Better Insulation Sought

WASHINGTON (AP) - If you are a homeowner, the chances are good that President Carter's omnibus energy policy is going to require you to better insulate your home

Federal Energy Administrator John F O'Leary is hinting that two-thirds of all U.S. homeowners may be required to make their homes are energy-efficient under Carter's program.

O'Leary said the President's April 20 energy message will seek to upgrade the insulation of all homes through a "blend of incentives and disincentives " He said he hopes the program could be accomplished in 10 years.

Nuclear Limit May Help

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter is looking to other nations to embrace his policy of restricting use of deadly plutonium as a nuclear plant fuel. Domestic reaction to Carter's new nuclear fuel policy is mixed, with an industry official contending it will drive

up the cost of uranium. In announcing an end Thursday to U.S. government support for plutonium processing. Carter said he will seek agreements with foreign governments to restrict access to plutonium, which can be used to make nuclear weapons.

Crime Labs Not Careful

WASHINGTON (AP) - Crime labs often do poor work and sometimes are wrong about the evidence used against defendants in criminal trials, a new government study says.

The report from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, released today, said many crime laboratories operated by state, local or federal governments make mistakes and overlook important features in comparing bloodstains, firearms, glass, paint, soil and other items used as evidence.

A lab technician's court testimony often is crucial in linking a defendant with a crime. For example, bloodstains on a defendant's clothing are compared with a victim's blood type to determine whether the defendant could have committed a murder

This is supported in part by the increased amount of savings and higher loans being extended local consumers.

ALTHOUGH BUILDING permits have sagged this year, banks and savings and loan facilities here report more deposits being saved by wage earners and a better atmosphere for loan risks.

As of the first three months, four local institutions doing most of their business here report total deposits of \$100,831,150 and loans of \$82,213,506. These are increases of about \$4.2 million and \$10.7 million respectively over the same time last year.

These institutions include Hereford, Tex., Federal Credit Union, Hi-Plains Savings and Loan Association. Hereford State Bank and First National Bank of Hereford. Security-Federal Savings and Loan Association was no included because it does most its business in Amarillo and Pampa and the firm has not yet compileld its end of March statement

However, Security Federal did report that it offered local residents resources of \$156,739,712 in deposits and \$178,423,-981 in assets as of the end of February. It approved loans of \$146,317,205.

OVERALL, the S-F figures were much higher than for the same month last year according to Dwight Turner, S-F vice in Dimmitt, but it is a comparatively small part of its total volume and therefore was included in the above

Since the first of the year, deposits have fallen by about \$4 million and loans have decreased by about \$6.1 million of all the reporting firms besides Security-Federal. Part of the decreases may be accurately attributed to the conditions at a given point in time since a lot of money is kept on hand after the first of the year depending on tax benefits received in 1976 or 197

Additionally, the agricultural situation fluctuates so much that these factors must be remembered when comparing totals. The recent drought conditions are grim evidence that future reports may not be as good. Combined with low prices received for agricultural products, some producers may be holding onto harvests pending better prices.

Motive In Principal's Death Still Puzzling

WHITHARRAL, Tex. (AP) - Authorities puzzled today over a possible motive for the fatal shooting of the Whitharral High School principal on the front porch of the school building.

A 17-year-old student, described as someone who had never given anyone any problems," was charged with murder for the slaying Thursday, but police knew of know reason for the shooting.

We know what happened. We just don't know why it happened." Hockley County Deputy Darrell Spence said.

The principal, Malcolm Omar Tripp. 31. allegedly was shot twice in the back by Ricarde Lopez, a freshman, who was jailed on the murder charges.

Lopez, who school officials said had been "in and out of school" for the past several years, was brought before Justice of the Peace Earl Ford, who set his bond

Lopez, of nearby Littlefield, was arrested in a grocery store near the school where he had gone and asked the owner to call police because he had just "shot a

The shooting occured at about 9 a.m. minutes after the school bell rang.

Authorities said Lopez reportedly was standing outside the school on the front porch when Tripp came out of his office and asked him why he was not in class.

Lopez replied he was ill and Tripp then offered him a ride home, but Lopez sai he was not "that ill," officers said. Tripp then told Lopez to go inside to his

It was then, Deputy Spence said, that

Lopez reportedly pulled a .38 caliber

pistol and fired three shots. Tripp was hit twice. He was pronounced dead on arrival at a Levelland hospital.

Spence said, "the people we talked to have indicated that there were no problems between the two." He said the youth gave a statement sayinghe had a disagreement with Tripp

Ray Caster, owner of the grocery store in front of the school, said Lopez walked in 'laid the pistol on the counter, shoved it away from him with both hands and said. 'I've killed a man. Call the police.' 1 and he repeated it

Caster said his wife called police and an ambulance. Then he had Lopez sit in a chair behind the counter.

"I sat between him and the gun," Caster said explaining that he waited 20 minutes until police arrived.

The Whitharral school has 215 students and 20 teachers. Students were sent home after the shooting.

to withdraw supervision Confronted with Trull's interview and statements from other parties, Dr. William Amos, federal parole commissioner in Dallas said flatly," you haven't told us anything we haven't heard already. We are looking into these

Legislators Adjourn Short Of Debating Volatile Bills

AUSTIN (AP) - Senators - as well as House members - were on holiday today after limiting Thursday's session to two hours by avoiding prolonged debate on controversial legislation

The next Senate will return from the Easter weekend on Tuesday morning. with House members resuming work that afternoon.

One proposal senators refused to debate Thursday would provide 411,863 young children from poor families free medical checkups and treatment at an estimated cost of \$21.3 million over the next two years.

The vote to bring up the bill, by Sen. Carlos Truan, D-Corpus Christi, was 16-9, one vote short of the two-thirds majority he needed.

The Senate voted, however to prohibit discrimination against the hiring of blind persons, who are otherwise qualified for public jobs.

The bill also provides that a blind person cannot be charged more than other renters for keeping a guide dog. The bill now goes to the House.

The House passed and sent to Gov. Dolph Briscoe and a bill exempting from the sales tax restaurant and bar tips that are automatically added to a customer's

The Senate refused, 15-11, to debate a flood control measure after A.R. Schwartz, D-Galveston, asked "Can this

bill stand a filibuster today?"

Schwartz and other objected because the bill would prohibit political subdivision from adopting land management measures under the national flood insurance program that are more stringent that minimum requirements.

Sen. Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, described it as a marrow, special interest bill of the Texas Association of

The Senate approved, 4-11, and sent to the governor a bill allowing legal fees in lawsuits based on contracts.

It passed to the House a bill giving the trial judge the discretion whether to permit appeals in cases where an accused and the prosecutor reach agreement on the sentence in exchange for a guilty

It adjourned, however, rather than debate Doggett's proposal requiring University of Texas regent appointees to file financial statements.

House members passed a measure making counties and school districts subject to damages for wrongful deaths. caused by their employes.

Another House bill that went to the Senate allows optometrists to use diagnostic drugs. They now cannot dilate a patient's pupils because that involves the use of a drug.

Krueger said Wednesday that this and other features of the new energy proposal could devastate the Texas economy.

Under existing federal priority policies, that would mean that gas which now fuels Texas utilities and industries would be shipped to Northern homeowners during winter months.

Texas may lose hundreds of thousands of jobs," he said, since it relies more heavily than any other state on natural gas for industrial uses.

Krueger's knowledge of the Carter proposals comes from numerous inquiries to the administration and a private breakfast meeting he and seven other congressmen had Tuesday with James Schlesinger, Carter's energy advisor.

The meeting with Schlesinger was off the record and Krueger said he woulde not disclose exactly what was said.

But he did suggest that the administration, while it has not finalized its plan, was preparing

Shuval Explains Bills To Kiwanians

District Attorney Andy Shuval presented a program before the Noon Kiwanis Club Thursday. outlining a group of bills now before the Texas Legislature called Dolph Briscoe's anticrime package.

The package of bills was penned by prosecuting attorneys following the last session of the legislature two years ago. These bills are designed to protect the individual and bring more into line the penalty for the crime committed as well as making it easier for law enforcement and prosecution for

Shuval urged the Kiwanians to write to their representatives in Austin in favor of the bills. Below is a list of the bills and a short description of each:

Welfare reform: Allow the penalties for welfare, medicaid, and food stamp fraud to be governed by the amount stolen the greater the amount, the greater the penalty. Senate Bills 154 and 149, House Bills 897

Jury Instruction on Parole: Allows a jury to know what the good time law of Texas is (basically a man gets to serve only one-third of his sentence not counting credit for good behavior and blood donations. Senate Bill 153 and House Bill

Mandatory Supervision of Released Prisoners and Limitation of Probation: All prisoners released from the penitentiary will be supervised for the remainder of the calendar time left on their sentence. Limits probation of the offenses of kidnapping, murder, robbery, rape, sexual abuse, or their aggravated forms. Also limits probation if a weapon is used or exhibited. Senate Bill 152 and House Bill 571.

Evidentiary Search Warrants: Allow a search warrant to be issued to seize evidence such as phony stock certificates crooked set of books, ect. Senate

Bill 156 and House Bill 701. Oral Confessions: Allows the admission of an oral confession of the defendant if the Miranda warning is given, the writing is reduced in 48 hours and sworn to by two or more people. Senate Bill 157 and House Bill

Control Organized Crime: Includes limited count supervised wiretapping and allows trying cases that occur in different counties all on one county and in one trial. Senate Bill 151 and House Bill 479.

Limitation of Bail: The first is a bill which allows the court to deny a man convicted of a bond on appeal if his sentence is over five years. The second is a Constitutional Amendment which would allow the judge to deny bail to men who are arrested for a felony while already out on bond for a felony. Senate Bills 52 and 3. House Bills 221 and 41.

Speeding Up Appeals: The first is a constitutional Amendment to increase the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine members. The second is a bill to speed up appeals by preventing the granting of excessive extensions in the trial court. Senate Bills 18 and 155, House Bills 485.

TRAINING PANTS 'N PRAISE HELP

Allowing a child to wear training pants rather than diapers encourages him to help himself. It is much easier to get one's training pants on and off when going to the bathroom.

Consistently praising the child for his successes and ignoring his failure promotes success, too, Mrs. Miller said.

Be accepting of an "accident." No how hard a child tries, there will be times when he will wet or dirty his clothing. Wet pants are likely to occur if a youngster gets excited, tired, ill or is over engrossed in play, she explained.

"Also, help your youngster clean up after accidents rather than scolding or punishing him. Constantly shaming a child for wetting or dirtying himself will only make him feel inadequate and guilty.

"It will take time, muscle growth and practice before a child is completely toilet trained," the specialist added.

Teacher Pay Raise Bill Must Wait Over Easter

AUSTIN (AP) - The legislature's four-day Easter holiday has delayed House committee. approval of a \$263 million reacher pay bill until Tuesday the same day represenatives are due to consider a school finance

771

Rep. Tom Massey, chairman of the House Public Education Committe, said Thursday's scheduled meeting on the bill. which calls for a 12.5 per cent raise to the most experienced teachers but virtually no increase for beginners, was postponed because of holiday schedule conflicts.

The House and Senate adjourned Thursday for Easter.

Massey had said he wanted approval by the full committee before the Easter weekend so representatives could take the bill home for study before considering the \$694 million comprehensive school finance measure.

"I don't think it makes much difference at this point if we pass it out now," Massey said Thursday. "Subcommittee reports are available. Since everyone has scattered, if we kicked it out now, they would not have any more material than they do now."

Massey said he thought the full committee would make no major changes in the bill

approved earlier this week by a public education subcommittee. The Texas State Teachers Association hopes to tack its \$865 million pay raise plan to the school finance bill in next Tuesday's scheduled debate.

The subcommittee's teacher pay bill would boost the next school year's beginning teacher salary only \$84 a year - to \$8,084 but, would raise minimum

income for the most experienced teachers by \$1,474 - a 12.5 per cent hike to \$13,254. In the 1978-79 school year, the beginning teacher's pay

would increase to \$8,164, while top scale would rise to \$13,386. Local districts can pay more than the salary levels guaranteed by and subsized by the state through the Founda-

tion School Program. Three new steps were added to the present 10-step salary scale, at a cost of \$26 million over the next two years. No teacher would advance beyond step 11 during that period. however. A teacher would have to remain in each of the top steps for three years before advancing to the next one.

Bachelor's degree teachers now reach the present top scale. step 10, in 13 years.

Demolition Squad Expected To End Search

HOLLIDAY, Tex. (AP) - An explosive demolition squad from Oklahoma was expected to complete its search today for a possible stockpile of nitroglycerine in a caved-in cellar.

The military team fro Sill. Okla., dug a hug about seven feet deep and 10 feet across Thursday but no trace of nitroglycerine was found.

Five soldiers, including one woman, who are members of the females in the Army in this kind 61st Explosives Ordinance of work, she said. Detachment EOD searched the collapsed cellar where 30 years ago the nitro supposedly was stored.

Late Thursday the yawning hole had yielded only some putrid jars of peach preserves, bits of timber and tin, cans, empty bottles, ceramic bowls, plates, hinges, several bricks and what appeared to be the remains of a bucket.

The digging started Wednesday after Georgia T. Lynch of Wichita Falls notified authorities that her late sister, Mrs. W.C. Curlee, had told her that her husband mixed and stord nitroglycerine for use in oil fields before he died in 1947.

The nitro reportedly was stored subsequently in the cellar here in an old residential area.

About 150 residents were evacuated from a potential three-block danger area Wednesday and returned to their homes shortly before dark that night. They were evacuated again Thursday.

Lone Star Gas Co. said it exposed a gas line that normally is underground so it could be turned off quickly if necessary.

Fire Chief John Harrigal of the Holliday volunteer fire department expressed belief that the entire town of 3,000 people might have to be evacuated if the three five-gallong nitro containers were found.

But Lt. David Farmer of the EOD squad said he thought evacuation of the three-block area would be sufficient.

Farmers said the ordnance crew's sniffing dogs smelled nitrates in the soil that was dug from the cellar.

Nitrates would be what the specially trained dogs would sniff if there was nitrogylcerine or dynamise present.

Asked if it could be a jar of pickles the dogs smelled,

Farmer nodded and said, "If it has nitrates in it." The only woman in the five-member bomb squad from Ft. Sill is Karen Crisp, 22, who

Judge Lobbies Favorite Water Project

WASHINGTON (AP)- When Judge Nelson R. Link of Palestine, Tex., first came to Washington to get some federal money for his favorite water project, Jimmy Carter was just a peanut farmer from South Georgia.

And, if all goes according to his plans, Link expects to still be coming to Washington for his project long after Carter has returned to Plains.

Link is one of thousands of people who have come to Washington in the past two weeks on an annual pilgrimage to the federal pork barrel. His experience illustrates some of the problems Carter faces trying to cut back on the size and nature of the federal public

works program. Judge Link's project is the Trinity River project, the biggest single effort the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has

If it is ever fully completed, it will create several massive reservoirs in East Texas and turn landlocked Dallas and Fort Worth into seaports by means of a 350-mile barge canal to the Gulf of Mexico. It will cost more than \$2 billion.

The environmental lobby. which Judge Link tends to characterize as "a bunch of professional do-gooders from upstream," thinks of the project as a classic boondoggle that will destroy thousands of acres of natural habitat to enrich a few businessmen.

That's not what Judge Link wants Congress to think. So, on Tuesday, he and 161 other Texans boarded a chartered plane and flew to Washington.

The group included bankers. utility officials, newspaper publishers and other businessmen from the Trinity basin. It also had a full compliment of local officials like Link.

The group leaders, over 15 years, have polished their Washington routines. They started off with a reception in the Rayburn House Office Building in a room provided for them by Rep. Olin Teague,

One by one, the members of the Texas congressional delegation whose districts about the Trinity basin dropped by to have a drink and reiterate their support for the project.

They included powerful congressmen like Jim Wright, the House majority leader, who originally introduced the Trinity legislation in the 1960s; Ray Roberts, chairman of the water subcommittee of the House Public Works Committee, which authorizes projects; and George Mahon, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, which funds them.

After an evening on the town, Judge Link was ready to play his who would actually testify. The rest crowded into the committee rooms behind him.

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





But in his office, where he frequently jots down significant thoughts immediately after a game, Lucchesi had scribbled on a piece of paper: "Bump, you did it for me."

Wills, the 24-year-old son of former star Maury Wills, said he was gratified with his major league debut because it gave him the feeling "That maybe things worked out for the best."

"I told myself that Frank had been through a lot," Wills said. "and I wanted to show him that I could play."

As for his own part in the confrontation. Wills said he was only involved indirectly because "it could have been someone else." He said the Texas players had agreed that what happened 'is all behind us now.'

Richards Passes Chromosome Test

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)-Dr. Renee Richards, a transsexual who has sparked controversy since joining the women's tennis circuit, says she's passed a chromosome test required to participate in most women's professional sports.

Dr. Richards said she plans to enter Wimbledon, the Italian Open, French Open and U.S. Open next summer...

She said she was informed by telephone Thursday that her Barrbody test, which indicates the percentage of X or female chromosomes in a cell, showed she genetically is a woman.

Dr. Richards said the test. administered by Dr. Anderson Nettleship of AML Medical Laboratories of Fayetteville, Ark., showed she has 24 per cent of X chromosomes, or four per cent above the cutoff used by Olympic and international tennis officials for participation in women's sports.

The cells were scraped from inside Dr. Richard's cheeks last

said Dr. Richards, 42, who was a ranked Eastern amateur and captain of the Yale University tennis team as Richard Raskind before undergoing sex change procedures two years ago.

"But then I realized that when the girls on the tour hear the news I'll lose the psychological edge that I had when they believed I had some kind of enormous geneticadvantage," she said.

She said she took the testsprivately before in California and passed them, but she says even some medical experts claim they're not conclusive.

She is in Tallahassee for a women's professional tennis tournament which does not require Barrbody certification of its players as demanded by the Women's Tennis Association. WTA officials were not
