\section*{Letter to parent called intimidating}


Local attorney Dino Barela, speaking as "a concerned citizen,"
said a letter sent to Mr. and Mrs. Tom Lange by the Hereford School administration was an attempt at intimidation. The letter, dated Feb. 21, 1985, warned the couple of the quishing of a tape recording of their child being tested. Mrs. Lange said she did not record the testing session.
In a meeting last week, Mrs. Lange had requested to be present
when her child was tested, and reported that the teacher was leading her child to be unsure of her first pick for an answer.
The letter explained that the taping of the test devalued its effectiveness and ruined its limited disclosure. It asked that the tape be returned or that the Langes tell the administration if they had not

directors since the days of Prohibition. The commission promoted and encouraged a climate of fear"t to

among themselves, from breaking
the traditional code of silence and from infringing on each other's territory, the indictment said. U.S. Attorney Rudolph Giuliani
said the government has thousands of hours of taped conversations, amassed during the past several years from 90 telephone taps and 80
