AROUND 10 Per Cent Cut In City's Water Rates Announced

Mayor C. J. Paddock yesterday morning following a meet-ing of the city commissioners, announced a reduction of 10 per cent in city water bills to be mailed out on May 1.

The reduction will be in effect through the growing months in order to provide better oppor-tunity for citizens to take care of their lawns and to raise flowers and gardens, and to encourage this activity. Similar re-ductions are made annually. The May 1 bills will include meter readings made on April 20. / The discount is effective only on bills paid before the 10th of each month. The reduc-

tion is effective on any amount of water used, starting with the \$1.50 minimum, which will be reduced to \$1.35.

Mayor Charles J. Paddock and Commissioners N. E. Gass and Vern Witherspoon were re-elect-ed to their respective positions in the city government in Tuesday's elections.

They were unopposed, having announced a few weeks ago that they would offer themselves for re-election. Apparently satisfied that the trio would return to office, little interest was manifested in the election. Only 71 voters went to the polls, none of them scratching any of the three names appearing on the ballot.

Having served the city well during the past year, they returned to office yesterday morning for their first session of the new term. Their first official act was to reduce the city's water rates for the summer months.






