AUSTIN (AP) - The Senate has voted to make it a crime to try to make money off the selling or buying of human organs within Texas.
Sen. Ray Farabee, D.Wichita Falls, said his bill is similar to a 1984 ederal law that prohibits interstate buying and selling of human organs for profit.
Violators of the
Violators of the proposed state law could be sent to prison for 10
ears and fined $\$ 5,000$., According to writt
Accoring to written, background material, testimony before Con-
gress indicated that buying and selling human organs for profit gress indicated that buying and selling human organs for profit
'would discourage potential donors' of organs and would
discriminate discriminate against persons who are poor by limiting the availabili--
ty of organs for transplant to persons financially able to puurchase ty of orga
them.
"Additionally, individuals in dire economic condition might be en couraged to sell, organs for financilil reasons," the material said.

Weinberger warns Soviets WASHINGTON (AP) - Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger
is cautioning that any slowdown in the nation's military buildup
would weaken U.S. leverage in arms control talks with the Soviet Union.
"As Secretary of State George Shultz warned when he returned rrom Geneva earlier this month, it will be impossible to gain" an
arms agreement with the Soviets "if we falter now in oir commitment to a stronger defense," Weinberger said in a nationally televised speech Monday night.
For, as Congress begins its budget deliberations next week, the Soviets will be watching to see whether the United States will again
shortchange defense as we did in the 1970s," Weinberger said in an musual appearance on Cable News Network
If the United States makes any large cuts in its military budget, tions themselves," he said. "Why should they if we reduce our defense programs before any agreement is made? Weinberger said a freeze on defense spending or drastic cuts in
Pentagon programs would not help much in overcoming the Pentagon programs would not help much in overcoming the deficit "For we must remember that for every $\$ 1$ billion that is cut from the defense budget, we would eliminate 35,000 jobs - and we would lose taxes those American citizens pay," he said.

"In fact, if you cut defense spending by one dollar, you only reduce he deficit by about 50 cents," he said.

The visit to India is considered here as another effort by his two-year-old administration to increase Mexico's profile
widen the current emphasis on Latin American problems.
De la Madrid started this trip - his first outside the hemisphere
since taking office in December 1982 - on Jan. 22 with a stop in Spain since taking office in December 1982 - on Jan. 2 with a stop in Spere
where he met Spanish President Felipe Gonzalez and an official visit where he met S
o Yugoslavia.
In India, the Mexican president will meet with new Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi and other top officials in an attempt to increase commercial and cultural ties between the two countries.
