

## Hot Weather Brings Early Onions

Deaf Smith County's onion crop is leaving the area about a week early this year, according to a report from a local vegetable processing shed. Harvest got underway last week, but rains in the latter part may have slowed operations down slightly.

A warm spring has helped the onions mature earlier; quality this year is good — at least as good if not better than the crop a year ago.

The market is fair — not a high as vegetable men would like to see it, but hopes are that it will take a turn for the better. Onions are being shipped to various points in the United States.

Harvest should be heaviest in the Hereford area during the months of July and August, but it will continue on into the early fall, in all likelihood.

Vegetables have gotten to be big business throughout many

sections of Texas. Vegetables are grown commercially in the Trans-Pecos region, Winter Garde, Laredo, North, East and Central Texas, Upper Coast, Coastal Bend, San Antonio and in the Rio Grande Valley as well as in the High Plains, where harvest of onions has started early.

The late spring onion crop in the Farmersville-McKinney area of north Texas is forecast at 30,000 cwt. double last year's

crop. Harvest got underway during the latter part of May with good yields. Heavy rains hit that area but crop prospects are not expected to be affected.

Based on June 1 prospects, early summer onion production in Texas is forecast at 1,750,000 cwt., 36 percent above the previous year. Anticipated yield per acre is above that of a year ago and acreage for harvest is 17 percent above last year. Harvest is nearing completion at

Presidio in the Trans-Pecos with good yields reported. At Pecos and Fort Stockton, hail and rain caused the loss of some acreage and lowered yields in other fields.

High Plains harvest is expected to get into really high gear now and heavy rains are expected to have some effect on this year's crop.

In the national picture, onion production of late spring onions is estimated at 2,803,000 cwt.

34 percent above last year. Harvest in North Carolina is later than usual because of the cool temperatures and light rain in May.

Weather conditions were favorable for harvesting Georgia. In Arizona the crop is generally behind a year ago. Peak movement is expected about mid-June. In California heavy supplies from the Imperial valley were expected during early June. Harvest of yellow varie-

ties was underway in the Kern County districts during May with a steady increase expected during June. Good volume was expected during the early part of June from the Stockton district and movement should remain active into July.

Early summer onion crop, the onions that will be competing with Hereford onions is forecast at 4,056,000 cwt., 38 percent above last year in the national picture.

Generally harvest dates are a little behind the local area.

Over 7,000 acres of onions are expected to be harvested from the early summer crop this year in Texas. This compares with 4,000 acres in the years from 1961-65 and 6,000 acres harvested for the summer season, 1966.

Yield per acre has also gone up with an expected 250 cwt. as compared to 231 for 1961-65 and a low 215 cwt. per acre for 1966 in the state.

## County School Board Talks Transportation

Trustees on Deaf Smith County School board met Thursday afternoon with the main business being transportation and transfer of students.

Reviewing the transportation report submitted by Hereford Independent Schools and Walcott school district, the board approved routes and a request by Hereford schools for additional routes.

Hereford schools operated 24 routes this past year but struggled with large numbers of children, crowded buses and long routes.

This year they are asking for additional routes. During the year, the Independent school district purchased additional buses at an expense of \$40,000. Total number of pupils riding Hereford buses last year was 1,388 and buses traveled 2,257.3 miles each day. Some buses had to make two runs for each day and carried heavy loads of up to 150 children for the two runs. Walcott operates four buses and does not anticipate need for any more bus routes for next year.

district to another was the second important item on the agenda Thursday. Fourteen pupils, called special transfers were approved. Special transfers constitute pupils in the school district who were not enumerated in January on the regular census roll.

There were 35 regular transfers approved at the meeting. Children requesting permission to attend Hereford schools constituted 24 of the regular transfers and 11 children were requesting permission to attend schools in other districts.

## Gentle Rains Soak In

A gentle, soaking rain fell over most of the area Friday night, bringing needed moisture to dry land. In some areas, it will slow the wheat harvest, but not for long.

Light hail did accompany the rains in Hereford, and also fell in the Frio area. Reports from over the county showed that amounts ranging from .46 to 2 inches have soaked into the ground over the past two nights. Phillip Miller reported the .46 near Wolcott.

Mrs. Herb Schmidt, 15 miles west, said that about 2 inches fell in that area over a period of three hours. There was no wind, just an easy soaking rain.

Milo Center, to the north of Hereford, got an inch of moisture; there was no hail reported there. This area has had more moisture and weather problems this year than all the rest of the county.

A call to Community Grain revealed that about one and a half inches have fallen there Thursday and Friday nights; no damaging hail fell, although there were scattered reports of light hail.

Owes Andrews of Frio reported 1.3 both Thursday night and Friday night.

Toward Dawn, an inch of soaking moisture fell, accompanied by no winds and no hail, according to H. L. Hershey.

### Cycle Riders Honor Former Enthusiast

Several weeks of planning have culminated in formation of a motorcycle club in Hereford. All ages can be members.

The new club had been talked about by several local motorcyclists and also non-motorcyclists for several weeks and their dream came true on June 6.

One of the leading persons who had started the idea of the new club was a 17 year-old youngster who just recently was killed in a car-motorcycle accident. The boy, Joe Dean Love, was well-known among most motorcyclists and other citizens and due to his active participation of the sport, the new club was named in his honor. J. L. Riders, with the initials standing for the late Joe Love, was founded with about 25 persons of all ages applying with 4 persons to act as directors for the club. Serving as its first president is Gary McPherson with Jerry Messer as vice-president and Chris Brooks as secretary-treasurer.

The board of directors is made up of Ed Cardinal, Jerry Blackburn, Ken Gott and Ronald Ott.

Membership to the new club is opened to anyone interested in the promotion of safety and moral character among motorcycle riders. It is opened to persons of all ages and one does not have to have a motorcycle to join. At present, the member's ages range from 13 all the way up to 60 years.

The club chose red and gold as their colors. Dues for membership are \$3 per month at present but plans are being made to reduce them in the future.

The club will meet the first Tuesday of every month at 8:00 p. m. at the Hereford Community Center, The July meeting, however, will have to be held on Wednesday, July 5, because of the July 4 celebration.

Plans are made for competition in the sport already. Next Sunday, a line run will be held at Veteran's Park at 2:00 p. m. It was reported that out-of-town contestants are welcomed and that no entry fee will be charged. The prize to the winner will be a trophy.

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### Baptists' Latin Crusade Brings 2 From Mexico

A second Latin American crusade, sponsored by Baptist churches in the Hereford area, will get underway at the Bull Barn next Sunday night when a 120-voice choir will open the program at 8:45 p. m.

The crusade, which will bring two musicians from Mexico and a preacher from Dallas, is directed toward Latin Americans of all denominations in this area including Hereford, Dimmitt and Frio.

The seven Baptist churches sponsoring the week-long series are planning no services next Sunday night in order that their members may turn out en masse to be a part of the Anglo-Latin American choir. Practice for the choir will be tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock in the auditorium of the First Baptist Church; all singing will be in Spanish.

Rudy Hernandez of Dallas will be the preacher every night, Sunday through Saturday, July 1. Assisting with the musical program will be Pedro Nunez of Chihuahua, Mexico, and Gregorio Tello of Monterrey, Mexico.

This second area-wide crusade is hoped to attract even larger crowds than the one in 1964, when some 350 turned out nightly.

Planners are now working to organize a children's choir in conjunction with the program; a bus service is being scheduled to pick up children to attend.

Robert T. Davis, regional director of business affairs of the General Services Administration told the assembled crowd that he was "indeed impressed with our city . . . its progress and achievements." "You should be commended for your splendid civic spirit," he said.

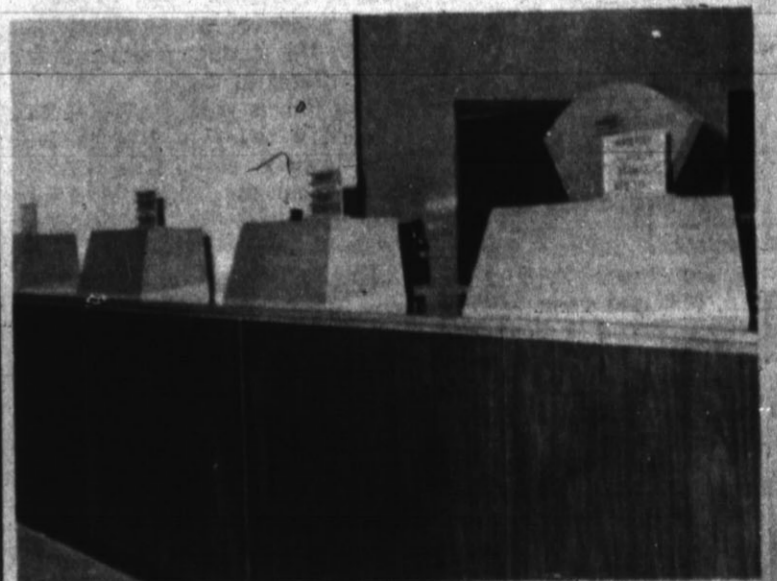
The remodeling operations of the post office cost a total of some \$250,000; of this amount, \$120,000 went to local labor and for local building materials.

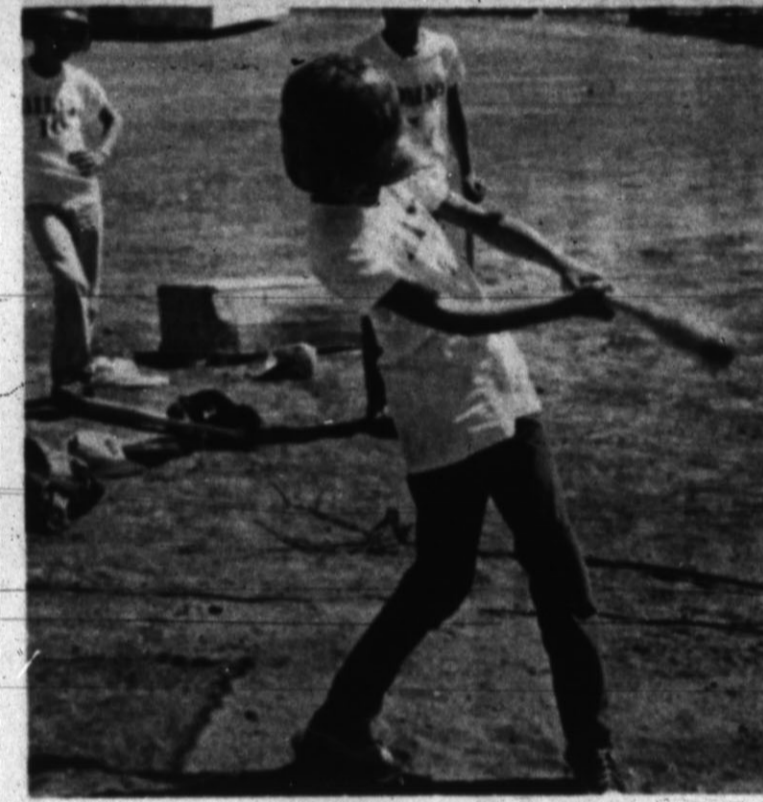
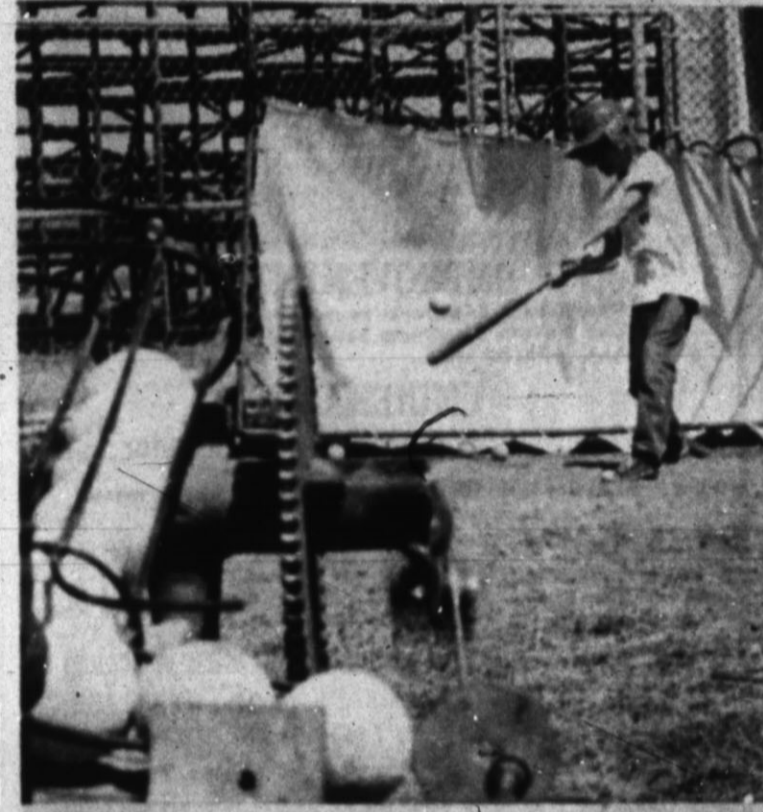
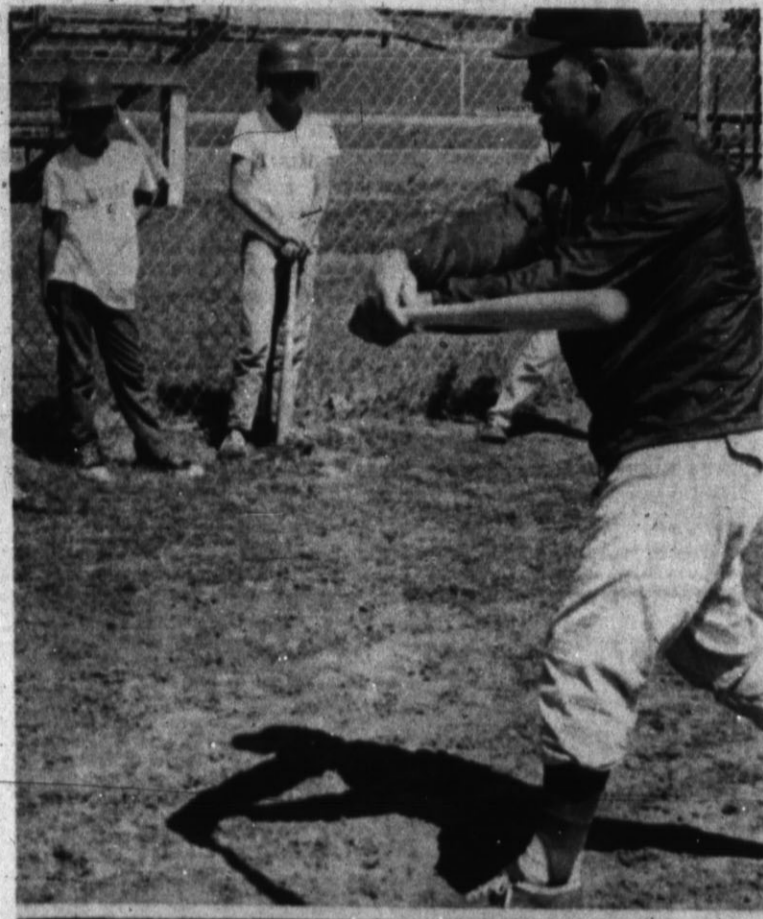


BILL CLAYTON speaks here

Flipping through an old copy of Post while waiting on the barber, I ran across the cartoon where the CIA Man, obviously frustrated at his failure to recruit secret agents from among the throngs of college graduates, walked up to the janitor sweeping the floor after commencement exercises and offered him a job as a CIA man. It reminded me of a puzzle that some hippies were trying to figure out this last spring. It happened at the Nueces College House at the University of Texas at Austin; College House is notorious on campus for the leadership it furnishes in liberal student movements.

It was at the Nueces House that the University Freedom Movement, advocating free speech and academic freedom, was organized. Throngs of students crowded the courtyard nightly in what was otherwise the typical college residence hall.

During the tranquil mornings, residents of College House noticed that a new janitor had arrived for work. Decked out in his faded overalls, complete with limp dusty cap and red handkerchief, he faithfully swept the sidewalks, emptied trash cans, and in general kept the place a little cleaner. And you know how it is in large groups — no one ever bothered to ask where he came from, since he evidently knew what he was doing and someone else must have hired him, or something.

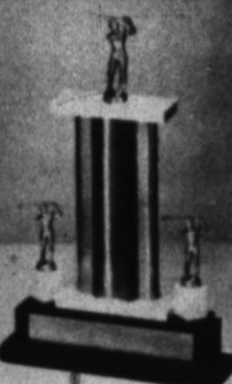
### Students Erect Signs In VBS Mission Project

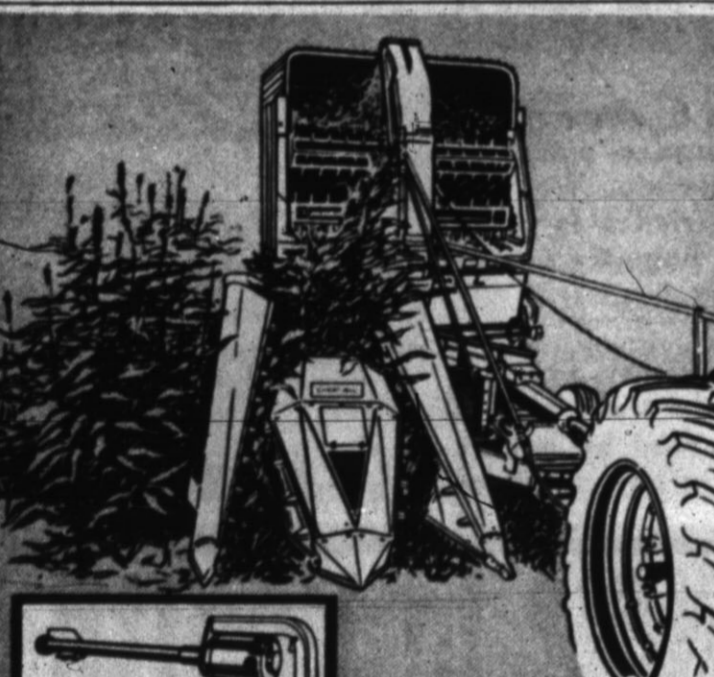

### High Plains Runs Tests On Oil Seed

Oil seed crops are the subject of an extensive testing and breeding program at the High Plains Research Foundation. The purpose of the oil seed research study is to develop im-

proved varieties which are adapted to complete mechanization. Included in this program are two hundred nineteen varieties and strains of Sunflower, which were selected from a total of six hundred in the sunflower six hundred sunflower twelve strains and varieties in the 1966 test. The seed contains about 30 percent oil and 22 per-

cent protein, and are rich in minerals and vitamins necessary for human, livestock and poultry nutrition.

One of the major objectives in the plant breeding program is to develop insect resistant varieties, suitable for machine harvesting. A current problem with the sunflower is the sunflower moth, which causes considerable damage to the seed of susceptible varieties.

Approximately two hundred strains and varieties of Sesame are under observation this year, with the ultimate goal in mind of developing or selecting improved non-shattering varieties which can be harvested mechanically. Expensive hand labor is required with the more common shattering types. Renner 15 is one non-shattering variety which produces acceptable yield under dryland conditions, but is not normally satisfactory under irrigation. Dr. Douglas F. Owen, Agronomist at the Foundation, is responsible for the oil seed testing and breeding program.

A new oilseed crop in the High Plains of Texas is Rape. Loyd Langford, Associate Agronomist, is testing six varieties for adaptability to our climate and soil. These seed were planted on April 5th at both the recommended rate used in Canada and at double that amount for testing under irrigation.

Dr. Ricardo Isla, Dean of Agriculture at the Catholic University of Agriculture in Santiago, Chile, who visited the Research Foundation on June 8, has agreed to a seed exchange program which will help enlarge the testing and breeding study next year.

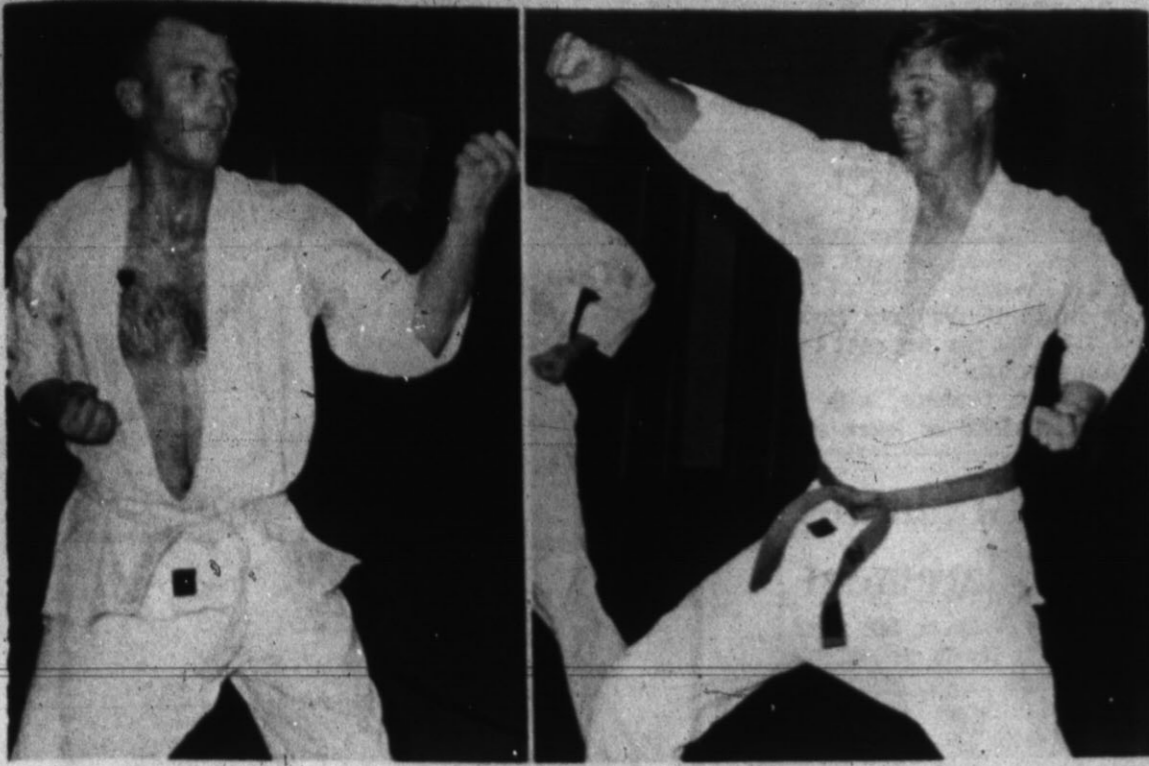

CHICAGO — Wilson & Co., Inc., which will merge with Ling-Tenico-Vaught, Inc. on June 19, 1967, reported today that net after tax earnings of the company and its domestic subsidiaries for the first half of the 1967 fiscal year, ended April 29, were \$9,745,189, an increase of 80 per cent over the \$5,418,318 net after tax profits earned in the first half of the 1966 fiscal year. Figures for 1966 are restated to include earnings of the New England Provision Co. acquired in September 1966.

After deducting dividends paid on preferred stock in the first half of the fiscal year, and adjusting for the 3-for-2 common stock split on February 1, 1967, the first half net after tax

earnings were equal to \$2.55 per common share compared with \$1.38 per common share in the first half of 1966.

Domestic sales also increased to a new six month's high of \$509,494,758, or 6 per cent more than the \$479,885,217 in the same period a year earlier. Tonnage sold was up substantially from a year earlier thereby offsetting somewhat reduced prices prevailing for meat products as compared to 1966. Roscoe G. Haynie, chairman and president said.

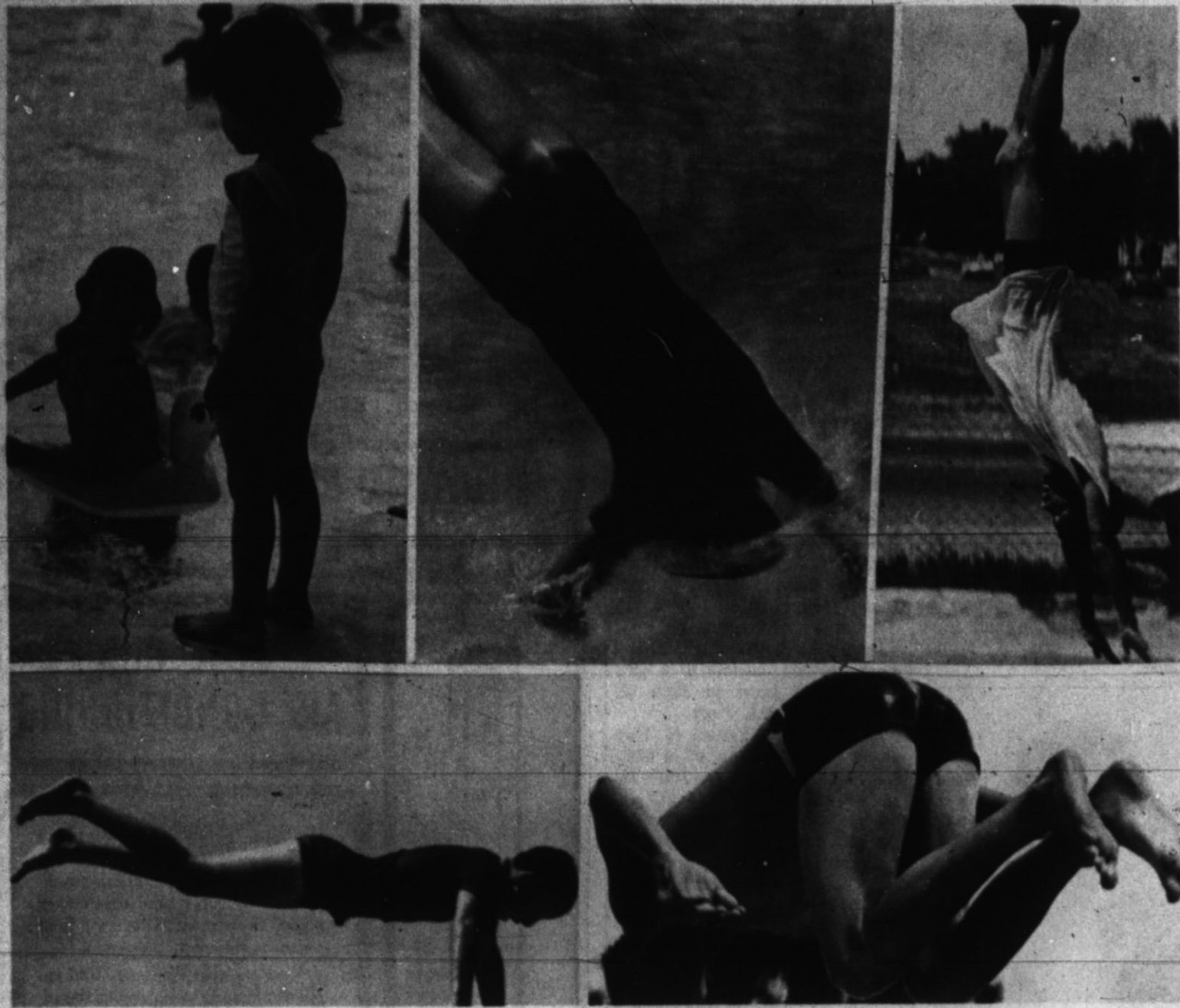

## North Texas Leads State In Feeding

Latest report from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service shows that the Panhandle of Texas leads the rest of the state in cattle-feeding. The report, with figures reflecting the June 1 situation, listed 581,000 head of cattle and calves on feed for slaughter in the state, with 284,000 of these in an area within the Panhandle. At this same time a year ago, there were only 198,000 head in the same area; the state had 515,000 head one year ago.

Ahead of Texas are Iowa, 1,970,000 head; Nebraska, 1,145,000 head; and California, 782,000 head. Arizona is feeding 319,000 Colorado has 529,000.

The increase in Texas is 13 per cent over last year, but it is a 2 per cent drop from May 1, 1967, figures.

Feedlots of 1,000 or more capacity held 550,000 (95 per cent) of the total being fattened for slaughter market. This size group is up 17 per cent from June, 1966, but one per cent below a month ago.

Some 200 feedlots with a capacity of 1,000 or more reported. Smaller lots throughout the state are currently feeding 31,000 total. Marketings of fat cattle during May totaled 151,000 head, 30 per cent above May 1966 but 7 per cent below April marketings in 1967.
