customers on that line were out of luck.

The heat from the bolt that hit the transformer was so intense that the lightning arrestors used, which are usually effective in such emergencies, were melted down and fused together.

Medals and Honor Bestowed on Odd Fellows Members

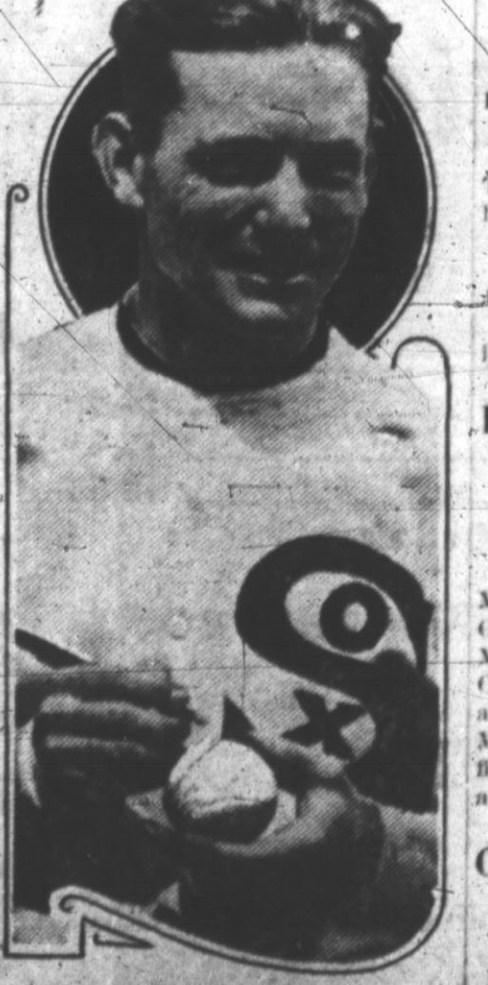

The question of what to do with our hospital is too vital a thing to allow to go by default, and it is earnestly hoped that every man, woman and child in the community, whatever their views may be, will take advantage of this meeting to hear all sides of the problem discussed.

His services were highly appreciated. He was accompanied by Mrs. Terrell and Prof. Buckner. Prof. Buckner will probably be our superintendent for next year.

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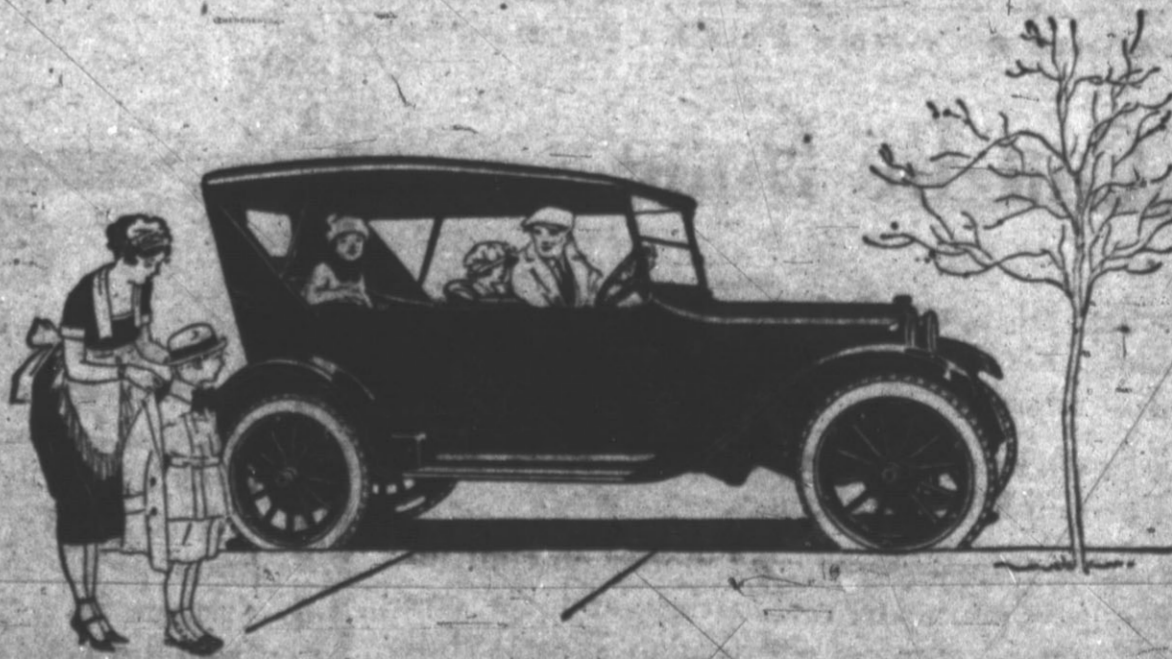
