

San Jose To Apply for \$400,000 Grant

Residents of the San Jose community south of Hereford joined with Deaf Smith **County Precinct 2 Commissioner Austin** Rose and representatives of the Texas Department of Health Resources and the Panhandle-Regional Planning Commission Monday night in covering all of the bases in an application for a \$400,000 block grant for a water system for the village.

Officials and residents gathered at the courthouse last night for a public hearing on a small community improvement grant program which could make up to \$400,000 available to San Jose.

The small community grant application comes on the heels of an imminent health threat grant application which has already been filed on behalf of San Jose. Rose explained that two grant

applications are being filed to enhance the chances of the community receiving grant money. In the event that funds are granted through the imminent threat application, the small community grant application would be dropped, according to Rose.

Approximately 25 residents of the San Jose community turned out to hear explanations on the grant application procedure from Mary Arndt, urban-

regional planner with the PRPC, and Rafael Quinones, a representative of the Texas Department of Health Resources office in Canyon.

Ms. Arndt explained the various projects San Jose residents could seek grant funds for, including demolition and clearance of deteriorated buildings, development of sewer systems, and employment, child care and drug abuse assistance.

Numerous residents of the community stood to voice their opinion that their primary aim at this time is to develop a water system, with their number two priority a sewer system to be developed at a later date.

"Grant money, which would be received from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) is not a loan, and would be paid in full by the federal government. But there are many more applications submitted to HUD each year than there are funds to take care of. We want you aware that this is a competitive program," Ms. Arndt explained.

Officials explained that Deaf Smith County is requesting the small community block grant, and in the event that HUD approved such a grant, it would be transferred to the county, and then to a San Jose water district, now in the

process of being formulated.

"There's not enough money in one block grant to get both a water and sewer system for San Jose at one time," Rose stated. "We are trying to get a grant for a water system now, and will try for a sewer system grant later," he added.

The pre-application for a HUD community improvement grand discussed at Monday night's meeting must be submitted to the HUD area office in Dallas by May 15.

HUD's Dallas office will make the decision on the imminent threat application, but officials explained last night that only limited funding is available through this program, and that in order to insure a better chance of a grant for the San Jose area, a small community development grant application is also being filed.

According to Ms. Arndt, a HUD response on the matter would be available June 13, at the earliest, and in all likelihood, a response will not come until July 15, because of the current work load

Quinones explained "an imminent threat application was possible because of a surface contamination problem with the current water system at the village. Back-siphonage of surface water into the (See GRANT, Page 2)

Judge, JP, Commissioner **Runoffs Scheduled for June 3**

The next rung in the local political ladder during this election year will be June 3 runoffs involving races for Deaf Smith County Judge, justice of the peace, and county commissioner, Precinct 4.

Voters, who numbered nearly 4,400, decided who would be in those runoffs during Saturday's Democratic primary elections, in which Texas voters nominated a new gubernatorial candi-

Wesley Gulley over Rex Easterwood for 222nd District Court judge. Austin Rose was re-elected as county commissioner. Precinct 2, subject to the November general election.

Saul managed 2,669 votes to incumbent Andy Shuval's 1,575. Gulley, appointed to the Judgeship last year by Governor Dolph Briscoe, got 2,252 votes to Easterwood's 1,964 in Deaf Smith County. Oldham County, also included in the 222nd District, gave Gulley another 419 votes and Easterwood 387.

Counties that gave Hill a good majority cover almost all of the Panhandle and the South Plains, another solid group covers northeast Texas, then extends down most of East Texas into the populous Houston, Galveston, Beaumont-Port Arthur areas. There's another big group of Hill counties in Central Texas around Austin. There even is a string of Hill counties along the Mexican border from Eagle Pass to Brownsville, where Gov. Dolph Briscoe's stronghold used to be. Briscoe's counties are mostly in one group that extends from far west Texas-but not El Paso-to Waco and from (See RUNOFFS, Page 2)

County Okays Application For District Attorney Grant

Deaf Smith County commissioners Monday passed a resolution to apply for a \$30,209 personnel and equipment grant from the state for the district attorney's office

District Attorney Andy Shuval, who requested the resolution Monday after the commission agreed last year to apply for the grant, said that Lorin Constanzo of Houston has been hired as a second assistant district attorney for the office.

Constanzo will begin his duties on May 15, according to Shuval. The commission agreed to pay the new assistant a salary of \$6,075 for the remainder of the year and \$13,050 next year.

The grant money will pay the salaries of an investigator in the DA's office and an office manager. It also will be used to purchase equipment.

Mary Arndt of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission asked the commission to consider applying for a small-cities grant, which, if approved, would finance an improved water system at the San Jose Labor camp.

Ms. Arndt told the commission that application should be made for the small-cities grant in case the request for the imminent health and safety grant. discussed last month by commissioners. was not approved.

"What we're doing is taking two shots et the same amount of money." said Austin Rose, commissioner of Precinct 2. who presided over Monday's meeting in the absence of County Judge Sam Morgan.

The court approved a motion to seek an application for the grant.

ROME (AP) - The Italian news agency ANSA reported today the body of kidnapped former Premier Aldo Moro was found inside a car parked on a downtown Rome street.

ANSA quoted a police official as saying the body was found in a car parked between the headquarters of the Christian Democrat and Communist parties.

Moro 61, president of the ruling Christian Democrat Party and five-time former premier, had been kidnapped March 16 in a Rome street ambush that killed his five police bodyguards.

Clayton Optimistic In Speaker Bid

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Bill Clayton of Springlake turned most of his pledge cards face up Monday and said they prove he can count on far more than the 76 votes he needs for a third term as House Speaker.

Clayton took less than two days after Saturday's primary elections for state legislators to declare himself the victor in House voting that is more than eight months away.

In another legislative development, unofficial returns gave former Rep. Ed Howard, D-Texarkana, victory in the race for the Senate seat from which Sen. A.M. Aikin, D-Paris, is retiring.

With only a few votes in Harrison County Marshall still uncounted, Howard had 38,257 votes - 51.3 percent of the totoal. Former Rep. George Preston, D-Paris, had 20,670, Joe Joiner of Sherman 12,429 and Charles McFatridge of Mount Pleasant 3,251.

There is no Republican candidate. Clayton called a news conference and laid out a list of 121 representatives from 110 districts who had authorized him to disclose their pledges to vote for him.

Not all the pledges are guaranteed votes. In at least three cases, Clayton had only one of two Democrats who will be in run-offs June 3.

Rep. Buddy Temple, D-Diboll, the only other speaker candidate, has not conceded the election to Clayton.

If elected, Clayton would be the first Texan to serve three consecutive terms as speaker. M.D.K. Taylor served three terms as speaker in the late 1800s, but the terms were nonconsecutive.

The speaker will be elected by a majority of the 150 House members when the Legislature convenes in January.

Asked if he were collecting pledge cards for a fourth term, Clayton said, "I

Sportscasting Not Work for KPAN's Simons

KPAN sportscaster Tom Simons likes sports so much he doesn't consider doing what he does as work. He says it's almost like watching the

game and simply talking about it. "It's fun, it's not work, it's the kind of thing you would do as an avocation. Maybe I shouldn't say that-I'll probably wind up getting a cut in my salary." said Simons, the voice of the Hereford Whitefaces for the last six years and a salesman for KPAN.

"The most fascinating thing about sportscasting is it's one of the few things where you can instantly give an account of what's going on. There's not many things in radio or TV or anything else that are live, instantaneous.

Simons, who played basketball at Sam Houston State in Huntsville, was vice president in a Mount Pleasant bank when he got his first taste of sportscasting.

"I started doing ball games on weekends because they needed somebody to help, and I liked that. I went back to school--broadcasting school in Dallas--then I sent out applications everywhere.

"I got only one back, so I took the job. And I've been here ever since."

Simons was hired as news director and sportscaster. He later moved into sales.

"I like working at KPAN. I like the things a small-town radio can do, and I like the notoriety. In a town the size of Hereford, you know the people involved in sports.

"I don't want to be unbiased when I'm doing Hereford games because the people who listen to those games are basically Hereford fans, and they don't want a Howard Cosell approach."

Simons said that knowing the players personally adds to his bias.


"I want to know who the kids are, and it probably results in me being less objective. But that doesn't bother me.

"Also, I probably sound too optimistic on the radio. But the main thing you don't want to do during the course of the game is to eliminate the team when the kid's mother or grandmother is sitting at home listening to the ball game."

Simons said he does not take winning as seriously as a lot of sports announcers.

"No matter what game it is, it's high school kids playing a game and the word game should be in quotes. It's nothing more than a game, and the object of a game is to do the best you can. If Hereford loses, it's satisfactory to me whenever I think they've done the best (See BRANDING, Page 2)

White Begins Campaign For November Election

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - Democratic nominee Mark White says he turned down advice to take a two-week vacation before resuming his campaign for attorney general.

"We started our campaign for November today," he told a news conference Monday. "We're going to be running hard every day - hard and scared.

That's the way White, the underdog. ran his Democratic primary campaign against well-known former House Speaker Price Daniel Jr.

White, a former member of Gov. Dolph Briscoe's official family, made it clear he's ready for friendly relations - in the interest of party harmony - with Attorney General John Hill. He said he visited with the Democratic gubernatorial nominee and talked with senatorial candidate Bob Krueger Monday.

"It looks like the Democratic party is going to be unified." he said.

White was careful not to offend supporters of Daniel or Hill. Daniel issued a belated concession

statement Monday afternoon. White said he hoped Daniel supporters

would vote for him against Republican Jim Baker, a well-financed candiate who was ex-president Ford's campaign manager.

Berkowitz Pleads **Guilty to Murders**

NEW YORK (AP) - Neysa Moskowitz sat like a stone, eyes riveted on the back of the head of the man who killed her daughter in the last attack of the Son of Sam.

Michael Lauria kept nodding his head from side to side in bitter accord with the indictment that outlined how David Berkowitz killed his daughter, Donna, with a shot in the back. Hers was the death that began a year of terror by "the 44-caliber killer.'

And a survivor, Donna DeMasi, who believes she can hear bone fragments still scraping in her head from the killer's attack, bent forward in her seat and plucked nervously at her lower lip.

Grim and anxious, they sat there

Monday, drawing comfort from their friends and their families - and watching the baldish former postal clerk who calmly confessed to killing six persons, knowing it was wrong to do so,

"You bastard!" Rose Lauria sobbed through the handkerchief she pressed to her mouth as Berkowitz, 24, recounted how he killed 18-year-old Donna on July 19, 1976.

"This isn't the justice I want," her husband muttered afterward. "He's got to burn. He's got to die for all the heartaches that he's caused. What else can I tell you?"

Hill Says Taxes

Important to People

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - Texas are worried most about what happens to their tax dollars, says Attorney General John Hill, the Democratic nominee for governor.

"My early emphasis will be on the budget, on how we are doing with our dollars, if we are getting our money's worth," Hill told a news conference Monday before disappearing on a short vacation.

"I think that is the job people want dohe first.

Hill said he has named Ernest Stromberger, a press aide during the campaign, to work on spending recommendations to the 1979 Legislature. He said Stromberger will be his "liaison" with Briscoe's budget staff. Hill said he doubted if he would present an entire new budget to the legislature, but would have recommendations.

"The proposals I made during the campaign can and will be carried out within our expected revenue," Hill said. "We are going to keep a close watch on the budget."

Hill said he received telephoned congratulations from President Carter Sunday night, but added that he had not asked Carter to campaign for him in the November election.

"I have always been one to rely on my own political resources," he said. "I don't anticipate asking for any outside help from anyone.

3 Killed in Crash Of Boeing Jet

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) - A National Airlines jet carrying 58 persons crashed into Escambia Bay while coming in for a landing, forcing stunned passengers to scramble out emergency doors into fog and a sea slicked with jet fuel. Three passengers were killed.

Most of the 52 passengers aboard the Boing 727 were saved because a tugboat

captain who saw the crash brought his barge to the rescue. The passengers had no warning that anything was wrong until the plane hit the water Monday night and came to rest about 500 yards from shore, settling in mud about 10 feet below the bay's surface.

'We were on our final approach," said Capt. Ronald Gift, a Navy pilot from Carmel, Calif., who was a passenger. "There was no warning, no violent maneuvering, no surging of the engines."

The airline initially listed 55 passengers, but later said three of those had never gotten aboard.

Three bodies were found floating near the plane. Divers sent into the partially submerged craft said everybody was out. But fog and haze hampered rescue efforts during the night, and a thunderstorm that moved over the bay early today churned up the seas as divers searched for the missing. A head count was further confused because passengers were scattered among six hospitals and several rescue stations.

The \$400,000 grant being sought by the San Jose area would cover the estimated cost of completely revamping the current system, which is riddled with leaks and distribution problems, and which relies on a well which failed for several days last spring, forcing some 100 families at the village to haul in their own water.

Bill McMorries. an Amarillo engineer. estimated the cost for rebuilding the water system, which would include a new well, pipe of adequate size for proper distribution, chlorination equipment. elevated water storage to insure proper water pressure and a sufficient reserve of water to tide the community over in case of a well failure, meters and fire hydrants.

Questioned by a resident about the quality of the system. Quinones responded, "It's first class. The way I've been told, it will be a better system than even Hereford has. It has been engineered for good water pressure throughout the community, and allowance has been made for expansion. It will take the water all the way up to the meter, which will be located near each house. I guess everyone will need to spend about \$50 for their own household water hookup. And everyone will be billed for the water he uses."

A San Jose resident expressed concern over cost overruns in the event the project is approved.

"The new wel will be located far enough from any open sewer to avoid contamination. The improved pressure of the new system should eliminate the current back-siphonage problem and do av ay with the contamination." Rose related.

Rose added that the county "is in good shape" on the paperwork necessary for grant applications.

Concern over the water system at San Jose arose last spring during the well failure, and as the Department of Health Resources was launching a crackdown on health hazards at the community.

Although water system problems had frequently arisen prior to the 1977 well failure. last spring marked the first time that San Jose residents united to secure an improved water system for their community.

At a series of meeting held early last summer, the community's residents elected a Steering Committee to begin the work necessary to secure grants or loans, and at the same time, formulated volunteer groups to begin clean-up work on their own within the village. Over the past year, livestock which



Young children, active teenagers, fussy eaters, and busy adults often depend on between-meal eating to supplement regular meals.

Sometimes all the incentive people need to snack nutritiously is to know there's nothing to prepare. Nutritionists suggest keeping cubed cheese on a covered plate in the refrigerator, or cut and store a variety of sandwiches in small guarters. Sliced raw vegetables and fresh fruits are other snack ideas.

For meal skippers or late arrivals, consider converting

leftovers into an assortment of ready-to-eat or ready-to-heat mini-meals.

Knowing what kinds of foods snackers are not getting enough of is one key to nutritional snacking.



Shipp Likes Change

By BOB NIGH Sports Editor

In a move intended "to settle the question once and for all." Superintendents of Texas high schools have voted overwhelmingly to change girls' basketball from the six-player format to the five-player form. Results of a vote taken last month showed that 549 schools in Texas favored the shift in format over only 369 who disapproved of the change.

Hereford Independent School System head Dr. Harrell Holder was one of the administrators who voted in favor of the move. That put Hereford in the majority of Class 4A schools who decided by a 161-24 vote to make the change.

"I had discussed the vote with our coaching staff and we felt like we as a school are prepared to play the five-player game, and to me that's (5-player format) the game of basketball," Dr. Holder said Monday afternoon.

Dr. Holder, who is a former oach of the six-player format of girls basketball, said he felt the ame needed a change. "I think he girls are physically able to lay the full-court game," he aid. "And, according to our staff most of the girls had ndicated that they would prefer he five-player format." HHS head coach Roy Shipp

the change." Many state schools made the change to five-player basketball last season even though the UIL officially sanctioned the old six-player game. Hereford was one of two District 4-4A schools

to make the move along with Plainview. UIL members had voted a year ago to change the game. but because court cases in other states upheld the six-player game and because some schools which voted to change the format weren't even playing girls basketball at the time of the initial vote, the UIL decided to submit the issue to another

vote. The large margin by which the referendum passed was a surprise to many coaches across the state, including Shipp. "I was very surprised by the margin it passed." he said. "I thought it would be much closer than it was."

Only one class (A) rejected the proposal. Class A superintendents voted against the change by a 106-74 margin. In

the other classes the vote favoring the change went as follows: 4A - 161-24; 3A - 68-41; 2A - 119-76; and B - 127-122. UIL director Dr. Bailey Marshall, who released the results of the vote last Saturday. agreed with Shipp that a lot of schools decided to make the change after trying it in their programs last year.


Eating a variety of wholeosme and nutritious foods, getting enough exercise, and schedul ing regular physical, dental and eye check-ups are all good ways to gaurd against potential health problems.

Encouraging young people to practice preventive measures is one of the major objectives of the 4-H health program, which offers 4-H members practical educational experiences that focus on the physical, nutritional, intellectual, emotional and social aspects of good health.

Under the supervision of the Cooperation Extension Service, 4-H members 9-19 can participate in projects and activities that help them develop healthy living patterns and identify and meet individual and community health needs.

WASHINGTON (AP)-Former Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger told a Senate committee Monday it should urge the Carter administration to increase the number of jet fighters it proposes to sell to

Kissinger told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that the number of planes for Israel in the administration's proposal is "at the very lowest end of the spectrum."

The package submitted to Congress by the Carter administration includes 15 F-15s and 75 F-16s for Israel, 60-F15s for Saudi Arabia and 50 F-5s for Egypt.

Kissinger appeared on Capitol Hill while reports where circulating that the administration was ready to submit a compromise that would increase the number of planes for the

Israelis. A prominent Senate backer of Israel said such a compromise would be welcomed on Capitol Hill, where the proposed sale of the sophisticated F-15s to Saudi Arabia has drawn strong opposition. Kissinger said that while he

was in office, the numbers scheduled witness before the discussed in terms of modernizing the Israeli air force "were several orders of magnitude' higher than the Carter administration proposal.



WASHINGTON (AP) - The overnment that slapped a 3-year-old boy with a dishonorable discharge in 1944, announced Monday that it had changed its mind.

A White House press release briefly stated that the Navy had "reviewed" the case of Calvin Graham and decided to give the Fort Worth man an honorable discharge.

Graham, now 47, was told of the move during a Monday afternoon telephone call from Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, the Texas Democrat who had championed Graham's cause since Septem-

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"I think it's about time," sighed Graham from his Fort Worth residence. "I've been fighting so long to get it. Thank God for the congressmen and news media we've got in this country."


